

I. INTRODUCTION

The Post Peace Assistance Scholarship Program, a human resources development program, was established by the Agency for International Development (AID) in 1979 as a result of the post peace discussions between the governments of Egypt and the United States. Under this program approximately 1500 Egyptian graduate students and professionals will pursue degree and non-degree research programs at American institutions of higher learning. The fields of study are to be related to the developmental needs of Egypt and the fellows are to be drawn from Egyptian universities, the public sector, and the private sector.

The subject of this evaluation report is the first phase of the program. It is being implemented by America-Mideast Educational And Training Services (AMIDEAST) under a contract signed in June 1979 between AID and AMIDEAST. This contract called for the placement and supervision of approximately 100 Peace Fellows, beginning in the Fall 1979.

This evaluation report is the fifth submitted to AID by AMIDEAST. The previous evaluation reports were submitted on September 30, 1979, March 31, 1980, September 30, 1980, and March 31, 1981.

In accordance with the above mentioned contract, AMIDEAST takes pleasure in presenting its fifth evaluation report, covering the period March 31, 1981 - September 30, 1981.

The figures given above, and those given in the statistical section of this report (IV. Statistics) represent the state of the program on September 30, 1981.

II. PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

Counseling, monitoring of academic programs, liason with U.S. university advisors, financial administration and reporting have been the major day-to-day activities carried out by AMIDEAST during this reporting period.

Among the important aspects of AMIDEAST's administration of Phase One of the Post Peace Assistance Scholarship Program were the visits made by the AMIDEAST staff members to the campuses where Peace Fellows carry out their academic and research programs. The purpose of the campus visit is to provide an opportunity to review project goals and specific academic objectives with the Peace Fellows and their academic advisors. Interviews are also held with deans and with foreign student advisors. University facilities and programs are observed first-hand and, in many cases, personal visits are made to the homes of the Peace Fellows. Reports on each of these visits are prepared and transmitted to AID/Cairo and AID/Washington. These reports describe in detail the academic and social setting of the institution, the courses and research undertaken by the Peace Fellows, comments and evaluations by the academic advisors, and particular concerns and problems of Peace Fellows, along with their ideas and suggestions. These visits continue to be of great value to all concerned and they serve to reinforce motivation and identification with PPASP goals.

Another important aspect of AMIDEAST's administration of the program is the debriefing session held at AMIDEAST headquarters in Washington, D.C. on the Peace Fellow's return journey to Egypt. During this session the Peace Fellow is asked to evaluate his entire academic and living experience in the United States, and a standardized questionnaire is completed. Suggestions and comments that future Peace Fellows might find helpful are

requested.

Formal project reporting on participants and their progress has been a significant activity during this period. AID Form 1380-9 has been prepared and transmitted to AID/Washington and AID/Cairo on a monthly basis. AID Academic Enrollment and Term Report Forms 1380-69 have been obtained from Peace Fellows and their academic advisors and forwarded to AID/Cairo and Washington as the Summer 1981 semester was completed and specific coursework in the current term was confirmed. Completion of Program Reports covering all those who completed their program during this period are being submitted to AID/Cairo and Washington.

In late March and early April 1981 three Peace Fellows participated in the "Egypt Today" program, sponsored by the Smithsonian Institution. The purpose of the program was to promote greater American awareness of several aspects of modern Egyptian life: social, political, economic, educational, and commercial. The Peace Fellows participated in that aspect of the program designed to provide a forum for an exchange of ideas between American and Egyptian university students. Within a ten day period, Fellows Aly Koura, Hoda Fahim, and Sami Shaker visited campuses in Washington, D.C., Houston, Texas, and Los Angeles, California. Through panel discussions they painted a more detailed picture of Egypt's needs, wants, and potential.

Mr. Koura focused his remarks on the educational renaissance underway in Egypt, concurrent with the decline in illiteracy and the reform and expansion of the university system.

Mr. Shaker discussed the return to traditional building materials and architectural forms as a means of relieving the acute housing shortage plaguing the country.

Mrs. Fahim addressed the increased availability and access to public health facilities.

These topics reflect the participants' areas of expertise and their fields of study in U.S. institutions.

Throughout the administration of the project, AMIDEAST has remained in close contact with AID officers in Cairo and Washington in carrying out the project guidelines with respect to funding for special equipment, allowances, research programs, field trips, internships, and professional meetings. Their recommendations and support in implementing the project within the terms of the contract have been invaluable.

To summarize, program activities continue to be devoted to the many and varied aspects of helping Peace Fellows gain the maximum benefit possible from their individual academic programs and from their stay in the United States so that upon their return to Egypt they will be able to make significant contributions to the development of their country.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS

The annual increase in maintenance allowances, the most recent of which became effective in September 1981, has been helpful in aiding most Peace Fellows in meeting some of the continually rising living costs. Semi-annual cost of living reviews are recommended, however, since many Peace Fellows continue to be confronted with basic expenses which exceed their allowances. The book allowance of thirty-five dollars per month remains insufficient for many master's degree candidates for whom the cost of required textbooks exceeds the allowance. We recommend that the book allowance be established so that, if the cost of the required texts exceeds the AID authorized allowance, reimbursement can be made directly to the Peace Fellow for the cost of verified required texts when receipts are presented.

The list of approved professional societies, as it appears in Handbook 10, should be reviewed and expanded to include all major fields. This would be helpful in eliminating the need to continually submit specific proposals for membership approvals.

The Egyptian Ministry of Higher Education regulation that a thesis be included in all master's degree programs continues to present problems for Peace Fellows who are in fields which typically do not include a thesis. AMIDEAST reaffirms its recommendation that the Missions Department and the Supreme Council of Universities consider modifying the regulation to allow for a comprehensive examination to substitute for the thesis when no thesis option is available.

As the Post Peace Assistance Scholarship Program-Phase I draws to a close, a number of fellows have requested permission to remain in the U.S. to complete research or degree programs. In some cases they have been offered

financial aid from their U.S. institutions. Some have indicated that they have the backing and approval of their Egyptian sponsors. All appear to be aware that extensions are being considered for students enrolled in the larger Peace Fellowship Program. However, unless USAID either extends their IAP-66 forms, or signs a release to another institution's IAP-66, all fellows remaining in the U.S. 30 days after the final date on their IAP-66 will be out of status. AMIDEAST recommends that AID determine as soon as possible whether fellows from Phase I will be allowed to continue their programs in the U.S. under Egyptian Mission sponsorship, as is being considered for fellows under the larger Peace Fellowship Program.

With regard to follow-up studies on PPASP-I, AMIDEAST would like to once again recommend that consideration be given to an evaluation program and follow-up activities. This could serve as a pilot project which, after appropriate modifications, could be used as a model applicable to the entire Peace Fellowship Program. AMIDEAST has submitted a separate proposal outlining the evaluation procedure and its implementation.

In addition, a number of Peace Fellows have indicated that they anticipate that it will be difficult to continue the research undertaken in the U.S. once they have returned to Egypt, since there has been little or no contact between their American and Egyptian advisors over the past two years. Furthermore, American and Egyptian facilities are not fully interchangeable. AMIDEAST believes that it would be very worthwhile to specifically study this question during the proposed Phase I follow-up activities, since the larger Peace Fellowship Program is considering modifications which would enlarge the "Joint Supervision" sector of the program.

As the statistics and reports which follow indicate, the Peace Fellows of Phase I have achieved outstanding records in the U.S. The combined

efforts of all concerned -the Peace Fellows themselves, the U.S. academic community, USAID, the Egyptian Ministry of Education, the Missions Department, and AMIDEAST- have contributed to the success of the program.





Early on in the program Mr. El-Abd registered for a Ph.D. degree and the courses he took were geared to the requirements of the doctoral program. Examples of these courses are: Hydrology, a graduate seminar in Soil Physics, Soil Mineralogy, Soil Chemistry, Fertilizer and Soil Fertility, as well as several directed independent research courses under the supervision of his academic advisor, Dr. Jury.

Ms. Abdallah is an assistant lecturer on the Faculty of Science at El Minia University. She has been enrolled in a Ph.D. program there. Her reason for wanting to come to the United States was so that she could do further research on her Ph.D. project, particularly in areas where neither equipment nor expertise was available in Egypt. Her Ph.D. project comprises a trial to correlate a certain test reaction. All of her preparations had to be investigated structurally by XRA (line broadening technique, IRA, TGA, DTA and electromicroscopy (SAED and TEM). These experiments required the use of a molecular spectroscopic laboratory which was made available to her at the University of Maryland.

Dr. Raj Khanna, Ms. Abdallah's academic advisor at the University, commented that she put forth a great deal of effort in her research and that with little guidance she made herself familiar with Infrared, Raman and ESCA instrumentation. She collected a large amount of spectroscopic data which she has been able to interpret. He feels she will be in a position to prepare an excellent dissertation.

Ms. Abdallah was called back to Egypt due to serious illness in her family. She returned on June 2, 1981. In her final evaluation of the Peace Fellowship Program, Ms. Abdallah stated that the knowledge and skills she has gained while studying at the University of Maryland will enable her to complete her Ph.D. and to make a greater contribution to the field of surface chemistry in Egypt.

This he was able to do within the time limits of his fellowship. According to his advisor, Mr. Fouly experienced initial difficulties in teaching, but made excellent progress after that. His request for the purchase of a tape recorder for use in pronunciation teaching was approved by AID and contributed to this progress.

P.F. Fouly attended two conferences directly related to his field of study. The first of these, the annual Illinois TESOL convention, was held from 20-22 March 1980, at which Mr. Fouly was able to learn from a variety of talks related to different aspects of teaching English to non-native speakers. He then attended the NAFSA Conference in St. Louis from 20-24 May 1980, which offered many sessions dealing with ESL.

She was shuffled from one professor to another, each reluctant to direct her because they preferred to devote their attentions to someone working on a degree. Finally she lucked upon Dr. Ruth Alscher-Hermann, who proved to be an invaluable assistance in recommending the necessary courses that would provide Samia with the background that she would have to have for her research.

Samia returned to Egypt on August 23, 1981. Before she left, she expressed the hope that she would be allowed to return to the United States, at her own expense, to complete the work she originally intended to do in the U.S., but began too late to complete on time, due to the advisor problem and the necessity to improve her English in the early stages of her program. To her credit, Ms. Madkour made an excellent showing in the second year of her program, handsomely overcoming her initial setbacks.

He arrived after the University's registration took place, which caused some initial administrative problems, although it did not seem to negatively affect Mr. El-Noory's academic progress.

In addition to his course-work, Mr. El-Noory was able to attend three conferences. These consisted of the annual Illinois TESOL Conference from 20-22 March 1980, the NAFSA Conference in St. Louis from 20-24 May 1980, and the TESOL Conference in Detroit from 3-8 March 1981. All of these were valuable learning experiences for Mr. El-Noory, and added an important dimension to his studies here.

After completing his program, P.F. El-Noory returned on 23 August 1981 to Egypt, where he resumed his position in the Faculty of Education at El-Manoufia University.

P.F. Ahmed Yousef arrived in the U.S. on 6 September 1979. He began at that time his non-degree Ph.D research program at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, enrolled in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences with a major in Food Science.

Mr. Yousef's special research was on Alfatoxin, a toxic and carcinogenic substance, and the problem of controlling its growth in dairy products. He has been working on a model to quantify the inhibitory effect of certain food additives on molds and on synthesis of alfatoxin, for which he received authorized project funds for expendable research items. P.F. Yousef's work at the University resulted in the publication of two papers, the first of which was "Growth and Biosynthesis of Alfatoxin by Aspergillus parasiticus in Cultures Containing Nisin," published in Zeitschrift für Lebensmitteluntersuchung und Forschung (Vol. 171, 1980). His article on "Growth and Synthesis of Alfatoxin by Aspergillus parasiticus in the Presence of Sorbic Acid," is planned for publication in October 1981, in the Journal of Food Protection.
