PROJECT AUTHORIZATION

Name of Country: PERU

Name of Project: FE Y ALEGRIA - Training

1. Pursuant to Section 106 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, I hereby authorize the Fe y Alegria Training for Employment and Community Development Grant Project for Peru involving planned obligations of not to exceed \$100,000 in grant funds over a one and a half year period from date of authorization subject to the availability of funds in accordance with the A.I.D. OYB/allotment process, to help in financing foreign exchange and local currency costs for the project. The planned life of the project is eighteen months from the date of initial obligation.

2. The project consists of continuing and expanding Fe y Alegria Training and Community Development activities in low income communities throughout Peru.

3. The Grant Agreement, which may be negotiated and executed by the officer to whom such authority is delegated in accordance with A.I.D. regulations and Delegations of Authority shall be subject to the following essential terms and covenants and major conditions, together with such other terms and conditions as A.I.D. may deem appropriate.

4. a. Source and Origin of Commodities, Nationality of Services

Commodities financed by A.I.D. under the project shall have their source and origin in Peru or in the United States, except as A.I.D. may otherwise agree in writing. Except for ocean shipping, the suppliers of commodities or services shall have Peru or the United States as their place of nationality, except as A.I.D. may otherwise agree in writing.

Ocean shipping financed by A.I.D. under the project shall, except as A.I.D. may otherwise agree in writing, be financed only on flag vessels of the United States.

b. Substantial Involvement by USAID/Peru

The parties agree that Fe y Alegria will submit each separate sub-activity to USAID/Peru for its review and approval. Each such request for approval will be accompanied by a description of the activity, the name of the community organization, the official representative of the community for the activity, a list of what the community will contribute for the activity and the monetary value thereof, and a proposed time table for completion of the activity. Those communities offering the greatest contributions will be given priority.

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

## JUSTIFICATION OF NONCOMPETITIVE AWARD TO FE Y ALEGRIA

### Issues

USAID proposes to make a noncompetitive award to Fe y Alegria by means of a Cooperative Agreement pursuant to Handbook 13, to continue to support Fe y Alegria Training for Employment and Community Development Activities.

### Background

The governing regulation, Handbook 13, Chapters 2B.1 and 2B3.d states:

#### Competition

1. Requirement for Competition. Competition is to be used to the maximum practical extent for the award of grants or cooperative agreements.
2. Exceptions. Competition is not required for:
  - b. Assistance awards for which the recipient is considered to have exclusive or predominant capability based on experience, specialized facilities or technical competence, or based on an existing relationship with cooperating country or beneficiaries;
  - d. Follow on assistance awards intended to continue or further develop an existing assistance relationship.

Chapter 2, B 4 states that non-competitive awards must be justified in writing by the technical office and submitted to the cognizant grant officer for review. Per DOA 452, Mission Director has authority to execute cooperative agreement up to \$100,000.

### Justification

Fe y Alegria is the leading Peruvian PVO engaged in training people to increase their employment potential. Fe y Alegria was the first local PVO registered by USAID/Peru in February 1979.

Fe y Alegria presently operates 110 training centers. Fifty of these centers are located in the poor areas of Lima while the remainder are located in small urban and rural poor areas throughout the country. The centers were built by Fe y Alegria with major contributions of money and labor by local community groups with an interest in ~~the~~ helping themselves to improve. These groups have a continuing commitment to maintain the facilities.

USAID/Peru has assisted continuously Fe y Alegria since 1978 with approximately \$830,000 in Operational Program Grants (OPG) and Special Development Activities (SDA) funds. At present, our only agreement with them is a SDA activity. These grants have supported Fe y Alegria training programs for poor Peruvians to increase their employment potential by developing and expanding their marketable manual and/or technical skills in demand.

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To date, these Grant funds have assisted Fe y Alegria to:

- Design and manage programs to train over 15,000 Peruvian young and adult men and women each year.
- Assist Fe y Alegria with training 500 poor Peruvians in sewing, typing, and basic carpentry through the local Clubes de Madres.
- Upgrade Fe y Alegria teachers' skills in seminars.
- Install small power supplies for microenterprises such as shoemakers.
- Provide training workshops for small guinea pig and poultry producers.
- Support a Fe y Alegria employment placement office for training graduates.
- Establish sewing outlets for low income women.

Fe y Alegria has submitted a proposal for additional assistance to continue and expand its non-formal and technical training programs and other small development needs in the communities where they operate. The proposed grant assistance will assist Fe y Alegria to continue its work and increase the number of poor Peruvians that have benefited from their programs. At the time of the most severe economic crisis in the history of Peru, Fe y Alegria is a unique organization that is providing those Peruvians most affected by the crisis with opportunities to obtain employment and a basic standard of living.


A.I.D./W has concurred in the Mission's conclusion that Fe y Alegria qualifies for 123(e) exemption as a PVO presently supported by A.I.D. in Peru prior to August 1989 and continuously since then. In other words, A.I.D./W has concluded that the activities proposed for obligation hereunder training fall within the nature of activities as described in the FY 1989 123(e) waiver because they are a continuation of the broad program that Fe y Alegria has undertaken in the past.

For these reasons, it is clear that this agreement will "continue or further develop an existing assistance relationship" as required/stated in exception "d" above and, therefore, that competition is not required in this case.

Recommendation

As the technical office responsible for overseeing this Cooperative Agreement, the Office of Human Resources hereby recommends that the Grant Officer accepts this justification for waiving full and open competition to enable USAID/Peru to issue a Cooperative Agreement with Fe y Alegria to perform the work outlined in this PIO/T.

Summary of Activities Proposed for Funding During  
Fiscal Year (FY) 1990

Private Sector Development

Institute for Liberty and Democracy (ILD) (\$443,615 PSEE, \$50,000 ARDN) to continue to support the Institutional Reform Project 938-0772 in its efforts to implement an international outreach, research dissemination, and training program; and the expansion of these activities throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. This new increment will assist ILD to (a) be more responsive to the objectives and priorities of the newly elected central and regional governments in Peru by implementing programs to promote democratic initiatives in Peru, including anti-corruption, democratization of the decisions of the regional governments and parallel systems; and (b) to integrate the considerations of key gender issues into ILD's work.

Education and Community Development

Fe Y Alegria (\$100,000 PSEE) to continue to support training for employment and community development activities under the Special Activities Project 527-0061. The purpose of the project is to increase employability and earning power of the pueblo joven dwellers by developing and expanding manual skills training programs and training for productions programs.
