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INTRODUCTION

This report covers the period of March 2008, which represents the eight monthly report (and first quarterly report), under LCIP II. This Monthly Report includes a narrative report on progress organized by grant, a summary of the financial status, and a presentation of employment generation during the month and quarter.

SUCCESS STORY: March 2008

In March of 2008, in preparation for a trip to Lofa County, the office of Liberian Vice President Joseph Boikai contacted the LCIP team to forward a request from the Vice President. Vice President Boikai wanted to visit some LCIP ESR project sites in Lofa. Vice President Boikai has consistently been a strong supporter of LCIP projects. In November of 2007, he helped to launch the Private-Sector Intern Program. In April of 2007, he traveled three hours to Buchanan, Grand Bassa County, specifically to open the LCIP Trade Fair, at which time he also made several purchases from participating businesses. Impressed with our work and aware that LCIP had several projects in Lofa, his office contacted us as he was curious to see what LCIP was doing in Lofa. We immediately assembled a team to meet him.

Vice President Boikai is originally from Lofa, so this was a special trip for the people of that county. As this is the first visit that he has made to his home since the inauguration, we did not expect that we would command much of his time. To our surprise, the Vice President made time in his schedule to visit seven different LCIP project sites in three areas,

Zorzor, Voinjama, and Foya. The projects visited include a cash crop farming project and six different enterprise development sectors. He visited several projects new to ESR, including restaurant management, electronics, Liberian country cloth weaving, and rattan furniture production. He also met our Foya blacksmith, a disabled gentleman who has employed other disabled community members, as well as one of our cosmetology shops. We are sincerely appreciative of the Vice President's interest in our projects as his interest provides motivation and moral support for our project beneficiaries



UPCOMING EVENTS: Pedestrian Compactors and IRAP STTA

In December 2007, DAI/LCIP ordered appropriate compaction equipment for road rehabilitation and maintenance works. The equipment was comprised of 1 piece of 2.2 ton BOMAG type Tandem Vibratory Roller and 3 pieces of 1.0 ton Double Vibratory Pedestrian Roller and shall be used to support the community based labour-based road works on Todee Road and associated priority community access rehabilitation works. The equipment was received on 26 March 2008 and expected to be in use from April 2008 forwards when cross drainage works using community based contracts commence.

Mr. Rob Dingen arrived on 26 March 2008 to provide four weeks support towards the planning process for Community Access Infrastructure planning for the Todee Road corridor. The provision and implementation of an integrated planning tool that will set out procedures for the decision making process, eventually linking to intervention selection and standards setting will be an important aspect of

the Project. The STTA inputs will be focused on a replicable Integrated Rural Access Planning (IRAP) Tool, to be implemented by LCIP in Community Access Programs.

The Social NGO that will undertake social mobilization and community development shall be trained during this period to make good use of the planning system. Their activities will directly link to community participation in all aspects including supporting the CBOs in undertaking community contracts.

Updated Status

- LCIP is exerting every pressure on the contractor to have him fully concentrate on works such as the installation of burglar bars, doors and floor tiles.
- A modification to the contract was done for additional works which includes the storm water drainage, septic tanks, water supply system, rehabilitation of an existing septic tank and a roof slab and additional materials for the plastering of the fence.
- A contract modification of over \$76,000.00 was signed without a time extension for water supply, sewage, site drainage, and septic tanks all of which were excluded from the original budget prioritization by MPW, as MPW was to assume the responsibility of water and sewer hook-up.
- The contractor submitted a response to some issues on the electrical works including the low voltage switch gear, distribution boxes/panel/board, unit rate increases (market prices of copper), and quantities of distribution cables. This response is being reviewed by DAI, with ongoing assistance from IRG, and a contract modification, and possible grant modification, may be required (\$200k)

- MPW through its Consultant wants a stop order to be issued on building # 5. This building would be turned over to the Ministry of commerce to be used as a laboratory.
- Conclusion on the outstanding electrical issue need to be reached so that works can commence ASAP.
- DAI LCIP will finalize the validity of those claims for delays submitted by the contractor. (\$35k)
- Cost savings may be possible by reducing the quantity of air conditioners; which may also ensure
 that the generators currently on site have sufficient capacity to match the electrical load requirements
 of the building.

Updated Status

- During the month extensive monitoring exercises and consultations were continuously taking place between the project Consultant, LCIP/DAI and all contractors regarding increasing activities and progress especially on three of the remaining project contracts.
- LRDC building activities are now almost 100% complete with additional works of installation of A/C cage boxes in progress.
- Slow progress from BNCC building and electrical works are still being monitored despite constant mentoring by the Consultant and LCIP engineers.
- MLL's activities on water supply and sewage disposal works are almost finished except for the complete testing of the water supply system and fittings due to delays by BNCC to connect the generator to the pump house and up to 12 soak-aways pits, pending a contract modification.
- BNCC has to a greater extent completed some activities on the building renovation works of the project and are concentrating on terrazzo floor tiles polishing, plastering, finishing and painting.
- Outstanding works still include the completion of grinding of part of the existing and newly installed terrazzo tiles, cleaning of floors, installation of some cupboard and wade robe doors, complete landscaping, removal of debris and site clearance.
- The electrical component of the project did finally commence with the installation of the direct burial of cables around the administrative wing of the campus and connections to individual buildings including installation of panel boxes in the generator houses. Solar panel street lights fittings and connections are still outstanding.
- MLL made considerable progress on the water supply lines installation and sewage disposal components of the project. Tests are still being carried out which have resulted in provision of a temporary water supply to the newly renovated steel water towers and subsequent distribution to the main lines and individual buildings.
- Extension of the individual projects has been renegotiated by the Consultant, Contractors and DAI/LCIP for acceptable completion timeframes.

- Four of the five subcontracts are on course, both in terms of work quality and performance.
- Cross Roads has substantially gathered various materials on site for the fabrication of concrete poles
 for street lighting. They are also in the process of procuring other imported electrical switch gears
 and accessories from outside the country.

- The Contractor of the electrical installation package has commenced mobilization of some materials and equipment. LCIP and the Consultant, AEP Consultants, have assisted in finding additional technical resources to augment staff for Crossroads, to ensure satisfactory completion of the electrical installation.
- Final model designs and cost estimates of the library building were presented by the Consultant/AEP for discussions with DAI/LCIP. Ministry of Education still has to approve of them.
- 3 existing contractors were provided with uncosted Bills of Quantities, designs, and Scopes of Works for the majority of remaining staff housing and a few additional academic buildings bids will be submitted by the second week in April in order to make decision about the remaining budget.

Updated Status

- Following the revision made by the mission consisting of the USAID Sr. Engineer, the CTO, on the 4th of February 2008 as it relate to, (1) the road length, (2) To maximize use of local available resources and community participation, (3) Detailed survey to be carried out expeditiously and to determine quantities of works were taken into consideration to be implemented during the rehabilitation period.
- Complete set of bid documents were submitted to three construction companies namely to SSF,
 Construction Engineering Company, and West Wood Corporation for a competitive bid of earth works for the road in subject.
- On the 4th of March 2008, a pre bid site meeting was attended on the Todee road with representative from the above companies, and LCIP Engineers.
- On the 11th of March, a competitive bid ceremony was performed in the conference room of the LCIP office located on redemption Street. Attendance of the ceremony was representatives from the Ministry of Public Works LCIP, and the Contractors.
- Bids evaluation and recommendation was made by the bid technical committee on the 13th of March 2008
- On the 17th of March 2008, SSF was invited to the LCIP offices, for words of congratulation for award, and negotiation performance period, bid price, and subcontract type.
- All document for LIDA, the social NGO were completed and signed by and between the managements of LCIP and LIDA on the 25th of March.

Updated Status

SEGMENTS A& B

- Revision of the road and cross drainage structures geometry after the review of Mission recommendations was concluded and issued to contractors. Revised drawings were also issued to the subcontractors.
- Resurveys to identify bottlenecks and revision of the scope of works on road spot improvements were completed and comprehensive site instructions issued to subcontractors.
- Due to the slow pace of works implementation and poor equipment in segment B, LCIP leased extra
 equipment in this section to speed up the road works on the spot improvements. This equipment unit
 is under the direct supervision and direction of the LCIP engineers. The contract has been
 repackaged and the Contractor (AAA Engineering) for Segment B will handle the cross drainage
 structures while the LCIP team of engineers uses the hired equipment to execute the spot
 improvements.
- Some unknown people living around chainage 43+000 of the Buchanan Greenville road set fire to a log bridge and was destroyed. A second log bridge was also lit, but extinguished. The problem was reported to the Rivercess authorities including Senator Banney who visited the community to talk and warn them about the practice of burning the log bridges.
- Contractor for Segment A (Westwood Inc) filed a claim for compensation of losses resulting from idle equipment during the period 1st Feb 21st Feb 2008 when the resurveys and redesigns to accommodate the review USAID Missions recommendations were being carried out. LCIP Engineers are in process of analyzing the claim.
- Contractor's are fully mobilized, although frequent breakdowns and reliability of old equipment continues to be a challenge.
- The scarcity of cement on the market has greatly hindered the progress of the drainage structures installation and affected the contractor's cash flow due to the increased price of cement. A unit price increase is being considered.
- A new work plan format was introduced to the contractors. The contractors were requested to provide updated work plans conforming to the requirements of the contract, specifically stating the construction activities, labor, equipment mobilization and production rates.
- Estimated Progress for segment A and B is tabulated below.

SEGMENTS C & D

- Segments C (Crossroads): the subcontractor carried out some construction activities including backfilling of former uncompleted works (13 lines) and some road spots improvements at different locations on the segment. There are materials (crushed rocks, sand) deposited at culverts installation stations and at the contractor's site camp (cement, reinforcement steel). At the end of March 2008 the mobilization levels was still inadequate to carry out the works. The total estimated work done is about 25% after three months of project time. The contractor is seriously behind time / schedule.
- Segments D1 (Gray): the contractor is very slow and so far has carried out about 7% of the total works contracted out to him, after about 3 months of project plan works time. There is limited labor on site. There are some materials at the contractor's site but inadequate to carry out the work. As of the end of March, 2008, the mobilization level is very inadequate. Steps should be taken to remedy this, including intervention through multiple smaller subcontractors or additional rental equipment.
- D2 (REDES): the contractor seems to be building up is pace but is still yet under-mobilized for the works. Materials have being deposited at culvert installations stations. However this contractor has completed about 15% of works after about 3 months of project plan time. Remedial actions will be identified to supplement slow progress.
- SMD, the heavy-duty equipment rental company was contracted to be directly supervise by the LCIP project engineer to carry out spots improvements within the Segments C & D. At the end of March 2008, about 22 Km of road has being rehabilitated. Consumables like fuel and lubricants are supplied by LCIP as part of their rental agreement.
- Total completion of works within the "C" & "D" Segments by the end of march 2008 is 15.6%.
- A joint inspection of the Sannquin River Bridge was conducted by LCIP Chief Engineering Jim Clarke, MPW representative Charles Carpenter and USAID CTO Mac Homer. Outcome of inspection report is attached as an annex.

- USAID CO Approval for 2 heavy-duty equipment rental contracts will demobilize by early April without further approvals.
- Obtain written consent from MPW endorsing the recommendations of the review of Mission much
 as MOU was signed between USAID and DAI embracing the recommendations. Once agreed on
 with MPW the recommendations are expected to result in adjustment of the geometric size of both
 structures and road spot improvement works, preserving properly functioning log bridges and
 improvements on existing structures rather than replacing.
- Subcontractors to submit their updated work plans for approval.
- Finalizing the Alternative improvements on the existing log bridges and incomplete box culvert works;

• Continue issuing contract instructions with pre-determined quantitative measures;

- Milton & Richards completed the bid analysis of the 4 bids received and recommended award to SEEK Engineering.
- The Groundbreaking Ceremony was completed as scheduled on March 18, 2008 which was attended by the President of Liberia, USAID, and Lofa County officials.
- SEEK Engineering have mobilized already and have already commenced with the demolition works especially of the roof, ceiling, window and door frames
- A contract, with a \$100,000 obligation, was signed on March 25, 2008 and awaits USAID Contract Officer approval for further obligation.
- DAI Project Engineer Jacob Neufville will directly supervise the construction, with engineering management from Victor Musarurwa.

- Contracting Officer approval of Consent to Subcontract to SEEK Engineering.
- Quantification of well rehabilitation costs and quantities of fascia board

PROJECTS UNDER DESIGN/PRE-CONSTRUCTION PHASE

The following projects are under design or in pre-construction under LCIP (Task Order #3) or LCIP II (Task Order #10):

Sinoe County Administrative Building (Greenville)

- Consultant for pre-engineering: ACC.
- Bid analysis was submitted by ACC and recommendation for award to Faith Engineering was not accepted by LCIP, as Gibbel Construction was the lowest qualified bidder.
- Award is scheduled for the first week in April
- No groundbreaking is scheduled a dedication ceremony upon completion is preferred.

Maryland County Administrative Building (Harper)

- Consultant for pre-engineering: ACE Planning.
- Consultant's estimate for rehabilitation: \$925,000 (higher than originally estimated at \$400,000). The civil works (without any electricity generation) is estimated at \$550k alone.
- The existing structure is fire damaged and in very poor condition. Much of the concrete frame needs to be demolished and reconstructed.
- A proposal to create offices in the auditorium and transferring other offices to space that has been vacated by other agencies who now have their own facilities would make it possible for the resizing

- of the building while maintaining the original number of offices. Reducing the number and size of the terraces would also be advantageous in the resizing process
- Additional meetings were held with the Minister of Internal Affairs, Maryland caucus, and other senior officials to decide how to proceed within the confines of the budget, but no decision has been reached.
- A structural engineer is required to review the integrity of the building before construction can begin.
- Time extension and a revised scope of works must be provided to ACE planning for the extended preconstruction process.
- Final decisions have not yet been reached regarding the preconstruction design of the Harper Administrative building; further discussion with USAID is required.

National Election Commission (NEC)

- Consultant for pre-engineering: ACE Planning.
- Estimate for rehabilitation: \$950,000 for 19,000sqf.
- Spatial Planning was completed in March and fits within the existing square footage of the 2 existing buildings.
- A structural engineer is required to review the integrity of the building before construction can begin.







VII. MONITORING & EVALUATION

The M&E Unit conducted field monitoring for the month of March 2008 in Nimba and Grand Gedeh counties. The purpose of the monitoring was to visit all LCIP grants currently implemented in the two counties and to verify the data contained in field reports submitted to LCIP/DAI by the implementing agencies. The grants include:

MPA010/C/06

- The swamp rehabilitation site currently has a workforce of 95 persons
- Feeding is provided for the workforce
- 9.9 acres of swamp land have been brushed
- The work at the site is behind schedule
- Ongoing activities include de-stumping and bund construction

MPA010/C/04

- The fish pond construction at the Putu Jarwodee site is far behind schedule. The site has a target to construct eight fish ponds but only one with the size of 450 square meters has been completed.
- The site has a workforce of 50 persons
- Feeding is provided for the workforce on site
- The fish pond rehabilitation site in Gwein Town also has a workforce of 50 persons
- Feeding is also provided for the workforce at this site

MPA010/C/05

- A farmer field school comprising participants from four towns neighboring Putu Jarwodee has been established. The school has a field demonstration site that teaches project participants different ways of vegetable production prior to harvesting the snails and honey.
- 67 snail cages and six beehives have been constructed at the Putu Jarwodee site; 10 of the 67 snail cages have stocked with layers.
- The Putu Jarwodee site has 67 farmers undergoing training in snail raising and beekeeping
- The site in Gwein also has a farmer field school comprising four towns neighboring Gwein town
- 14 snail cages have been constructed and stocked with layers in Gwein town.

MPA009/C/01

- The interns assigned at the Cellcom sites are all males and were all present during the team visit.
- There are no attendance record system at the sites

MPA008/C/04

• The site visit confirmed the construction of five hand pumps in Putu Jarwodee, Tweh Town, Keh Town, and Sieh Town.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- That a meeting be held by both ESR and M&E with PNO and FFDC to plan on ways to move their work activities that are behind schedule faster so as to be able to complete the work as scheduled in the grant agreement;
- That a follow-up visit be conducted by both ESR and M&E at the end of April 2008 to assess the progress of the work of both PNO and FFDC;
- That pump cages/jackets be considered in future community hand pump construction projects to avoid theft;
- Making Enterprises should ensure that daily timesheet provided by LCIP is distributed to all the sites and data from the field are verified prior to submitting to LCIP.
