I. Overall Project Goals

This project is designed to assist provincial and local governments and institutions to accelerate economic growth through more effective organization, planning, implementation and evaluation of rural development programs. An important concomitant goal is to assist national agencies and institutions which are carrying out development activities in the provinces. As part of the strategy for attaining these goals, demonstration and experimental local development activities will be encouraged and, where deemed appropriate, given support under this project.

II. Project Activities

A. Provincial Development Assistance (PDAP)

1. Situation:

Effective provincial governments are potentially the key to rapid economic development in the rural areas of the Philippines. At present most of these governments are weak fiscally, and unprepared, organizationally, for the enormous tasks of development that challenge their capacities. A few provinces, on the other hand, have shown that by organizing themselves more effectively, the limited resources available to the provinces can add significantly to development.

2. Background:

The Provincial Development Assistance (PDAP) became operational in 1968 when a Planning and Coordinating Committee was organized with representatives from key Central Government Agencies and the University of the Philippines Local Government Center. PDAP representatives, backstopped by USAID advisors, have been fielded and are working actively in eight pilot provinces. Each of these provinces has a development plan and <sup>an</sup> active technical

staff functioning under the governor and in cooperation with the PDAP.

3. Objectives:

The primary objectives of the project are: (a) to assist provincial governments in the Philippines to develop capabilities in the planning, execution and maintenance of development programs through efficient use of each participating province's financial, human, and natural resources and (b) to strengthen national government capabilities for assisting provinces in their development efforts.

4. Progress:

The PDAP has identified commodity requirements of provinces in which its technicians operate. Both equipment for general administrative use and specialized equipment for selected projects contributing to the efficient and effective implementation of provincial development programs have been identified. Though all provinces previously lacked basic tools for execution of projects at the research and planning levels, through this project these needs have been adequately met, for the present.

5. Course of Action:

These objectives are met by fielding technicians in a number of administrative, engineering, and fiscal disciplines, by preparing instructional materials, by providing research assistance, and by furnishing strategic commodities. This support is concentrated within the provincial governor's office and the technical staffs of the provincial development councils. Most of this year's commodity support centers on specific needs of selected projects in certain provinces, with a minimum of input applicable to all provinces.

- (2) Map cabinets, aerial dot counters, pocket stereoscopes and mirror stereoscopes for those provinces implementing programs of land evaluations for assessment purposes, infra-structure studies, and tree crop censuses;

**B. Demonstration Fire Control System (Cagayan de Oro)**

**1. Background**

Cagayan de Oro City is the industrial, commercial, economic and cultural hub for most of the provinces in Northern Mindanao. As such, its orderly growth and improvement as a processing and transshipping center of agricultural products is vital to the development of that region.

During 1969 a massive fire destroyed most of the industrial-commercial area of the city and caused serious economic setbacks to agricultural producers by rendering them unable to store or market their products. Subsequently, an alarmed city council passed ordinances that carefully control all new and rebuilt structures in a designated fire zone. However, the basic problem, i.e., the lack of a usable water supply with which to suppress future fires, had not been addressed. To deal with this problem, the Mayor, leading other prominent citizens and guided by

local engineers, conceived a fire fighting scheme that would utilize the abundant supply of water in the nearby river. The completed plan consisted of 3 construction phases and was submitted to NEC/USAID with a request for assistance in completing the first of the 3 phases on a matching fund basis.

As part of the strategy of the Provincial Development Project, NEC/USAID has indicated a willingness to extend limited amounts of assistance to governmental jurisdictions which seek to undertake experimental/demonstration projects which meet the criteria of:

- a. Feasibility
- b. Demonstrated local support
- c. Economic benefits
- d. Possibility and probability of replication in other areas

The Cagayan de Oro fire control system proposal meets these criteria.

2. Objectives

The objective of this activity is to demonstrate that a City can establish an effective fire protection system for a small fraction of the cost of property that would be lost were a major fire to occur in an inadequately prepared urban center. It is believed that such a demonstration will serve as a model for other areas interested in improving their systems of fire control and protecting the facilities upon which the economic development of the surrounding hinterlands so heavily depends.

3. Progress to Date and Plan of Action

The City has provided firm indication that it will bear its share of the costs. Under Ordinance No. 134 it has obligated P64,000 to cover the cost of local purchase items (P24,640) and labor and evacuation/

installation costs (P39,360) required for the installation of a fire control system. An additional P30,000 will be provided by the city to cover costs of filling and preparation of a pump site (P25,000) plus construction of a pump house and maintenance facility in addition to shipment of commodities from Manila to Cagayan de Oro (P5,000). The City is financially sound enough to meet these obligations.

The technical progress has been encouraging. The ground survey of the proposed fire protection system has been completed. The system has been judged technically feasible and capable of providing excellent fire protection.

The prospects for strong local administrative support are very favorable. The city is committed firmly to executing phase I of this activity, involving the installation of the commodities requested herein.

Finally, the plan is viable. In demonstrating a feasible method of developing an urban fire fighting system, the project will utilize readily available river water, a minimum number of pipes, and install hydrants in strategic locations.

Responsibility and Funding

a. Provincial Support and Funding

The City of Cagayan de Oro shall, by appropriate legislation, make the total amount of P94,000 available to this project. The provisions of this ProAg shall not become effective until copies of city ordinances obligating this amount have been received by NEC/USAID. It is understood that the transporting of USAID-procured commodities from Manila to Cagayan de Oro will be the responsibility of Cagayan de Oro City.

b. USAID

USAID will provide approximately \$30,000.00 for the purchase and shipment to Manila of U.S. Government excess property as available. The U.S. input of excess property will be limited to commodities which are not locally produced and which may include "Free Issue Items".

c. NEC/Cagayan de Oro - Memo of Understanding

The NEC shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with the City of Cagayan de Oro outlining its responsibilities under this agreement.

C. Applied Photogrammetry Training and Utilization

1. Activity Outline

The Training Center for Applied Geodesy and Photogrammetry at the University of the Philippines (TGACG/UP) offers training in preparation and interpretation of land maps derived from aerial photographic negatives for use in determining land utilization, crop identification, crop census, area of property lots, classification of lots for tax assessment purposes, and for facilitating placement of infrastructure elements such as roads, bridges, dams, irrigation canal systems, and power line rights-of-ways. The Center assists in the preparation of aerial photographic mosaics and sectional maps for the purposes noted above. These mosaics and sectional maps have been thus far used in selected pilot provinces for tax mapping and to a limited extent in taking rapid and accurate censuses of coconut trees in order to estimate production potential of copra and other palm products, as well as aiding in determining areas to be planted or replanted with new palms. The Center has a critical need for supplementary equipment to more efficiently and expeditiously meet increased demands on its facilities as more and more provinces and national agencies recognize

**I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

In the Philippines, the provinces and cities are the basic entities concerned with economic and social development of the rural and urban areas respectively. Under the basic assumption that those governmental units closest to the people are in a better position to identify and respond to local needs, the primary purpose of this project is to assist selected provinces, cities and other public entities to create the organizations and administrative systems required to more effectively plan, execute and evaluate local economic development programs. This involves the creation of such new organizational units as the development staff and activity task forces, together with supporting management systems. The new systems are initially tested and perfected in the basic priority areas of agricultural production and marketing, infrastructure (particularly farm-to-market roads and irrigation), financial development and in the case of cities, urban planning and development. (The latter two are the result of the merger of the Urban Planning project, 492-11-830-214, with this project.) As warranted by progress in these areas, the system is then directed toward the creation of an integrated local development program which encompasses such key developmental efforts as rural electrification, family planning, and nutrition. The composition of each program will vary according to the local conditions and resources in a particular area. While local governments have only modest financial resources, these are still adequate to produce a significant developmental impact if better integrated and directed toward meeting priority local needs.

To facilitate the acceleration of local development, the project is also concerned with improving the quantity and quality of services provided by national and private agencies. To this end, the project supports the National Economic Council's counterpart organizations; the Provincial Development Assistance Project (PDAP) and the Urban Development Project (UDP), which were created to provide technical and other assistance to provincial and city governments. The project also supports the efforts of local and national academic institutions to provide local level research and training services. Finally, the project is concerned with encouraging closer cooperation on local development problems between government agencies (national and local) and those civic, religious and private organizations which have the capability to

**II. OBJECTIVES**

**III. COURSES OF ACTION IN EACH PROVINCE OR CITY**

In each cooperating area, the project's first concern is to develop a staff and structure capable of formulating a development program which meets priority needs and which can be implemented within the constraints imposed by resource availabilities. Within each program, local authorities will be encouraged initially to give first priority to improving agricultural production and marketing, infrastructure development related to agriculture, management systems, local tax administration and in the case of cities, preparation of comprehensive plans. In selected areas, the project will assist in the local implementation of other GOP/USAID priority activities such as land reform, rural electrification, family planning and nutrition; therefore, the project will be closely coordinated with the Equipment Pool Improvement Project, the Family Planning/Nutrition Project and the Food for Peace Program. Specific courses of action include:

I. Background

During the period of September through November 1970, the Republic of the Philippines was hit by four highly destructive typhoons. Typhoon Sening which devastated much of the Bicol Region and Typhoon Yoling which hit a large area in southern Luzon were of almost unprecedented violence. The four typhoons wrought total damage to public infrastructure facilities estimated at P97 million (\$15 million). On an original acquisition cost basis, approximately P35 million (\$5.5 million) of this total was comprised of damage and destruction of schools. Damage surveys indicate that a total of over 3,000 two-room and three-room schools were totally destroyed and, as a result, an estimated 300,000 children are without classroom facilities. The estimated total present day cost of replacing the damaged and destroyed schools is of the magnitude of P50 million (\$7.8 million).

II. Objective of the Project

The objective of this School Reconstruction Project is to assist the Philippines in meeting the major rehabilitation task forced upon the nation by the substantial and widespread destruction wrought by the series of severe typhoons described above. Specifically, this Project will devote itself to the complete reconstruction (i.e. replacement) of as large a portion of the totally-destroyed schools as available project resources will permit. Schools to be built will be designed and constructed to be able to withstand typhoon wind velocities of 140 miles per hour. This program will be carried out on a "Bayanihan" (self-help) concept of cooperation. Philippine and United States military forces which cooperated effectively during the emergency phase of the 1970 typhoons will have major responsibility for implementation of the program and will be assisted by community self-help and the U.S. Peace Corps.

In rural areas there is a general absence of objective information on local problems and a lack of trained personnel capable of planning and carrying out systematic development programs for provincial or local governments. Related to this is the insufficient involvement, on a direct and systematic basis, of national and local intellectual and financial resources in the solution of local development problems.

II. Background

In recent years the University of the Philippines, in cooperation with other public and private groups, has been contributing significantly to the solution of important development problems through research, consultation, and in-service training programs. To more effectively meet the increasing demands for its services in the provinces, it established in 1969 five Regional Development Study Centers in strategic locations throughout the Philippines (Davao, Marawi/Iligan, Cebu, Iloilo, and Baguio). Each Center was established in cooperation with a local university or (in the case of Davao) a local government unit. The Centers are governed by Executive Boards composed of representatives from government, business, labor, and other elements of the local society. The Director of each Center is appointed from the local sponsoring institution and a co-director is appointed by the University of the Philippines (UP). The UP has created a Council on Regional Development Studies (COREDES) to coordinate the Centers' activities. COREDES is composed of the Institute of Planning, the Local Government Center, the Institute of Small Scale Industries, and the Asian Labor Education Center. The Director of the

Institute of Planning serves as Secretariat for the group. Each unit in COREDES has designated one or more staff members who will be concerned with backstopping activities at the regional centers. The United Nations Development Program (UNDP) planning experts assigned to the Institute of Planning will also be supporting the Centers as a part of their overall assistance program. NEC/USAID will provide supplementary technical assistance and commodity support for the Centers and the COREDES Secretariat.

Much has already been accomplished. The UP has already signed agreements with the five institutions or groups in the regions involved. Physical facilities to house the Centers have been constructed and furnished by the Presidential Assistant on Community Development and Public Works. The Centers have already organized small staffs and libraries and are identifying or initiating research or survey projects and training activities. In February 1970, the Cebu Center and the COREDES jointly sponsored the first of a series of seminars focusing on the development problems faced by the five cities and one province which make up the island of Cebu.

**III. Objectives**

The general goal of each Center is to improve the policy and decision-making processes related to planning and implementation of local and regional development programs. Provincial and city governments will be the prime beneficiaries. While the ultimate aim is to achieve more integrated and comprehensive planning on a regional basis, the short term objective will be to assist in planning and implementing local or regional programs which show promise of creating beneficial economic effects. 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Provincial Development

I. Background and Description

The Provincial Development Project (PDP) and the related Provincial Development Assistance (Counterpart) Project (PDAP) evolved from efforts to support agricultural development in two pilot provinces in 1966.

In 1967, the Government of the Philippines enacted Republic Act 5185 commonly known as the "Decentralization Act". This law was designed to substantially expand the role and authority of the provincial government in matters of public works, public health and agriculture.

The following year, based in part on its successful experiences in the mid-60s under Operation SPREAD, which was a project to involve provincial governments in local efforts to implement a national rice production program, the Mission initiated the current Provincial Development Project.

Under this project major functional areas such as agriculture, finance, and infrastructure construction were identified, in which development efforts were required to effect positive change at the provincial level.

Utilizing the experience of the past four years, the PDP has now been redesigned to serve a two-fold purpose: to function as the USAID coordinating activity for systematically supporting integrated rural development at the provincial level, and to provide direct technical assistance in designated provinces in priority development areas. In the new approach particular attention has been directed toward institutionalizing at the provincial level those specific sectoral programs designed to achieve measurable improvement in the level of life of the rural populace within 24 selected provinces by relying essentially on provincial development plans and action programs in the sectors of agricultural production and marketing, fiscal management, targeted nutrition, family planning, infrastructure construction, rural electrification and rural industry. Excess property equipment previously provided to the provinces under the terminated Equipment Pool Improvement Project No. 492-11-995-166 will now be provided under this project through PDAP.

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This effort will utilize the services of USAID Provincial Representatives and PDAP technical personnel supported by participant training, commodities and the training resources of the GOP, the University of the Philippines, and the participating provincial governments.

II. Purpose and Outline

The purpose of this project is to obtain maximum development impact through (1) the coordination of all GOP national agency resources, with those of the provinces and the USAID, in a complementary development effort at the provincial level and (2) overall improvement in the provincial planning, financing, and implementing of development projects designed to meet priority needs.

During FY73, assistance efforts will be concentrated in 13 provinces, of which seven are continuing and six will be added in FY73. Specific outputs (targets) for these provinces have been established as follows:

- A. Maximum coordination of GOP national agency, provincial and USAID-sponsored programs.
- B. The assignment of provincial technicians and GOP liaison officers, trained in development techniques, systems, motivation and basic management.
- C. The establishment in the Office of the Governor of a full-time, trained, and equipped development staff capable of planning, organizing, monitoring and evaluating development projects at the provincial level.
- D. Preparation of multi-year development plans covering fiscal management, agriculture, infrastructure construction and capital improvements, family planning, targeted nutrition, and, as applicable, rural industry and rural electrification.
- E. Establishment of a functional Provincial Equipment Pool that includes identified equipment requirements to support

the infrastructure development program, an effective spare parts supply system, efficient maintenance and repair system, rapid identification and disposal procedures for uneconomic equipment and adequate provincial peso deposits with the NEC to ensure effective acquisition of materials under the 607 (offshore procurement) and 608 programs. As a condition for participation in the equipment pool activity each province will be required to execute an agreement with PDAP in the form of the memorandum of agreement which is attached to and considered an integral part of this agreement (See Attachment A).

- F. The preparation of quarterly progress reports and annual evaluation reports analyzing the problems and successes of the respective provincial development programs.
- G. Publication of development handbooks and training manuals.

III. Designation and Implementation Responsibilities

A. Designations

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5. Other GOP Entities

The National Economic Council will provide accounting and other fiscal support functions for PDAP. The National Food and Agriculture Council, the Bureau of Lands, the Fisheries Commission, the Department of Health, the NEA, the NACIDA, and the Bureau of Agricultural Economics execute programs which directly support the operations of this project, thus the active cooperation of these agencies will therefore be required.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING  
CONSTRUCTION SURVEILLANCE OF USAID (PHILIPPINES)-SPONSORED SCHOOLS  
VARIOUS LOCATIONS, SOUTHERN LUZON

1. This memorandum of understanding is entered into between the U.S. Agency for International Development (Philippines) and the Officer in Charge of Construction, Naval Facilities Engineering Command Contracts, Southwest Pacific (OICC). The purpose of this memorandum is to define the responsibilities of each of the above agencies in connection with surveillance of USAID-sponsored construction of schools in Southern Luzon, as provided under the RP-U.S. Bayanihan School Reconstruction Program. Said Program is to be executed under an Agreement between the Government of the Philippines (GOP) and the Government of the United States, which dictates that such reconstruction is to be conducted as a Self-Help Program, with its associated tangible and intangible Civic Action benefits, in an effort to maximize the number of schools constructed thereunder within the available funding. Both parties to this agreement hereby understand that the typhoon destruction occurred in widely separated, often remote, geographical locations, some of which are relatively inaccessible to motorized land or water travel. Both USAID and OICC further agree that construction under such conditions by unskilled labor cannot be expected to be of equal quality to that of skilled craftsmen under continuous U.S. Government inspection. In recognition of the foregoing and that funding restraints preclude continuous inspection, both parties agree to strive to ensure the highest quality construction feasible and consistent with the modus operandus adopted under this Program for the people of the Republic of the Philippines.
2. USAID (Philippines) will:
  - a. Provide the funds required for review of design and for printing of drawings and type specifications required for construction of modular schools, and for construction surveillance, testing of materials and related overhead charges.
  - b. Designate in writing the OICC as USAID Engineering Consultant and Construction Surveillance Agency for this project.
  - c. Furnish to the OICC sets of drawings prepared by the GOP Bureau of Public Works (BPW) sufficient for review purposes.
  - d. Provide to the OICC a map or maps indicating all construction sites, accompanied by a listing of all sites, such as approved by the Government of the Philippines and USAID for the U.S. Government.
  - e. Provide to the OICC the phased program for construction at the various sites listed above.

- f. Advise all agencies involved in the construction of the schools that the OICC will serve as the construction surveillance agency for this project on behalf of the USAID with the field inspectors being titled as USAID Field Inspectors. Further, USAID will enlist the necessary cooperation of all said construction agencies, and particularly the foremen and/or supervisors and other jobsite personnel, to carry out all necessary surveillance and testing.
3. The OICC will:
- a. Review BFW standard drawings and provide comments on adequacy of proposed construction. In addition, type specifications will be suggested where appropriate to supplement construction details shown.
  - b. Provide detailed estimate for material costs for a typical 3-classroom school.
  - c. Provide the estimated costs for the above services and for inspection and testing, as described below. Actual work will be performed upon receipt of appropriate funding documents.
  - d. Provide construction surveillance services at the various approved construction sites reflected in item 2d. In general terms, surveillance will include:
    - (1) Intermittent site observation of construction to determine compliance with plans and specifications, and quality of craftsmanship.
    - (2) Qualitative examination of the work.
    - (3) Checking the results of laboratory tests and analyses of materials in instances where inferior construction or materials have been discovered or suspected.
    - (4) Detection, recognition and assistance in resolution of obstructions to satisfactory progress of construction.
    - (5) Timely reporting of information concerning progress and status of construction.
    - (6) The inspector will make every attempt to insure that construction is in accordance with plans and specifications, but in the event the construction group will not comply with the inspector's directives or recommendations, this fact will be reported to USAID for final enforcement or resolution.

Such surveillance services shall be performed with the objective of producing the best quality construction possible, consistent with utilization of locally available material and unskilled, volunteer labor.

To maximize quality of construction under this program, within available funds, material testing will be conducted, including field testing of design mixes for concrete; strength of concrete in place by breaking sample concrete cylinders for compressive strength and spot-checking by a concrete test hammer; compressive strength of concrete masonry units; and laboratory testing of random samples of reinforcing steel, but will not include testing of lumber (all types and grades), nor load tests of trusses and miscellaneous metals. Inspectors will be assigned to general areas to maximize surveillance at all sites under construction, and their efforts will be directed and reviewed by the Supervisory Construction Representative assigned to the Program. Reports of such surveillance will be prepared on standard Inspectors Daily Reports, as modified to meet USAID Reporting Requirements; and results of testing will be prepared on standard test forms used by the OICCSWP contract testing service. The original of all surveillance and testing reports will be forwarded weekly to OICC for transmission to USAID within three working days after receipt; in addition, significant deviations encountered will be reported immediately by telegram or other rapid means of communication to OICC, who will notify USAID within one work day of problems associated therewith.

4. Attempts by any personnel to coerce information, to influence the results of such surveillance or testing, or interference with assigned responsibilities of USAID Field Inspectors will be reported immediately to OICC, who will inform USAID within one workday. All such actions shall be immediately investigated by a joint committee composed of representatives of the Philippine Government, USAID and the OICC. In every such case, no further inspection or testing shall be accomplished by the USAID Field Inspectors at the site or sites where such actions are alleged to have occurred, pending appropriate investigation and/or action by the aforesaid committee and specific OICC authorization to the Inspectors to resume inspection and testing.
5. In the event additional services not envisioned in this memorandum are desired from OICC, USAID, after consultation with OICC, will issue the necessary change orders to formally authorize any additional services and specify the approximate additional cost involved.

Block 19 A - Objective

One of the major goals of the Provincial Development project is to assist the participating provinces in improving local revenue resources to assure the continuation of developmental activities after the termination of external assistance.

The local revenue source having the highest potential yield is the Real Property Tax. The major deterring factor to the realization of a much higher yield from the Real Property Tax is its cumbersome administration. System modernization requires the introduction of a "mass appraisal" element for improvements (i.e., rural residences and other structures) to replace the current method which is virtually non-existent in some provinces (often land is the only item assessed with improvement being omitted), while in other provinces the system is complex and painstakingly slow.

The Real Property Tax Administration System being designed with the support of this project, for purposes of discussion can be separated into four distinct steps: (1) tax mapping; (2) identification, classification and assessment of property; (3) preparation of tax rolls; and (4) the collection of taxes. The appraisal of improvements (buildings, etc.) is precedent to the assessment of property in step (2) above.

Presently, EDAF/USAID-financed technicians are designing an EDP system to further modernize the preparation of assessment rolls, tax rolls and tax bills; thereby, substantially reducing administrative time and cost.

The computerized application of "mass appraisal" formula is the final integral part of the whole EDP system.

Block 19 B - Description

Specifically, the contractor will visit the two Provinces of Leyte and Palawan and work in the pilot Municipalities of Dulag and Aborlan respectively. He will familiarize himself with current appraisal practices and the level of appraisal technician capability. From the information so gathered, he will write a manual suitable for

The manual will target those buildings (approx. 90%) that are common place throughout the countryside generally of the marginal to medium value class. First class and multi-storyed buildings will continue to be appraised on a special basis. The manual will be written to the comprehension level of practicing technicians in the field and will be subject to review and acceptance by the AD/PD.

The contractor will then confer with appropriate PDAP, University of the Philippines Local Government Center and USAID officials and technicians in concert to prepare the curriculum for the training course. The contractor will be responsible to train the instructors and monitor a pilot training program composed of Leyte, Palawan and participating PDAP province officials and appraisal technicians. The reference source document will be the "mass appraisal" method manual developed in the preceding paragraph.

The contractor will then confer with programmers of the University of the Philippines Computer Center (under contract with PDAP for this purpose) to computerize weighted "mass appraisal" formulae for the integration of this step with the system presently under design by PDAP/USAID-financed technicians.

The contractor will then prepare a manual (supplement number 1) to the Real Property Tax Administration Manual (draft) 1973) encompassing all elements of the RDP system finally designed. These elements are: (1) the assessment roll, including "mass appraisal" method; (2) the tax rolls; and (3) the tax bills.

One of the major goals of the Provincial Development Project is to assist the participating provinces in improving local revenue resources to assure the continuation of developmental activities after the termination of external assistance.

The local revenue source having the highest potential yield is the Real Property Tax. A Real Property Tax Administration System is being prepared by this project which, for purposes of discussion, can be separated into four distinct steps: (1) Tax mapping; (2) identification, classification and assessment of property; (3) preparation of annual tax rolls and tax bills; and (4) the collection of taxes. The preparation of annual tax rolls are non-existent in the system currently being employed in the Philippines. Presently, Real Property Taxpayers in the Philippines do not receive direct notice of tax amounts due and payable. Such notice is left to the chance that taxpayers will visit the Town Hall and read the General Announcement posted there. Beside serving the need for a direct notice to taxpayers and building an awareness in them of their obligations to local government, the tax bill and supporting tax roll are necessary permanent official documents expedite tax collection and funds accountability. The tax rolls present an immediate check for an individual and total tax collectables, while the bills serve as official receipts and posting documents. The introduction of these two elements in the system are a prerequisite to the successful management of the tax collection process.

Experience shows that tax rolls and bills prepared through automation greatly reduce the cost of administration. The system design for the electronic data processing of tax rolls and bills are, therefore, provided for in this PIO/T.

The Contractor will work exclusively in the pilot Municipality of Aborlan, Palawan Province. The Contractor will: (1) design all necessary forms for the system; (2) prepare a manual describing the system and source use; (3) program the system for RDP equipment located at the University of the Philippines Computer Center. The Contractor will coordinate with PDAP in arranging for the print-out of tax rolls and bills for Tax Year (CY) 1974 for the pilot municipality of Aborlan. Tax rolls and bills will indicate delinquent and current taxes collectable as well as the usual pertinent information.

Specifically, the Contractor will confer with the representative of the Department of Finance and local officials (the Provincial Treasurer and the Municipal Treasurer of Aborlan). He will design a system and write a manual of procedure for using the property index records as a data source for the annual preparation of a tax roll and individual tax bills on computer runs. The manual of procedure, among other pertinent information, shall contain an explanation of the procedures for transmitting property records revision (system maintenance) to the Computer Service Center for incorporation in the annual tax roll and bill print-out. The system must also provide for delinquent tax collectables appearing on current tax bills.

As part of the same manual of procedure, the contractor will cover the tax collection process. He will write a carefully detailed explanation for implementing Section 28 of Commonwealth Act 470 (Assessment Law) including a listing of the accounting entries to be made. Particular attention must be given to the design of supporting ledgers, (receipts) bills, and other related portions of the records and reporting system.

Because legislative changes are at best long-range and uncertain all procedures and systems developed by the contractor must be operable under existing laws of the Philippines. The contractor may identify any deficiencies as part of his final report and indicate the legislative amendments required to correct such deficiencies.

C. Comments

The services under this PIO/T would be in direct support of planned and on-going activities of the provincial governments of Leyte and Palawan.

Leyte has initiated a P180,000 program in Dulag which has the official approval of NEC. However, they are concentrating on steps 1, 2 and 4 as identified in Block 19 B above. The contractor would provide the much needed assistance for Step 3.

Palawan is presently finalizing a 4 year province-wide tax assessment and collection improvement program which will cost approximately 1 million pesos. Program will include acquisition of aerial photograph for virtually the entire province. A tax reassessment program has been completed in the municipality of Brooke's Point. Another is now in process in Roxas. The province's performance in assessment work has been excellent but they have been unable to cope with the "weak link" problem identified in Block 19 A above. The contractor would provide the technical assistance required to resolve this problem.

Under Philippine laws, the only significant source of locally generated revenues available to the provincial governments is the Real Property Tax. One of the major reasons this tax has never been fully exploited, is the "weak link" in the system between the establishment of assessment rolls and the preparation of tax rolls for collection purposes. The former is the responsibility of the Assessor and the latter is under the Office of the Treasurer. The services requested in this PIO/T are intended to develop procedures for preparation of annual tax rolls and the necessary reporting and records systems to manage the tax collection program.

Section 28 of Commonwealth Act 470 is very similar to provisions of the New York State Real Property Tax Laws. Particular care must be given to design of supporting ledgers, receipts and other related portions of the record and reporting system.

The work in Dalg will be similar to the Aborlan program except that in place of an annual tax roll, the municipality will maintain a permanent tax registry. A manual of procedure will be prepared by the contractor after he has designed the overall system that complies with current Philippine laws. The manual system must be designed so that it can be readily adapted to the EDP System developed for the municipality of Aborlan. In the manual of operation, the contractor must carefully cover the procedures required to keep the tax registry current. He must design a control procedure to reconcile the tax registry with the property index cards (or the assessment roll). As in the case of Aborlan the manual of procedure must also include the collection process. Although procedures for handling current and delinquent taxes will probably differ from the system installed in Aborlan because of the absence in this case of EDP, it is anticipated that the implementation of Article of Commonwealth Act 470 will be exactly the same under both systems.

All procedures and systems developed by the contractor must be operable under existing laws of the Philippines, even if this results in "weak spots" in the system. The contractor must identify such "weak spots" as part of his final report, indicate the legislative changes that must be adopted in order to overcome such deficiencies. Attached is a tentative work plan.

The contractor will be required to spend at least half of his visit in the field (Leyte and Palawan). He must be prepared to accept modest lodging accommodations (coldwater showers, non-air-conditioned rooms, etc.) during this portion of his stay in the Philippines. Working space will be provided by the respective provincial governments. It will be adequate but not air-conditioned. Living and working conditions in Manila will be comparable to U.S. standards.

In accordance with the Project Agreement of April 13, 1971, Provincial Development (Sub-Project B: School Reconstruction), an amount of pesos not exceeding the equivalent of \$20,000.00 is hereby made available to the Weather Bureau to be utilized for constructing a building under the following procedures:

1. The Weather Bureau shall submit the plans and specifications to the National Economic Council for review and processing. In case the estimated cost of the construction shall exceed the equivalent amount of \$20,000.00, the excess amount shall be provided by the Weather Bureau out of its own appropriations.
2. If plans and specifications are found in order NEC submits them to the USAID for concurrence.
3. Upon concurrent approval by USAID of the Plans and Specifications, the equivalent amount of \$20,000.00, or the agreed cost of the building, whichever is lower, shall be released to NEC for deposit into a Special Account established for the purpose.
4. The NEC shall issue a certification as to availability of funds, which will be used by the Weather Bureau in the bidding for the construction of the building. Representatives of both NEC and USAID shall be allowed to sit as observers during the bidding and award process.
5. Formal notice of award to the winning contractor shall be submitted by the Weather Bureau to NEC and USAID.
6. Based on the amount released by USAID to NEC to finance the construction of the building and deposited in the established Special Account, releases to the Weather Bureau shall be made by NEC in

accordance with the following schedule:

- a. Initial release shall be not more than 30 per cent of the amount deposited in the established Special Account.
- b. Subsequent releases up to 60 per cent of the original amount deposited in the Special Account will be made when needed.
- c. Final release which is equivalent to the remaining 10 per cent of the original amount deposited in the Special Account shall be made upon formal acceptance of the completed building by the Weather Bureau and duly certified as completed by the Bureau of Public Works.

With the exception of the initial release, all requests for release of funds by the Weather Bureau shall be accompanied with a certification issued by the Bureau of Public Works covering the percentage of work finished on the building.

Withdrawals shall be made by checks signed by the Director, Weather Bureau, or his designee, and countersigned by an authorized official other than the Project Accountant.

Monthly progress report accompanied by a Statement of Status of Funds showing funds received and disbursed will be submitted by the Weather Bureau to the NEC and USAID not later than the 10th day of the month following. 9. Any funds remaining after the completion of the building shall be returned to the NEC.

10. The Weather Bureau shall be responsible for the bidding, award of bid, faithful compliance by the contractor of the terms and conditions of the award, collection of the tax liability of the contractor and final acceptance of the building when completed.
