INTRODUCTION

On September 1, 1986 the Egyptian Cultural and Educational Bureau (ECEB) assumed the full responsibility of the administration of the Peace Fellowship Program in the U.S. Placement, however, continued to be the responsibility of the America-Mideast Educational and Training Associates (AMIDEAST), subject to the approval of the ECEB. AMIDEAST and ECEB staff members have worked closely during the life of this project to provide Peace Fellows with a comprehensive support system. The ECEB has continuously maintained numerous student services on behalf of Peace Fellows in the U.S. including adjusted maintenance allowances, dependent medical insurance, academic placement, conference and field trip approval, transfer of Peace Fellows to Egyptian government Missions or self-financed programs, and follow-up on the status of participants remaining in the U.S. beyond their termination date.

This is the first comprehensive report prepared by the ECEB representing the period January 1 to June 30, 1987. Two additional reports were prepared previously; the first representing the period April-October 1986 which highlighted the transfer of the project from AMIDEAST to ECEB; a second, prepared by the Peace Fellowship Unit of the Ministry of Higher Education in cooperation with the ECEB, which reviewed the entire fellowship period.

PART I. STUDENT AFFAIRS

A. STATISTICAL SUMMARY

The number of Peace Fellows in the U.S. as of June 30, 1987 was 241. The number of students who arrived during the period January 1-June 30, 1987 was 91. During this same period, 125 participants completed their programs.

SUMMARY

The figures in Tables I-IV indicate that during the period January 1- June 30, 1987, the majority of Peace Fellows who arrived in the U.S. were sponsored by academic institutions (Cairo Univ., Alexandria Univ., Ain Shams Univ.) or research centers (National Research Center, Agricultural Research Center). The majority were nominated as post-doctorates for 6-month programs of research in the fields of engineering, medicine and the biological sciences.

SUMMARY

To summarize, the percentage of Peace Fellows in medical and public health fields represents the largest group as of June 30, 1987. The universities in Egypt sponsor the majority of these participants (79%); Cairo University dominates the nominations.

B. PEACE FELLOWSHIP ADMINISTRATION

1. PLACEMENT GUIDELINES

Prior to December, 1985, AMIDEAST often submitted only one placement option to the ECEB for consideration. The ECEB was not satisfied with this practice and met with AMIDEAST in March 1986 to review general nomination conditions and placement criteria.

All Peace Fellows are required to meet basic qualifications including:

- a) minimum TOEFL requirement (post-doctorates excluded per Missions directive)
- b) clearly written study plan
- c) appropriate field of study based on Egypt's development plan

It was agreed that the placement agency would submit files to a minimum of four U.S. institutions which offered the applicant's specialization in a degree or training program. For its part, the ECEB recommended to the Missions that all files be submitted to AMIDEAST for placement 6-8 months prior to the intended starting date. Approval from the ECEB is based on the following:

- a) tuition/research costs
- b) cost of living
- c) availability of specialization
- d) services available to students

AMIDEAST and the ECEB continue to work together to follow these guidelines.

2. ORIENTATION

The ECEB cooperates with the Washington International Center (WIC) to orient Peace Fellow participants provided that the group totals thirteen in order to keep orientation costs at a reasonable level. Groups of less than thirteen are oriented by the ECEB staff. The Missions has been advised and encouraged to send Peace Fellows in large groups once per week to profit from WIC's services.

From January 1 to June 30, 1987, ninety-four Peace Fellows arrived in the U.S. In January a total of eight groups was received, each group totaling less than thirteen. As a result, the Washington International Center was not engaged and orientation was conducted at the ECEB offices. Upon review of the six month period, the ECEB estimates an average of three students per week received by this office. The ECEB continues to provide orientation upon the Peace Fellows' arrival in the U.S. As part of orientation, staff arranges Washington, D.C. hotel reservations, confirmation of on-going flights, temporary housing in the host community, and leads discussions on the financial aspects of the fellowship, including a general overview of cross-cultural issues.

3. MONTHLY MAINTENANCE AND GOVERNMENT ALLOWANCES

A special allowance is provided to certain designated participants if the total Peace Fellowship allowance does not exceed what the Egyptian Missions student (of same marital status) receives. Those eligible include post-doctorates who are sponsored by universities or research centers in Egypt, and Assistant Lecturers from Egyptian universities. Dependent allowances are paid only if the Peace Fellow's family is in the U.S. nine months or more.

The ECEB prepares maintenance checks the 22nd of every month in order that students receive their checks before the first day of the following month.

4. TUITION AND RESEARCH EXPENSES

The ECEB pays tuition and fees and pre-approved research costs. The ECEB, for the most part, pays tuition fees only for students who are enrolled in coursework, and research fees for non-degree scholars. In very few cases, the ECEB has agreed to pay both tuition and research costs when the student is required to take one or more courses as a supplement to his/her research.

The ECEB has noted significant increases in research costs since the beginning of the project. The staff has attempted to minimize these costs by contacting the accepting institution to discuss a possible reduced budget. The ECEB has recommended to the Ministry of Higher Education (MOHE) that fellowship participants submit a list of equipment and materials needed when applying for research fellowships. In this way, the ECEB can better determine the most appropriate budget for any given proposal.

5. CONFERENCE/FIELD TRIP

The ECEB has placed certain controls on conference attendance at the expense of the Peace Fellow's program in order to guarantee its' relevance to program goals. It is expected that the Peace Fellows submit an academic plan and timetable to the ECEB shortly after arriving in the U.S. This plan should include any expected field trip or conference.

Peace Fellows who have been accepted for paper presentation are eligible to receive funds for conference attendance. This regulation applies to Egyptian government students as well. The Peace Fellow must submit the following documents to ECEB for consideration:

- a) a letter of request from the Peace Fellow
- b) a letter from the academic advisor explaining the importance of the conference (or field trip) to student's goals
- c) proof of oral, not poster, presentation

In the case of a field trip, the Peace Fellow is required to send a schedule of his plans, and a letter of invitation, where applicable, from the host institute.

6. CAMPUS VISITS

The Egyptian Educational Bureau is responsible for approximately 1,200 students in the U.S.; of that number, approximately 250 are Peace Fellows. During the Spring, 1987, the Director of the ECEB, Dr. Abdel Latif Aboul-Ela, conducted visits to six different campuses (including a visit to San Francisco where students representing several schools met together at the Consulate) for the purpose of meeting with Egyptian students and university faculty. All trips were made by Dr. Abdel Latif Aboul Ela during the period March 19 - April 16, 1987.

The goals of these visits are:

- to initiate discussions with American university faculty on the topics of strengthening ties between U.S. and Egyptian universities, to open channels of academic cooperation between the U.S. and Egypt, to inform faculty of the Joint Supervision Program, and to stimulate new ideas of further joint efforts between institutions.
- to meet with academic advisors supervising Egyptian student programs for discussion of the students' academic progress.
- to meet with Egyptian students to discuss questions or problems concerning their U.S. stay and any delayed or unfinished business matters with the ECEB office.
- to provide opportunities for all Egyptian students at a given campus to become acquainted with one another.

Dr. Aboul-Ela met in group and individual meetings with a total of 68 students and individually with over 30 university faculty and administrative staff members. He visited the following institutions during this period:

In order to promote future cooperation between American and Egyptian institutions, Dr. Aboul-Ela met with directors of international centers, and deans and faculty from the Colleges of Public Health, Medicine, Pharmacy,

Business, and Engineering. He also spoke to staff from the offices of graduate admissions and foreign student advising.

Discussions resulting from the campus visits clarified that the students are progressing satisfactorily in their training. In a few cases, lack of English language proficiency and/or pre-existing academic training necessitated an extension of the program. Other than the training program, questions from the Egyptian students concentrated on financial and administrative issues, customs regulations, requests for exemptions, financial aid for medical expenses (particularly delivery of second child not covered by insurance), and requests for changes from non-degree to degree status.

In addition to Dr. Abdel Latif's visits, the Deputy Director of the ECEB, Dr. Hassan Soliman, made a visit to Michigan State University as a guest of the institution during their Egypt Day celebration. During his stay, Dr. Soliman met with 20 Egyptian students on campus who are affiliated with the ECEB office. The Egypt Day festivities highlighted the country's cultural and artistic history.

7. PROFESSIONAL SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP

As of October 1, 1986, the ECEB took responsibility for all financial matters involving Peace Fellows, including payment of bills representing the period prior to September 30, 1986. This responsibility included all professional society membership dues for Peace Fellows whose programs had ended while under AMIDEAST administration. Since these files were not housed at the ECEB offices, it was necessary to clarify the status of each membership request with AMIDEAST in order to avoid overpayment. This resulted in considerable delays for approximately eighty participants.

8. EXTENSIONS

As of June 30, 1987, Peace Fellows were nominated for periods of six to twenty-four months, or eight different program lengths. Table VI (p. 46) indicates the actual length of program following approved extensions for completion of coursework or training. Between January 1 and June 30, the ECEB extended fellowships of 120 students for a total of 376 months. The average extension period was 3.13 months per student and the approximate total cost \$338,400 for all extensions. These costs increase with the additional expenses of dependent allowances and medical insurance. These extensions have been granted to the following four groups with regard to the participant's goal:

1) 21-month degree candidates: Peace Fellows nominated for 21 months to complete a Ph.D. degree, Master's degree, or to engage in research under the Joint Supervision program have requested 3-month extensions at the expense of the Peace Fellowship Program. As noted in Table VI, 48 out of 110 Peace Fellows made this request; 60 are expected to extend in the future.

These extensions require substantial administrative tasks on the part of the Peace Fellowship Program staff which must be completed within one month of the approval. Initially, the Peace Fellow must submit documents for extension consideration. Once approved, staff must first extend the visa and medical insurance for three months under Peace Fellow sponsorship, then extend the visa for one year under Egyptian government sponsorship. Were the Peace Fellows originally nominated for 24 months, the majority of paperwork could be eliminated.

2) 10-month trainees (non-degree): Participants who are nominated for 10-month programs are entitled to extend for three months under Peace Fellow-

ship Program sponsorship if they have been accepted by the U.S. institution to complete a Master's degree. They may extend for an additional 7 months as independently funded students under the supervision of ECEB. According to the data, 16 students were entitled to this extension.

As in the case of PhD extensions, numerous administrative tasks are required including: (a) renewing the visa twice: three months under Peace Fellow sponsorship and 7 months under Egyptian government sponsorship; (b) renewing the medical insurance for three months and (c) completing documents which verify the participant's financial support during the 7 month period.

Comment: It is not advisable to encourage trainees to enroll in degree granting programs when their original study plan identifies non-degree training goals since this is defeating the goals of the Peace Fellowship program in general. For administrative reasons, however, when an extension is recommended, it is preferable for these participants to complete 10 months as Peace Fellows, then to apply directly for 10 month extensions as self-financed students rather than dividing the extension into a 3/7 month split.

3) 6-month Post-doctorates: Post-doctorates consistently request extensions of 4-7 months in order to maximize on the 13 month possibility. They are frequently unable to complete their research within a six month period. Table VI shows 22 post-doctorates received extensions of 2-6 months during the period that ECEB has been administering the program; an additional 26 are expected to request more time.

In the past, these extensions required approval from the Missions in Cairo. Post-doctorates with 6 month fellowships begin contacting the ECEB office after only three months in the U.S. with inquiries about extensions. (The Peace Fellowship Program staff has been faced with a barrage of phone

calls and letters from this group requesting response from the Cairo office proving to be an extremely time-consuming process.) For this reason, the ECEB requested authorization to grant up to four months extension for post-doctorates rather than channeling the requests via MOHE/Cairo in order to reduce administrative time for the Washington, D.C. staff.

Comment: If the MOHE considers a 10-month program to be legitimate (which ECEB highly recommended even before members of this group were nominated), it is preferable for post-doctorates to be nominated thus, rather than for 6 months followed by multiple extensions. This should provide to be more suitable for efficient planning of the research project and for evaluating costs from the beginning.

4) Trainees (non-degree): In a few cases, the participant's fellowship concludes midway into the semester or close to the exam period. Table VI identifies 13 Peace Fellows in 10-month training programs who received extensions to complete the semester (up to 45 days).

Comment: It is reasonable to grant extensions for this purpose.

Recommendations regarding the length of program:

1) Candidates in the PhD, Master's degree, and Joint Supervision programs should be nominated from the beginning as Peace Fellows for 24 months, not less.

2) Post-doctorates and non-degree trainees should be nominated for 10 month periods with no possibility of extension under Peace Fellowship Program funding.

3) Peace Fellows nominated for collecting data (not Joint Supervision) should receive 18 month fellowships.

The nomination periods would thus be reduced to three options (6, 18 or 24 months), instead of the current 8 options available which later have increased to 15 periods of extension following approval.

4) Changing status or academic goals should not be supported. This is especially true for students applying to remain in the U.S. for a degree program after being nominated for a non-degree program.

Why approve for more time than needed for original plan?

9. VISA ISSUES

The IAP-66 is extended every 12 months by the ECEB office and also renewed for extensions of one month or more. In addition, the ECEB handles the extension of visas for students who are remaining in the U.S. as Egyptian Government Missions participants or as independently funded students. The volume of visa extensions which falls into one of these three categories is considerable. Problems arise when:

a) Responses regarding allowable extensions from MOHE/Cairo are received after the ending date of the Peace Fellow's program thus imposing retroactive preparation of visa documents, an experience which the ECEB and A.I.D. officials in the U.S. view unfavorably.

b) Visas are often renewed two or more times for the same student in order to reflect changes in funding or sponsor. For example, a student who is given a three-month extension under Peace Fellowship funds requires one visa extension followed by a second extension under Egyptian government sponsorship when the student is approved to be independently funded for up to an additional 7 months.

In order to facilitate this time-consuming process, the ECEB recommends:

1. reducing extensions to a minimum
2. receiving decisions regarding extensions prior to the Peace Fellow's ending date (ECEB would be required to submit requests to Cairo in a timely manner).
3. to extend programs, when necessary, under only one financial support system (as in example (b) above: extend for a total 10 months as either a Peace Fellow or independently funded, not both, thus eliminating one step).


10. RETURN TRAVEL

ECEB issues two types of airline tickets to Peace Fellows when their fellowship has ended, 1) an open ticket for those remaining in the U.S. to complete a Ph.D. degree. (This ticket must be renewed annually and transferred to APEX fare at the time of departure. Peace Fellows are entitled to return to Egypt for one month after completing 24 months in the U.S. In some cases, the Peace Fellows do not return until they have been in the U.S. for four years.) or 2) a non-negotiable pre-paid ticket which specifies a confirmed departure date.

Because A.I.D. regulations stipulate the use of an American carrier for travel between the U.S. and Egypt, and the Egyptian government requires the use of Egypt Air for dependent travel, numerous complaints have been received from Peace Fellows who wish to accompany their families when they travel.

The ECEB attempts to arrange travel dates for Peace Fellows and their dependents on Fridays or Sundays when Egypt Air offers flights from New York to Cairo so that families may travel together as far as New York. However, legitimate complications result from problems due to illness, children, or English language barriers. In a few rare cases, both parents are Peace Fellows, and are not allowed to travel with their children according to these regulations.

On June 12, 1987, Dr. Abdel Latif Aboul-Ela submitted a memorandum to the MOHE recommending that Peace Fellows be allowed to travel with their families from Cairo to the U.S. on an American carrier (which will facilitate orientation arrangements in Washington, D.C.) and to travel from the U.S. to Cairo at the end of their program on Egypt Air. No response to that memorandum has yet been received from the MOHE.

PART II

PERSONNEL

I. STAFFING PROJECTIONS

Initially, the ECEB assessed Peace Fellowship staffing needs according to the student caseload from August 1 - December 31, 1986. The following chart outlines the results:

In addition, two Egyptian government administrative attaches were assigned to coordinate the administrative and financial aspects of the project.

Although the projected staff needs totaled eight, the ECEB sought to reduce costs by hiring six staff members to manage the project. Salaries offered were based on similar wages paid to current Egyptian government staff members whose length of service ranged from five to twelve years.

In order to compensate for the lack of staff, the ECEB elected to pay overtime costs to current employees who had previous experience with the Peace Fellowship program. These staff members had worked closely with AMIDEAST staff prior to the transfer of the project to ECEB and were familiar with A.I.D. regulations. During the transfer period in the Fall, 1986, ECEB benefited from their experience while new staff members were being trained.

In May, 1987, two Peace Fellowship Program staff members resigned. A second specialist was absent for several weeks due to medical complications. As a result, the Peace Fellowship Program staff was critically understaffed from May through July. Consequently, employees from the ECEB Missions staff

were asked to assist with the administrative tasks during this period on an overtime basis. ECEB attempted to hire replacements, however, the salary advertised did not produce qualified applicants. A second employment announcement was released with successful results after the base salary was raised to \$16,000-\$18,000 for Student Affairs Specialist. Two specialists were hired as of August 1, 1987.

In addition, a former AMIDEAST Assistant Director who had worked with the Peace Fellowship Program for 5 years joined the ECEB staff in July. Her assignments have included hiring assistance, training of new staff members on policies and procedures of the Peace Fellowship Program, preparation of an up-to-date reference library for placement research and academic counseling, revision of correspondence forms, orientation materials, and other standardized materials.

The difference in wages between the newly hired Peace Fellowship staff and Missions government employees at the ECEB created numerous personnel conflicts. Since the Peace Fellowship Program salaries exceeded those of other staff members whose service in the Educational Division exceeded five years, obvious complaints resulted.

Recommendations concerning staffing:

1. Because all ECEB staff members are performing the same type of work within the educational sector, the ECEB seeks to consider the needs of all employees. Two solutions are recommended to bridge the wage gap.

- A. Reserve funds for overtime to provide staff members the opportunity to work additional hours with the permission of the State Department;

B. Raise the salaries of "Missions" staff to meet the wage level of the Peace Fellowship Program staff.

2. The ECEB has initiated a computerized data base system to track the financial and academic activities of its student participants. Implementation of this system is underway. It is suggested that a qualified computer specialist be hired to provide data entry and compilation of statistical reporting.

PART III

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

AND

EXPENDITURES

A. FINANCIAL REGULATIONS AND POLICIES

Prior to January 1, 1987, A.I.D. regulations cited two maintenance rate groups -- a technical rate of \$900 per month for participants in the U.S. 13 months or less, and an academic rate ranging from \$570-\$785 per month for participants in the U.S. fourteen months or more based on an approved A.I.D. institutional list. As of January 1, 1987, these rates changed to \$900 per month (technical rate) for participants in the U.S. five months or less, and \$570-\$785 (academic rate) for participants in the U.S. 6 months or more.

According to these changes, ECEB was required to put into effect new monthly maintenance rates affecting all Peace Fellows who had arrived in the U.S. as of January 1, 1987. This primarily affected those Peace Fellows whose program length ranged from 6 to 13 months as they were no longer entitled to the higher technical rate. At that time, no Peace Fellows had been nominated for less than six months. The difference in monthly rates ranged from \$115-\$300 less per month for this particular group.

This change was of great concern to those students who were just arriving in the U.S. and had not been informed by the Ministry of Higher Education of the change in regulations. Many of them had budgeted their expenses according to the previous rate of \$900 per month and were unprepared to live on the lesser amount, especially those whose families had planned to accompany them.

The ECEB advised the Ministry of Higher Education of this problem requesting that all Peace Fellows be informed of the new regulations. Several suggests were made at that time:

- 1) to inform all the nominated Peace Fellows in Egypt who were then preparing to come to the U.S. of the rate changes and to request that they agree in writing to accept these financial limitations.

2) to pay the difference in rates with funds from the Egyptian government.

3) to reduce the length of program of post-doctorates nominated for six months to five months in order to take advantage of the higher technical rate. In this latter case, no extensions beyond five months would be permitted.

After reviewing these options, A.I.D. approved exemptions for 70 Peace Fellows thus entitling them to receive the higher maintenance rates until September 30, 1987.

The ECEB continued to pay newly arrived Peace Fellows the higher technical rate based on their order of arrival in the U.S., not the nomination date of their fellowship. The ECEB intended to pay Peace Fellows the same rates whose programs ranged from 6-13 months in order to avoid unfair distribution of funds at the time of orientation.

Comment: The problem of reduced rates needs to be resolved prior to the Peace Fellows' arrival in the U.S. The solution should take into consideration that the academic rates do not guarantee an acceptable standard of living for periods less than 12 months when considering one year lease regulations and the costs of unfurnished housing. Furnished housing is beyond the budget of the average Peace Fellow participant.

B. ACTUAL ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS, INCLUDING OFFICE EQUIPMENT (p. 28)

1. Total Expenditures: \$96,902.06
2. Monthly Average: \$16,180.34

This amount corresponds with the actual monthly administrative

3. The table on page 28 reflects an increase in personnel expenditures as of June, 1987, when substantial overtime wages were spent following the resignation of two staff members.
4. The table indicates an increase in travel expenses due to campus visits in March and April 1987.
5. Telephone costs decreased towards the latter part of this period when numerous changes were made to improve the system. Additional lines were added to the phone system, an answering machine was installed, a loudspeaker system was added and hours were regulated to limit the number of calls received to the afternoon.
6. Some overhead costs are shared in the ECEB office including rent and utilities.
7. Office Equipment Expenditures: \$4,940.07.

PART IV INFORMATION SYSTEM

In an effort to update resource materials for the Peace Fellows, the ECEB undertook an extensive project to provide both placement and in-country services to students. Numerous improvements were made including:

1) an up-to-date reference library which offers current university catalogues, graduate study guides, field specific directories, student handbooks, and other training manuals.

2) a multi-user computer system to be installed during the Fall, 1987. This system has been established to store the entire data base to be accessible to nine work stations for updating and maintaining student data. Previously the computer system was only capable of issuing checks. Programs have been designed to record general information, academic progress, and the financial status of each student affiliated with the ECEB. Additional programs will be written to access data for various statistical graphs and tables, as well as up-to-date research and placement information. It is expected that this system will facilitate accuracy of record keeping, save administrative staff time and thus assure a more cost-effective project.

PART V GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

The following comments and recommendations have been made based on conclusions derived from review of statistical data presented in this report.

1) The majority of Peace Fellows are sponsored by Egyptian universities, engaged in advanced research and training programs in the fields of medicine, engineering and agriculture; this group is primarily composed of Ph.D. and post-doctorate researchers.

2) In order to increase the pool of Peace Fellowship trainees (non-degree), participants must meet minimum English language proficiency standards and be well qualified in their field of study. Placement difficulties arise when underqualified participants wish to engage in practical training programs for which their background does not meet minimum U.S. standards. Placement of this group would be greatly facilitated if further official relationships were established between non-academic U.S. and Egyptian institutions (such as E.N.P.P.I. in Egypt and Bechtel in the U.S.).

3) Program lengths should be limited to a) 10 months for post-doctorate and non-degree trainees, b) 18 months for non-degree data collection (not including Joint Supervision), and c) 24 months for degree candidates or Joint Supervision participants.

4) Follow-up and administration of 6-month fellowships or less is exceedingly difficult and not recommended. When it is necessary to compress the wide variety of student services into a very short time period, the cost-effectiveness from an administrative standpoint is questionable. In addition, Peace Fellows are unable to complete their research in this short period.

5) The plan of study should be prepared well in advance of placement including an outline of the research budget whenever possible. This affects

post-doctorates and participants in the Joint Supervision/data collection groups for the most part. Such information would assist the ECEB in negotiating research costs.

6) All Peace Fellows, including post-doctorates, should take the TOEFL examination or other standardized English language proficiency test. Many Peace Fellows do not feel linguistically qualified to engage in research as soon as they arrive in the U.S. thus creating delays in appropriate use of time. American faculty members are equally dismayed when this adjustment period seriously conflicts with the research goals of the participant.

7) An orientation program should be provided to Peace Fellows coming to the U.S. prior to departure from Cairo. This should be organized and presented by qualified Missions staff or former Peace Fellows who are familiar with the project.

8) The differences in maintenance rates between what is allowed by AID for Peace Fellows and what is allowed by the Egyptian government for Missions students is often considerable. This creates internal strife amongst the Egyptian student community as a whole.

9) Frequent extensions should be eliminated whenever possible in order to avoid frequent repetitive tasks on the part of the Peace Fellowship Program staff. This time would be better spent on educational counseling matters.

The Egyptian Cultural and Educational Bureau certifies that the above named student has been awarded a Peace Fellowship by the Egyptian Ministry of Higher Education, through funds provided by the U.S. Agency for International Development, with additional funds from the Egyptian Government. The funding and other support included in this fellowship award will be provided only for the duration specified above. Under the contract between AID and the Egyptian Government this program provides the following benefits:

I. Tuition and Fees

Tuition and all mandatory fees will be paid by ECEB directly to the institution upon receipt of a bill in triplicate. No fees will be paid for a semester or term which cannot be completed during the fellowship period specified above. ECEB should be credited for tuition and fees resulting from withdrawal or dropping any courses. Only students who have been approved by ECEB to enroll in coursework or for a degree will be provided with tuition benefits.

II. Medical Insurance

All Fellows will be provided with complete health and accident insurance. Some educational institutions may require Fellows to be covered under their own health plans in addition to ECEB coverage. In such cases ECEB will pay the premium if the institution's coverage does not exceed the minimum required and if it is a mandatory requirement for enrollment.

Health and accident insurance coverage is not to be confused with the student health service benefits such as use of the university's infirmary, its staff or services. If these services are a mandatory requirement for enrollment at the institution, ECEB will pay the fee.

Fellows whose dependents are eligible for medical care coverage by the Egyptian Government will be covered under a separate policy between ECEB and Blue Cross/Blue Shield, through funds provided by the Egyptian Government.

III. Monthly Maintenance for Living Expenses

A settling-in allowance of \$1950 will be issued by ECEB to each Peace Fellow. Calculated at a rate of \$65 per day, this allowance is intended to pay for the majority of expenses incurred by the Peace Fellow during the first thirty days in the U.S., including hotels, meals, and ground transportation. A high cost city rate is paid where applicable.

A regular monthly maintenance allowance is determined by the AID cost-of-living rates according to the specific geographic area. The ECEB sends this allowance to the Peace Fellow at the beginning of every month. The monthly allowance for the Peace Fellow listed above is:

IV. Transportation

Round trip international and domestic economy class transportation is provided to the Peace Fellow and to eligible dependents.

V. Books and Equipment Allowance

Peace Fellows are entitled to receive a book and equipment allowance at a rate of \$65.00 per month. Participants will be reimbursed by ECEB after submitting receipts for approved items. Guidelines have been provided to the Peace Fellows about limitations and procedures.

VI. Egyptian Government Allowances

The Egyptian government Missions provides an allowance for post-doctorates sponsored by universities or research centers, and for Assistant Lecturers from Egyptian universities only (not research centers). This allowance is provided only if the total PFP funds do not exceed those funds available to Egyptian Missions students. Dependents of this group are eligible for this allowance if they remain in the U.S. nine months or more.

PLEASE UNDERSTAND THAT THE TRAVEL DATE IS SUBJECT TO THE FIRST AVAILABLE FLIGHT. THE DATE OF DEPARTURE SHOULD COINCIDE WITH YOUR TERMINATION DATE OR AS CLOSE AS POSSIBLE.
