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

AGRICULTURE/COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT YMCA PROJECT
PAPER

Summary

The purpose of this grant is to provide one year of funding to the Ethiopia Agriculture/Community Development Project of the YMCA which is designed to improve the social and economic conditions of marginal subsistence farmers in the areas of Dembi Dolo and Nekempte. During this time, the YMCA and USAID Ethiopia plan to organize a project to replicate the activities of this project in other areas of Ethiopia.

This project focuses on the total life situations of the farmers participating in its activities. The first step, lifting these farmers from marginal subsistence to secure subsistence agriculture, has been accomplished under the predecessor project. The next step will attempt to make these farmers more self-sufficient, practicing agriculture for income as well as subsistence. In addition to basic agricultural development, other activities will be conducted in the areas of non-formal education, cultural enrichment, sanitation, family planning and health.

The budget for this one-year grant totals \$34,740; the YMCA will obtain an additional \$12,000 from other sources.

Introduction

The YMCA originally received a grant of \$25,600 in July 1974, to fund a one-year agricultural/community development project in Dembi Dolo, Ethiopia. Due to political changes which occurred soon thereafter, project implementation was delayed and the project was extended one year until July 1977, without additional funding. The project was evaluated in June 1977. At-

tached is the evaluation report which also contains a proposal for extension of the project for an additional one year.

The USAID Mission in Ethiopia concurred in the findings of the evaluation report -- i.e., significant progress had been made; that replication of the project and expansion to other areas of Ethiopia was highly desirable; and that project activities should continue for an additional year during which time the Mission and the YMCA would develop an expanded project utilizing lessons learned and personnel trained under this project.

The Ethiopia YMCA Agricultural/Community Development Project is designed to improve the social and economic conditions of marginal subsistence farmers in the areas of Dembi Dolo and Nekempte in Ethiopia. These rural areas are characteristic of much of the country where farming although the only means of subsistence barely enables families to survive. Along with the low level of agricultural production, are accompanying problems of poor health, high birth rates, and little education. This project takes on added significance since it is serving as a model for duplication in other parts of the country.

Project Rationale

[The administering agency is the World Development Unit of the International Division, National Board of YMCAs of the U.S.A.] It will be responsible for financial and program reporting to AID and will account for and channel funds to the Ethiopia YMCA. [The implementing agency is the National Council of YMCAs of Ethiopia. There are local YMCAs in Nekempte and Dembi Dolo which provide direct on-site supervision and leadership to the project activities.

Project activities will be directly implemented by the farmer associations in the area. This highly decentralized project has proven itself most effective in implementing the stated purposes while also providing a hierarchy of accountability to AID through the U.S. YMCA.

Technically, the project is based upon some very basic approaches with no great sophistication in machinery or methodology. Since the farming is at such a low level of production and since basic health and sanitation facilities are lacking, the attempt is made to provide as simple methodology as possible to place the populations on a more secure social and economic base. All staff are Ethiopian, with assistants coming from concerned areas. Specialists are brought in as needed through the related host government ministries. In this way, farmers learn to make use of local resources with little outside input. The Project staff serve as catalysts, stimulators, and sometimes as demonstrators. They become a part of the decision-making process and participate as a member of the farmer associations. There is close cooperation throughout with the host government's rural program. In fact, the Provincial Administrator considers the YMCA project as a fine example of how to implement the government's program of land reform, strengthening farmer associations, and increasing agricultural production.

There have been clear demonstrations that this project can be replicated in other parts of Ethiopia. It is relatively inexpensive and involves large numbers of people in basic agricultural community development. During this funding period a concerted effort will be made to do the basic planning for expansion activities. There are six site locations which have already been identified in a preliminary way. The provincial administrator has already

indicated his personal desire to see the project expanded to other parts of his province. The rate of return for this relatively small investment seems great.

Project Goal

To improve the educational, agricultural, social and health conditions of participating subsistence farmers in the areas of Dembi Dolo and Nekempte, Ethiopia.

This project focuses on the total life situations of the farmers participating in the activities. The first attempt has been to lift those farmers from marginal subsistence to a secure subsistence agriculture. The next attempt is to make the farmers more self-sufficient --agricultural production for increased income as well as subsistence. In addition to the basic agricultural activities, other activities are conducted in the areas of non-formal education, cultural enrichment, sanitation, family planning and health projects.

Project Purpose

1. To provide self-help community development activities.

The primary method of operation is through the formation of and cooperation with farmer associations in each of the areas. There are a total of 21 associations representing approximately 250 families per association, or more than 5,250 families. With the exception of selected inputs from Ethiopian staff, instructors, and occasional specialists, all activities are conducted by the members of the farmer associations. Considering that there are approximately 6 people per family, more than 31,500 people are either directly or indirectly affected by the self-help activities of this project.

2. To provide public health and sanitation activities and education.

Class activities in health, hygiene, and sanitation are conducted for the farmers and their families in both areas. Special activities are also conducted, such as "clean home" work projects where recognition is given to women who make demonstrated improvements in their living compounds. Classes in prenatal and child care are also conducted. Work projects building latrines, digging wells for clean drinking water, and separating animal from human living areas are organized. Information concerning family planning techniques is also disseminated.

3. To provide assistance in improved agricultural techniques and activities.

For the Dembi Dolo site location, the improvement in agricultural production and marketing is conducted through 50 previously unemployed and landless rural young adults who collectively cleared, cultivated, and settled 40 acres. Under the land reform program they have approximately 2,000 acres available to them for future expansion. In addition, cooperative farming assistance is being given to the members of the four surrounding farmer associations. Improved varieties of maize, soybean, potatoes, red pepper, sugar cane, teff, and oil seeds have been produced. Poultry farming and bee keeping have also been successfully introduced.

For Nekempte, there are three demonstration areas - Friday Market, Boneya (Tuesday Market), and Gutie. Seventeen farmer associations are involved in seed selection for improved grains and vegetables, fertilizer demonstration, improved irrigation, bee keeping, cattle inoculation, and rat-proofed grain storage. Detailed records of the varieties of crops planted at each

of the three demonstration areas are available in the evaluation report of June 1977 (attached).

Evaluation Plan

A basic evaluation of the predecessor project activities was conducted in June 1977 (Attachment). Target indicators have been specified and provide the base with which to judge continuing progress. After six months, a team will visit the site locations for an in-depth evaluation and to begin re-planning activities. The insights and skills of the existing staff and volunteer specialists will be utilized in these activities. Discussions

will be conducted especially with the minister of agriculture and other related ministries to select additional potential sites for extension activities; six such sites have already been identified. Additional sites will be selected as seem feasible. After the sixth month and not later than the ninth month a full OPG proposal will be submitted to the USAID Ethiopia Mission specifying the extension plans.

AID/Mission officials will be fully informed and consulted during the entire evaluation/program planning process.

Reports:

Quarterly reports of progress will be prepared by the YMCA covering progress during the reporting period, problems encountered and proposed solutions, and an outline of objectives for the ensuing quarter. Three copies will be submitted to USAID Ethiopia, and three copies to AID/W.

Budget

As noted previously, there are 21 farmer associations involved in the project activities. Each association represents approximately 250 families for a total of 5,250 families. Considering that there are approximately six people per family, there is a potential of 31,500 people who are either directly or indirectly affected by the benefits of this program. In terms of the AID input of 34,750 dollars, cost per individual is \$1.10.

Personnel - are all Ethiopian nationals. The project manager is trained in agriculture. Additional specialists are brought in from the Ministries of Agriculture, Education, or Health as particular conditions require. Fringe benefits include social welfare payments, medical, and retirement benefits.

Travel - includes local travel and travel within the country. The international travel includes assistance from international evaluation and planning sources to assist in the replanning activities.

Other Direct Costs - replacement commodities, and equipment with some monies for extension purposes. Special projects money includes basic building materials (for latrines, storage bins etc.) fertilizer, seeds, fencing, and raw materials for tool manufacture. Replanning monies will be used for feasibility studies, including soil analysis, accumulation of base-line information, and consultations.

Administrative Costs - cover headquarter administrative costs of the YMCA in Addis Ababa, as well as incidental local administrative costs, and costs of the U.S. National Board in administering the grant.

Problem: Your approval is requested for the attached grant to the YMCA for which the proposed life-of-project funding totals \$34,740.

Background: The predecessor of this project, the Ethiopian YMCA Agricultural/Community Development Project, predated what was later to become Operational Program Grants. As such, it was the first A.I.D.-funded project under the then newly established World Development Unit of the International Division, National Board of YMCA's of the U.S.A. Although the project was originally funded for one year in mid-1974, due to political changes which occurred soon thereafter, the project could not be completed until June 1977.

In June of this year, the YMCA evaluated the project and found that significant progress had been made. The USAID Ethiopia concurred in these findings and recommended that the project activity be extended for another year, during which time the Mission would develop a new OPG to replicate the activities in other areas of Ethiopia.

The purpose of the present Grant is to provide one year of funding for the Ethiopia YMCA Agriculture/Community Development Project which is designed to improve the social and economic conditions of marginal subsistence farmers in the areas of Dembi Dolo and Nekempte in Ethiopia. These rural areas are characteristic of much of the country where farming, although the only means of subsistence, barely enables families to survive. Along with the low level of agricultural production are accompanying problems of poor health, high birth rates and little education. The project focuses on the total life situation of these farmers through self-help community development activities; provision of public health, hygiene, sanitation and family planning activities and education; and the provision of assistance in improved agricultural production and marketing techniques.

Because the project was originally funded and managed by PVC, the Africa Bureau and its Ethiopia Mission have requested an extension of our grant rather than require a totally fresh processing of a proposal by the Africa Bureau. We believe such an approach to be warranted.

The proposed grant funding will be for one year at \$34,740. During this period, the YMCA will contribute an additional \$12,000.

Recommendation: That you approve this project for funding in FY-1977.*

The following concerns the YMCA OPG, Grant No. AID/Pha-G-1067.

Dan Tyler, East African Representative, and Dick Bertucco visited Addis Ababa, May 29 - June 2 hopefully to evaluate the YMCA Rural Development Project. Unfortunately, their travel was restricted and they could not visit the project site. But all reports indicate that the program has been successful and that there is considerable interest in extending the projects concepts and lessons.

Although there has been no USAID visit to the site in a years time, we are interested in viewing the recent successes. From all angles it seems to be a winner now that the activity has gotten off the ground. The delays and re-programming that have been necessary appear totally justified in the context of change in today's Ethiopia.

Bertucco was going to get back to me on some details, but as I've received nothing to date, I am keeping you posted on our overview. We concur that the project should be extended but more detailed plans need to be worked out. Unfortunately, the project ends this month and funding cases. USAID will concur in some type of bridge funding (6-9 months) in order that the program can move to the next phase - transferring the Dembi Dolo experience to other Peasant Associations.

I would appreciate if you could let Dick Bertucco know that we are anxious to support the effort. We would appreciate you assisting in working out an appropriate agreement to keep funding


flowing over the next months until a new program is developed.

With Bertuccio/Tyler we discussed the larger issue of the YNCA/Ethiopia situation in general and see it in the context of a global issue of organizational financial support during troubled or transitory times. Although we would like to contribute to a solution - it really appears to be beyond a Mission program. However, lets not let this larger, global YNCA issue cloud the Rural Development Project which the Mission would like to see continued actively. Without an in-depth analysis it sure looks like the cost/benefit on this project is an envious record.

Please keep us posted on Bertuccio's thoughts.


