



Distribution of Sample


Percent of Children from Muslim households, by Zone



Schooling Status




Schooling status of Muslim children






Distribution of Pupils by type of religious school



Distribution of children within school types by when they attend the school




Proportion of children by school type also attending formal school






Percent Literate, by Age




Wealth and School Type
