Applications received, pre-award grants processing and disbursement of funds

- In the first quarter of 2013, Citizens' Voice Project received **652** applications, raising the total number of applications received to **1476** as of March 31, 2013.
- During the quarter, **605** applications were reviewed by the Technical Review Committee (TRC), bringing the cumulative number to **1371**; **441** were reviewed by the Grants Management Committee (GMC), bringing the cumulative number to **668** and **140** were reviewed by the Project Steering Committee (PSC), bring the cumulative number to **324**.
- During the quarter, Citizens' Voice Project recommended **181** applications for award to USAID, while the total number of recommended applications is **269**. Out of the 181 recommended applications, **143** stand approved by USAID while **48** are in process at USAID.
- Citizens' Voice Project signed grant agreements with **72** partner organizations, while the total number of partner organizations under the Project has increased to **124**.
- Citizens' Voice Project committed US **\$2,336,935** during the reporting period, raising the total committed amount to US **\$8,239,645**.
- Citizens' Voice Project disbursed US **\$1,295,721** during the reporting period, raising the total disbursed amount to **US \$2,273,777**.

Monitoring and Evaluation

- **127** operational and **125** programmatic pre-award assessments were conducted during the reporting period. The Project has thus far conducted **247** operational and **228** programmatic pre-award assessments to date.
- The Project conducted **6** operational and **5** programmatic post-award visits, while cumulative figures stand at **31** and **56** respectively.

Capacity Building

- In terms of capacity building, **179** persons from **42** organizations participated in Not-for-Profit Management courses held at Institute of Business Management, Karachi and COMSATS IIT, Islamabad.
- **48** persons from **32** partner organizations participated in PMP workshops held in January and February.
- **81** persons from **42** organizations participated in Quick Impact Trainings on voice and accountability.
- **79** persons from **40** Cycle 3 and Cycle 4 partner organizations received training on financial management, procurement and human resource management.


Other events and meetings

- During the month of January and February, three PSC meetings were held. The meeting on January 8 was convened to discuss the Fifth Grants Cycle on Elections, legislative governance applications, and applications recommended by GMC under the thematic areas of 'Citizens' Awareness for Higher Female Voter Turnout' and 'Citizens' Voice and Accountability for Youth Development'.
- The second PSC meeting was held to review the evaluation criteria for selecting applications at the TRC level, examine the progress of YES and The Network, and discuss Monitoring and Evaluation updates.
- The third PSC meeting was held on February 28, 2013 to review of applications recommended by GMC under the thematic area of 'Citizens Voice for Free, Fair and Peaceful Elections'.
- The Chief of Party, Procurement Officer and Finance Officer of Citizens' Voice Project participated in an Anti-Fraud Hotline meeting on January 30, 2013 in order to learn more about the Hotline and benefit from knowing better how to prevent fraud.
- Manager Communications attended a Provincial Water Rights Workshop organized by GINI, First Grants Cycle sub-grantee under the thematic area of Water Rights on February 12, 2013.
- A coordination meeting was held with the Energy Sector grantees on February 14, 2013. There were a total of 10 participants in the meeting.
- Communication team represented Citizens' Voice Project on United States National Day event at US Consulate Lahore on February 21, 2012 in which the visitors were briefed on project related activities.

- A meeting was held at the Citizens' Voice Project office by the Office of Inspector General (OIG)/ U. S. Department of State on March 4, 2013. Staff from TDEA and the Project office participated in the meeting.
- Manager Communications attended the South Punjab Kissan Water Rights Conference organized by Awaz Foundation in Multan on March 5, 2013.
- From March 4 to 7, 2013, Manager Communications conducted field visits in Bahawalpur, Multan, Lodhran and Vehari and met with the beneficiaries of Damaan and Awaz Foundation. Both these organizations are working on water rights in Southern Punjab.
- A meeting was held at the Citizens' Voice Project office on March 7, 2013 with the Chairman of TDEA, Mr. Zahid Islam to present an overview of the Project.
- Communication Unit attended a Communication Working Group session organized by USAID DOCs office on March 13 and 14, 2013.
- A meeting was held at the Citizens' Voice Project office on March 14, 2013 with Deputy Mission Director, Catherine Moore; Senior Director, Democracy and Governance, Jene Thomas; Darlene Foote and Nazeer Mahar, COR from USAID.

1. Monitoring, Evaluation and Research
1.1 Program Development and Research
1.1.1. Applications Received

In the Fifth Grants Cycle 652 applications were received under the advertised thematic area of ‘Citizens’ Voice for Free, Fair and Peaceful Elections. Following is the thematic breakup of the applications:

After the completeness check of all the received applications, 605 were found complete while 46 applications were incomplete and one application was irrelevant to the advertised thematic area.

1.1.2. Application Reviews, Approvals and Application Revisions

Fourth Grants Cycle

During the month of January, a PSC meeting was held to review applications received under the thematic areas of ‘Citizens’ Awareness for Higher Female Voter Turnout’ and ‘Citizens’ Voice and Accountability for Youth Development’. PSC gave specific comments about the former thematic area for further improvements and changes and shortlisted 8 applications in the latter thematic area. In light of PSC recommendations, summaries of 36 applications under ‘Citizens’ Awareness for Higher Female Voter Turnout’ were developed by the Unit and presented to the GMC.

Under the projects of Citizen’s Awareness for Higher Female Voter, the grantees will motivate and educate female voters about the importance of voting and their active participation in the upcoming general elections. They will also facilitate the formation and capacity building of local civil society/citizen platforms/forums and engage community elders, political leaders and relevant authorities for creating a conducive environment for increasing female voter turnout.

Each of the organizations was facilitated to identify their respective national assembly constituencies and polling stations. The projects under Cycle Four will be implemented in those female polling stations of selected constituencies where turnout was between 1-30% in 2008 elections (source FAFEN data). Under this project, multiple types of activities will be carried out, which will include, among others, the formation of Citizens’ Voter Groups (CVGs), mobilization campaigns, community meetings, sensitization of community elders, and engagement with Election Commissions of Pakistan (ECP), NADRA, district administration and political parties, door to door visits and dissemination of IEC materials. It is expected that the project will contribute to strengthening citizens’ voice and removing barriers to encourage and facilitate increased female voter turnout.

Fifth Grants Cycle

Under Grant Cycle 5 the grantees will mainly focus on low voter turnout and its reasons i.e. discrimination against certain segments of society like women and disabled, fear of election-related violence, allegations of rigging and violations of the electoral code of conduct, inability of political parties to educate and mobilize voters, and weaknesses in the election administration in terms of voter registration and other arrangements in a manner convenient to voters.

Each of the organization was facilitated to identify their respective Tehsil. The projects under Cycle 5 will be implemented in those polling stations (male, female and combine) of selected tehsils where turnout was low in the 2008 elections.

A consultation meeting with the FAFEN secretariat was held to discuss the FAFEN 2008 Elections data about polling stations and determine the areas that would be targeted separately by Citizens' Voice Project and FAFEN since FAFEN is also implementing a project on increasing female voter turnout. The assessment matrix for evaluating applications was also revised in order to better scrutinize the grant applications under Fifth Grants Cycle.

After successful Technical review process and getting recommendations from PSC, 99 shortlisted applications were sent to USAID as the first batch. 18 more applications were sent to USAID after getting approval from the PSC for the second batch of applicants.

In the third week of March 2013, the PDR and Communications team along with TAF members prepared IEC material (poster, banners, stickers and brochures etc.) regarding General Election 2013 and also prepared and finalize different sample letters which will be used by the grantees during the general election advocacy campaign.

1.2. Monitoring and Evaluation

1.2.1. Pre-Award Support for the Award of Grants

M&E Unit provided support for the award of grants including revision of work plans, development of milestones and suggesting conditions to the Grants Unit to be negotiated and agreed upon with the applicants. The unit also developed the milestones of Simplified Sub-Award (SSA) grantees to upload them in the GMIS. Details are as follows:

M&E unit continued desk based and field monitoring of all grantees of cycle 1, 2 and 3. During desk monitoring, M&E team carried out follow up with grantees through email and phone calls. The team reviewed target versus achievements of grantees, grantee's progress reports, supporting documents and invoices. They also made random calls to beneficiaries to verify the implemented activities.

Based on the unit's post-award field-monitoring plan for the First, Second and Third Grants Cycle sub-awardees, the post-award field visits of the following sub-awardees were carried out in the quarter. The details are as follows:

During these post award visits, M&E field teams held meetings with project staff, reviewed their progress (i.e. targets vs. achievements), verified the activities of sub-awardees as per their monthly progress reports and provided guidance for the preparation of monthly progress reports, quarterly progress reports, field monitoring reports, event reports, and necessary documentation. Some of the major activities implemented by sub-awardees during the quarter (January-March 2013) are summarized as follows:

- 513 meetings/awareness sessions/ trainings/ workshops/ seminars/ dialogues held.
- 23 complaint cells/visitor information centers established.
- 30 council/networks/committees/forum/group/CBOs were formed.
- 8 street theatre dramas held.
- 1 baseline study was completed.
- 1 training manual developed.
- 32 radio messages broadcasted.
- 5 press conferences held.
- 50 garbage collection points installed.
- 1 NOC was received from Education Department.

2. Finance, Grants and Compliance

2.1. Grants

2.1.1. Pre-Award Assessments

- During this quarter, the Grants Unit issued 9 task orders to Anjum Asim Shahid Rahman-Grant Thornton (AASR-GT), Avais Hyder Liaquat Nauman Chartered Accountants (AHLN), UHY Hassan Naeem & Co Chartered Accountants (UHY) and HLB Ijaz Tabussum & Co Chartered Accountants (HLB) for a total of 125 pre-award assessments.
- 1 of these was upgrade from rapid to detailed, while 25 were rapid and 99 desk assessments. The related organizations had applied under Grant Cycles 4 and 5.
- Grants Unit received 127 pre-award assessment reports in the quarter ended March 2013, out of which 125 relate to the task orders issued during the current quarter and 2 from previous task orders.

2.1.2. Post-Award Reviews

- During the quarter, the Grants Unit issued a task order to AASR-GT for post award financial monitoring and follow-up on Capacity Action Plan of 6 awardees.

- These include 5 awardees under ‘Citizens’ Oversight of Effective Legislative Governance’ and 1 awardee under ‘Advocacy for Effective Implementation of the Frontier Crime Regulations (FCR) Reforms’ under Second and Third Grant Cycles respectively.
- Reports were received for all 6 awardees regarding revision of risk rating based on post-award financial review of awardees and follow up on Capacity Action Plan under Simplified Sub-awards.

Key findings include the following:

- Decrease in risk rating: 2 organizations
- No change in risk level of low risk sub-awardees: 3
- No change in risk level of high or moderate risk sub-grantees: 1

2.1.3. Due Diligence

Anti-terrorist and other compliance check vetting was conducted by the Grants Team for recommended applications under Cycle 4 and 5. Process of finalizing different pre-award forms and disclosure checklists related to these grant applicants was also completed.

2.1.4. Preparation for Fifth Grants Cycle

The grants team supported preparation and issuance of the Request for Applications (RFA) for the Fifth Grants Cycle during the month. An illustrative budget was also prepared by the grant team for benchmarking the competitive range of cost of work to be performed in one tehsil for the Fifth Grants Cycle. The RFA and templates for application, budget and certifications were revised. Also, the templates and toolkit for pre-award assessments was reviewed to remove redundancies between programmatic and operational pre-award assessments. Certain new functionalities were added in the GMIS through the team’s inputs. These will support the process of desk based pre-award assessments being conducted for the first time in the project and award of grant.

2.1.5. Award of Grants

72 grants were awarded during the quarter, details of which are provided below:

- 2 grants for Punjab were awarded under Cycle 3 in relation to the thematic area ‘Citizens Advocacy for Implementation of 18th Amendment’.
- 1 grant for Punjab was awarded under Cycle 3 under thematic area ‘Citizens’ Engagement and Accountability for an Effective Local Government’.
- 2 grants for KP were awarded under Cycle 3 under thematic area ‘Citizens’ Voice for Strengthening Transparency and Accountability Mechanisms’.
- 1 grant for Punjab was awarded under Cycle 3 under thematic area ‘Energy Sector Reforms’.
- 25 grants relating to the thematic area ‘Citizens’ Awareness for Higher Female Voter Turnout’ under Cycle 4 were awarded out of which 11 relate to KP, 8 to Baluchistan, 4 to Sindh and 2 to Punjab.
- 41 grants relating to the thematic area ‘Citizens Voice for Free Fair and Peaceful Elections’ under Cycle 5 were awarded out of which 6 relate to Baluchistan, 13 to KP, 12 to Punjab and 10 to Sindh.

** Difference of 19 between approved and signed grants is due to the fact that 1 grant agreement is in process and negotiations are underway; 4 have been put on hold by USAID, 8 have been put on hold by the project for several reasons including performance issues related to an already existing grant, reassessment of capacity and awaited reference checks and 6 applicants withdrew the application.

2.1.6. Pre- and Post-Award Conditions

Keeping in view the pre-award risk assessments, pre- and post-award conditions were agreed upon with six sub-awardees under Cycle 3 mentioned in section 2.1.5 under the following thematic areas:

- Energy Sector Reforms
- Citizens' Advocacy for Implementation of 18th Amendment
- Citizens' Engagement and Accountability for an Effective Local Government System
- Citizens' Voice for Strengthening Accountability and Transparency Mechanisms

Purpose of these conditions is to ensure that sub-awardees improve their systems and procedures for efficient implementation of the project as well as for long-term institutional development. Later, the Grants Unit, along with M&E Unit, tracks the sub-awardees' performance in terms of meeting such conditions.

2.1.7. Post Award Orientation

Three sessions of post award orientation were carried out for 25 awardees under Cycle 4 and 41 awardees under Cycle 5. These sessions included presentations related to the Letter of Grant (LoG), M&E and Financial Reporting.

2.1.8. Technical Assistance to Sub-awardees

Existing sub-awardees were provided technical assistance in the areas of financial management, record keeping and reporting on a daily basis. The TAF team and project team for grants coordinated with sub-awardees for any issues that they faced and guided them about the required standards of record keeping and reporting for USAID grants.

2.1.9. Other Capacity Building and Supportive Initiatives

Certain administrative tasks were carried out to support project workflow with respect to contractual matters:


- Joint review of subcontractor invoices was conducted with the TDEA Secretariat, Compliance and Project teams.

- Review and submission of monthly grants report to USAID.
- Advise to COP about process improvements in respect of solicitation, selection and outreach.
- Revised the budget forecast of TAF's component of CVP for FY-13.
- Coordination and provision of information to AASR-GT for routine compliance matters.
- Review of accruals for the quarter ended March 31, 2012 for submission to USAID.
- Review and submission of the realignment and no-cost extension request for the project to TDEA.


2.2. Finance

During the quarter, financial audit of the project under Guidelines for Financial Audit of Non-US NGOs contracted by Recipients for 2011-12 was finalized by KPMG and the report was submitted to OFM. Besides this, Finance Unit continued to perform a range of routine functions including financial management, submission of reports to the USAID, payments to sub-contractors, and other functions relating to compliance with USAID regulations and TDEA policies.

One of the Finance Officers resigned and left the project to pursue career development, and the recruitment process for this post was initiated. A Finance Officer attended the NPO management course arranged by IoBM at Karachi in February 2013. A refresher course for Quick Books Accounting Software was also attended by Finance Team.

3. Capacity Building

3.1. Partners' Training

3.1.1. Quick Impact Trainings (QIT)

Finance, HR and Procurement Trainings

During the quarter, the following major activities took place:

- AASR's Capacity Building team conducted two trainings for sub-grantees of Third and Fourth Grants Cycle in Financial Management, Human Resource Management and Procurement Management.
- The training for second batch of Third Grants Cycle sub-grantees was held at Hotel Hill View, Islamabad from February 6-8, 2013. A total of 20 participants from 10 sub-grantee organizations participated in the training.
- The training for sub-grantees of Fourth Grants Cycle was held at Hotel Hill View, Islamabad from March 25-27, 2012. A total of 59 participants from 30 sub-grantee organizations took part.

Programmatic Trainings

At the beginning of the quarter, two senior consultants, Mr. Akbar Nasir Khan and Mr. Saeed Ahmed Minhas, were brought on board for conducting Programmatic QITs. The fourth QIT on Voice and Accountability was held from January 30 to February 1, 2013 for grantees from the following thematic areas:

- Legislative Governance
- Tax Collection
- Frontier Crimes Regulation (FCR) Reforms

The total number of participants under this QIT was 17. The fifth QIT took place on February 26 to February 28, 2013 and a total of 14 persons from Energy Sector Reforms grantees attended this training.

Two QITS were organized in the last week of March 2013 for all 25 grantees working on the thematic area of Higher Female Voter Turnout to deepen their understanding about the parliamentary form of government, election process and voter education, factors inhibiting participation of vulnerable groups and the role and structure of the Election Commission. Grantees also learned how to write letters to local and higher authorities and political parties and candidates, and conduct household visits and corner meetings. On the final day of the trainings, grantees participated in mock exercises and set up election camps and conducted door-to-door household visits. A total of 50 persons participated in these trainings.

3.1.2. Performance Management Plans Training

- 2 thematic areas were covered under the PMP in the first quarter of 2013 engaging 32 partner organizations and 48 participants. 10 grantees implementing the project on Education Sector Reforms participated in a workshop on Design and Implementation of Performance Management Plan (PMP) from January 8 to 10, 2013 at Margalla Hotel, Islamabad. 6 grantees and 1 non grantee, working on thematic areas of Legislative Governance and Tax Reforms attended 4 workshops on Design and Implementation of Performance Management Plan from February 6 to 8, 2013 at Crown Plaza Hotel, Islamabad. 3 members from the Program Development Unit and 1 from Monitoring and Evaluation Unit of Citizens' Voice Project also participated in these trainings.
- A Training of Facilitators (TOF) on Managing for Results was organized for participants selected from the four trainings held for grantees of Cycles 1 and 2 on Design and Implementation of PMP. The selection was based on evaluation of the participants by the trainer on pre-determined criteria during the trainings and M&E team's recommendations. A total of 22 participants attended this training; including 6 from Citizens' Voice Project's team members. The training was a significant contribution towards development of a pool of skilled facilitators' able to design results-based projects and performance management systems. The workshop was held at Pearl Continental Hotel, Bhurban from February 18 to 22, 2013.
- The workshop was highly appreciated by the participants and the project and it was decided that such trainings on PMP would be held for all new grantees being awarded projects under other grant cycles. The ToRs have been drafted for a Senior Consultant on PMP and advertised on Citizens' Voice Project and HRDN websites. The due process for selection of consultant will be completed in the first part of the next quarter.

3.1.4 Consultative Workshop on Not-for-Profit Organizations (NPO) Management Course

A three-day consultative workshop to bring about improvements in the Not-for-Profit Organizations (NPO) Management Course curriculum was held at Pearl Continental Hotel, Bhurban from February 8 to 10, 2013. Six modules (five compulsory and one optional) were discussed and updated during the three day consultation. For each module, two

senior level practitioners from Trust for Democratic Education and Accountability (TDEA), The Asia Foundation (TAF) and/or Citizens' Voice Project were invited to give their feedback and share their learning with the concerned faculty members. Facilitators from both Institute of Business Management (IoBM) and COMSATS Institute of Information Technology (CIIT) were present and this workshop was useful in bringing them on the same wavelength in terms of session delivery. A total 28 people participated out of which eight were from IoBM, 10 from CIIT and 10 were development professionals. The remaining five modules will be reviewed and updated at a later stage.

4. Administration and Procurement

- A user complaints module in GMIS system was developed, through which users can register their complaints.
- The capacity building courses/training module in GMIS system was developed under the requirements of TAF. Through this module, the trainings organized by TAF and AASR departments can be inserted against a particular application.
- A disbursement and expense module in the GMIS system was developed for the Grants Department in which they can submit/insert the disbursed amount details against a particular application.
- A report disbursement module was developed to facilitate reporting by Grants unit.
- A countdown timer was added to count down the days and time for the current cycle.
- Quality and assurance test of the PMP revised module was conducted after launch.
- OTI database data was replicated over the GMIS system.
- Requisition module was modified along with its reporting module as per the request of Admin Department.
- Assessments module was developed and linked with the application module for users to submit their assessment reports over the GMIS system.
- A page was designed for the applicants to view and download IEC material from the GMIS system.

6. Communications and External Relations

During the reporting period, Communications and External Relations (CER) unit completed the following key tasks:

on the mentioned scenarios as well as oriented about the program's thematic areas and acquainted with mechanism of acquiring and verifying information. DLTOs started reporting using the online tracker from February 1, 2013 whereas CLTOs started reporting by from March 23, 2013 when the election schedule was announced. In the month of March, as a result of prompt reporting, 1144 SMS messages were received (excluding incorrect or false smses) in the system. Out of the SMSes received, 25 were selected as issues to be taken up and sent forward to the relevant stakeholders for the corrective action to be taken.

7.3 Communications Unit

- A stakeholders' briefing on the scope and methodology of FAFEN's Observation of General Election 2013 was held on January 31, 2013 in Islamabad. The objective of the briefing was to share the scope and methodology of FAFEN's long-term observation with key stakeholders and obtain their feedback. The briefing was attended by representatives of all the major political parties, civil society organizations, leading media houses and international community. The event was attended by approximately 120 participants.
- Follow up meetings were held with leading media groups to discuss the possibility of TDEA's collaboration regarding information sharing on Election Observation. Geo, Dunya TV, Dawn and Capital TV expressed desire in signing MOUs with FAFEN for getting first-hand information on election related information. Draft MOUs were shared with Geo, Dunya TV and Dawn News.
- TDEA met DG Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation (PBC) Murtaza Solani for mutual cooperation in election related news on March 21 2013. The concerned directors and managers of PBC attended the meeting. Both sides agreed to meet again for signing of MOU relating to prompt election news for improving the quality of General Election 2013.
- A meeting was held with Director IT, Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) on February 14, 2013 to get the NOC for the acquisition of short code for the wider dissemination election observation updates to its subscribers.
- The Communication Unit disseminated 8 fortnightly newsletters in the reporting quarter.
- The Project Description of Election Observation was printed and disseminated amongst various stakeholders. Folders and writing pads were also printed.
- Databases for external reporting to a wider range of stakeholders were updated and atomized.

7.4 IT Department

Telecommunication:

The TDEA short code case is still pending with ECP despite multiple reminders by TDEA and Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA). Meetings were also conducted with ECP officials for the said purpose. TDEA management was informed that the matter was presented to the Commission for approval, but no information has been received so far.

Rental Short Code:

Since it is unclear whether TDEA will receive its own short code as per its application submitted to PTA, management considered a backup solution in the shape of short code available on rental basis for which a number of companies were contacted. To acquire the short code on rental basis as well as receive technical expertise in case TDEA acquires its own short code, a series of meetings were carried out with different companies. The purpose of these meetings was to get the best possible solution for the program. One of the companies also demanded an NOC while some of them quoted very high rates. One of the companies agreed to the provision of the service but backed out later due to technical problems. During the process, TDEA's management came to know of a variety of problems associated with the rental Short Code, which are as follows:

- Rental Short code could be blocked by the PTA due to mismatch with business plan.
- Companies are more interested in SMS traffic rather than renting a short code due to revenue.
- Short codes are normally used for revenue generation and the revenue is shared between operator and the company.
- It is difficult to find a dedicated short code for FAFEN on rental basis.
- FAFEN requires a low cost rental short code without revenue sharing but the price of using the rental short code is higher. As a result, less people will be interested in subscription.
- In case of Sharing short code, number of companies will be using the same short code for different campaigns.

Long Code:

Due to the issues related to the rental short code highlighted above, TDEA management has opted for long code. After negotiations, TDEA has acquired long codes from Ufone, Warid and Zong. The benefits of long codes are the following:

- No legalities involved in long code.
- Lower setup cost.
- No filtering of the traffic.
- No specific/high-end hardware required.
- No registration with any mobile operator is required and will be treated like a simple SMS.
- It would cost less to the subscriber and observers.

To make the Long Code service active TDEA management took the following steps:

- Bulk SMS accounts have been created in all the mobile operators for SMS dissemination.
- All the messages would carry the masking of FAFEN.
- Projected traffic has already been shared with Telco's.
- All the arrangements will be made to meet the requirement of the expected traffic per ten second transfers.
- Traffic will be routed within the respective operators.

Partnership and long-term engagements:

For the awareness of the general public, TDEA is also negotiating with mobile operators on the basis of their Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR). Under their CSR portfolio, the mobile operator will send a message to its user for the subscription of the service which TDEA is offering. The negotiations are in final stages with Zong.

Development of IT Infrastructure

- Network security has been enhanced by creating isolated Cloud networks.
- Work is underway for the installation and configuration of servers using clustering technology, which provides good scalability, reliability and serviceability.
- A map server has been installed with the following features to facilitate election data with Geo Referencing:
 - Advanced cartographic output
 - Scale dependent feature drawing and application execution
 - Feature labeling including label collision mediation
 - Fully customizable, template driven output
 - TrueType fonts
 - Map element automation (scale bar, reference map, and legend)
 - Thematic mapping using logical- or regular expression-based classes
 - Support for popular scripting and development environments
 - PHP, Python, Perl, Ruby, Java, and .NET

Long-term Election Observation and Information Systems:

In December 2012, program team participated in a meeting to discuss and finalize parameters required in a checklist to be used in long-term election observation at district level. During the reporting quarter the IT team worked closely with the Program team to review, finalize, modify and adjust parameters and modules for prompt reporting to be integrated in EIMS. A detailed monitoring checklist to be used in long-term election observation was also developed and uploaded on the system for online reporting, during the quarter.

Development and Deployment of Constituency Maps on Election Portal:

FAFEN has successfully developed a GIS map of geographical National Assembly constituencies of Pakistan. As many as 264 out of total 272 constituencies have been plotted on the map so far. Remaining eight constituencies will be plotted on the map in few days. This unique, indigenously designed utility will enable users to explore and search electoral information using state-of-the art map powered by geographical information system with accurate latitude and longitudes. This utility is integrated with FAFEN's online program tracker that records and documents electoral developments taking place across the country. This integration will essentially help users to track the consolidated data of various violations and other developments recorded during the nationwide observation of pre-election, Election Day and post-election phases. The GIS powered map further provides a unique facility of tracking and finding the sub-

locations in one constituency to see various trends in terms of violation and other electoral information. A total of 85,000 locations with latitude and longitude have already been plotted on constituency maps.

8. Challenges Faced

During the quarter, the project faced and responded to certain challenges. The most significant of these are highlighted below:

- The Project recommended 17 Cycle 4 applications on January 30 and 17 more on February 1, 2013 to USAID. However, approvals were received four weeks after the applications had been recommended on February 28, 2013. If these applications had been processed quickly, then the projects could have been more effective.
- 100 grants were announced in Cycle 5 and the Project recommended 117 applications to USAID. However, only 41 were awarded finally due to non-approval of remaining recommended grants. Four grants were approved by the USAID relating to Cycle 3 but not awarded due to non-availability of sufficient obligated funds.
- Approvals for thematic areas of youth development, media and Ombudsmen are also pending at USAID.
- As highlighted in the previous quarterly report, the limited number of personnel in the Project's M&E team was one of the challenges faced by the Project and the team was overloaded with work. During this quarter, two new M&E officers were recruited on a full-time basis, one of whom has joined already. PDR and AASR-GT teams also extended support to the M&E unit in conducting field visits.
- The Security condition during this quarter remained a key challenge for the Project as well as partner organizations especially with regard to election-related activities. The M&E team faced security challenges in conducting field visits to Balochistan, KP and certain parts of Sindh, and special measures had to be taken to ensure their safety. Visits also had to be delayed in light of the security conditions.
- In several instances, grantees have also been unable to conduct election-related activities such as setting up election camps and organizing candidates' forums, due to prevailing security situation. Citizens' Voice Project is taking steps to respond to needs of adjustment/amendment in the contracts in these cases, so that funds provided through our grants are efficiently used towards the set objectives. However, progress may have been affected because of this.




