

ACTION MEMORANDUM FOR THE ADMINISTRATOR

SUBJECT: Population Policy Initiatives (PPI) Project, 936-3035

Action: Your approval is requested to authorize S&T Bureau funding in the amount of \$29,703,000 for the first five years of the Population Policy Initiatives (PPI) Project, 936-3035.

Discussion: In the last two decades, many developing countries have made major improvements in their population policies. Between 1974 - 1984, forty developing countries issued explicit population statements either through their constitutions or through their development plans. A.I.D. has assisted LDC officials in the development of population policies and programs consistent with their own development goals. In this effort A.I.D. does not advocate specific population policies but contributes to the policy dialogue by assisting LDC leaders to obtain information needed to examine the effects of demographic change on their development objectives.

The Population Policy Initiatives project responds to an increasing demand to provide assistance to LDC policymakers in developing policies and programs consistent with their own development goals. Over the next five years, the project will address the key elements of the policy development process including: basic research; timely presentation of research findings to facilitate their use by decisionmakers; on-going review of policies and procedures (both public and private sector) that affect population and family planning programs; and formulation of improved policies and programs.

This is an umbrella project designed to meet changing needs in policy development. The project has four major components:

1. Private Sector Policy Initiatives is a new policy initiative to explore opportunities and constraints in the delivery of family planning services by the private sector. This project component will encourage private sector health managers and public officials who regulate programs to incorporate family planning into private health care systems. Analysis of the cost and returns on investment of adding family planning to existing programs will be a major activity.

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2. The Dissemination Program is another new initiative designed to improve the use of population information by LDC policymakers. Over the past 15 years, the quality and amount of policy-relevant research has increased significantly. To make the research findings available to LDC decisionmakers in a timely and useful manner, new approaches to their presentation and distribution will be developed drawing on the experiences and techniques of the communications and marketing industries.
3. The Policy Research Program will continue support for population research, but will emphasize the needs of LDC decisionmakers. Applied research projects will be designed to increase the near-term usefulness of findings particularly as they help to inform decisionmakers about resource allocation. Some support will be given to program research to address policy issues important to guiding donor assistance. The level of support for policy research will be consistent with current research activities carried out under agreements with the Population Council (International Research Awards Program on the Determinants of Fertility) and the National Academy of Sciences. An average of \$1.5 million has been obligated for these activities over the past five years.
4. Technical Support for Policy Development builds on the successful experience with the Development Law and Policy Program (Columbia University) in strengthening institutions, particularly public sector agencies such as population commissions, which develop and implement population policies. This project component will support short-term technical assistance, long-term assistance through resident advisors, seminars, and observational travel for LDC policymakers.

The Population Policy Initiatives project has an estimated cost of \$29,703,000 for the period FY 85-89 reflecting the increased demand from LDC policymakers for policy development assistance. In FY 85, obligations are planned for the private sector policy initiatives and subject to the availability of funds, the dissemination program. The other two components will begin in FY 86. Missions and regional bureaus will be encouraged to provide supplemental funds to support country activities through regional and bilateral funds. It is planned that about 25 percent of funds for the project will be contributed from these sources.

The Project Paper was prepared in consultation with regional bureau staff and in response to field needs. A memorandum was sent to USAID missions in July 1984 requesting comment on an outline of the major components of the project. More recently a cable describing the project in greater detail was sent to USAID missions soliciting further comment. Response cables show very strong interest in the project. Of 26 responses, 24 indicate a need for one or more of the proposed project components. The Population Sector Council reviewed the project on February 14, 1985 and recommended it for approval. Minutes of that meeting are attached. Comments from the regional bureaus, S&T, and PPC have been solicited and incorporated in the project paper.

While a ten-year Project Paper has been reviewed and endorsed, we are only requesting authorization for the first five years at this time. The five-year authorization (a) reflects no commitment on your part to go beyond five years and (b) will encompass activities which can be accomplished in five years.

Justification to Congress: An Advice of Program Change has been drafted and is in process.

Recommendation: That you sign the attached Project Authorization.
