### Food Security Situation\*

- Despite strong economic growth over the past few years, Rwanda remains a low-income, food deficit country ranked at 165 of 179 on the United Nations Development Program's 2008 Human Development Index.
- High population density, low agriculture productivity, deforestation, and soil erosion all pose threats to Rwanda's food security.
- Nearly 30 percent of the country is food insecure and another 24 percent are highly vulnerable to food insecurity. More than 40 percent of Rwandan children are chronically malnourished.
