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Report to AID/WID for the Period August 1979 through July 1980

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I. Introduction: An Historical Perspective

The Secretariat for Women in Development of New Trans-Century Foundation has been collecting documents on women in development since 1977. Nearly 400 documents were collected at this time as part of the research for Development As If Women Mattered: An Annotated Bibliography with a Third World Focus. Two hundred eighty seven documents were annotated in this bibliography and all the documents were organized to form the core of the collection. This initial collection and classification was done to help provide relevant project information for U.S. based private voluntary organizations.

Then, in September 1978, a grant from the WID office of AID enabled the Secretariat to expand the Publication Retrieval System to include 900 documents. These have been used to support the work of consultants who are programming or designing projects to integrate women in development efforts and by researchers interested in knowing more of the status of women in developing countries. This grant also enabled the Secretariat to refine its classification system and to include these new documents in this system.

An effort has been made to collect unpublished documents written by Third World women. These documents are least likely to be found in libraries and research centers around the world, and are therefore most valuable to researchers and consultants. They are generally research studies, workshop papers, progress reports and project descriptions,

often obtainable only from the author. The Secretariat's international network of contacts facilitates identifying and collecting these documents, as well as obtaining the author's permission to disseminate them to interested consultants and researchers.

The Secretariat's Publication Retrieval System is unique in the area of Women in Development documentation, in that documents are not only collected but sent back out again to researchers and consultants in the field. If the author's permission has been granted to photo copy the document, it can be sent out as requests are received.

Since August 6, 1979, when a one year growth grant was awarded by the AID/WID office, the collection has increased again in size and expanded in usage, as well as achieved a step towards self-sufficiency. This report will discuss these areas in more detail.

II. GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

In January 1980, the Secretariat hired a full time librarian to assume the responsibility for the Publication Retrieval System. This opened the way to further refinements of the control and classification system and for professional contacts within the development documentation network.

Collection contents:

The Publication Retrieval System currently consists of 1500 documents, which represents almost doubling in size since the expansion grant was awarded in August 1979. These documents include anthropological and sociological research studies, workshop proceedings and papers, case studies and project descriptions, all mostly unpublished, along with the most relevant published texts, bibliographies and directories.

Published documents:

For instance, documents on the Yemen Arab Republic have been difficult to obtain, with the exception of a USAID report in September 1975 and a section in another AID report on traditional health care in the Near East in 1978. We have therefore had to obtain two books on women in Yemen: Changing Veils: Women and Modernization in North Yemen, by Carla Makhlouf (London: Croom Helm, 1979) and Women and Development in Yemen Arab Republic, by Cynthia Myntti (Eschborn: German Agency for Technical Cooperation, Ltd. (GTZ), 1979). These have been used to answer a diversity

of requests on women in Yemen.

We have also acquired published bibliographies, such as Women in the Development Process: A Select Bibliography on Women in Sub-Saharan Africa and Latin America, by Suzanne Smith Saulniers (Austin: Institute of Latin American Studies, 1977), which is a basic, useful reference guide for women in development collections.

Published directories are necessary to answer questions on women's organizations and projects throughout the world, as well as to keep informed of new projects. Examples of these would be the APCWD Women's Resource Book (Kuala Lumpur APCWD, 1979) and the upcoming ATRCW: Women's Resource Book (Addis Ababa: ECA, to be published).

Unpublished documents:

The unpublished documents are arriving, partly as a result of a large mailing sent out during 1979 and partly through new outreach. Many researchers and agencies continue to send us their documents as a matter of course. A large number of workshop papers and country reports were collected at the U.N. Mid-Decade Conference on Women and the accompanying Forum held in Copenhagen in July 1980.

Each time an unpublished document is entered into the retrieval system, the author's permission to disseminate is solicited from the author so that the document can be

distributed to other interested researchers and consultants.

Newsletters:

The Publication Retrieval System also receives 120 newsletters and journals in the development field, many of which relate specifically to women in development, such as "Mujer y Desarrollo" from the Dominican Republic, and most of which have articles and bibliographic listings touching on the subject of women in development, for example, "IDS Bulletin" from the Institute of Development Studies, Brighton, England. Our newsletters come from the United States, Europe and the Third World. Many address specialized topics, such as "Family Planning Perspectives" and others relate directly to certain regions, such as "Al-Raida."

We are constantly on the lookout for new titles of newsletters as they occur and we request to be placed on their mailing list. We also scan these newsletters as a source of new documents and for announcements of new research and up-coming workshops and conferences. A listing of newsletter and journal titles currently held is attached (Appendix 1).

Classification System:

The classification system has undergone only minor changes. The 12 subject areas arrived at during the early stages of the Publication Retrieval System have been retained. Since these grew out of the subjects of the

documents themselves, they have proven satisfactory.

The documents are still broken down within each subject division by the four main Third World regional subdivisions (Asia and the Pacific; Sub-Saharan Africa; Middle East and North Africa; and Latin America and the Caribbean) plus Multi-Regional when more than one region is included.

This system allows access to not only all documents on a subject, but also all documents in a certain region. We have received, for example, a request from the International Planned Parenthood Federation in London for a listing of our documents on women and the law for a wall chart they were planning to produce with the July 1980 issue of "People" magazine to coincide with the Copenhagen Conference. Since we have the subject division of women and law and politics, we were able to provide this information quickly. A second example would be the request of the Institute of Social and Economic Research of the University of the West Indies for a listing of all our documents on women in the Caribbean countries for their upcoming bibliography, which utilized our country index and regional subdivisions.

Key words:

To facilitate even more complete access to the document contents, however, the subject divisions have been refined through the increased use of key words. This enables us to keep current with new topics of research without altering our major subject areas. We have also found it useful to include the form of the document as a key word. Our working list of these key words follows:

This list reflects only our current needs and, as a dynamic and active list, it is frequently amended according to the emphasis of the documents we receive and to highlight the needs of our users.

Thesaurus:

As a result of contacts made at the Copenhagen

Conference, our Director of the Documentation Center was instrumental in forming an international steering committee to investigate the establishment of a WID thesaurus and classification system (WID/TCS). It is hoped to see this develop into some kind of workshop which would actually produce a first draft of a thesaurus for women in development, and perhaps examine different classification systems currently in use for women in development collections.

Donor Documentation Center:

In May 1980, the AID/WID office awarded a grant to the Secretariat to coordinate a donor document exchange with OECD-DAC donor countries during the Mid-Decade Conference for Women in Copenhagen, with long-term plans for a donor document collection. Documents produced by these countries are to be collected and annotated and the Secretariat will serve as a clearing house for document exchange. The donor documentation will follow the same system of classification by themes, regions, and key words that is already established by the Publication Retrieval System. The documents, when received, are being housed within the PRS and our Director of the Documentation Center is providing technical assistance.

Copying facilities:

In March 1980, TransCentury leased a Xerox 9400 copier and hired a full-time operator. Since, previously, all copying of documents to be sent out had to be performed by the person in charge of the PRS, or by interns, this new

procedure facilitates faster turn-over of document requests.

Interns:

The Secretariat has had an agreement with the American University to place interns for several semesters now. We have also received interns and requests to place interns from Georgetown University, and Denison University in Ohio. These are generally students in their last years of University study with an interest in international relations or development who appreciate the work of the Secretariat and quickly become involved. They work primarily with the Publication Retrieval System, but also help on other Secretariat projects as needed. Their work with the PRS involves classifying and describing documents, responding to document requests, keeping statistics, and assisting the Director of the PRS with special projects. They have all found this to be a valuable exposure to the field of women in development.

III. Usage and Users

The range of requests and users which the PRS receives is as varied as its documents. Requests come from both individual consultants and private researchers and from organizations within both the private and public sector. Although the majority of users are first world women and men, an effort has been made to reach an increasing number of Third World people.

The U.N. Conference in Copenhagen offered a unique opportunity to reach women from Third World countries, since the registered Forum attendance included 222 from Africa, 312 from Latin America, 132 from the Middle East, and 491 from Asia and the Pacific (Forum '80, July 24, 1980, p.1). This tally doesn't include official delegates to the U.N. Conference who also visited the Forum, and attendees who didn't register. Since the Secretariat's brochure and publications flyers were widely distributed, it is hoped that this exposure will bring it to the attention of more Third World women.

Statistics:

From February to July, 1980, the staff of the PRS responded to 94 letter and phone requests and assisted 83 researchers and consultants in person (nearly 1/4 of these in-person visits were Third World women). A breakdown of users and organizations from the PRS user log for the months of May and June, 1980, is attached as a sample

of the kind of usage the PRS receives (Appendix 2).

Title XII:

One new source of requests to the PRS has been as a result of the Title XII amendment. This requires that within the framework of the "New Directions" Foreign Assistance Acts of 1973 and 1978, AID revise its programs to make greater use of the resources available in U.S. Land and Sea Grant and other agricultural universities "to increase the production and distribution of food, and to increase institutional capability in research, education and extension in developing countries... in all levels of agriculture and rural development." (1979 Report to Congress). Title XII Strengthening Grants provide funds to participating universities to "strengthen their capabilities in teaching, research and extension work to enable them to implement programs authorized by Title XII." Title XII officers of several universities which have chosen to focus on strengthening their WID resources have contacted the Secretariat for Women in Development and our documentation center staff assisted them by producing a listing of all documents in the PRS on agriculture. The list was submitted to the University of Arizona, Tucson, for distribution through the Women and Food Communications Network.

Packets:

Special request packets like the one prepared for Title XII are another way the Publication Retrieval System is utilized. We have prepared a listing on women and communications and one on documents on women in the Caribbean

countries. Most recently we were able to assist in the compilation of a bibliography on women in India for the India Desk of AID.

In June we prepared a packet of our publications for a NAFSA conference in Wellesley. For the U.N. Conference in Copenhagen we prepared a special listing of 100 documents from our collection which related to the nine themes of the conference: peace, development, equality, health, education, employment, racism, refugees and family. A copy of this 8 page, briefly annotated list is attached. (Appendix 3). Copies of the documents themselves were taken to the Conference for display and the order sheet at the back of the document list was made available to those requesting copies.

More recently, in support of a woman-to-woman ICA funded project which allowed four American women from four different women's organizations to meet and share activities with four Moslem women from Morocco and Indonesia, the staff of the PRS prepared a large packet of relevant documents which were distributed to the participants.

IV. Self-Sufficiency

The Publication Retrieval System of the Secretariat for Women in Development has experienced increased usage in the past year, as well as increased exposure and a faster turnover of requests for documents. It is the goal of the Secretariat to reach self-sufficiency.

Pricing for documents:

In an effort to achieve this goal, the pricing schedule for document copies has been revised, utilizing a set scale for document prices by number of pages. A 15% fee is charged for postage and handling (40-80% for requests sent airmail). A copy of our order form is attached (Appx. 4). The new Xerox 9400 copier facilitates faster copying turn-over time and results in a lower cost per copy.

Resource List:

A major achievement has been the publication and distribution of Women in Development: A Resource List, (revised, 1980) presenting an author, title, date and page number listing of the first 1000 documents in the Publication Retrieval System. These include the 287 from May Rihani's bibliography, Development As If Women Mattered and other documents received since then. The Resource List is indexed both by country and by author. Just under 1000 flyers (attached as Appendix 5) were distributed in a mass mailing through the Secretariat's mailing list. The response in May, June and July alone has been 50 requests. Increased requests for documents and therefore increased income are

anticipated as a result of the wide distribution of the Resource List.

In Copenhagen, the order flyer for the Resource List was made available to Forum participants both on display tables and during workshops chaired or attended by Patricia McClure, the Director of our Documentation Center. This exposure should bring in even further requests for the Resource List and documents.

Outreach:

Using the Secretariat mailing list, several announcements publicizing the services of the Publication Retrieval System have been made. More of these mailings are anticipated.

The revision of the Secretariat for Women in Development brochure to coincide with the Copenhagen Conference provided increased publicity for the PRS. This brochure was distributed widely at the Conference and a copy is attached (Appendix 6).

Publicity notices in newsletters and journals also increase the exposure of the Secretariat PRS, which has received mention in several periodicals this year. Review copies of the Resource List have been sent out in hopes of mention in even more periodicals.

This outreach all serves to increase the awareness of the public of our services and will bring more requests, and therefore, increased income.

V. Summary

This report has focused on the growth and development of the Publication Retrieval System of the Secretariat for Women in Development, its increased usage, and its efforts to achieve self-sufficiency.

The need for a PRS on Women in Development is well substantiated by the number of people who have been using the system and by the positive responses we have received verifying the interest in a resource center of this kind. We regard the Publication Retrieval System as an on-going project that can be maintained with the continual collection of action-oriented documents. We also feel that by building on our network of U.S. and Third World contacts we can increase the size and usage of the system by further outreach work and publicity.

In sum, we feel the Publication Retrieval System has had and can continue to have an important role in the Women in Development field as a resource information center where researchers and consultants, practitioners and academicians can come whenever they need to know about the findings of the literature about women, their activities, status and role in different parts of the world.
