DATE: October 13, 1988

As you requested following is a brief description of the Denton Amendment.

Definition: The so-called Denton Amendment is Section 1540 of the Department of Defense Authorization Act, 1985 as amended by Section 306 of the Defense Authorization Act, 1986 and Section 332 of the DAA, 1987.

What it is: Under this authority the Secretary of Defense is granted the authority to transport private sector (e. g. non-governmental) humanitarian cargo without cost on a space available basis, to any area of the world. This authority is carried out under the policy direction of the Secretary of State, who has re delegated implementation of the program to the AID Administrator. Although this authority specifically is available for relief supplies provided by non-governmental organizations, these private donations, which are often coordinated with OFDA relief efforts, are an important element of the overall relief effort from the United States. Use of this authority is more appropriate for disaster rehabilitation and reconstruction rather than immediate disaster relief.

The law further requires that there must be a legitimate need for the goods; the commodities must be suitable for humanitarian purposes; such goods must be used for humanitarian purposes, and there must be adequate arrangements for the distribution of the commodities in the country of destination. It also specifically prohibits the distribution of the transported goods to individuals, groups or organizations engaged in military or paramilitary activity.

How it works: AID's Office of Private and Voluntary Cooperation in Washington accepts applications for shipments from U.S. donors. The donors must include a description of beneficiaries, distribution plans, and a description of items, i. e. a complete inventory, on their applications. All shipments must be certified by the Department of State as consistent with U. S. foreign policy objectives, and by AID as having a humanitarian need. All shipments must have an in-country consignee who will: a) secure the approval by the local government, b) make customs arrangements, c) receive the goods and d) distribute the transported items to beneficiaries. In processing the application, the Office of Private and Voluntary Cooperation advises the AID field mission of its receipt, the U. S. donor, the local consignee, a brief description of the cargo and beneficiaries. The AID field mission is then required to confirm that there is a legitimate need for the goods, the goods will in fact be used for humanitarian purposes and arrangements for duty free shipment have been made. If a positive response is received, AID/W will arrange for inspection of the goods and seek Department of State certification. Once these actions have been completed, AID asks DOD to transport the goods. When the arrangements are finalized, DOD provides the field with the point of embarkation and estimated time of arrival.

Brief synopsis of status in Jamaica: Thus far, USAID/Jamaica has been advised of 13 Denton Amendment requests since early September. These requests comprise approximately 800,000 pounds of assorted relief supplies (e. g. canned food, blankets, clothing, tools, etc.) The first Denton Amendment shipment to Jamaica takes place today.

PROCEDURE FOR DENTON AMENDMENT

DAY 1

1. Request under Denton Amendment is received from AID/W in OPEP.
2. Contact is made with consignee by Alice Coles to determine that:
 - A) There is a legitimate humanitarian need for the goods.
 - B) The goods will in fact be used for humanitarian purposes.
 - C) Arrangements for distribution will be made.
3. Letter is sent to Com. McFarlane from Paul Crowe notifying OPD that a request under Denton Amendment has been received and AID/W is being notified that duty free entry is approved under the blanket waiver provided in ODP letter number CTA/UI/1 dated October 1, 1988.
4. Cable is sent to AID/W granting approval of Denton Amendment request.
5. Military Liaison Office Jamaica is notified by telephone of Denton Amendment request.

DAY 2-4

1. Upon receipt of Mission cable, AID/W arranges for inspection of the goods and seeks Dept. of State certification that transport is consistent with U.S. foreign policy objectives. (Approximate time is two days.)

DAY 4 plus

1. AID/W requests DOD transport the goods (transportation time variable, up to several weeks to schedule planes.)
2. Upon receipt of scheduled Denton shipment plane arrivals, MLO notifies OPEP date and place of delivery.
3. Alice Coles immediately notifies ODP, USIS and consignee of date of shipment, reminding consignee to:
 - A) Make arrangements to transport the goods. (If assistance is needed, contact ODP.)
 - B) In all cases, consignee to contact ODP, tel 85111-4, 1) arrange to provide ODP with the necessary information for Customs clearance and, 2) arrange to receive the goods from ODP.
 - C) On receipt of goods, consignee is to inform Alice Coles and provide as much information as possible on plan of distribution of goods.

NOTE: ODP has stated it will be responsible for the delivery of shipments.

MAJOR POINTS OF INTEREST

1. Total number of Denton Amendment flights as of 3/08/89 is 28 which covers a period of six months, October 1988-March 1989.
2. Total number of C-5A military cargo planes carrying relief supplies to Jamaica is six as of 03/08/89.
3. Total amount of relief supplies to date received is approximately 1,250,000 lbs.
4. At least, 250,000 lbs arrived in Montego Bay for distribution on the North Coast.
5. Relief supplies consist of non-perishable food, clothing, medical supplies, veg. seeds, school supplies and building materials. In general, the U.S. donor has communicated with the local consignee and sent appropriate goods.
6. The recipients of the goods have been church affiliated groups and civic organizations; the goods have been distributed on a non-political basis.
7. The U.S. donor, Caribbean Action Lobby, has:
 - A. Sent a total of seven flights to Jamaica.
 - B. Sent over 400,000 lbs. of supplies.
 - C. Donations have come from NJ, NY, MA, and CN.
 - D. Are the largest U.S. donor of humanitarian relief to Jamaica following Hurricane Gilbert.
8. Donated supplies have been gathered by PVOs, private volunteer organizations, primarily church and civic groups across the U.S.
9. Considering the large number of requests to send humanitarian relief abroad, DOD seems to have arranged the shipments expeditiously although the entire process of sending relief takes approximately three months from the time a U.S. donor submits an application to AID/Wash to the actual delivery to the recipient.
10. The Office of Disaster Preparedness has worked with the Government of Jamaica and customs officials to assist in a smooth operation once the goods are delivered to the airport, minimizing problems as much as possible.
11. The response has been overwhelming from the U.S. and this reflects the strong relationship between the U.S. and Jamaica.

12. Additional relief flights are planned in the near future from Tennessee, Massachusetts, Kansas, Colorado, Texas and Nebraska.
13. Jamaica is the first country outside the U.S. where Humanitarian Relief Under The Denton Amendment has been enacted as a result of the destruction caused by Hurricane Gilbert on September 12, 1988.

4. POST IS REMINDED THAT THE DENTON AMENDMENT PROVIDES THAT QUOTE: GOODS OR SUPPLIES TRANSPORTED UNDER THIS AUTHORITY MAY NOT BE DISTRIBUTED DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY TO ANY INDIVIDUAL, GROUP OR ORGANIZATION ENGAGED IN MILITARY OR PARAMILITARY ACTIVITY. UNQUOTE.

5. IF POSITIVE RESPONSE IS RECEIVED, A.I.D. WILL ARRANGE FOR INSPECTION OF THE GOODS AND SEEK DEPARTMENT OF STATE CERTIFICATION THAT TRANSPORT IS CONSISTENT WITH U.S. FOREIGN POLICY OBJECTIVES.
