## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Iraq Access to Justice Program is United States Agency for International Development (USAID)/Iraq's three-year program designed to improve access to justice for vulnerable and disadvantaged peoples in Iraq. The program is currently working with civil society counterparts and the Government of Iraq (GOI) to develop a better understanding of which groups fall into the categories of "vulnerable" or "disadvantaged" populations. As a preliminary matter, it is widely accepted that these groups include women, war widows, orphans, detainees and the incarcerated, minorities (both ethnic and religious), internally displaced persons, and returnees. Access to Justice focuses on the following three components:

### **COMPONENT 1:**

- Improve the practical knowledge of vulnerable and disadvantaged Iraqis of their responsibilities, rights, and remedies under Iraqi law.

### **COMPONENT 2:**

- Increase the competence and availability of legal professionals and civil society partners who assist vulnerable and disadvantaged Iraqis.

### **COMPONENT 3:**

- Improve government processes and procedures to facilitate access of vulnerable populations to government services and legal remedies.

This quarter represents the second quarter in Year 2 of program implementation. This report covers the third quarter in Year 2 of program implementation. Access to Justice laid the foundation for assisting vulnerable populations in the initial phases of the grants program and continues to issue grants through a competitive process. Several new grants were awarded during the reporting period and additional grants will be rolled out in the next quarter.

Component 1 continued building connections between civil society and government counterparts through strategic training on implementing awareness campaigns to Kurdistan Regional Government (KRG) Ministries, which follows upon training provided to key GOI Ministries last quarter. The program's key government partners in this component include the Ministry of Human Rights (MOHR) in Baghdad, the Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs (MOLSA) in both Baghdad and the KRG, and the NGO Directorate in Baghdad and the KRG. During the quarter, Access to Justice began receiving grant applications from NGOs interested in partnering with the government on awareness-raising campaigns. Additionally, twelve new grantees began awareness-raising campaigns while Access to Justice prepared for next quarter's launch of its own awareness-raising campaign on the importance of marriage registration. The first perception survey to determine vulnerable groups' knowledge of their rights launched during the quarter, and the program and is piloting an on-line NGO registration system in partnership with the NGO Directorate.

Component 2 oversaw the establishment of twelve new NGO legal clinics and further implementation of the Best Practices Workshops for NGO Legal Clinics. Access to Justice's partnership with the Iraqi Bar Association (IBA) continued to grow as Human Rights Law Workshops for young lawyers began this quarter. The program's efforts in legal curriculum reform bore fruit as Access to Justice hosted the second annual Law School Dean's Conference and saw the completion of the first legal clinic course at Baghdad Law School.



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Component 3 continued to facilitate meaningful dialogue between NGO partners and government in order to address areas of needed reform important to vulnerable groups. During the quarter, the executive and legislative branches of government in the GOI and the KRG were engaged. Issues addressed included amending the Personal Status Law, strengthening the rights of the disabled, and improved residency procedures for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the Iraqi Kurdistan Region (IKR).



## **ACHIEVED RESULTS**

### **COMPONENT I: PUBLIC AWARENESS AND OUTREACH**

During the quarter, the first group of Iraqi civil society organizations (CSOs) that were awarded rapid grants successfully completed their projects. Nearly all of them included a public awareness component to inform vulnerable groups about the legal rights and services available to them by the GOI and/or to publicize free legal clinic services. Twelve new grantees started implementing information and awareness-raising campaigns this quarter in Baghdad, Basrah, and the IKR. Access to Justice supported the development of an on-line registration system for Iraqi NGOs at the NGO Directorate in Baghdad. The registration system is in the pilot phase but will be fully operational early in the next quarter. In expanding the program's geographical outreach, the program team traveled throughout the IKR and to Najaf and Karbala to introduce NGOs in these areas to the program and to the grants process. The program continues to provide awareness-raising campaign technical support to the GOI and grantees through mentoring, training, and capacity building on various aspects of communication.

#### **Highlights**

- Eleven (11) awareness-raising campaigns completed by program grantees:
  - Tools employed: radio, TV, brochures, posters, booklets, awareness-raising workshops.
  - Focus issues: marriage registration, Personal Status Law, identification issues, rights of persons with disabilities (PWDs), rights of internally displaced persons (IDPs).
- Most effective communication tool—awareness-raising workshops: more than 284 workshops on legal rights for more than 7,000 attendees (over 5,500 women), resulting in approximately 1,000 legal cases.
- Development of NGO Directorate on-line registration system for Iraqi NGOs.

#### **1.1: Partner Civil Society Organizations, Professional Organizations, and Government Partners Launch Strategic Communication Campaign that Effectively Delivers Priority Access to Justice Messages to Targeted Vulnerable Populations**

##### **Awareness-Raising Campaigns by Ministry of Human Rights and Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs**

As a result of program efforts, relevant government ministries and departments now realize the importance of investing in raising awareness of citizens concerning their rights and government services. The more challenging task remains coordination between the government and civil society in launching awareness-raising campaigns. During the quarter, the program expanded efforts in introducing NGOs and CSOs in various parts of the country as implementing partners for GOI-led awareness-raising campaigns. The NGO Directorate and the MOHR strongly supported these efforts with lists of registered, competent NGOs and in organizing meetings. The NGO Directorate coordinated with the program in organizing meetings in April with 19 NGOs from Najaf, Karbala, Hilla, and Diwaniyah who are actively involved in implementing various projects for vulnerable groups in their areas. Most of these NGOs submitted grant summary forms (GSFs) which are moving through the evaluation process.

In June 2012, Access to Justice met with representatives from 38 NGOs from Baghdad, Mosul, Anbar, Kirkuk, Salahaddin, Diyala, Hilla, Karbala, Najaf, Diwanya, Basrah, Amarra, Nassiriya and Kut, recommended by the MOHR based on their experience and competence. The NGOs were introduced to the objectives of the program, the scope of work, the targeted vulnerable groups, and their potential issues. High level officials from the MOHR also attended the meeting, stressing that the cooperation between the MOHR and Access to Justice plays a vital role in improving the knowledge level and status of vulnerable communities in Iraq.

These meeting formats are essential in expanding the outreach of the program. Those NGOs selected will begin implementing awareness-raising campaigns on themes selected by the MOHR in the next quarter. The design and implementation of the campaigns will be supervised by a joint committee of representatives of the MOHR, the Access to Justice Program, and the implementing NGO.

### **Localized Awareness Campaigns Launched by Partner CSOs, Professional Organizations, and Government Partners Improve Knowledge of Vulnerable Groups about Their Legal Rights and Remedies**

During the quarter, 11 awareness-raising campaigns were completed by grantees. The campaigns covered issues faced by women, persons with disabilities, and internally displaced persons and included awareness-raising events, booklets/handouts/brochures/ posters, and radio and TV programs. The immediate impact of the campaigns is measured by the approximately 3,000 people who sought free legal services offered by grantee legal clinics after learning about them through various communication tools used in the campaigns.

The most effective tool of communication used in these campaigns was the awareness-raising workshop in which participants were provided firsthand knowledge and information about their rights and services offered under the constitution. A total number of 284 workshops were conducted by grantees on topics including the Personal Status Law, rights and services for PWDs and IDPs, and most of all on issues related to identification documents like *jinsiya*, ration cards and marriage certificates which are necessary to access services offered by GOI. These workshops increased the knowledge levels of participants, encouraged them to access their rights through the free legal services offered by grantees, and they also provided NGOs with the opportunity to learn more about the issues most affecting their communities and helped them plan future projects accordingly.

The radio/TV talk shows and booklets containing information about legal rights and the processes involved in accessing those rights in simple language are very effective tools for increasing the knowledge levels of the target vulnerable groups. Interactive radio shows where the audiences



could call in and consult directly with legal advisors has also been another effective tool for mass awareness.

Fourteen new grants were awarded during the quarter and all include awareness-raising and information campaigns as part of their main activities. Four grants focus exclusively on raising awareness of issues faced by women victims of violence and deprivation of basic human rights. The issues highlighted in these grants, the corresponding activities, and the targeted beneficiaries have been carefully selected with primary consideration given to the likelihood of sustainability and impact. Below are brief overviews of new grant activities:

- **Aswat Al-Iraq** is filming reports on different legal issues faced by widows which will be available for use by other NGOs for raising awareness on legal issues related to widows.
- **Salam Al-Rafidain's** phase two grant focuses on the problems associated with unregistered marriages through workshops in the rural areas of southern Iraq.
- **Hataw Organization** will address women's issues through specialized training of media professionals and journalists to highlight and report more effectively on issues related to violence against women.
- **Hiyad Organization** started awareness-raising activities on issues related to women and the Personal Status Law. They developed a booklet and brochures that provide basic information on the Personal Status Law and the free legal services offered through their legal clinic.
- **Amal Al-Basrya Organization** is providing free legal services to people with disabilities and is informing them about their rights and the services offered to them by the government.
- **Voice of Older People (VOP)** started a campaign on issues related to unregistered marriages with a live call-in TV talk show to provide legal awareness about the importance of registering marriages and the process of registration. The next activity is a TV drama that highlights this issue in more detail.
- **Civil Development Organization (CDO)** established a legal clinic in Kirkuk that aids vulnerable women. They also launched an awareness-raising campaign with folders and leaflets containing legal information on various issues related to women and violence.
- **Al-Taqwa Association** printed 1000 posters and 2500 brochures to promote the free services offered in their legal clinic for female IDPs.
- **Warvin Foundation for Women Issues** is establishing a news agency that will report only on issues related to violence against women and protection of their legal rights. They started activities by launching a training on "Journalism and Justice," for female journalists in the IKR.




Figure 3: Kurdistan Reconstruction and Development Society (KURDS) Poster for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) Campaign

## **1.2: Improved Knowledge of Target Groups about Services/Entitlements Offered by the Government and Civil Society**

### **Awareness Campaign Sponsored by Program to Improve Knowledge and Access to Legal Rights in Target Vulnerable Groups**

The program contracted this quarter with East Studio for Art Works, a Sulaymaniyah based company, to implement a media campaign that will include popular radio, television, and print media. The objectives of the campaign are to increase the target audience's knowledge about the importance of registering marriages, the consequences of unregistered marriages, the process of obtaining marriage certificates, and how to access remedies and entitlements provided by the government under the Personal Status Law. The target audience includes widows, divorcees, young couples, and the general public.

The program team is working closely with the company on messages and campaign information dissemination. East Studio conducted a number of focus group discussions with sample target audiences in the IKR, Baghdad, and Basrah. The campaign is expected to launch during Ramadan.

### **Assessments Conducted that Assist Vulnerable Populations in Accessing their Rights**

Access to Justice contracted with Relief International (RI) to design and implement a series of surveys to collect information on vulnerable groups; measure implementation progress of program activities; assess the existing knowledge levels of targeted vulnerable groups about their legal rights, related services offered by the state, and ways to access those services; and assess the changes in the knowledge levels of the vulnerable groups after program interventions. The survey findings will enable the program to refine activities in providing services to these groups.

The program is working closely with RI in the development of the questionnaires and survey plan. The survey will commence next quarter with a sample size of 15,200 spread over 76 districts in Iraq.

## **1.3: Practical Knowledge of Vulnerable Populations of How to Access and Use Tools Improved Through Traditional and Social Media**

### **Training and Assistance to Partner Organizations to Conduct Public Outreach or Needs Assessments**


Access to Justice, in collaboration with IREX, completed a training program on "Effective Communication and Information Dissemination Using Traditional and New Media." The six-session program was held in Erbil in June and was attended by representatives of the KRG MOLSA and MOJ, the Kurdistan Bar Association (KBA), and representatives from grantees Kurdistan Human Rights Watch (KHRW), Al-Aswat, KURDS, and CDO. The program is designed to improve the skills of the participants in various aspects of media and in designing, planning, and implementing awareness campaigns.

Training topics included communication strategies and tools, market research plans, right-to-information policies, uses of new media, understanding the use of images in advocacy, general principles of statistics and sampling, and the use of data analysis programs to facilitate campaign

design. Interactive sessions also helped participants understand the role of an effective government media office, while teaching practical skills for writing better news reports, press releases, and articles.

During this quarter all new grantees received the strategic communication plan (SCP) that was designed in Year 1. The SCP provides basic guidelines on the process of designing, implementing, and monitoring awareness-raising campaigns for program partners. The SCP also provides the starting point of the program’s training package tailored to build the capacity of grantees that do not specialize in awareness campaigns, and to refine the technical skills of those with prior experience in awareness campaigns. This training includes sessions on: determining goals for the campaign; selecting the target audience; developing messages; selecting appropriate tools for message dissemination; and the importance of continuous monitoring and evaluation to measure the progress and impact of the campaigns. Two trainings were held, one for nine grantees from Basrah, and the second for six grantees from the IKR.

**On-Line Registration System for Iraqi NGOs:** This quarter the NGO Directorate completed, with the assistance of the Access to Justice Program, the set-up of an on-line registration system for Iraqi NGOs. This comprehensive on-line application, screening, and automatic archiving system will be a pioneering system in digitizing registration procedures in Iraq. The system will be completely operational by the second week of July after completion of the testing phase. On-line registration will not only increase the efficiency of the registration process, it will also simplify the screening process while facilitating automatic archiving of files created by the system. An extensive training program for IT and staff responsible for assessment of applications submitted for registration was completed during the quarter.

### 1.4: Effective Monitoring and Evaluation of Implementing Partner Public Awareness Campaigns

#### Tools to Monitor Communication Activities and Evaluate Their Impact

Access to Justice Component 1 (C1) developed monitoring plans for all new grantees that corresponds to their implementation plans and includes regular site visits. Information gathered during these visits is used to monitor implementation and impact of communication initiatives.

The following summarizes a sampling of site visits completed during this quarter:

- **Baghdad Law School.** C1 provided technical input for improving the designs of their public awareness materials.
- **Salam Al-Rafidain.** Recently completed awareness-raising activities under the current project and briefed C1 on the impact of the awareness-raising campaign in terms of improvement in knowledge and access to legal services by the target groups. The NGO is



in the process of developing a database which will provide details and numbers of people who accessed legal clinic services as result of the awareness-raising campaign.

- **Fatema House of Charity for Women**, located in the critical area of Sadr City in Baghdad. The primary objective of the visit was to determine whether the grantees' activities are positively affecting targeted beneficiaries for consideration in the NGO's application for a second grant. C1 interacted directly with a large number of beneficiaries at the Fatema House Legal Clinic and gathered firsthand information about their experiences with the services provided by the grantee. The beneficiaries expressed that their lives had undergone a change when they learned during awareness-raising workshops that they could access a number of benefits from the government as widows and divorced women. C1 followed up with Fatema House to discuss a second grant that will be focused on awareness-raising and expanding the scope of the grant to violence against women, a rampant problem in the Sadr City area.
- **Iraq Al-Amal Association's** Legal Clinic Aid and Information Center (LAIC) for Vulnerable Women in Najaf. C1 was briefed on the impact of the center's awareness-raising workshops and materials. The clinic is approached by many women for legal consultation and support as a result of posters displayed around the city and by referrals from concerned departments in the MOLSA and through the social police department set up under the Ministry of Interior (MOI). A beneficiary of the legal clinic who was discussing her case with one of the lawyers expressed deep gratitude for the free legal services.

Access to Justice presented USAID Marking and Branding guidelines as well as directions on how to prepare the required awareness-raising work plan and weekly updates for new grantees: Baghdad Women Association (BWA) in Baghdad; Hataw, CDO and Bustan Association in Sulaymaniyah; KURDS, Harikar, and VOP in Dohuk; and Aswat Al-Iraq, Warvin Foundation, and KHRW in Erbil.

## **COMPONENT 2: LEGAL SERVICE NGOS, LAWYERS, AND LAW SCHOOLS**

During this quarter, 12 new NGOs were awarded grants to provide legal services to vulnerable people, increasing the program's footprint in the southern provinces and Kirkuk. The program refined in-house technical monitoring tools and completed 28 site visits during the quarter. Legal education reform moved forward with the second Law School Curriculum Reform Conference, attended by law school deans from across the country, students and legal professionals. During the conference, 11 law schools expressed interest in opening a legal clinic, and Access to Justice provided them with in-depth assistance on how to apply for a law school legal clinic grant. Representatives from 8 of the schools attended a two-day workshop on the program's law school legal clinic model utilizing the proper methodology of coursework and student involvement in client representation. This quarter saw continued progress with legal associations as the program worked with the Iraqi Bar Association (IBA) to provide human rights training for legal professionals. The KBA continued their training for lawyers on *pro bono* work, the importance of legal clinics, and the Lawyer's Code of Conduct.



## Highlights

- 8 new NGO legal clinics in Basrah covering the governorate and expanding the program's geographic footprint into the South.
- 4 new grantees in Dohuk, Kirkuk, Ninewa, and Baghdad to implement legal clinics.
- 2 NGO Legal Clinic Best Practices Workshops, developing grantees' capacity to successfully run a legal clinic based on a client-centered approach that best serves vulnerable people.
- Iraqi Law School Curriculum Development Reform Conference brought together Deans from 25 law schools to discuss reform efforts to encourage a more practical skills based educational experience for students.
- Baghdad Law School (BLS) completed the semester long "Legal Clinic Course" based on entirely new curriculum for 339 fourth year students.

## **2.1: Support Iraqi NGOs Working in Priority Access to Justice Areas to Improve Their Administrative and Substantive Capacity to Support Vulnerable Populations**

### **Increased Legal Awareness of NGOs Serving Vulnerable Groups**

The IBA finalized training materials developed for the training program to assist NGOs to better understand common procedures for cases involving vulnerable people. Practical in nature and designed for one day of training, the materials include templates that can be used as a reference by new lawyers in civil and personal status cases. The materials focus on personal rights, wills and inheritance, marriage, divorce, separation, alimony, and dowry. The IBA will debut the materials at the Third Quarterly Partners Meeting in July where they will conduct a training session for NGO lawyers.

### **Improved NGO Organizational Capacity to Increase and Ensure Effective Service to Vulnerable Populations**

Access to Justice provided technical advice, capacity development, and mentoring to all NGO legal clinic grantees to improve their organizational capacity and provision of direct legal services. As a result of these efforts, the quality of technical and administrative ability and direct legal service provision continues to improve each quarter. The Access to Justice legal clinic model is utilized to ensure the provision of quality service and to ensure that NGO legal clinics understand reporting requirements. The site visit monitoring and mentoring program includes unscheduled site visits to grantee NGOs, in addition to the scheduled visits, for increased quality control.

The program finalized the technical reporting mechanism used to capture lessons learned, evaluate the success of a grantee in both organizational development and direct service provision over the lifecycle of the grant, and to make recommendations on whether or not the grantee should be given the opportunity (with or without recommended changes in scope) for a follow-on grant. Access to Justice teams comprised of Component 2, the Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Specialist, the Grants Unit, and the Basrah and Erbil Regional Offices, completed 28 site visits to grantees this quarter.

Access to Justice experts observed the challenges facing grantees due to low levels of organizational development. To address the problems, the program is developing a pilot course module on activity planning to assist partner NGOs in managing their activities with enhanced capacity. The objectives of the course are program implementation benefits of an activity plan and how to develop an effective activity plan. The course will provide guidance in breaking down each task in order to clearly articulate the steps necessary to meet a deliverable and to ensure that the implementation of the activity is in keeping with the wider objectives of the project. The course, which includes power point slides, student hand-outs, and an instructor guide, will be rolled out for grantee project managers as a one-day three hour training at the Third Quarterly Partners Meeting.

All program NGOs are providing legal assistance to vulnerable groups including women, IDPs, returnees, and persons with disabilities; the majority are related to vulnerable women. The chart below reflects the estimated number of legal cases and hotline calls received by grantees.

### **Direct Service Delivery to Vulnerable Groups Improved through NGO Legal Clinics**

The program linked eight new grantees implementing legal clinic activities in Basrah with Mercy Corps CAPIII women’s awareness and inclusion literacy classes based on target beneficiaries and geographic location. This coordination between the two programs represents an effort to provide more comprehensive assistance to many of the more than 1,000 women attending the classes (widows, divorcees, and IDPs) who have expressed a need for assistance in obtaining IDs, accessing government benefits, and certifying their marriages. Program funded grantees will provide awareness-raising sessions and direct service provision to the women in the literacy classes next quarter.

During May and June, the program completed two five-day training programs in Basrah and Erbil on best practices for NGO/community-based legal clinics. Sixteen participants, including directors and lawyers from eight NGO grantee legal clinics, attended the Basrah training, and 19 participants, including directors, social workers, and lawyers from seven grantee legal clinics and the KBA, attended the training in Erbil.

These were the second and third trainings based on the Access to Justice best practices model and were conducted by Access to Justice lawyers and the Training Specialist. The trainers provide in-depth instruction through lecture, group discussion, and interactive exercises on the provision of quality legal services and the management and operations of NGO legal clinics. The agenda included: focusing a legal services program; organizational development; handling vulnerable populations with sensitivity; legal advocacy techniques; legal defense; informal justice; and managing legal services programs. The training is being provided for lawyers and directors of new legal clinics.

During the workshop, new grantees were provided with technical assistance on reporting, managing information, databases, progress reports, filing systems, activity planning, and classifying legal services according to program criteria. At the Basrah training, coordination between the legal clinics' activities and the Mercy Corps' CAP Women's Awareness and Inclusion Literacy classes was also discussed.

#### **Relationship Building with NGO Directorate**

Government partner NGO Directorate provided Access to Justice with an updated list of all legally registered NGOs throughout the country to assist the program in identifying potential NGOs that broadly work under the Access to Justice umbrella, including those providing legal services. Access to Justice used this list to invite NGOs to RFA trainings.

#### **Grants Support Provision of Targeted Legal Assistance to the Vulnerable**

The legal assistance to vulnerable populations provided by grantee organizations this quarter is reflected in the following table.

## **2.2: Work with Iraqi Legal Professional Associations (primarily the Iraqi Bar Association and Jurist Union and their subsidiaries) to Increase Administrative and Substantive Capacity for Empowering Lawyers and Other Legal Professionals to Assist Vulnerable or Disadvantaged Populations**

### **IBA and KBA Administrative Capability Strengthened**

During the quarter, the program worked extensively with the IBA in activity planning and basic administrative techniques, such as internal communication, preparation of documentation, and reporting skills.

The program is moving forward with the professional connection between the KBA and the Florida Bar Association (FBA) facilitated by Access to Justice and the U.S. Consulate General Rule of Law Office in Erbil. The FBA is tentatively planning to travel to Iraq after Ramadan.



### **2.3: Assist the IBA and Other Legal Associations to “Increase the Supply” of Lawyers Assisting Vulnerable or Disadvantaged Populations**

#### **Awareness-Raising Among Lawyers of Basic Human Rights of Vulnerable Groups**

During June, the program completed rollout of the revamped four-day Human Rights for Legal Professionals training in Baghdad in conjunction with the IBA. The IBA Chairman attended the first two days, along with 50 young lawyers (35males, 16 females). The agenda included an overview of international human rights laws, how to apply the laws at the national level, the role of lawyers in ensuring the application of international human rights laws to which Iraq is signatory, children’s rights in international and national law, women’s rights, and the rights of internally displaced people.

The new materials were well received and the interactive training methodology provided a dynamic environment for the participants to discuss the role of legal professionals in upholding human rights in Iraq.

#### **Training for Lawyers in Providing Practical and Effective Legal Assistance to Individuals from Vulnerable Groups**

The KBA completed training for 18 lawyers from the Soran District, 12 lawyers from Erbil, and 20 from Koya in June. Next quarter, they will conduct their final training for law students from Salahaddin, Dicle, and Ishik Universities. The training covered the importance and role of legal clinics in supporting vulnerable groups, *pro bono* work by lawyers to support human right issues, and the Lawyer’s Code of Conduct.

As previously noted above in section 2.1, the IBA finalized their training materials on common procedures for cases involving vulnerable people and will train NGO lawyers at the July Quarterly Partners Meeting.

### **2.4: Support Development of Programs and Modernization of Academic and Practical Curriculum Related to Extending Access to Justice to Vulnerable Populations at Law Schools**

#### **Curriculum Development**

Access to Justice, in collaboration with the Deans Council of Schools of Law & Political Science, conducted the Second Annual Deans Conference in Erbil on May 6-7, titled “Iraqi Law School Curriculum Development Conference.” The event, attended by 25 deans, seven professors, three



students, and a representative from the KBA, opened with an overview of the previous conference held in May of last year and the achievements to date, particularly the MOHE's approval to implement legal clinics at Iraqi Law schools. The participants reevaluated gaps and omissions in Iraqi law school curriculum and produced a 10-step strategy to remedy the issues. These steps are incorporated into Access to Justice ongoing activities with law schools, such as curriculum reform, legal clinics and participation in the Jessup Moot Court Competition.

The agenda included presentations on the importance of moot courts in the learning process with a specific discussion of the Jessup International Law School Moot Court Competition; the importance of incorporating legal clinics into law school curriculum; an action plan for enhancing the role of students in the educational process; and recommendations on how law schools can become more engaged in the legislative process to work on behalf of vulnerable groups. The conference ended with recommendations on the way forward and an action plan that the Deans Council will use as a blueprint to modernize law school curriculum.

Baghdad Law School successfully completed the new semester long legal clinic course based entirely on new curriculum developed by Access to Justice as part of its core fourth-year curriculum. The course provided practical clinical legal education training grounded in international best practices regarding the rights of vulnerable groups for 339 students (248 female).



## Establishment of Legal Clinics in Law Schools




Figure 11: Visit to Babil Law School

Eleven law schools expressed interest in applying for grants to incorporate legal clinics into their curriculum. The schools are located in governorates across the country and have been targeted by the program for in-depth technical assistance through site visits, nine of which occurred during the quarter, to explain the legal clinic model and gain official approval from the law school leadership to incorporate clinic activities into their curriculum. Fifteen representatives from eight of the schools attended a two-day Baghdad workshop, June 30-July 1, on the Access to Justice Law School Legal Clinic Model explaining the proper methodology of coursework and student involvement in client representation. ### **COMPONENT 3: ADVOCACY AND LEGAL REFORM**

The number of Access to Justice grantees supporting and organizing dialogue with the GOI and Parliament on much-needed areas for reform increased this quarter to approximately 20 NGOs in direct, high-level engagement. The program continued to organize high-level meetings between the General Secretariat of the Council of Ministers (COMSEC) and NGOs on issues of importance for vulnerable groups as relationships with COMSEC deepened, and the program began working in earnest with the Human Rights Committee of Parliament, as well as, representatives of the Legal Committee and the Women's Committee. Program grantees lobbied for passage of a Disabilities Law, Social Insurance Law, and improved procedures for widows whose husbands have disappeared in acts of violence. NGOs were provided expertise on lobbying techniques for specific reforms. More formal training on advocacy is programmed for next quarter. By facilitating meetings with GOI representatives, Parliament, and NGOs on a basis of trust and mutual respect with the intention of changing laws and procedures important to vulnerable groups, Access to Justice is working toward the formation of long-term relationships.

#### **Highlights**

- Facilitated coordination between grantee NGOs and GOI to advocate for NGOs' proposed changes to the Personal Status Law to reduce waiting period for establishing missing husband's death from 4 years to 2.
- Working group of NGOs focused on disabilities and the GOI established at COMSEC's request to sustain ongoing active exchanges between government and civil society while grantee IADO advocates for disabilities law reform.
- Grantee KHRW roundtable addressing issues related to denial of residency for IDPs in the IKR.

#### **3.1: Support Partners in Reviewing Processes and Procedures for Reform of Policies, Regulations, and Legislation as they relate to Vulnerable Populations**

##### **Disabilities Law**

During the quarter, the program facilitated the establishment of a working group comprised of eight NGOs active in disabilities issues and COMSEC to discuss and find solutions to the challenges faced by the disabilities community. The working group will enable the NGOs to independently support programs and to support the passage of legislation responsive to the needs of vulnerable persons. COMSEC has embraced this working group and has incorporated it into its agenda.

A grant was also awarded to the Iraq Alliance of Disabilities Organizations (IADO) to lobby legislative authorities for passage of a robust Law on Disabilities.

These efforts have increased the momentum for the GOI to shoulder treaty obligations under the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). This will involve moving ahead with passage of a relevant new Law on Disabilities that fulfills treaty obligations. COMSEC's engagement with the NGO working group reflects the GOI's intent to enact a law relevant to the treaty in a way that has real meaning for the disabilities community.

IADO has committed to conducting three forums on the needs of vulnerable groups and in particular the need to pass a Law on Disabilities that will meaningfully implement the 50 diverse articles of the CRPD. COMSEC has been able to attract the attention of important community leaders and high-level government officials to two forums held to date, including the Deputy Secretary General of COMSEC Rahman Issa.

IADO continued to actively lobby to have a law consistent with the CRPD enacted, and with our technical support makes its views known on gaps that it sees between draft legislation and the CRPD.

Access to Justice fostered its relationship with Dr. Entisar Al-Jabouri, head of the Women, Family, and Childhood Committee, who was the driving force behind Iraq’s accession to the CRPD in January 2012. In the next quarter, the program will provide the Parliament and the GOI with a legislative linking document that matches the CRPD’s provisions to specific Iraqi laws that require amendment.

The head of the Human Rights Committee of Parliament presented an MOU stating the Committee’s intent to work with the program on instilling best practices in the laws, such as the Law on Disabilities and has requested expertise on a number of laws affecting vulnerable populations.

With program grant assistance, KURDS started an assessment on denial of disability benefits in the IKR. Scheduled to be completed in the next quarter, the report will facilitate preparation of a draft procedure for appeal of denial of benefits for consideration by the KRG Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs.

### **Widows Issues and Social Welfare Law**

During the Second Quarterly Partners Meeting in April, Access to Justice linked grantee Fatema House with GOI representatives Ahmed Al-Meini of the Shura Council and Hussein Al-Safi of the Legal Committee of Parliament. The purpose of the meeting was to strategize on how to remedy the burdensome procedures required before a married woman, whose husband is presumed deceased, may be legally declared a widow. Oftentimes, these women and their children may be a decade without survivor benefits and will resort to begging, truancy, and petty criminality to feed their families.

Based on the positive reception by the GOI, the program buttressed this initiative with targeted grant support to Fatema House and facilitation of further high-level meetings to lobby for procedural simplification and Personal Status Law reform.

Meanwhile, three separate NGO grantees are working on efforts to reform the Law on Social Insurance (also called Social Welfare), which will decide how widows without independent incomes will be treated in the future. These NGOs will be the foundation of a committee of NGOs lobbying the government to pass a significant Law on Social Insurance to protect vulnerable groups.

The program is preparing a paper, at the request of the legal consultant to the Speaker of the Parliament, which will provide historical information on how the devastated economies of



Germany and Japan supported their most vulnerable people, such as widows, at the end of World War II. The paper will include an explanation in the developments in those countries from the mid-1800s to the period following WWII.

At the request of COMSEC and with the agreement of USAID, the program organized and facilitated a meeting of seven NGOs with COMSEC, USAID, and Tijara (a USAID-funded project) to examine employment generation and microfinance opportunities for homebound women (including widows) and options for addressing the problem in the future. COMSEC used the opportunity to establish an NGO working group on the issue.

### **Improved Framework for Gender-Based Violence**

Component 3 worked with several grant applicants to begin assembling a coalition of advocacy grantees to work on issues of gender-based violence, particularly as reflected in the Personal Status Law and the Penal Code. The program has consistently urged grant applicants to budget a lawyer responsible for legislative writing, to draft proposed provisions in law, rather than well-meaning but less influential efforts like highlighting obstacles. In the future, the program will work with grantees to form a working group that will work on these laws in particular and make recommendations to the GOI.

The program and one of its grantees worked with Member of Parliament Safiya Suhail's monthly Salon to identify provisions of laws that should be amended, particularly those affecting the equal treatment of women. The Salon is an occasional forum that deals with diverse topics such as literature, current events, and legal initiatives such as these. The intent is to afford better protection to women and improved gender-neutral treatment in cases of gender-based violence related to marital relationships.

On April 16<sup>th</sup>, Access to Justice-Basrah participated in the Domestic/Gender Based Violence Seminar sponsored by UNDP at the Basrah International Hotel. Participants included members of the Basrah Provincial Council, Family Protection Units of the MOI, Family Court Judges, lawyers, and concerned NGOs. Access to Justice Basrah Legal Advisor introduced the Access to Justice Program to the participants.



### **Reformed Law on Lawyers that Provides Improved Legal Assistance to Vulnerable Groups**

The multi-agency working group comprised of a Member of Parliament from the Legal Committee, the Legal Office of COMSEC, the Shura Council, and the IBA was stalled in moving the IBA draft version of the Law on Lawyers toward adoption. The GOI expressed a number of concerns unrelated to the *pro bono* requirements for representing vulnerable persons that caused the IBA to disengage from the process. Access to Justice continued working cooperatively with the IBA in developing a different strategy to facilitate the adoption of a law that will include the *pro bono* provisions.

### **Identity Law Reform Initiative and Internally Displaced Persons**

KHRW is preparing an assessment of the procedures that result in the denial of residency permits in order to better understand the process and effectively advise vulnerable groups (and relevant legal clinics) in how to apply for residency permits. The assessment will be used to develop guidelines for appealing denials of residence and for obtaining residency permits in the IKR.

The program organized and held a roundtable for NGOs and government officials in Erbil on Residency Issues of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in the IKR, whose numbers are substantially greater than all of the Central/South 15 governorates combined. Participants from the roundtable are engaging relevant KRG agencies in order to persuade them to consider the roundtable recommendations that include drafting a national policy on IDPs and refugees, and establishing a commission or committee on displacement issues. As a result of the IDP roundtable, a series of recommendations were prepared and agreed among a number of NGOs present and were brought to the Provincial Governor's Office in a joint demarche.

### **Analysis and Review of Draft Laws Pertaining to Vulnerable Groups**

The program continues to consult and advise grantees and the GOI on laws affecting vulnerable groups. The program has draft agreements preliminarily approved by Parliament and under consideration by COMSEC that the program will continue to support their legislative and procedural reform efforts in several areas. The program provides assistance to grantees in making effective presentations before such decision-makers. Technical assistance to build the capacity of these groups will be provided in the coming months.

Access to Justice awarded a grant to the five-year-old Al Meezan Newspaper as a tool to increase decision makers' understanding and support for all of the legislative initiatives in the program's portfolio. The monthly newspaper will substantially increase its circulation from a single governorate to a 15-governorate circulation of 180,000 copies concentrated on legislative change for vulnerable groups. Articles will be contributed by judges, legal experts, and NGOs and will be targeted toward legal professionals and government decision-makers to sensitize them to the legislative needs concerning vulnerable groups.

### **3.2: Coalitions, Hotlines or Other Positive Linkages to Support Government Efforts to Improve Legal Frameworks for Vulnerable Populations**

Access to Justice Erbil met with various officials, including the President of the Kurdistan Parliament, to advocate for implementation of anti-trafficking legislation. The effort involved a coalition with UNAMI, Heartland Alliance, the Al Masala NGO, CDO, the Women's High Commission, and the KRG MOI Directorate on Violence against Women. The direction that anti-trafficking legislation will take in the IKR remains unclear, with legislators and stakeholders somewhat divided on whether a substantially new law is needed or whether the Iraqi statute can be used with minor modifications.

## **GRANTS**

This quarter saw the recruitment of a new Grants Manager and additional staffing of the grants management team as grant activities continue to increase.

### **Quarterly Partners Meeting**

The Second Quarterly Partners Meeting was held April 22-24 at the Erbil International Hotel. The theme for this meeting was "Exploring Opportunities for Collaboration" with the following objectives:

- To share best practices among grantees and partners in order to foster understanding about the scope of each other's work and the broader program mission;
- To interact with representatives from the Government of Iraq who are key partners in program efforts and discuss possible ways to collaborate;
- To establish connections and relationships to sustain potential partnerships into the future; and
- To build skills in necessary administrative requirements among partners.



All 36 NGOs presented their objectives, challenges, and future strategies, as well as their vision statements. NGOs and government representatives were divided into three thematic working groups: access to courts for women, identification, and NGO sustainability, and developed collaborative actions between NGOs and the GOI designed to improve these specific areas. Grantees were provided refresher training on key administrative skills (capacity building, writing success stories, planning work, progress reports, financial reports, and the rollout of new documentation and classification systems).

In the week leading up to the meeting, Iraqi program staff participated in a facilitation training workshop to build their skills in facilitating the meeting. Eight program staff were trained in basic “Technology of Participation” facilitation methods and worked with the lead facilitator and coach, Alisa Oyler, to design and lead each of the meeting sessions. They clarified the required outcomes, reviewed procedures, divided up roles, prepared all necessary materials, and documented the event.

### **Grant Awards and Grant Activity**

Program and USAID approvals were sought and granted for eight grants from the Basrah region that succeeded in the competitive review process during the quarter:

- Hiyad Organization for Legal and Media Development
- Hadia Society for Human Rights and Civilian Community Development
- Al-Amal Humanitarian Association Al Basreyaa

- Al-Taqwa Association for Women and Child Rights

The Grants Evaluation Committee convened three times this quarter, reviewing 38 Grant Summary Forms (Phase 1) and 22 Grant Applications (Phase 2). Grant agreements were signed with six recipients during the quarter: KURDS, Hataw, Harikar, CDO, Warvin, ICHRA and Bustan Association for Children's Protection and Education.

Nine grants were closed during the quarter: KHRW, Al-Amal, Mercy Hands, Al-Mortaqa, Al-Shabak Women's Association, Al Malak, SACH, Fatima House, and Al-Rahma.

### **Request for Application (RFA) Workshops: Capacity and Grant Application/ Proposal Writing**

Two RFA and Proposal Writing Workshops were completed in Baghdad and Erbil and were attended by 53 participants from NGOs in Baghdad, Diyala, Sulaymaniyah, Kirkuk, Dohuk, Mosul, and Erbil.

Access to Justice Basrah completed an RFA and Proposal Writing Workshop in April for NGOs located in the South. The workshop was attended by 11 NGO representatives from Basrah, Muthanna, Dhi Qar, and Maysan governorates.

Participants are provided a general overview of the program, requirements and procedures of application submission, and how to fill out the GSF and grant application.



### Site Visits

Access to Justice completed 24 visits to the following NGOs: Kurds, Hataw, CDO, Warvin, Al Shabak, Al Malak, Baghdad Women's Association, Al Meezan Newspaper, Fatima House, VOP, Harikar, Iraqi Bar Association, Al Amal, Al Taqwa, Sayed Al-Shudaa Organization for Social Development, Haida Society for Human Rights and Civilian Community Development, Iraqi Center for Human Rights Activists (ICHRA), Al Arqam Cultural Charity Association, Hiayd Organization for Legal and Media Development, Al Meamen Humanitarian Association, IADO, KHRW, Al Arqam Cultural Charity Association, and Al Rawaby Humanitarian Organization. Program representatives reviewed financial and progress reporting procedures, key Access to Justice grant policies, and required forms for documenting activities such as workshop attendance sheets and call logs.

## GENDER

### Gender Integration

The Gender Integration component has been challenged by difficulties identifying a suitable replacement for the Gender Specialist that departed the project earlier this year. A candidate has been submitted to USAID and approved for mobilization. At this stage the mobilization process is pending receipt of the candidate's updated passport and the visa application process.

In light of this, the contents of this Quarterly Report are more forward looking, detailing anticipated activities between July and September. To capture momentum that has been slowed as a result of the absence of a Gender Specialist, a statement of work has been submitted for approval for work that can begin remotely as the passport and visa process is finalized for the new gender specialist.

To date the following activities have been completed in the Gender Integration Component of the Iraq Access to Justice Year 2 Work Plan.

- Gender Assessment/Stocktaking
- Gender Mainstreaming / Integration Action Plan (GIAP)
- Project Staff and Partner Capacity Building Plan

The above three deliverables comprised a comprehensive Gender Assessment Report, inclusive of recommendations and strategies for gender integration.

The second key activity related to gender integration is the Gender Value Network Analysis (GVN) that commenced during the first quarter of Year Two and will be conducted in phases throughout the year. The GVN will provide a broader analysis framework that will enable the achievement of effective and sustainable outcomes for linking different categories of vulnerable populations to the resources they need to access their rights. The GVN is a road map that maps



out the various actors and linkages that a person must encounter from becoming aware of his/her rights to accessing those rights.

Progress against this activity during this period includes:

- Identified widows as the first vulnerable population to pilot the GVN.
- Conducted desktop review of relevant literature related to conducting GVN.
- Held focus groups with organizations that work with widows to identify rights that are most important to them.

Staff capacity building is viewed as an on-going activity that the Gender Integration Specialist provides in a sustained manner to all A2J staff with respect to a) understanding what gender means, and b) assisting A2J in addressing gender in their day to day project activities.

Highlights of gender training and capacity building efforts initiated to date include:

- Basic training has been provided to A2J staff on what ‘gender’ means.
- Through the Gender Assessment interview process, the Gender Integration Specialist is gathering information on A2J staff’s level of understanding of what gender means as well as what types of training and capacity building they will require to effectively integrate gender into their work.
- Training and capacity development plan has been incorporated in the Gender Assessment Report document.

- Support the capacity of Legal Clinic Network with Access to Justice grantees.

### Recurring Issues from Legal Clinics Hint Paths to Legislative Change

*Program is expecting to promote legislative reform and real changes to occur which will be more beneficial to the families of the victims*

Legal clinics supported by the USAID-Iraq Access to Justice Program are increasing the public's and the government's awareness of one of the most damaging cycles facing married women whose husbands have disappeared in violence. These women are required to register their husbands as missing, publish a missing person notice and photograph in a newspaper, and wait for a period of four years before being legally declared widows. During this waiting period, the widow and her children receive no financial support or benefits from the government, oftentimes forcing them to live a life of poverty and deprivation.

Often times, poor, uneducated women are not familiar with the requirements. Many may register their husbands as missing, but don't publish the notice and photo. They learn about the publication requirement when they apply for benefits after waiting four years. They then publish the notice and another four year waiting period begins. Many women have documented proof that the husband has died, but his body has not been found. They are still required to register him as missing, and publish the notice and photo in the paper and wait four years.

This single gap in the law is causing agony to numerous families because no help is available to these families before the lapse of this four year waiting period.

Iraq Access to Justice-funded NGOs are conducting awareness-raising campaigns to inform women about the requirements, and their legal clinics are helping poor women to properly complete the paperwork and procedures.

Fatema House is one such NGO and with the support of Access to Justice is raising this issue up to the government level. The Director of Fatema House met with members of the Shura Council and the Parliament, and received an overall positive reaction. Using its' experiences to highlight the loopholes in this law, Fatema House with funding and technical assistance from Access to Justice will develop legislative solutions to remove the gaps in the law and improve the circumstances for these widows and their children.

Haneen's (her name has been changed to protect her identity) life might be described as a series of unfortunate events and tragedies. Married at a young age, she and her husband had seven daughters. Her husband, a poor shepherd, passed away leaving her alone to care for their children. Uneducated with mounting social pressures and barely surviving, Haneen arranged the marriage of her oldest daughter, also at a young age. The son-in-law died in a car accident, leaving Haneen's daughter with four children. His family seized the entire estate, denying the rights of his bereaved wife and children. With no other options, the daughter and her children moved into Haneen's house. More tragedy awaited Haneen and her family as her other daughters married and then divorced.

With all of these problems and no financial support to meet the family's ever increasing needs, including medical provisions, Haneen, her children and grandchildren lived in poverty. She knew that she and her daughters were entitled to certain government benefits as her husband's survivors, but his death had not been duly registered, so she was unable to claim those benefits. Her lack of education made it impossible to navigate the government system alone. She needed the assistance of an attorney, but was unable to afford one.

*"It seemed that there was no hope for a better future for me and my daughters,"* said a heavyhearted Haneen. Then one of her relatives told her about free legal services provided by Al-Rahma Humanitarian Association, which is based in a poor neighborhood of Baghdad. Al-Rahma operates a legal clinic with technical and financial assistance from the USAID-Iraq Access to Justice Program. The NGO's mandate is to help vulnerable Iraqis, like Haneen, understand their rights and access government-provided services.

Haneen appealed to the center for assistance in applying for social security benefits for widows. Al-Rahma legal clinic lawyers assisted Haneen in obtaining a new identity card with the adjusted status of 'widow' and also helped her register with the Social Security Network to access her benefits as a widow. *"I feel secure and less vulnerable now as I am getting benefits from the government without having to ask favors from friends and relatives anymore."*

Haneen's daughters are also beneficiaries of the free legal aid offered by Al-Rahma to access their government benefits.

Jana is one of eight sisters who suffered the cruelty of a step-mother who badly beat them. The continuous physical torture resulted in Jana losing hearing in her left ear. At 13, she was forced to marry a very poor man who lived in a mud-room in the backyard of a brick factory in al-Sadr City, Baghdad. Jana’s husband worked as a scavenger, collecting cans from the trash and selling them; his meager income was not enough to even buy food for the family which quickly grew to five members with the addition of three daughters.

Due to her and her husband’s lack of knowledge about their rights and how to access them, Jana’s family received no government benefits for destitute families such as food supplies and free medical care. Their marriage was unregistered and no official documents existed to prove her marriage and the existence of their children. Her eldest daughter died at the age of eight as a result of the smoke emitting from the brick factory and they had no means to provide for proper medical care for the child.

Jana’s neighbor told her that she could access benefits from the government and also told Jana that she had learned this information from a workshop held at Fatema House of Charity for Women. Jana reached the Fatema House offices at 6:00 a.m. the next morning, waiting at the door for the staff to arrive. She was registered to attend the legal awareness workshop where she learned about her rights and services offered by the government. This information renewed Jana’s hope for a better life and she approached the free legal services offered by the USAID-Iraq Access to Justice Program funded legal clinic maintained by Fatema House.

Her case was accepted and after extensive efforts of the legal clinic staff, Jana was able to obtain her marriage certificate which made it possible for her to get identification documents for her and her children. This enabled them to enlist in the poor families’ list maintained by relief department and now they receive free monthly rations. Her family also has the right to free medical care and education. Jana’s life has improved considerably and she thanks Fatema House for this. *“The information and help I got at Fatema House workshop has completely changed my life. We didn’t know this because we were illiterate but my daughters will not suffer anymore due to poverty and I will make sure that they go to school so that they know their rights and are not deprived like their parents.”*

## العيادات القانونية .. هل ستنشل النساء من براثن العنف الاسري ؟



لا شك بأن ثقافة العنف الاسري هي امتداد طبيعي أو انعكاس مشروع لما تشهده الساحة العراقية من أحداث عنف، علما بأن هذه الثقافة تتناغم أو تتسجم في أحيان كثيرة مع العادات والتقاليد الاجتماعية المستوحاة من أعراف القبيلة، حيث ينظر إلى تلك المؤسسة الاجتماعية أي (الاسرة) والمتمثلة بالزوج والزوجة، ليس ككونهم كيان أسري مترابط الأطراف يستند على قاعدة المودة والتعاون والمساواة، بل على العكس هي تطغى مسلحة شاسعة أو فسحة كبيرة لتجعل من الرجل أداة لفقر جميع أفراد الاسرة. ويعد العراق من البلدان التي تنتشر فيها حالات الضرب ضد النساء. ولا توجد إحصائيات عن الأعداد التي تتعرض للعنف في المجتمع. وسجل العراق وبخاصة في إقليم كردستان والمحافظات الجنوبية العديد من حالات الانتحار لتساء في مقتل العمر. ويرجع الكثير من المختصين سبب ذلك إلى العنف الأسري. في مؤتمر تغيير المناهج الدراسية لكلية القانون الذي عقد في أربيل مؤخراً ، جرى إقرار مشروع العيادة القانونية في كليات القانون في الجامعات العراقية وتبديل تنظيم الزيارات لتلك العيادات في الجامعات العالمية والعربية للتعرف على التجارب المختلفة في هذا المجال. ويؤكد الدكتور جمال الحيدري عميد كلية القانون في جامعة بغداد ضرورة تفعيل هذه التجربة في الجامعات العراقية وتضمين دروس العيادات القانونية في مناهج كليات القانون العراقية لخدمة المجتمع خاصة وأن بعض التجارب العربية أثبتت نجاح العيادات القانونية في مفاهيم نشر العدالة لدى طلبة الكلية وتمكينهم من مساعدة الأشخاص الذين لا يستطيعون الوصول إليها. وعملت كلية القانون في جامعة بابل بدورها على تنفيذ هذه الفكرة بعد توقيع اتفاقية مع منظمة بنت الرافدين/ لتأسيس عيادة قانونية متخصصة بقضايا العنف الأسري. وتعتبر عيادة الاصراري رئيسة المنظمة هذا البرنامج هو الأول من نوعه الذي يضمن الشراكة بين منظمة

مجتمع مدني ومؤسسة أكاديمية كلية القانون ، وخطوة رائدة من نوعها على مستوى العراق. وتشير إلى إن كلية القانون في جامعة بابل ستكون الأولى التي ستقوم بهذا البرنامج وستقدم العيادات القانونية الاستشارية المجانية فيها خدماتها إلى المجتمع بالشراكة مع منظمات المجتمع المدني. التوعية أولاً .. كالتقف أمام المرأة في كل مرة يضربها زوجها فيها لتحصي آثار الضرب على وجهها وجسدها ثم تتساءل " هل أنا ساقطة حقاً ، الى متى احتمل ذلك ؟ ". وفي إحدى المرات حزمت أمرها على اللجوء لأشقائها وإهمال وصايا الأمهات بضرورة الستر ومسامحة الزوج إذا أخطأ وعدم هدم بيت الزوجية والصبر ثم الصبر ، إذ لم يعد هناك بقية من صبر بعد أن حطمتها الاحساس بالإهانة. لم تتفعل محاولات الإشقاء بتهديد الزوج ثم محاولة إعادة المياه إلى مجاريها إذ تكرر الضرب والإهانة ، وفي هذه المرة لم تلجأ إلى أشقائها بل إلى مركز الشرطة!! مجتمعنا لا ينصف المرأة المشككية على زوجها ، إذ أن مجرد دخولها الى مركز الشرطة يعد سلوكاً معيباً ومرفوضاً اجتماعياً - هذا ما تراه الناشطة زينب الوائلي من رابطة المرأة الحرة. وتضيف ان بعض منظمات المجتمع المدني حاولت مساعدة نساء مثل المشككية بالمتاح عيادات قانونية لاستقبالهن وتسهيّل أمر حصولهن على حقوقهن بعد إرشادهن إلى الطريقة التي يتم بها ذلك. وتعلق المحامية بشرى الكبي على ذلك قائلة " إن المرأة العراقية لا تملك لحد الآن القوات التي يمكن من خلالها البوح بما تعانیه من عنف داخل بيتها وعملها ومجتمعها رغم ان عدد ضحايا العنف من النساء في العراق يمكن اعتباره الأعلى على مستوى العالم ". وتستند الكبي إلى جملة من المسببات لهذا العنف وأهمها المشاكل الاجتماعية التي تعكس بشكل أكبر على النساء ، وتقول إنها تطلع من خلال عملها في مجال المجتمع المدني على حالات متعددة بهذا الصدد ، لكن البلد يخلو من محاكم مختصة تنظر بهذه القضايا و هو ما تحرص منظمات المجتمع المدني حالياً على تأسيسها للدفاع عن حقوق المرأة العراقية. وكلمت زهار الشريبات المحامية والناشطة النسوية والمستشارة القانونية في لجنة كتيبة قانون حماية المرأة من العنف الأسري في وزارة الدولة لشؤون المرأة أول من أسس عيادة قانونية لحماية المرأة من العنف الاسري في عام 2005 ودفعتها إلى تأسيسها عملها


### **Legal Clinics: Can They Save Women from Domestic Violence?**

Legal clinics were discussed at the Deans' Council Conference which convened in Erbil recently.<sup>2</sup> Legal clinics in Iraqi law schools were approved, in addition to conducting visits to Arab and international legal clinics in order to be introduced to the expertise related to them. The Dean of the Baghdad Law School, Dr. Jamal Al Haydary, stressed the importance of implementing legal clinics in Iraqi universities and the incorporation of legal clinic subject matter in the curriculum of law schools in Iraq to serve the Iraqi community, particularly when the success of legal clinics in the Arab world in disseminating justice among the students is taken into account, as the legal clinics in the Arab world have assisted people to access justice. On the other hand Babylon University has signed agreement with Bint Al Rafedain Organization to implement the project.

### **Researchers Call for the Approval of Legal Clinics in Iraqi Universities**

Legal academics and researchers have called for the approval of legal clinics in Iraqi universities and organizing visits to international and Arab universities to share experiences in this regard. The participants at the conference stressed the role of Iraqi law schools in building the legal system in Iraq throughout the consultation centers.

The above was discussed during the Second Deans' Council Conference for Developing the Curriculum of Law Schools which was convened in Erbil.

The conference, conducted in coordination with the Access to Justice Project, recommended that the law schools adopt the (legal clinical) teaching methodology in a manner conforming to the schools' capacity and their financial and human resources. Additional recommendations included using moot courts as part of practical training, promoting summer training for students within the courts and competent agencies that are close to the students' districts, coordinating with courts and relevant agencies, and stressing the learning of English language in all stages and to support establishing language labs.



بغداد/تينا/ تقرير عدوية الهلالي : في مؤتمر تعبير المناهج الدراسية لكليات القانون الذي عقد في اربيل مؤخرا ، جرى اقرار مشروع العيادة القانونية في كليات القانون في الجامعات العراقية وتبادل تنظيم الزيارات لتلك العيادات في الجامعات العالمية والعربية للتعرف على التجارب المختلفة في هذا المجال.

ويؤكد الدكتور جمال الحيدري عميد كلية القانون في جامعة بغداد ضرورة تفعيل هذه التجربة في الجامعات العراقية وتضمن دروس العيادات القانونية في مناهج كليات القانون العراقية لخدمة المجتمع خاصة وان بعض التجارب العربية اثبتت نجاح العيادات القانونية في مفاهيم نشر العدالة لدى طلبة الكلية وتمكينهم من مساعدة الاشخاص الذين لا يستطيعون الوصول اليها.

وفي احدى المرات حزمت امرها على اللجوء لاشقاتها واهمال وصايا الامهات بضرورة المتر ومسامحة الزوج اذا اخطأ وعدم هدم بيت الزوجية والصبر ثم الصبر ، اذ لم يد هناك بقية من صبر بعد ان حطما الاحساس بالاهانة.

لم تنفع محاولات الاشقاء بتهديد الزوج ثم محاولة اعاده العيا الى مجراها اذ تكرر الضرب والاهانة ، وفي هذه المرة لم تلجأ الى اشقاتها بل الى مركز الشرطة !!

مجتمعا لانصف المرأة المشتكية على زوجها ، اذ ان مجرد دخولها الى مركز الشرطة يعد سلوكا معيبا ومرفوضا اجتماعيا - هذا ما تراه الناشطة زينب الوائلي من رابطة المرأة الحرة.

وتضيف ان بعض منظمات المجتمع المدني حاولت مساعدة نساء مثل المشتكية بافتتاح عيادات قانونية لاستقبالهن وتمويل امر حصولهن على حقوقهن بعد ارشادهن الى الطريقة التي يتم بها ذلك.

وتعاق المحامية بشرى الكعبي على ذلك قائلة " ان المرأة العراقية لا تملك لحد الان القنرات التي يمكن من خلالها البوح بما تعانيه من عنف داخل بيتها وعملها ومجتمعها رغم ان عدد ضحايا العنف من النساء في العراق يمكن اعتباره الاعلى على مستوى العالم ".

وتستند الكعبي الى جملة من المسببات لهذا العنف واهمها المشاكل الاجتماعية التي تمكن بشكل اكبر على النساء ، وتقول انها تتطلع من خلال عملها في مجال المجتمع المدني على حالات متعددة بهذا الصدد ، لكن البلاد يخلو من محاكم مختصة تنظر بهذه القضايا وهو ما تحرص منظمات المجتمع المدني حاليا على تأسيسه للدفاع عن حقوق المرأة العراقية.

### **Legal Clinics: Can They Save Women from Domestic Violence?**

### **Next Educational Law School Term will Open Legal Clinic Project**

The Law School of Babylon University has started completing the procedures of establishing legal clinics which will be initiated in the next school term, 2012-2013, and incorporating legal clinic subject matter into the educational training materials of the students.

Dr. Hadi Hussein Al Ka'abi , the Dean of Law School in Babylon, stated that he discussed with the representatives of Access to Justice Project the mechanisms of implementing the legal clinics and providing the material and human resources to develop the training materials for the students aiming at assisting the community. He indicated that the legal clinic function is to provide legal services to the poor and disadvantaged populations by receiving their cases, reviewing them, referring them to the court and representing them for free if they are required to. Moreover, the legal clinic objective is to assist vulnerable groups in society and promote the social justice. As for the students, the legal clinic is a tool for improving the skills of students and encouraging *pro bono* work among the students. Dr. Al Ka'abi added that legal clinics are aiming at promoting the role of the students to have a crucial role in the legal process starting from receiving the case and following-up the legal procedures until the decision of the court is taken.
