Dear Ms. Sheffield:

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, the Agency for International Development (AID) hereby provides to the International Planned Parenthood Federation/Western Hemisphere Region (hereinafter referred to as "WHR" or "Recipient") the additional sum of \$550,000 in continuation of a program on Population and Family Planning (Ecuador), as more fully described in Attachment 1, "Program Description" of the Cooperative Agreement, as amended. This increment will be effective on the date this letter is countersigned by the Regional Director of WHR, or his delegate.

The total estimated cost of this Agreement is \$3,472,000 of which, with this amendment, \$3,472,000 is now obligated. AID shall not be liable for reimbursing the Recipient for any costs in excess of \$3,472,000.

The text of the Cooperative Agreement is amended as follows:

1. Cover Page: Delete Amount Obligated "\$2,922,000" and substitute in lieu thereof "\$3,472,000".
2. Cover Page: Delete Total Estimated Cost "2,922,000" and substitute in lieu thereof "3,472,000".
3. Cover Page: Delete Expiration Date "June 30, 1986" and substitute in lieu thereof "December 31, 1987".

Please sign the original and seven (7) copies of this letter to acknowledge your acceptance of Amendment No. 10, and return the original and six (6) copies to our office.



ATTACHMENT No. 1

The activities described below will be implemented by the three Private Ecuadorian Population/Family Planning organizations namely, APROFE, CEMOPLAF and CEPAR, with the assistance of WHR, during the period covered by the PACD extension.

The activities of WHR will be executed in close coordination with USAID/E, and will continue to be developed through the WHR Quito Coordinating office.

1. APROFE

APROFE will continue providing family planning information, education and services through its clinics located in Guayaquil, Quito, Cuenca, Machala, Babahoyo, Portoviejo, Loja, Milagro, Ambato, Chone, La Libertad and Daule, and will complement its activities in Guayaquil with the installation of a new clinic in 1987. A new clinic will also be initiated in Manta, at the beginning of 1987. APROFE will provide services to 44,450 new users, and will maintain a semester rate of retention of 70%.

2. CEMOPLAF

CEMOPLAF will continue providing information, education and services in family planning through its clinics located in El Guasmo, Esmeraldas, Quinindé, Ibarra, Riobamba, Tulcán, Guaranda, Latacunga and Quito. Support to the clinic of the Quito Midwives Professional Association will be continued through CEMOPLAF. In addition, CEMOPLAF will develop the Campesino/Indian subproject with the assistance of the Population Council in Otavalo, Pujilí and Colta. CEMOPLAF will provide services to 20,250 new users and will improve its semestral retention rate of 39%.

3. CEPAR

CEPAR will continue to inform Ecuadorean leadership about high population growth rate in Ecuador, and the impact such growth has on the country's socio-economic development. CEPAR will also continue to stimulate the development of a population policy and to provide Ecuadoreans with information for making responsible decisions about family size. To fulfill these objectives, research, training and informational activities will be continued. Informational activities will be reinforced through the establishment of a radio communication subproject.

USAID and WHR will discuss the possibility of including community based distribution and distribution through pharmacies programs within the scope of this Agreement. APROFE and CEMOPLAF's success in CBD programs, CEPAR's successful training of pharmacists have been very encouraging.

These three organizations will submit to USAID, through WHR a semi-annual workplan for the last semester of 1986 and an annual workplan for 1987.

Written reports shall be submitted quarterly by WHR on activities developed. WHR shall conduct evaluations at six month intervals.
