RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS



Actuator for Socio-Economic Progress:

Rural Enterprise. This project is intended to benefit small-scale rainfed farmers of the municipalities of Tayug and San Nicolas in Pangasinan by increasing their yield and incomes as a partial solution to the problem of rural poverty in the province. At the end of three years, the project will have achieved the following: 1) increased the levels of income of 300 farm families by as much as 50%; 2) improved the production capacity of 150 limited resource farmers by year 2 and an additional 150 farmers by the end of year 3; 3) diversified crop production through the introduction of high value crops, high yielding crops or improved seed species; 4) provided 300 small-scale farmers with access to credit; 5) provided skills training in crop improvement practices and entrepreneurship development; 6) provided marketing assistance to farmer beneficiaries as necessary; and 7) organized the beneficiaries into cohesive work groups or associations.

Development of People's Foundation, Inc.: Accelerated Area Development Project.

This project aims to accelerate the provision of key development services, including those which may increase incomes, to fifty (50) barangays located in two provinces of Region XI - Davao and Davao Sur - and in Davao City. Local proponent organizations will receive funding support, through sub-grants, and will implement subprojects targetting the problems of lack of basic services and low incomes within poor communities. At the end of three years, the project will have achieved the following: 1) water system subprojects that will increase access to potable water from the current 10 to 50% to at least 70% among a minimum of 35 of the 50 identified barangays; 2) livelihood subprojects that will increase the annual incomes of a minimum of 30 families per barangay by at least P3,000; and 3) health subprojects that will increase access to basic health services (e.g., immunization, construction of sanitation facilities, deworming activities, supplemental nutrition programs, and health education) by at least 50% above their present levels.

Benguet Corporation Foundation, Inc. (BCFI): Benguet Community Development Project. Project objectives are: At the end of the grant period, the following subprojects will be functioning and viable: 1) Bobok Woodcraft Subproject--this subproject will train about twelve workshop production groups, with each production group managing a group business venture. Each production group will have approximately 25 members. Each member will be employed by the workshop and will be paid on a piece-rate basis. Approximate number of target direct beneficiaries is 300 individuals. 2) Bisal Handicraft Workshop--this subproject will be operated based on the same principles as (1) above. Approximate number of target direct beneficiaries is 300 individuals. 3) Agri-based Income Generating Projects--this subproject will assist approximately 150 target farmer-beneficiaries to increase their agricultural productivity through improved vegetable farming and livestock raising.

WINROCK (ADC):

Agricultural Policy Analysis. Project objectives are: 1) At the end of the grant period, the Department of Agricultural Economics and the Center for Policy and Development Studies (CPDS) at UPLB will have improved institutional capability to undertake policy analysis in agriculture. The Department of Agricultural Economics CPDS are the most suitable centers for agricultural policy analysis from several points of view. UPLB is the locus of the strongest research and teaching institutes in the agricultural sciences, and agricultural policy analysts should work with physical scientists to understand the interaction between policy and technology. In addition, the Departments of Agricultural Economics and CPDS already have a staff of well trained people. Many of these form the core of the informal Agricultural Policy Working Group formed one year ago, which consists of social and physical scientists from UPLB and other Philippine academic institutions. This group has already prepared a number of valuable policy studies and proposed a program for future policy work; 2) The principal outputs expected from the grant assistance are the results of the studies done by the ADC, the three research fellows and other research grantees; 3. It is expected that publications will result from the above research. In addition, publications from non-fellowship holders will be encouraged by allowing them to apply for publication grants.

Ilaw International Center:

Remote Islands Development Project. The purpose of this project is to test, demonstrate, and implement an effective and cost-efficient approach to remote islands development. Six small islands northwest of Bohol are being targetted in an area that was once highly productive of fish and marine life, but is now seriously degraded due to improper fishing practices and siltation. Specific project objectives are: 1) at least 750 families shall be provided access to credit for economic livelihood projects; 2) at least 6 experimentation/demonstration projects shall be established for evaluation of new technologies using local resources that can either generate income or rehabilitate local resources; 3) at least 500 women and youth shall receive skills training that will enable them to undertake home-based income generating projects; 4) at least 1,000 men shall receive livelihood training that will improve their skills in existing occupations or enable them to undertake new ones; 5) 1,800 families shall participate in community sessions which will increase their awareness of ecological problems and help them to initiate appropriate and workable solutions; 6) 420 community leaders and volunteers shall be given training in leadership, project identification, implementation, management, monitoring and evaluation, and credit and financial management; 7) 230 provincial, municipal, and barangay officials, technical agency personnel and leaders from various sectors in this area shall be sensitized to the problems of the islanders through orientation sessions and shall be mobilized to respond to community economic initiatives and to assist the communities with their resource conservation efforts; and 8) 75 national and regional government officials and agency representatives shall be oriented to the problems of the islands and assisted in acting as advocates for sound national and regional planning and collaboration.

Kapwa Upliftment Foundation, Inc. (KAPWA):
Davao Comprehensive Livelihood Promotions Project. Project purpose: To improve and augment the earning capabilities of the poor in five central zones located in Malabog and the Malabog mission zone of Sinuda. For each of the zones of Malabog and Sinuda, there will be a zone association whose objectives will be to increase the income and purchasing power of the members and ten verification/demonstration farms established with trained farm leaders who will also act as para-extension workers. Training on setting up an organization, management principles applied to an organization or an individual farm, and participatory project planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation, credit and cash management will be provided. Financial assistance will also be extended to qualified farmers.

Iloilo Economic Development Project. The purpose of this project is to increase the agricultural productivity of the target beneficiaries in nine communities in the province by 52% thereby resulting in increased incomes of up to 15%. Specific objectives are: 1) provide training to a total of 2,498 farmers on soil erosion control, proper land use, improved planting technologies, livestock management and cooperative development; 2) provide farmer beneficiaries with access to credit enabling them to purchase the agricultural inputs and equipment necessary for productive farming; 3) strengthen local agricultural cooperatives through the provision of technical assistance and the infusion of additional capital for their agricultural activities; 4) provide extension services with 3 technicians who shall be hired to work full-time; and 5) provide and strengthen support services related to marketing and storage of agricultural products.

Tarlac Integrated Development Project. The purpose of this project is to: (1) increase the productivity of target farmer beneficiaries, and (2) increase the incomes of landless rural workers and women beneficiaries. At the end of the project, at least 17 farmers associations, 12 landless rural worker groups and 6 women's groups shall have been provided with technical and financial assistance. The estimated number of direct beneficiaries is 1,100.

Mother Rosa Memorial Foundation:

Productivity Program in Pampanga. Project objective is to increase the agricultural productivity of target farmer beneficiaries and to increase the income of target landless rural workers, out of school youth, and women beneficiaries. This will be done by making credit available to (1) farmers who do not qualify for regular bank loans; and (2) landless rural workers, out of school youth and women target beneficiaries who have feasible and viable income generating projects. At the end of the project, approximately 30 associations, with each association consisting of at least 50 members, will be assisted. These associations are: a)10 farmers' associations; b)7 landless rural workers' associations; c)6 out of school youths' associations; and d)7 women's associations.

Xavler Science Foundation: Project Lovola. Project purpose is to help increase the income level of its target direct beneficiaries, enabling them to graduate from the low income group at the beginning of the project to a higher average income group at the end of the project. It is expected that income will increase from an average of P 600 to P1,200 to P1,800, thus approximating the total poverty threshold of P1,200 (rural) and P2,000 (urban) or an average of P1,600. A secondary purpose is to improve the health status of target beneficiaries. Project outputs are: (1) By the end of year one and a half, there will be 320 target household beneficiaries assisted by the project who (a) show increased income and (b) show improved health status as it relates to communicable disease. (2) By the end of year three, there will be an additional 300 target household beneficiaries assisted by the project who (a) show increased income and (b) show improved health status as it relates to communicable disease.

Benguetcorp Foundation, Inc. (BFI):

Benguet Livelihood Development Project. Project objectives are: By the end of the grant period, 1) at least 15 operational and viable farmer organizations with a minimum membership of 30 marginal farmers shall have been formed; 2) at least 450 marginal farmers shall have been provided with basic financial assistance and training on appropriate production skills and farm management; and 3) at least 30 three-day training programs shall have been conducted to enhance the management capabilities of farmer organizations and develop/improve the technical skills of farmer beneficiaries.

Each of the four farmers' cooperatives will have the capability to: a) Manage and operate a solar dryer, a warehouse, a coop store, and either a corn sheller or palay thresher; and b) Implement a savings and loan program. During the grant period, each of the four cooperatives will aim to: a) Build up share capital of individual farmer members to ensure capability to buy his/her own agricultural inputs by the beginning of the fourth year; and b) Increase membership. 2. Within three years, the ACDC will have assisted the Notre Dame Foundation (NDF) to improve its marketing services for the target cooperatives.

Paninindeg Sa Ranao Association of Rural Workers, Inc.: Maranao Agro-Forestry Development Project.

The purpose of this project is to assist low-income Muslim farmers in Lanao del Sur provide adequate and nutritious food for their families. The means of achieving this goal are a) training to improve food production and preparation and b) conservation efforts to protect farms from further erosion. Beneficiaries of this two-year project are 100 Maranao Muslim households (approximately 600 persons), located in the communities of Balindong, Lumbaabayabao, Poonabayabao, Maguing, and Taraka.

In its work with the tribal communities, PAFID aims to help them attain a level of organization and problem solving ability with which they can deal effectively with outside agencies in securing the rights and services to which they are entitled. In its work with the resource agencies, PAFID aims to sensitize them to the special needs of the tribal communities and to assist them in adapting their operating procedures to facilitate interaction with the tribal communities.

Southern Upland Agrotechnology Program. The goal of this project is to assist poor upland tribal communities (Bilaan and T'boli) achieve basic self-sufficiency through an integrated community development program. Emphasis in this program is placed on securing land tenure, improving marketing, and increasing agricultural productivity. By the end of the three-year grant period, the project shall have achieved the following: 1) 100 families shall have acquired stewardship agreements for at least 500 hectares through the Integrated Social Forestry Program of the Forest Management Bureau; 2) 150 families shall have improved their farms using permanent vegetative contour barriers to control erosion and diversified farming techniques; 3) 20 community technicians have been trained to assist families of their sitios in making these improvements and shall serve as an on-going resource to their communities on new crops and cropping method; 4) a buying station shall have been established which will enable beneficiaries to sell at least 30% of their marketable produce at higher prices than what they currently received; and 5) one community per sitio shall have been established with responsibility for planning and supervision of on-going program services.

Mindanao Lumad and Muslim Development Center. The Mindanao Lumad and Muslim Development Center (Center) aims to identify existing Lumad and Muslim groups and to develop these groups into viable PVOs. The Center will also assist the organized PVOs to seek funding assistance and to implement participatory community development projects to improve the standards of health, education, and income of Lumad and Muslim communities. The following outputs shall have been achieved by the end of three years: 1) 24 Lumad and Muslim groups shall have been developed into viable PVOs with at least 12 of these PVOs registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission; 2) 12 of the 24 PVOs shall have been registered with the USAID PVO Co-Financing Program and/or other donor agencies; 3) 24 Lumad and Muslim PVOs shall have been assisted in the conceptualization and preparation of proposals for community development projects for submission to various funding agencies; 4) a directory of Muslim and Lumad PVOs shall have been developed; and 5) technical assistance and training shall have been made available to at least 24 Muslim and Lumad PVOs.

Project objectives are: By the end of the grant period, there will be a total of 210 micro-entrepreneurs provided with (1) knowledge and skills on simple financial recordkeeping, asset management, pricing, improved business management and other related subjects; (2) capital assistance for micro-enterprises; and (3) consultancy through regular monitoring and field visits.

In implementing the grant, NEDF will act as an intermediate institution and will provide partial financial assistance to approximately 30 subprojects proposed by locally based organizations.

The four major component of the projects are: 1) technical assistance to new and existing businesses through analysis of current local business conditions, resources, and opportunities, and collection of information on appropriate technologies and business opportunities; 2) business management training for new and existing businesses through seminars on accounting, credit, marketing, appropriate technologies, and business opportunities and direct consultation for advice on issues pertinent to a specific business; 3) financial assistance to at least 75 micro-entrepreneurs and at least 25 small businessmen; and 4) long-term maintenance through an organizational structure to deliver services to outlying areas and alternate sources of finance for BRC activities. Approximately, 3,000 business people shall be beneficiaries of the above services.

Mutual Aid for Shelter Development. This project addresses the following problems: (1) lack of employment opportunities for low-income residents of Pulpogan Resettlement Area and other low-income communities outside Cebu City, (2) lack of access to housing loans of low-income members of shelter cooperatives within Cebu City, and (3) lack of low-cost building materials that have been tested and verified for durability.

The targets for SLU/EISSIF assistance are: a) cottage industries, both directly and through their associations, and b) micro-entrepreneurs, through local PVOs. At the end of three years, the project shall have achieved the following: 1) 20 PVOs provided with financial assistance for re-lending to at least 500 of their constituents; 2) 3 producers associations assisted to provide loans to at least 40 cottage industries; and 3) 225 persons trained in simple business skills, technical skills, and values conducive to business or personal development. It is expected that both the micro-entrepreneurs and the cottage producers shall have increased their monthly income by at least 15% by the end of the project. The participating members of the PVOs and associations shall have contributed share capital to create a loan fund in their respective organizations; the value of the share capital shall be at least 10% of the amount the PVO was loaned during the project period.

Micro-Enterprises Development Project. It aims to increase income derived from micro-enterprises in food processing and agri-business. The Small Enterprise Research and Development Foundation (SERDEF) will reach prospective beneficiary entrepreneurs through private voluntary organizations, other non-governmental organizations, and other organized delivery structures which have current and ongoing community organization activities. SERDEF assistance to micro-entrepreneurs will consist of (1) providing industrial extension which includes conducting socio-economic viability studies and consultancy, (2) training in (a) adoption of simple, appropriate and cost-effective technologies and (b) general micro-business management principles, and if needed, (3) financial assistance for start-up or expansion costs.

By the end of three years, TSPI shall have: 1) provided credit to 253 micro and cottage-level entrepreneurs to expand their businesses and to hire additional workers, 2) assisted 3 associations of micro-entrepreneurs in establishing a system for granting and monitoring credit to their constituents, and 3) provided training to 975 micro-entrepreneurs for the financial and technical improvement of their enterprises. The project is expected to create at least 177 jobs and to increase the income level of beneficiaries by 15% over the 3-year period.

The project seeks to address the primary concern of food shortage in the area brought about by the underutilization of agricultural land, inadequate skills and knowledge related to farming and lack of production capital. The PVO will work closely with the Aeta Development Council (ADA), an association of 36 Aeta leaders representing 20 Aeta villages in the Aeta reservation area.

Project objectives are: 1) to develop the institutional capability of Negros Economic Development Foundation (NEDF), an indigenous PVO, native to and based in Negros, and 2) to act as a technical service organization with the capability to manage shelter development and housing cooperative projects.

**Development of People's Foundation (DPF):
Community Health Through Integrated Local**

Development (CHILD) Project. The goal of the CHILD Project is to effect a reduction of infant and young child mortality in 400 depressed barangays located in 38 municipalities and cities of Region XI. The project is designed to benefit at least 60,000 households (360,000 persons) of which about 65 percent are located in rural areas. These households constitute about 10 percent of the regional total of 591,896 households. The attainment of the project goal is dependent upon achieving the purpose of each of the following subprojects: Subproject 1-- Health Service Delivery (to be implemented by the Ministry of Health); Subproject 2--Training of Local Development Councils in Planning Social Development Programs, such as Child Survival Action Programs (to be implemented by the National Economic Development Authority--Region XI Office); and Subproject 3-- Community Participation (to be implemented by the Institute of Primary Health Care of the Davao Medical School Foundation).

Primary Health Project. This will be done in cooperation with the Ministry of Social Services and Development; and b) Village Health Workers who will run dispensaries with minimal supervision, immunize children under six with DPT-Polio in cooperation with the Ministry of Health, and provide referrals of difficult and high-risk cases to practitioners in the town center.

Each NGO will provide health services in these areas which have an estimated population of 15,000.

Existing community groups will be involved in carrying out program activities. Community health volunteers and farmers will be provided leadership and skills training. Small scale appropriate technologies corresponding to the basic needs of the community will be introduced to demonstrate viable alternatives to the limited economy of seasonal fishing. The project also seeks to maximize the agricultural potentials of the island presently underutilized due to limited farming technology, seed stocks and product processing.


