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


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

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**Semi-Annual Interim Administrative Progress Report
December 28, 1968, to June 27, 1969**

INTRODUCTION

This report covers the activities of the Development Planning Project of the Center for Development Planning, National Planning Association, for the period December 28, 1968, to June 27, 1969. It is submitted in accordance with the contract between the National Planning Association and the Agency for International Development, AID/Repas-9, Amendment #4, Article I.C.2a.

I. STAFF CHANGES

The appointment of Richard Hooley as Senior Economist terminated on December 31, 1968.

On March 16 Robert P. Haven was appointed as Economist to assist with completion of the Project's final report. His curriculum vitae is attached to this report.

On February 1 John C. H. Fei returned to his duties at Cornell University after spending the first semester of his academic year with the Project. Professor Fei has continued as a consultant to the Project since his return to Cornell.

II. RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

The work of the Project during the period under review continued to focus upon completing final results of the studies financed under the contract.

In an amendment to the contract dated January 17, 1969, an extension of the term of the contract, without additional funding, was approved by AID. This extension allows completion of the final results of the Project in two stages. In the first stage, general theoretical, methodological, and empirical results are being written up prior to September 30, 1969. In the remaining period, emphasis will be upon specific country applications for comparative analysis and policy conclusions.

During the present reporting period, three types of final studies were completed and submitted to AID: (1) the general methodology which the Project has developed for analytical and empirical research on open, dualistic economies; (2) general theoretical analysis of two alternative patterns of transitional growth in open, dualistic economies; and (3) a survey of the post-World War II growth performance of a relatively large sample of open, dualistic economies.

In the next phase of the Project's work, these general studies will be explicitly applied to specific country experience to investigate in detail the process of growth in several countries. These applications are designed to shed light on the variety of growth systems which emerge in open, dualistic economies and on how these different growth systems operate in practice, as well as to provide a basis for development strategy and policy conclusions germane to the variants found in this type of economy. Even among the four or five countries which are being intensively studied for this purpose, considerable diversity in postwar growth experience and significant differences in growth performance are being found.

In addition to the two countries (Thailand and the Philippines) in which the Project earlier undertook intensive field work, country applications will include China: Taiwan and Malaysia. For comparative purposes, reference will also be made to Indonesia and selected Latin American countries. Country studies are being prepared for each of the four countries to which the analysis is being intensively applied. Each represents a rather unique case of open, dualistic growth. We believe that these studies will offer a basis for identifying the nature of growth systems in other developing countries of this type and that this

knowledge will be useful for more effectively adapting policy recommendations to the unique development problems which confront particular countries.
