(1) Complete self-sufficiency, that is, technical and managerial self-sufficiency as well as financial self-sufficiency, will be difficult for the RIG Fisheries Service to attain in the forseeable future, let alone by the estimated final contribution date of FY74. The expenses of some hatchery operations may be met through the sale of fingerlings and market fish but it is doubtful that the Fisheries Service then will be financially self-sufficient or require no further advisory assistance. Our target is a RIG Fisheries Service that by FY74 will be able to adequately service Lao fish culturalists with the aid of the RIG Extension Service and with a minimum of outside assistance.

- O88 RIG was reluctant to purchase fish feed (such as rice bran, broken rice, chicken egg, etc.) and fertilizer (such as horse manure, chicken manure, etc.). However, in the First Lao National Fisheries Meeting, after discussion, the Director of Forest and Water issued orders to purchase these items and gave implicit instructions to his staff to do so hereafter to the limit of funds available.
- O97 It is the practice in Laos to barter for services and favors among government services and one of the property of the project Agreement provided for the fingerlings to be sold and therefore this practice of bartering or giving of fingerlings is being discouraged. However as this has been the normal practice for such a long time it is difficult to correct, and from a cultural point of view, maybe not desirable. Given time and patience, it may be redirected.

- 1. Three participants completed a 3 month training course in Thailand. Two trainees are in Japan attending a 6 month fish culture course under sponsorship of the Colombo Plan.
- 2. Station facilities are nearly completed. (P 1A)
- 3. Accumulated fingerling production at the three culture stations increased from 594,000 in the previous PAR to 1,156,000. (P 2)
- 4. RLG was reluctant to purchase fish feed (such as rice bran, broken rice, chicken egg, etc.) and fertilizer (such as horse manure, chicken manure, etc.). However, in the First Lao National Fisheries Meeting, after discussion, the Director of Forest and Water issued orders to purchase these items and gave implicit instructions to his staff to do so hereafter to the limit of funds available. (P 8)

#### Problems

- 1. Technical and managerial self-sufficient as well as financial self-sufficiency, will be difficult for the RLG fisheries Service to attain in the foreseeable future, let alone by the estimated final contribution date of FY 1974. The espenses of some hatchery operations may be met through the sale of fingerlings and market fish but it is doubtful that the Fisheries Service then will be financially self-sufficient or require no further advisory assistance. Our target is a RLG Fisheries Service that by FY 1974 will be anle to adequately service Lao fish culturalists with the aid of the RLG Extension Service and with a minimum of outside assistance. (P 3)
- 2. Predators have presented a problem. (P 2)

#### Lessons Learned

1. It is the practice in Laos to barter for services and favors among government services and the items used for bartering have been the fingerlings produced at the fisheries stations. The Project Agreement provided for the fingerlings to be sold and therefore this practice of bartering or giving of fingerlings is being discouraged. However, as this has been the normal practice for such a long time, it is difficult to correct, and from a cultural point of view, maybe not desirable. Given time and patience, it may be redirected.
