

## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Support Program for Ex-combatant Children, funded by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), and implemented by IOM, the ICBF and other public and private institutions, hereby presents its 27<sup>th</sup> Quarterly Donor Report. This quarter, the Program was able to assist 3410 ex-combatant boys, girls and adolescents for a Program total of 3664, out of which 254 are Indigenous Colombian or Afro-Colombian.

The Program continues to support the implementation of the CAL, strengthening government institutions and civil society organizations, to guarantee rights restitution to the most vulnerable members of a society afflicted by the Colombian armed conflict: the children. Also, the Program has successfully supported the coordination efforts between the ACRSE and the ICBF, so that youths from the ICBF Program may continue with their reintegration processes.

Several security reports were received from different CROJs, which state the tremendous need to guarantee the safety of beneficiary population and field monitors of the CROJs.

This quarter, the assistance component provided health services to 446 children and young people, which include medical services by specialists and general practitioners, dental treatments, psychological support, etc. Regarding education, school coverage this quarter was 61%. Likewise, 415 boys, girls and adolescents participated in the training courses at SENA. Schools subsidies were provided for 98 beneficiaries, and 53 found employment during this period.

Regarding CROJs, 1502 beneficiaries have been contacted, and 753 continue to benefit from services such as mental and physical health, formal education, training courses, socio-cultural activities, and employment opportunities. A total of 170 families were referred through the CROJs to different services; 112 youths obtained legal documentation. The total number of institutions of the national CROJs network was 58. Additionally, the Program was able to support a total of 169 income generation projects, approved and financed through the alliance with "Asociación Tejido Humano".

The *recruitment prevention component* of the Program continued to provide specialized technical assistance to government institutions in the Departments of Nariño, Putumayo, Meta, Valle del Cauca, Huila, Choco, Antioquia, Bolivar, Santander and Sucre, for the implementation of the CAL, through the elaboration and establishment of public policies. Additionally, the prevention component supported the dissemination of the updated legal roadmap for the assistance of ex-combatant boys and girls. Also, different workshops were held at a regional level, based on the Collective Rights for Indigenous Populations Document.

A total of 416 youths from ethnic groups participated in projects implemented by the Program in the Departments of Sucre and Bolivar. New beneficiaries from Indigenous and Afro-descendant communities joined the Program this quarter.

This quarter, IOM and ICBF have signed two cooperation agreements aimed at strengthening activities to prevent the recruitment of children and adolescents (especially early childhood<sup>1</sup>) by IAG and to continue providing assistance to these victims. One project, with a total budget of USD 12.3 million (USD 10.8 million funded by ICBF and the rest by USAID), would benefit some 20,000 children at risk of being recruited by IAG and another 800 children will receive direct advice and assistance from the CROJ. The other initiative will receive a total of USD 7.8 million in funding (USD 7.6 from ICBF and the remainder from USAID) to work with children under the age of six to prevent future conscription into IAG.

## 2. CONTEXT

During the period from September to December, progress was made on childhood and adolescent public policy through four main activities:

- 1) A Governors' Office workshop named "*V Encuentro de Gobernadores por la Infancia y Adolescencia*" took place. The event was based on regional and local sustainability of the "*Estrategia Hechos y Derechos 2008 – 2011*", (Strategy Facts and Rights) and a historical evaluation. The General Attorney's Office referred to the strategy as an "important initiative that must be included in the departmental and municipal development plans".
- 2) New proceedings for youth responsibility are gradually being implemented through the CAL in the cities of Bogotá and Cali. The CAL aims to protect and guarantee the personal integrity of boys, girls and adolescents by establishing their rights whilst the State, family and society became responsible for the wellbeing of children and youths. Additionally, Decree N° 2714 of 2007 was signed by the Governor of Antioquia to create the "*Mesa Departamental de Prevención a la Vinculación de Niños, Niñas y Adolescentes al Conflicto Armado*" (Departmental Roundtable for Recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents to the Armed Conflict).
- 3) The National Committee for Recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents was created by Decree 4690 of 2007. The Decree seeks the protection of boys, girls and adolescents rights as well as the strengthening of the design, implementation and follow-up of public policies to prevent children's recruitment by IAG.
- 4) A workshop was held in order to provide technological tools for the training process and updates for public employees, to effectively implement attention and non-penalization of ex-combatant boys processes.

The General Attorney's Office reported that in 2008 the Colombian State assigned 4 billion Colombian pesos (COP) to assist children and adolescents in the following areas:

- Mothers' Health: 19.000 million
- Childhood Health: 33.000 million
- Birth Certificates<sup>2</sup>: 92 million
- Nutrition: 60.000 million
- Education: 3 billion
- Sexual Health: 6.000 million
- Water Supply: 427.000 million
- Protection: 87.000 million
- Childhood and Adolescents Law implementation: 610 million
- Related issues: 5 million

The program supported training and information processes to include strategic issues in the Departmental and Local Development Plans during October, after the election of local authorities (Governors and Mayors). As a result, issues like the implementation of the legal and administrative roadmap and the CAL are under consideration by local governments.

The Colombian Government continues its efforts to reach an agreement with the FARC for the release of kidnapped individuals. In November of 2007, the Government released proof of life of five people in captivity, which was obtained after capturing three individuals, who apparently belonged to the urban network of the FARC in Bogotá. The proof included videos and letters of the former presidential candidate Ingrid Betancourt, three American security contractors kidnapped in 2003, former senator Eladio Pérez and twelve active members of both, the Military Forces and National Police. Family members of kidnapped individuals are demanding more political will from the Government to reach an agreement with the FARC.

Even though there has been some progress with the release of Clara Rojas, a former vice presidential candidate, and Consuelo Gonzalez de Pérdomo, a former legislator. The humanitarian agreement has not yet been arranged. These failed efforts increase both, the vulnerability of people in different territories where the conflict has a stronger impact and the suffering of kidnapped people and their relatives.<sup>3</sup>


### 4. ACTIVITIES

#### A. ASSISTANCE COMPONENT

The main objective of the assistance component is to improve the capacity of the Colombian Government and civil society to respond and guarantee restitution of rights and social insertion processes for ex-combatant boys and girls.

## 1. TRENDS


**Graph #1 Program Entries by IAG**



The decreasing trend on the number of boys, girls and adolescents entering the program was counteracted during 2007, at the moment appears to be stabilizing. Additionally, 380 children entered the Program, which represents a 4% decrease compared to last year.

Four behaviours have been identified, analyzing the annual trends of entries to the Program by IAG of provenance: 1) A decreasing tendency of the beneficiaries from the AUC, in accordance to the demobilization process; 2) The increasing tendency of the ex-combatant children coming from the FARC group, initiated in 2005. This is mainly due to the higher military pressure over this group; 3) A trend was maintained throughout the number of boys and girls disengaged from the ELN 4) A significant increasing tendency of new IAG which is represented in "Others" category (26 out of 33 for the last two quarters).


**Graph #2 Relation between IAG and gender**



The gender distribution of children that joined the program this quarter shows that the tendency is consistent with historical records, the major average of beneficiaries entering the program is represented by men. Until 2007 a total of 3664 girls, boys and adolescents had entered the program, out of which 3410 did it with support from USAID. Out of this total, 27% (917) are female and 73% (2534) are male, increasing the percentage of girls compared to 2006.


These graphs show three different behaviours: 1) The new IAG report AUC's gender distribution; 2) FARC maintained an increasing tend of girls and boys entering the program. The percentage of girls is higher than that of 2006; 3) ELN kept the percentage of entries and the gender distribution.

**Graph # 3 – Program Entries by Year , Type and IAG (ELN, FARC)**




This graph shows that percentages of entries rescued by the military forces for both groups have declined in the last year, meanwhile percentages of voluntary demobilizations have increased. A significant turning point took place in 2005 to FARC's tendencies, opening a major gap between rescues and voluntary demobilizations. The girls' percentage of voluntary entries rose from a 56% to 86% and the percentage of men's voluntary entries have increased from 78% to 96%.

**Graph # 4 – Program Entries by Age Average and Year**



A trend maintained throughout 2007 was the entries average of adolescents between 15 and 16 years old. The AUC have had the highest age average, followed by FARC. This graph shows that younger children have entered the program during this year. There are two possible interpretations for this tendency: 1) IAG are recruiting younger children or 2) Recruitment time has decreased.

**Graph # 5 – Level of studies by year**



A profile changing tendency that shows the increase of educational levels, especially for FARC, could be appreciated through the analysis of the educational levels of beneficiaries entering the program.

This graph shows three different tendencies: 1) Children with basic incomplete studies (between 1 and 5 years of school) have been the biggest group since the beginning of the program. 2) The percentage of children with high school incomplete has increased meanwhile children with basic incomplete studies has decreased; 3) The beneficiaries with no school education have always been an average of 10% of the total entries.

**2.1 RESULTS FOR THE REPORTING PERIOD – ASSISTANCE DURING THE FOUR PHASES**

**2.1.1 COVERAGE AND ASSISTANCE**

During the reporting period, 100% of the new entrance requests were accepted and the total population was attended. The pilot project "Hogar Gestor" ended and new agreements with the operators were subscribed until June 2008.

During this quarter, the program and the ICBF held technical assistance workshops to the regional offices in Santander, Meta, Armenia, Pereira, Manizales, Bogotá, Antioquia and Valle del Cauca. The objective was to institutionalize the guidelines designed for psychosocial and family assistance as well as the prevention of consumption of Psycho Active Substances (SPA).

IOM provided technical assistance for the "Re-establishment of Rights" and "Youths" booklets, based on the text presented by the Social Foundation<sup>4</sup>. Also, staff from the regional offices has continued with the worktables on re-establishment of rights, as an implementation strategy of the Childhood and Adolescence Law.

**"Hogar Gestor" Modality:**

During the reporting period, this modality continued to be supported in Bogotá, covering Cundinamarca, Tolima, Boyaca, Cesar, Valledupar and Atlántico. The contract with the operator expired in early September. However, the program paid in-kind subsidies for 31 youths (19 from Bogotá and 12 from Cesar). Progress was made on the identification, follow up, evaluation and monitoring activities for youths and their relatives in Bogotá.

**"HAZPAZ" (make peace) Family Coexistence Policy:**

During this quarter, the program began its inter-institutional plans' evaluation and monitoring activities. As a result, successful experiences were identified in Antioquia, Caldas, Valle del Cauca and the program designed some strategies to improve plans in Meta, Santander and Arauca. Additionally, this process allowed the identification of some priorities such as the prevention of sexual violence and the need to strengthen inter-institutional work.

During the reporting period, ICBF made some progress on follow up and monitoring tools, in order to verify the effectible implementation of The Guide to Assist Boys, Girls and Adolescents Victims of Sexual Violence applicability in Bucaramanga, Medellin, Cali, Cúcuta and Bogotá. Next year ICBF will hire two internships to reinforce this tool implementation.

**Bogotá Mayor's Office**

- Educational Component: The theater group "Enlazando Vidas" performed a play focused on recruitment prevention in three schools. This play had an important pedagogical impact.
- Family Component: The program developed a project with "Corporación Casa para la Mujer Trabajadora" (Foundation House for the Working Women), with the purpose of providing training for reincorporated women or reincorporates' relatives, from Suba, Ciudad Bolivar and Engativa in Bogotá. Training on citizenship, reestablishment of rights and non-violence issues was provided. This quarter began with the implementation of an agreement with the "Escuela Galan" (Galan School), which will improve capacities on social and familiar reintegration of 700 ex-combatant individuals and 1000 relatives in the city of Bogotá.
- Recreational Component: During this quarter three main activities on this matter took place:
  - 1) A party for reincorporated children in Bogotá.
  - 2) A Christmas party for reincorporated children and their relatives in "Mundo Aventura" Park (Bogotá), with a total attendance of 2644 persons.
  - 3) A recreational journey was held and a movie was presented with the attendance of 65 people from Suba and Engativa in Bogotá.

**2.2 FAMILY REUNIFICATION SERVICES**

**2.2.1 Technical Guidelines**

ICBF and IOM unified criteria for the publication of the Family Guidelines Document, ready to be published and formalized through Resolution N° 002366. ICBF reports that this quarter 12 youths were reintegrated to their families.

**2.2.2 Family Meetings**

This quarter, three family reunions were held, two in the "Hogar Gestor" modality and one in Specialized Assistance Centers (CAE in Spanish), with the participation of 168 youths and their

families (84 youths and 84 relatives).

## **2.3 HEALTH**

### **2.3.1 Preventing the Consumption of Psychoactive Substances**

Due to coordination and articulation problems with ICBF, operators and the hired company for the therapeutic ambulatory assistance, the pilot projects for Bucaramanga and Cali ended in advance. As a result of the evaluation process, it was necessary to establish contact with the "Secretarías de Salud Departamentales y Municipales" (Departmental and Local Public Health Secretaries) so the ambulatory assistance can be handled by the first semester 2008, starting with Cali.

In Medellín, the agreement with the University Foundation Luis Amigó is in progress. A total amount of 35 youths are in the assistance process. In Armenia, Faro Foundation leads the assistance process. This quarter 30 youths received ambulatory assistance.

## **2.4 EDUCATION**

During the reporting period school coverage was 61%; twenty one youths out of 370 have completed baccalaureate. The Program brought complementary support (transportation and school supplies) to 98 youths in the Caldas and Villavicencio Foster Homes and in the Medellín Transit Home.

In November, project CLG (General Labor Competencies) was closed. A total of 160 public employees (ICBF and educative institutions) participated. This Ministry organized the third workshop to present educative attention results and constrains in Departments, with the participation of 85 public employees. The results of this workshop were inputs for the National Planning Coordination Worktable for 2008. (Annex)

Regarding the project "Evaluation of Results of Educational Assistance", progress was achieved on inputs provided by teachers' visits and interviews, in order to complete the information for the final report.

The program provided financial support for the publication of the "Educational Plan for the

Coming Decade".

## **2.5 EMPLOYMENT PREPARATION**

During this quarter a total of 415 youths attended the training courses at SENA among other institutions such as Comfenalco, Cajasan, Don Bosco training centre and the MAC Foundation in Cali. Out of this total, 150 received training through the initial module in the departments of Antioquia, Cundinamarca, Bolivar, Caldas Meta, Quindio, Santander y Valle. In addition, youths received training courses related to their first and second occupational profile.

A total of 111 professionals participated in four workshops held as part of the transference process of the MIMA<sup>5</sup>. Also, 192 tool kits have been provided through the agreement N° 090 SENA-IOM, 134 during the workshops and 58 after.

## **2.6 INCOME GENERATION**

Regarding the alliance with "Tejido Humano" Association, a total of 5 productive and housing projects received funding this quarter.

The Gastronomy Workshop along with the "Fundación Escuela Taller de Bogotá" (FETB in Spanish), continued with the training process of an attending average of 11 youths out of 15. Counseling and labor intermediation activities made progress through strengthening the alliance between "Asociación Amigos" (Friends Association), FETB and some field private companies. Some integration activities have taken place like "La Casa Tomada", in which programs' beneficiaries cooked for the complete gastronomic school group under the supervision of a basic cooking teacher. In November, the program participated in a national gastronomic fair in Bogotá, as an opportunity for the youths to share knowledge and experiences with other national workgroups.

The training on the production of medicinal plants and organic fertilizers from the Pueblo Bello Project continued with an average of 16 youths participating. Also two follow up visits were held in which a bank account for Seymukekun association was opened. The project was included in a fair organized by USAID, as a part of a marketing strategy to strengthen productive networks, with a successful presentation of soaps and soils' image designed by Indigenous youth's groups.

In alliance with the International Colombian Corporation (ICC), this project was included in a "Fondo Emprender" call for proposals from SENA. Likewise, this project could access funding through the Ministry of Social Protection – IOM agreement. Finally, a business workshop was held with the participation of ICC experts.

### **2.6.1 Coordination with the Civil Reintegration Program ( PRVC)**

Progress has been made through articulation process with the ACRSE, IOM and the CROJ. During the reporting period two worktables were held in order to establish the ACRSE institutional policies for psychosocial and educational assistance areas emphasizing referential and articulation processes.

In October, the program participated in the Economic Reintegration National Committee which updated public policy on reintegration, productive projects, employment and work opportunities. Moreover, the Psychosocial Reintegration National Committee took place in November to adjust some of the previous agreements on the matter, results that were shared with the CROJ, in which the program played an important part. This quarter a total of 131 youths applied for training on formal education, community work and psychosocial participation process.

## **2.7 REFERENCE AND OPPORTUNITY CENTERS**

To date 1502 youths have been contacted and 753 were active. A total of 107 youth had access to the Health and Social Security System; 33 enrolled in formal education process, out of which 39 received subsidies; 165 youth enrolled in training courses and 106 received subsidies to participate in these courses.

Additionally, 48 youths were referred to get a job as a part of the selection process. 53 youths have been employed, a total of 550 jobs have been created; 975 youths have participated in socio-cultural activities; 170 families of the youths in the program were refereed through the regional CROJs; 112 obtained legal documentation; and the total number of institutions that are part of the employment national network is 58.

Regarding the beneficiaries' security, four of the youth were relocated for security reasons, two of which are currently employed.

## 2.8 CULTURE AND RECREATION

This quarter 213 boys, girls and adolescents participated in cultural and sports activities as part of articulation and the local process. Progress was made with "Corporación Colombia Subacuática" (Subaquatic Colombia Corporation) on sports and cultural activities with the youths from the program in the cities of Cali and Medellin. Youths have recognized new ways to enjoy their free time while improving their social interaction through physical, training and conditioning activities, as follows:

- Health Accident Prevention Course: 129 youths
- Handmade products: 56 youths
- Music: 40 youths
- Cooking: 40 youths
- Theatre: 50 youths

For a total of 129 beneficiaries participating in all the activities they were interested in.

## 2.9 MONITORING AND EVALUATION SYSTEM

### 2.9.1 Reintegration Conditions Index (ICR)

During the reporting period the program worked on adjusting the ICR tool to the current institutional policy. ICBF's approval is required to proceed with the transfer to transit homes.

As regards to the ICCR implementation process, the program jointly analyzed the application.

### 2.9.2 SAME

During this period a total of 70 beneficiaries were entered into the system, for an accumulated total of 944 registered youths. Likewise, 19 transferences from one CROJ to the other took place this quarter for a program total of 134.

### 2.9.3 SIMONI

This quarter transference to ICBF was completed, after the problems with the server were solved. The program will continue the follow up and accompaniment activities for the implementation process to ICBF regional offices and operators to quarantine applicability.

During this quarter, the program focused on keeping youths in the ICBF's specialized program until their reestablishment of rights was completed; even though they were older than 18 years of age.

### **Beneficiary's story**

#### **AN INSPIRING HOPE STORY**

*Alberto, a 19 year old youth formerly recruited by an IAG, calls his life story an "An Inspiring Hope Story". When he was twelve years old he was recruited by the FARC, where he spent most of his childhood. He did not have a family but he still required protection, so this group took him into custody.*

*He lost one of his eyes in combat, therefore he was assigned to guard an engineer who was kidnapped, who later on became his friend and family. The engineer taught Alberto how to read and write they spent several hours reading.*

*"I started to feel like a prisoner by spending time with that man. I was not pleased with what I did and the orders I received. The engineer who was now my friend, told me about the opportunities that I could have outside the group; so I cleared my thoughts and planed a way to escape", Alberto stated.*

*Alberto's friend found help in the Specialized Attention Programme for Boys, Girls and Youths Disengaged from IAG, leaded by ICBF, after having escaped together. The programme, financed by USAID with technical support from IOM provided Alberto with bakery training and cultural and recreational activities. He is currently concluding high school studies and working at a bakery. Alberto continues to take part in CROJ's activities such as theatre plays and sports.*

*Alberto developed a great interest for reading and writing. As a result he decided to take part in the Fifth Local Story Telling Competition, "Which is your Story?" in Medellin. He was one of the winners and his story was published. He is grateful to the Programme that "gave youths, hope and life".*

## **B) PREVENTION**

### *Main Objective*

The prevention component provides technical and financial support to government entities, communities, private sector and civil society organizations to strengthen public policies and programs that help develop and protect the life of boys, girls and adolescents and prevent their recruitment by IAG, which is one of the effects of the armed conflict in this country.

### **B.1 Legal Framework**

#### *B.1.1. Childhood and Adolescence Law*

During the September-December period, an adjusted version of the childhood and adolescents Recruitment Prevention document was elaborated. Likewise, the program provided technical assistance

for the implementation of the Ministry of Social Protection Law 4690/2007, which created the Inter-agency Commission for Recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents.

**B.1.2 Formulation of Public Policies on Childhood and Adolescence**

- Regarding dissemination, activities for the implementation of the Childhood and Adolescence Law took place in Bogotá this quarter. Additionally, progress was made on design, implementation and follow-up's of public policies, especially in Cúcuta (300 public employees) and Cartagena, where municipal's public budgets include a component for childhood and adolescents.
- During this quarter, the final phase of the project with "Corporación Te Apoyo Antioquia" (I Support You Antioquia) and the Antioquia Governor's Office was conducted. The program provided technical assistance for the childhood and adolescents public policy design, with emphasises on recruitment prevention, in 27 out of 51 Antioquia's municipalities. In addition to this, Childhood, Adolescents and Family Local Observatories were consolidated and 21 worktables on childhood and family were held.
- A technical training on DEVINFO<sup>6</sup>, for mayor's public employees took place this quarter, with the participation of 17 municipalities in Meta. Technical assistance was providing to the strengthening of a Departmental Information System for Childhood and Adolescence rights. Likewise, the program provides technical assistance for the organization of a Mayor's Departmental Encounter for dissemination of the main advances on public policy, focusing on recruitment prevention and the goals and challenges that must be included in the departmental and municipal development plans. Finally, the program gathered the inputs provided by 29 municipalities in order to complete some guidelines and institutional orientations.

**B.2.1 Childhood and Armed Conflict in the Human Development Report for Valle del Cauca**

As part of the agreement with the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), progress was made on researching, collecting, processing and systematizing information for the Human Development Report for Valle del Cauca. The report's publication will be launched at the beginning of 2008.

**B.2.2 National Committee for Recruitment Prevention**

During the reporting period, the program supported the creation of the Inter-Agency Commission for Recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents, through 4690 Decree of 2007 from the Ministry

of social protection. This Commission is led by the Vice Presidency of the Republic, and the Presidential program "Colombia Joven" (Youth Colombia) is responsible for its technical secretary.

The Commission is in charge of articulating, promoting and guaranteeing the rights of children, preventing violations and re-establishing rights when they have been violated. Also, it should promote programmatic decisions, institutional strengthening and the formulation of public policies on childhood, focusing on recruitment prevention to avoid risk factors.

### B.2.3 General Attorney's Office (GAO)

- Regarding the support project for the GAO<sup>7</sup>, a public act was held to launch three products (Virtual Classroom, CD and booklet), related to technical training for public employees on justices process, judicial system and non-penalization of ex combatant boys, girls and adolescents recruited by IAG. These didactic materials serve as pedagogical and training tools for more than 600 public employees.
- As part of the monitoring, evaluation and follow-up phase to the departmental and municipal plans, the program ended the analysis to prevent, detect and deal with child abuse and family violence; which are key aspects related to boys, girls and adolescents recruitment by IAG. An institutional guidelines document for departments and municipalities will be published in February 2008.
- On December 10<sup>th</sup> of 2007, an agreement between the GAO and the National Ombudsman was subscribed to provide technical support and strengthen activities for the formulation of public policies on childhood and adolescence, with a recruitment prevention focus. Through processes like strengthening of local activities, working on childhood and adolescence; researching, control and punishment activities for recruitment prevention and early warnings. This allows the establishment of a judicial network to establish effective children rights.
- Also, the specialized consultancy finished the document, endorsing hypothesis on the principles and obligations stated in the Law 975 of 2005, related to the integral protection of boys, girls and adolescents, to guarantee their rights and freedom. As part of the follow up strategies on public policies, the official approval was given to the *Protocol for Attorneys, Integral Reparation, ICBF Operators and Childhood and Adolescents Law as a Guide for Public Policies*. This publication will be launched next quarter along with GAO, as a guiding tool for public employees, on the steps that need to be followed when assisting boys and girls disengaged from the IAG and for the supervision and control actions to ensure the fulfillment of public policies on childhood.

During the reporting period the Vulnerability, Risk and Opportunity Maps (MVRO) methodology continued to be applied in eight municipalities of Montes de Maria Region. As a result of this, the program has increased coverage, including youths from rural areas who have participated in the process, in the

followed municipalities: María la Baja, Córdoba, El Guamo, (Department of Bolívar) and Palmitos, Chalán, Morroa, San Antonio de Palmito and Coloso (Department of Sucre). 129 boys, girls and youths, 94 parents and 25 public employees participated in the process of identifying local vulnerabilities and opportunities for youths at risk of recruitment by IAG.

The strengthening of the "Institutos Técnicos Agropecuarios" – ITA – (Technical Agricultural Institutes) is noteworthy for the local interinstitutional articulation with SENA, Food Security Programs and the presidential Program "Acción Social". A total of 54 beneficiaries, participated in the workshop that was held in Sincelejo to start the transference process of SENA's Integral Model for MIMA tools, as a methodology to be used for the total number of ITAs and for 10 youths initiatives for Productive Undertake Projects part of the cooperation agreement with Restrepo Barco Foundation and "Redes" initiative from UNDP.

This quarter the program provided technical assistance to twelve institutions from three municipalities in the Montes de María Region; eight ITAs (San Onofre, Zambrano, San Jacinto, San Juan Nepomuceno, Carmen de Bolívar (two ITAs), Los Palmitos and María la Baja); six educational institutions in Urabá (Apartadó, Carepa, Chigorodo, Mutatá, Necoclí and Turbo) and one educational institution in Soacha.

A total of 265 beneficiaries participated in cultural, educational and Project formulation activities, in the municipalities of: El Carmen de Bolívar, San Jacinto, Zambrano, San Juan Nepomuceno; María la Baja, Córdoba, El Guamo (Department of Bolívar) and eight municipalities in Sucre (Ovejas, San Onofre, Tolúviejo, Los Palmitos, El Chalán, Morroa, San Antonio de Palmito and Coloso). Also, cultural and communication activities took place in 15 municipalities of Montes de María Region, Barrancabermeja and four municipalities from the Department of Putumayo (Mocoa, Puerto Asís, San Miguel and Valle del Guamuéz).

Regarding the Support Groups for the Social Coexistence project, funded by USAID and Cali's Government, progress was made on improving social coexistence in the city of Cali through strengthening of soccer fan clubs, covered a total of 250 beneficiaries.

Likewise, this quarter technical assistance and financial support was provided to 121 recruitment prevention initiatives in 8 departments, benefiting 6.032 boys, girls and adolescents. The Vulnerability, Risk and Opportunity Maps methodology continued to be applied with the participation of 68 girls, 61 boys, 94 youths, and 25 public employees.

The 2750 new beneficiaries that entered the program, correspond to the coexistence strategy. A total of 121 received technical assistance and financial support. The program continues to expand in geographical coverage, in order to reach a cultural and social representative selection of the youths affected by the armed conflict.

### ***B.3.2 Sensitizing Campaigns***

To continue the strengthening of awareness campaigns for journalists, social communicators, news agencies and social communication media, the Seventh Workshop "Childhood and Challenges for Journalism", was held in Barranquilla. Also, journalist, public and private employees' participation has increased, with a total of 70 participants, who are helping to prevent the recruitment of children and adolescents by IAG and raising awareness among different populations on the issue.

### ***B.3.3 Strengthening Government Institutions and Civil Organizations***

During this quarter, along with "Colombia Joven" Presidential Program the Forum "Youth: Potential for Development" was held in Bogotá, with the participation of 124 youth from 31 different departments, with a significant participation of Indigenous and Afro-Colombian communities. This Forum aims to provide guidelines and inputs for the public agenda of local authorities focusing on youth development population.

Technical and financial support was provided to ICBF in order to hold a prevention recruitment public policy workshop, with the purpose of making progress on institutional strategies and guidelines for preventing childhood recruitment. A total of 26 public employees from ICBF participated in this training.

Concerning the Mayor's Office in Bogotá and IOM's project that is supported by USAID, progress was made on the implementation of a contest "Jovenes Conviven por Bogotá". Also, experiences' systematization took place in order to strengthen Youth Public Policy and the design and implementation of an administrative tool for supporting 160 urban youth initiatives.

### ***B.3.4 Monitoring and Follow up***

This quarter, the Municipal Information Systems for recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents' guidelines and support materials were consolidated, strengthening public policies on childhood and adolescence. For this purpose, two guideline documents were elaborated: "Guía de Trabajo para la Elaboración de Diagnóstico Situacional de Niñez y Adolescencia en el Nivel Municipal y para el Establecimiento de Prioridades" (Guide for an Assessment to Establish Priorities and the Status of Children and Youths at a Municipal Level) and "Guía para la Incorporación de la perspectiva de Prevención de la Vinculación de niños, niñas, adolescentes y jóvenes al Conflicto Armado en el Marco de los Planes de Acción Municipal en Derechos Humanos", (Guide for incorporating into the municipal action plans, a Human Rights perspective to prevent the involvement of children and youths in the armed conflict.)

## ***B.4 Special Support to Indigenous and Afro-Colombian Communities(2p, 6l) y tabla Accumulated Results***

### ***Main Objective***

The Prevention Component provides technical and financial support to government institutions, ethnic communities and organizations to promote the rights of ethnic groups, social organization, territorial rights, and adequate living standards that help develop and protect the life of children and adolescents, preventing their recruitment by IAG while supporting the return and insertion processes of Indigenous and Afro-Colombian children and youths disengaged from IAG.

### ***B.4.1 Strengthening Organizations and Cultures by Exercising the self-determination principle***

With respect to the implementation of the "Granja Integral para la Vida" (Integral Farm for Life) project, technical assistance was provided for operation of the Ethno educational school and the expansion of activities to nine more educational institutions with the Sikuaní community in Meta.

Activities related to the strengthening of the educational model "Institutos Técnicos Agropecuarios" – ITA – (Technical Agricultural Institutes) are noteworthy for the assisted population in conflict areas this quarter. This initiative is a prevention activity that allows and strengthens pedagogical tools, according to local developments. This quarter, a training and inter-institutional articulation processes took place, emphasizing on specific training for Department of Cauca's schools (Paeces, Guambianos, Yanaconas,

Kokonucos- 700 indigenous). Three schools in the Montes de María Region<sup>8</sup>, received a total of 58 Afro-Colombian youths for training activities.

Additionally, the cooperation between CRIC and IOM presented the following results:

1) Project "Cultivando Futuro", (Cultivating Future): The program, has strengthened Life Projects' formulation in order to prevent the recruitment of boys, girls and adolescents. Also, the program has expanded this project through Indigenous communities in the municipalities of Paez (Belalcazar Reservation), Inza Morales (Honduras Reservation), Cajibío (Path-Yu Reservation), Caldono (Pioyá Reservation), Puracé and Silvia. Beneficiaries' selection criteria have been established, in order to support productive experiences to improve the living conditions in these communities.

Pedagogical strategies have been established with the Pastos' Community to develop projects' components in Nariño. The main goal of these strategies is to create communication channels with the communities in order to design life projects, which strengthen organizational capacities, as well as the implementation of projects that recover ancestral knowledge. To date, 391 girls and 379 boys have participated in the program; through Yascual, Tuquerres, Colimba, Muellamues, Cumbal, Panan, Mallana and Ipiales educational centres.

#### B.4.3 Support to Social Investment Initiatives with Emphasis on Cultural Respect and Revitalization

The Program maintained the geographical coverage in order to reach ethnic groups through a strengthening process related to cultural, political and food security initiatives. During this quarter, various initiatives, with ethnic groups, were supported in five departments: Nariño, Cauca, Cesar, Meta and Sucre, with a total of 2.546<sup>9</sup> beneficiaries and their communities (258 entered the program this quarter).

Activities with ethnic groups focused on strengthening the ITA's pedagogical model to preserve cultural and agricultural practices. This quarter the program executed the following activities:

- 1) Nine ethnic- education projects in Cauca and Meta
- 2) Three educational initiatives in Cauca
- 3) One cultural project in Sucre
- 3) Two productive projects in Cauca y Cesar.

During this quarter the program has provided technical and financial support to 15 initiatives. In the Department of Meta, Ethnic- education's project increased the number of beneficiaries from Sikuaní Community.

### **Beneficiary's story**

#### ***The Shagra<sup>10</sup> : Education to Reaffirm Indigenous Communities Own knowledge***

*Paula<sup>11</sup> is a young girl deeply interested in her community knowledge. She is currently concluding high school studies in the Agro-industrial School Los Pastos in the Ipiales Indigenous Community. During the last year she has been beneficiary of the USAID and IOM's Support Programme for Ex-Combatant Children in Colombia.*

*This 17 years old girl participates actively in the project titled: The Shagra: Education to Reaffirm Indigenous Communities Own knowledge. The Shagra, became a communitarian space to recover ancestral knowledge and values. "The Shagra transforms my life and my community because strengthens family and friendship ties. It is a sharing and learning space, in which cultural and farming activities encourage our ethical values to improve coexistence. This is an opportunity to show that our society is capable to coexist peacefully and give the best", Paula affirms.*

*This girl from the Pastos Community spread her time between her studies and the farming work, as a way to protect the environment following the indigenous precepts, "We all are inhabitants of this land, she is our mother, we all have to protect her and our own existence", Paula assures. For the Indigenous that work the land, it has a special meaning linked to purity, tranquility and peace.*

*Paula has learned a lot through this initiative, "This is the way to demonstrate the value of mutual help, living in a country marked by violence and loneliness. The Shagra strengthens collaboration and solidarity principles, increasing tolerance and life respect.*

*With this project Paula reinforced her indigenous identity and her ties to her community. Through productive experiences which improve living conditions in these communities, the risk to be recruited by IAG or to get involve in illicit activities decreased for girls like Paula.*

## 5. LESSONS LEARNED

- Working with the Monserrat Clinic expanded the possibilities of mental health services, providing first experiences of virtual training.
- The National Encounter of Educational Public Employees gathered inputs for a national planning worktable, through an inter-institutional articulation between ICBF and ACRSE. This meeting was an opportunity to identify priorities and community needs.
- A successful experience of transferring MIMA to SENA, demonstrated the importance of achieving effective indicator systems in order to provide an assertive assistance to vulnerable communities.
- Prevention recruitment youths initiatives should include explanatory arguments and inter-institutional work, in order to provide long term alternatives and increase the impact of projects results on the public policies' implementation.
- Childhood and adolescents public policies require civil society participation.
- The elections of new local authorities demand awareness and information campaigns, focusing on pedagogical process, Childhood and Adolescence Law implementation and transference of guidelines and methodologies.

## 6. PRIORITIES FOR THE COMING TERM

- Follow up on the SIMONI's implementation and the installation of ICR in temporary homes
- Support Family Assistance Institutional Guidelines on prevention for the illegal use of psychoactive substances.
- Strengthen worktables for re-establishing children rights and support regional work plans.
- Initiate the virtual training for mental health services
- Begin the implementation and follow up of the Inter-institutional National Plan with the MEN.
- Strengthen the ACR's economic reintegration projects through CROJ infrastructure as a raising funding strategy. Also, ACR-IOM-CROJ inter-institutional worktable should be strengthened.
- Provide technical assistance to institutions working on recruitment prevention issues.
- Consolidate the Early Warning Systems and Recruitment Prevention Indicators, especially in municipalities with higher recruitment risk.
- Transfer program's educational methodology to the MEN.
- Assist the inclusion of a human rights perspective in Local Development Plans.

## 7. CONSTRAINTS AND ACTIONS TAKEN

- The election process delayed some project activities, due to political, administrative and security implications of this process for Colombian State institutional procedures.
- The implementation of Law 80 of 1993<sup>12</sup>, during the reporting period, constrains the institutional flexibility and budgeted availability.

<sup>12</sup> This provides the minimum standards required for the activities and procedures of the Public Administration.

- This quarter, the school coverage for the CAE, CJ and Foster Homes phases was lower, due to long distances that some children have to cover for rural Foster Homes, which explains 19% of the missing coverage. The remaining 10% was owned to the end of the academic year because some of the children entered the program in November.

## **8. CONCLUSIONS**

During this reporting period the program continued implementing and improving the assistance and prevention strategies created to support and strengthen public policies on children rights.

Through the cooperation agreements signed this quarter with the ICBF, the program improved the capacity of the Colombian Government and civil society to respond and guarantee restitution of rights and social insertion processes for boys and girls disengaged from IAG, focusing on early childhood. The ICBF and other public institutions had a higher participation in inter-institutional work tables and workshops, which aims to promote respect and awareness of human rights, particularly among vulnerable populations, such as ex-combatants, disengaged children, and receptor communities.

The creation of the Inter-Agency Commission for Recruitment Prevention of Boys, Girls and Adolescents, was a relevant advancement supporting institutions, in the implementation of the Childhood and Adolescence Law and other laws that are relevant to recruitment prevention.

There is still work to be done in components such as culture, recreation, sports and in the consolidation of processes with the ethnic minorities.




