## INTRODUCTION

This bibliography on population problems in Africa is the fifth in a series of six reference tools intended to provide development officials and scholars, both in Africa and in the donor countries, with a current and basic overview of available literature on a given theme. The final guide will deal with the implementation and administration of development activities in the public sectors, including low-cost methods of bringing education, health, and other governmental services to the rural populace. Previous guides are Rural Development in Africa, Educational Development in Africa, Income and Employment Generation in Africa, and Economic Cooperation and Regional Integration in Africa.

All compilations consist of resources published between 1969 and 1973; however, selected major works published prior to 1969 have been included in order to indicate the nature of the evolution of population research in Africa. The Bibliographical heading in the Subject Index contains a number of entries which will provide the user of this bibliography with many of the references included.

The format of the Bibliography is based upon the Center's quarterly journal, A Current Bibliography on African Affairs, and other specialized guides issued by this office on an irregular basis. Items of special importance are denoted with an asterisk and annotated wherever possible. The material included herein is available on a selective basis at major public and private depositories in the United States and abroad. The Continuing resource Information section mentions micropublishers whose services may provide the user with many of the references included.

The problem of demographic transition, as experienced by the industrialized countries, and presently occurring in Asia and Latin America, was up until the nineteen-sixties not one of Africa's major problems. Africa is still generally characterized by high fertility and high mortality. However, demographic changes have begun to occur. Ghana, Kenya, Tunisia, Morocco, and Egypt have established official family planning programs. Other countries have semi-official and private programs.

Literature on population as it pertains to the continent remains sparse with much of that which does exist concentrating on describing the parameters of African populations. Clearly there is a great need for research on an individual attitudinal level especially in the areas of motivation for smaller families and the efficacy of post-partum family planning.

This bibliography on population in Africa contains material of a general nature which, it is hoped, will contribute to an understanding of the population problems faced by the developing countries of the world in general, and of Africa in particular. (There has been a great deal of literature produced which deals with the United States,

but the greater part of the extant population material has not been included in this work.)

Lastly, the subject of migration as a contributing factor in a nation's rate of natural increase has not been given much focus in this bibliography because of the extensive coverage of the subject in a previous bibliography, Income and Employment Generation in Africa.
