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
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9. ABSTRACT
 The Agency for International Development has contributed in a number of different ways to the conduct of household and other micro-data surveys in developing countries. The material on the following pages provides information relative to some of these surveys as a convenient reference for the use of AID Missions, researchers, analysts and other interested persons.

The nature of the collaboration and the context within which the surveys were carried out varies. For example, some surveys were associated with a program to develop a computer center to which AID provided commodity support. In other cases the survey served a basic data need and was carried out to fulfill that need. The range of programs involving surveys and also involving some kind of AID input included the establishment of demographic centers, participant training in statistical programs, and technical assistance to LDC experts in system design and sampling techniques.

INTRODUCTION

The Agency for International Development has contributed in a number of different ways to the conduct of household and other micro-data surveys in developing countries. The material on the following pages provides information relative to some of these surveys as a convenient reference for the use of AID Missions, researchers, analysts and other interested persons. Other surveys exist for which we have inadequate information to include in this report. Subsequent reports will expand on this information. Each entry is limited to a short description of the survey, the size of the sample, and the complete address of the location of the data.

Inquiries regarding the availability of the data should be made by the potential user to the address given. In many cases the untabulated original data will not be available. There are tabulated data for most of the surveys listed. The user will also need to determine the value of the data for his particular need. Some materials (sample questionnaires, code books, etc.) have been accumulated for some of the surveys. Inquiries concerning the latter should be addressed to the Documentation Branch, International Statistical Programs Center, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

The nature of the collaboration and the context within which the surveys were carried out varies. For example, some surveys were associated with a program to develop a computer center to which AID provided commodity support. In other cases the survey served a basic data need and was carried out to fulfill that need. The range of programs involving surveys and also involving some kind of AID input included the establishment of demographic centers, participant training in statistical programs, and technical assistance to LDC experts in system design and sampling techniques.

This listing does not deal with another vast field of survey activity (a part of which has had AID assistance), fertility and family planning. Surveys of Fertility and Family Planning gather some information on knowledge, attitudes and practice, popularly referred to as "KAP" studies or surveys. Because of the great differences in the methods of collection of information, and the varied cultural and social factors influencing the phrasing of

the questions, much of the material is only useful in the specific country where it was obtained. In order to make it possible to do a cross-cultural analysis of some KAP surveys, the Roper Organization was contracted by the Office of Population in AID to analyze and restructure the format of the data gathered in 35 KAP surveys from 20 countries. The more specific surveys of fertility behavior form part of the World Fertility Survey, a major program of research involving nationwide sample surveys carried out in 50 to 60 countries. These surveys are not included in this publication, but are fully reported in the Occasional Papers of the World Fertility Survey, available from:

It is expected that this report will be revised and updated periodically with the discovery of additional information from the field and with new surveys of household and other micro data.

This first edition of "Description of Household and Micro Data Surveys, 1975" has been the work of many people both in the field and in Washington. Jayetta Hecker, PPC/PDA/DA in early 1973 produced a "Proposal for an A.I.D. Data Strategy", which contained a list of AID Projects having a SURVEY component. The list called attention to this potentially useful resource. AID Missions worldwide were queried and responses came from 31 on which this monograph is based. Mr. Floyd O'Quinn, and Mr. Donald O'Brien, both of the Bureau of the Census, helped us to recognize the breadth and depth of household sample surveys worldwide to which AID made some contribution. The major task of research and writing fell to Miss Annie Laurie, AID Foreign Service Education/Population Officer, who tracked this elusive, scattered information and brought it forth for whatever use it may serve.

ERRATA

Page 2, the surveys referred to in the ISPC Occasional Papers are not part of the World Fertility Survey (WFS) program. They were previously completed surveys that were inventoried by the ISPC demographic analysis staff at the request of A.I.D. and the WFS staff. The WFS program will encompass 50 to 60 new surveys.

Household Sample Survey (Rural Afghanistan 1970).

This survey was made in 4 representative villages of rural Afghanistan, and includes everyone in each of the four villages. It is an epidemiological study which gathered information on household relationships in the extended family, the diet, the market supply, waste disposal, and housing. Entomological studies were also made. The detailed material is medical, resulting in a profile of rural health and disease in the country.

This survey includes basic demographic data on household members, housing, employment, fertility, maternal-infant mortality and migration. A Pregnancy History Schedule was used for married women only in a sub-sample of the survey households.

Household Sample Survey Program

This survey program provides great item and area detail of all characteristics included in the surveys. It is the principal source of current social and economic information about households, families and individuals. It is the sole current source of information about the entire labor force, detailing both social and economic characteristics. In addition, there is information on education, training, internal migration, health and nutrition, family income and expenses and housing characteristics. The program includes special demographic surveys and surveys of cottage and home industries.

Survey of Urban Marginal Settlements (Encuesta Sobre Marginaldad Urbana, Guayaquil, 1969)

There is a wealth of data in this survey including basic demographic information, family relationship characteristics, migration, time in residence, education, occupation of all household members, father's occupation, occupational history of person interviewed. There is quite varied manpower information. Also treated are expenditures, help received (money, food, clothing); attitudes toward economic situation of barrio, friends, neighbors, previous mates, perception of most important problems in the barrio, blame, solution; perception of government, principal problems of country and solutions; perception of own role in change process; exposure to mass media.

Communications Survey (Audiencia Survey 1974).

This is a quota survey to determine the means of communication which affect the lives of those interviewed, and an inquiry into the possible fields of interest for non-formal education. The data gathered includes access to which means of communication, membership in church and fraternal organizations, and use of government assistance, i.e., agricultural extension, community development.

The related questions deal with interest in subject fields for non-formal education, i.e., health, nutrition, home economics, employment and job training, recreation and leisure activities, agriculture (contour farming, etc.)

This is a highly detailed survey with questionnaires covering the following: a household profile including occupation, language spoken, and education of each household member; health and sanitation; perception of resources, stability and fertility of soils, conservation; demographic characteristics desired family size, social and economic perceptions of the family, migration; perception of population growth; economic activities; land ownership, tenancy and crop production; consumption patterns, the place of abode. Sociological inquiries were made into the following: mutual aid organizations, government community development activities, social stratification and values, style and standard of living, community leadership, attitudes toward work and toward government, perception of government and social problems.

This is a three round survey, 1968-1969, 1969-1970, 1970-1971. The specific objective of the study was to measure changes in income levels and income distribution, and changes in patterns of consumption, investment and savings of rural households. INDONESIA

A Study of Migration in Indonesia, 1974.

This study was made in several areas of Indonesia to determine some patterns of migration. Respondents were asked about their movements to another area: when, why, with whom, where from; about themselves: age, siblings, parents, education, children, birthplace of respondent and his parents, regional dialect, history of where he has ever lived. There is information on the conditions prevailing in the previous residence, before respondents moved into present area for the first time, knowledge of present area previous to arrival, contacts with home village, occupation and economic activities, condition of place of residence, economic situation and the respondent's opinions about the area in which he lives.
