



Total ODA Disbursements 2010-2012 (USD millions):





ORGANIZATIONAL OVERVIEW & LEADERSHIP

- German Official Development Assistance (ODA) is implemented by Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) under the political guidance of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ). Minister Gerd Müller is the current head of the BMZ; he was appointed in December 2013.
- In 2012, Germany provided \$13.1 billion in ODA. Approximately \$8.7 billion (66 percent) was implemented bilaterally and \$4.4 billion (34 percent) was implemented multilaterally.
- Under the leadership of Minister Müller, the BMZ will emphasize a more multilateral approach to development.



POLITICAL CONTEXT AND FUNDING TRENDS

- Minister Müller will focus on sustainable growth as the driver for German development policy.
- Although the BMZ will be one of only three ministries that are going to see a significant increase in its funding over the coming years, it will have to operate in what is overall a much tougher fiscal environment, with the government committed to balancing the budget by 2015.
- Germany currently contributes 0.4 % of gross national income (GNI) to ODA, despite the government's promise to allocate 0.7%.

GEOGRAPHIC PRIORITIES

- Germany's top three aid recipients in 2012 were China (\$724m), India (\$571m), and Afghanistan (\$527m).
- In 2012 Germany disbursed \$2.81bn to Asia (33% of total), and \$2.78bn to Sub-Saharan Africa (32% of total).
- However, Minister Müller has announced the focus of German aid will be shifted to Sub-Saharan Africa.

SECTORAL PRIORITIES

- The 2013 Coalition agreement places greater emphasis on multilateral assistance and health-related programs.
- In 2012, Germany allocated 25 percent (\$2.7bn) of ODA on Economic Infrastructure & Services—of which \$1.3m went towards Energy— 19 percent (\$2bn) on Education, and 14 percent (\$1.4bn) on Government & Civil Society.
- Minister Müller has announced an extra \$1bn to be allocated towards rural development, particularly in Africa.






By Income Group (USD m)
