Mission believes GOP support of Internal Security Program warrants continuation of USAID assistance.

The major objective of USAID assistance is to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of civil police in carrying out their mission - the maintenance of law and order.

The progress of development in the Philippines has not been smooth. Subversion and violence do exist. The Government of the Philippines has given national support to the task of law enforcement and the Administration of Justice, particularly by supporting the Police Commission in the implementation of national police improvement programs.

The government has supported the national police training program. Regional training centers have been programmed for eight locations. Facilities have been built at Cagayan de Oro, Cebu, Tacloban and Fort Bonifacio. Academies are under construction at Bacolod City and Legaspi. The Davao and Baguio centers are being programmed for completion this fiscal year, all financed by GOP.

Approximately two million pesos were appropriated for the initial program. GOP has provided supplies and equipment, construction costs and funds for operation.

Eight academies are operational (some in loaned facilities) throughout the country. GOP funds are provided for instructor and support staff.

DISTRIBUTION  
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The majority of police personnel previously have received little or no training. The Basic Police Science Course (3 mos.) is being presented in each academy. Full program implementation will provide this type training for all police personnel of patrolman rank. Many other highly specialized courses are programmed for presentation at an early date.

The government has provided direct support to the Police Commission for special projects to improve the civilian police departments. Standards and procedures have been developed for police operations. Procedure manuals have been furnished to the nation's police departments. Limited equipment has been provided for personnel successfully completing investigative courses.

Lack of adequate communications continues to be a major operational deficiency. The provincial and local governments have supported the communications programs in their respective areas. Funds were provided for the employment of technicians to maintain the communication systems. Support hardware was provided for each project. Funds were also provided for the training of all technical and operational support personnel. USAID assisted in the development of the first completely integrated provincial law enforcement communications system in the country. This capability enabled the GOP to respond effectively to a recent HUK threat in the Visayan area.

The GOP has also made available records and data processing equipment (reparations equipment) for law enforcement needs. The government has supported the program to standardize police records and to provide a national data bank for crime information. A program goal is to increase reporting from the field operational level to support national systems.

The Department of Justice is reviewing the performance of all courts and has developed a system whereby case status will be continually monitored. Case backlog remains a problem; however, additional courts have been created.

The GOP continues to utilize the Peace and Order Coordinating Council to facilitate program implementation of all law enforcement efforts. GOP performance during the past year is indicative of increasing Presidential concern for the crime situation.

In view of the current crime situation and the insurgency problem in the Philippines the Mission recommends continued support for law enforcement agencies of the Philippines through the Internal Security Program during FY 70.

The Mission is proposing a USAID commodity support program of \$540,000 for Training, Police Improvement, Communications and Records project. In order to implement the Internal Security program as scheduled it is recommended that the \$125,000 commodity restriction be removed as soon as possible.

Commodity Funding as follows:

Police Improvement - \$190,000

Cebu, Tacloban, Legaspi and Baguio - (Will include in-depth survey and technician support at Hqs. and field operational level in all phases of police functions).

Regional Training Centers - \$100,000

Davao, Cagayan de Oro, Cebu, Bacolod City, Tacloban, Legaspi, Fort Bonifacio and Baguio.

Communications - \$175,000

Municipal Systems at Cebu, Legaspi, Tacloban and Baguio. Four provincial systems in high crime and dissident problem areas - emphasis Central Luzon.

Records - \$75,000

Develop records capability all local departments, develop nationwide criminal identification system, develop nationwide computer-based crime statistics reporting system.

Additional details outlined in PROP, PIP and PAR. Specific commodities involved were detailed in attachment to letter from Wagner to Hall dated August 21, 1969.

**I. Background**

This project began in FY 1969 with the objective of assisting Government of the Philippines professionalize police services, thereby changing the police image, attitude and capability to result in a more professional approach to the crime problem.

A professional law enforcement capability is defined in terms of police attitudes and capacity and should be reflected in better performance of assigned tasks. In the attitude aspect, professionalization is defined as a commitment to enforce existing laws with reasonable equality, a desire to serve the community by apprehending offenders and respecting the rights of the citizen. The term capacity implies the training and equipping of police officers thus improving their technique to deal more effectively with the problem of crime.

The purpose of this project agreement is to specify goals and objectives for FY 1972 and provide an allocation of monies in support of the project for this year.

The elements of this program include: (1) Police training; (2) Establishment of Police Communication Systems; (3) Development of Police Records Management Systems; (4) Instituting modern operational procedures in specified police departments (Police Improvement).

**II. Responsibilities and Targets**

**A. Police Training**

Under this program, 4,000 policemen will receive training directed at the following levels: (1) Police Recruit; (2) Police Supervisor; (3) Police Administrator and selected specialized courses.

To accomplish this, USAID will continue to provide technical assistance to the Police Commission Training Department. For its part, the Police Commission during FY 1972 will establish one new academy in the Mindanao area (to be determined soon) and will continue training in the existing

police academies (Baguio, Fort Bonifacio, Rizal, Legaspi, Tacloban, Cebu, Bacolod, Cagayan de Oro and Zamboanga).

The Police Commission agrees to provide sufficient funds for operational costs of these academies and for construction of another academy in the Mindanao area. The Police Commission further agrees to provide for each academy before the end of FY 1972, a Police Commission teaching staff which will include at a minimum, one Chief Training Officer and at least three permanent instructors. Additional personnel shall also be provided by the Police Commission for administrative and custodial purposes.

USAID will provide sufficient training aids to enable the new training academy to become operational as well as complementary commodities for academies already established and supported under previous agreements.

During FY 1972 criteria will be established by the Police Commission to evaluate the effectiveness of the graduates. USAID/NEC/PolCom shall mutually select participants for overseas training. (See Item III c.). The Chief Training Officer PolCom and Regional Public Safety Advisors shall assist by identifying outstanding police officers in their respective area of assignment.

**B. Communications**

Project activities include establishment of provincial law enforcement communications systems linking all municipalities within a province. Adjacent provincial capitals are then linked together forming an inter-provincial communication system.

USAID/NEC/PolCom agree to select in FY 1972 at least 15 additional provinces for consideration in the Police Radio System. Once an entity has been designated to receive a Police Radio System, the standard sub-project agreement shall be entered into between that entity and the Commission and approved by the USAID Public Safety Division.

**C. Police Records**

USAID Public Safety Advisors will continue assisting the Police Commission in the Police Selection Program, the development of a single, nationwide computer-based, criminal statistics program and the improvement of the internal management information systems of the Police Commission.

The Police Commission agrees to provide sufficient staff and funds for the preparation and processing of at least two written examinations during FY 1972 to test all ranks within the police service. The Police Commission also agrees to provide sufficient funds and staff for the continuance and expansion of the nationwide criminal statistics program, the implementation of the microfilming program and the internal management systems.

During FY 1972, USAID/NEC/PolCom will establish specific targets on levels of completeness expected by the end of FY 1973.

**D. Police Improvement**

Based on PolCom/USAID surveys of particular police organizations, phased, multi-year assistance is provided for introducing improved police concepts and practices in an effort to raise professional law enforcement capacity. In FY 1972 USAID will provide third year technical and commodity assistance to Marikina, Legaspi, Bacolod, Cebu, Tacloban and Cagayan de Oro cities; second year technical and commodity assistance to Zamboanga and Baguio cities; and original, first year assistance to the City/Municipality where the new academy in the Mindanao area will be located. U.S. assistance to Davao is dependent on a USAID Public Safety/PolCom survey designed to recommend changes for making the local police department more effective. Subsequent USAID commodity and advisory assistance will be provided upon receipt of a PolCom/Davao signed agreement to a plan of action as developed in the survey.




