Public Voucher No. 22/VN includes all VN costs incurred pursuant to the terms and conditions of USAID letter Notice of Partial Termination dated 2 April 1975, and accordingly can be termed a Final Piaster Voucher.

Also transmitted herewith is a reconciliation of VN\$ Bank Accounts at Vietnam Thuong Tin, Nha Trang and Chase Manhattan Saigon, together with a summary which itemizes disposition of the VN\$ 37,000,000 advanced for our use by USAID/VN.

FINAL REPORT - CONTRACT AID-730-3619

SUMMARY

The Contract became effective on 14 September 1973. Mobilization commenced immediately thereafter. Temporary offices were provided by VHA Nha Trang until permanent offices could be established at 70 Duy Tan. On 28 March 1975 informal notification was received in Nha Trang that all U.S. personnel were to be evacuated immediately to Saigon. On 29 March 1975, this informal notification was confirmed in writing by Montcrief J. Spear, Consul General CONGEN II. Physical evacuation of the SPA Nha Trang offices was accomplished during the period 29 March 1975 thru 1 April 1975. At the time of evacuation from Nha Trang, engineering design services were approximately 98% complete. Engineering supervision of construction services were barely under way on 29 March 1975. Notice of partial termination of Contract AID-730-3619 was received in Saigon on 3 April 1975. Instructions contained in this Letter of Partial Termination were immediately implemented. Temporary offices, in space provided at the USAID II compound by USAID/ETA/VN, were established in Saigon on 2 April 1975. Partial evacuation of U.S. personnel to Bangkok was accomplished during the period 5-6 April 1975. One fulltime U.S. employee, supported by a small Vietnamese staff of 4 employees, continued contract closing activities in Saigon. The remaining staff of U.S. employees continued work on records consolidation in Bangkok. One U.S. employee was terminated effective 7 April 1975; 4 additional U.S. employees

were terminated effective 2 May 1975 and the one remaining U.S. employee was terminated on 30 May 1975. The remaining staff, of 4 Vietnamese employees, was terminated on 25 April 1975. The terminal period of employment granted all U.S. and Vietnamese employees, in accordance with SPA company policy and Vietnamese Labor Law, is included in the total contract period ending 30 May 1975. Actual contract operations in Vietnam were closed out on 26 April 1975, when the one remaining U.S. employee was evacuated, by order of USAID/ETA/HB, to the U.S., via Clark Field and Guam. Contract close-out activities were continued to completion in the Sverdrup & Parcel Regional Office, Bangkok. The following articles of this Final Report contain pertinent data on status of contract completion, costs and expenditures, property disposition, reconciliation of the piaster advance, evacuation, termination and final settlement of contract reimbursibles.

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I. EVACUATION OF NHA TRANG AND PARTIAL CONTRACT TERMINATION

Attached, as EXHIBIT I, is a Memorandum describing the continuity of events which resulted in the evacuation of the SPA offices Nha Trang and the notification of partial termination of Contract USAID-730-3619.

II. DISPOSITION OF EQUIPMENT AND FURNISHINGS

Transfer of all equipment and furnishing held in custody by SPA were transferred to the VHA on 31 March 1975, with the very able assistance of Mr. Tibor Nagy, Deputy Chief, Highway Branch/ETA. All furnishings, equipment and vehicles under the control of SPA, were physically transferred to the VHA, except as follows:

As last seen, all property transferred to the VHA was in good serviceable condition, as a result of an effective maintenance and repair program which was strictly enforced during the entire period of SPA vested custody and control of the property.

Inventories were taken, during the period March 20-26, 1975, of all furnishings, property and equipment at 70 Duy Tan (office) and at 16 Ru Ri (VHA laboratory at VECCO quarry) in anticipation of approaching difficulties. The latest inventories, with the exception of the inventory for laboratory equipment, are attached as EXHIBIT II. The laboratory inventory was on file at the VHA laboratory and could not be recovered prior to evacuation.

Laboratory equipment was stored in the VHA Laboratory Building at Ru Ri. Temporary storage for other property transferred to VHA, and physically present in the office and compound at 70 Duy Tan, Nha Trang, is provided by a lease, prepaid to June 30, 1975. Designation of VHA as the successor Lessee could not be effected prior to evacuation. However, an appropriate transfer document has been executed by the SPA Home Office, St. Louis and a copy

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thereof is herewith attached as EXHIBIT III. The original of this transfer document was delivered to USAID/ETA/HB, on 14 April 1975.

III. STATUS OF ENGINEERING DESIGN SERVICES

Engineering design services for the total amended scope of work, as hereinafter summarized, was approximately 98% complete on 29 March 1975, the date of written orders to terminate operations and implement evacuation orders.

a. Highways

(1) QL-1 Stations 0+000 to 102+750 (102.34 kms)

All engineering design services 100% complete.

(2) QL-1 Bridge 215 north to Tuy An (18 kms)

All engineering design services complete to Pre-Final level.

IV. STATUS OF CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

a. Highways

(1) QL-1 Stations 0+000 to 41+000 (Section 1)

Contract for highway rehabilitation had been awarded to the contractor Phuong Nam. Notice to proceed was withheld since Highway QL-1, north of Saigon, was closed by interdiction of the highway in Binh Tuy Province, south of the project site.

(2) QL-1 Stations 52+300 to 102+750 (Sections III and IV)

Bid openings were held on February 14 and 25 respectively, and an award of contract to the contractor CIDEC had been recommended for both sections. However, no awards were made due to lack of security in the project area.

b. Bridges

(1) Song Van Bridge. Contract for construction awarded to contractor Pham Thi Duu. Notice to Proceed was issued on 4 March 1975. Work was suspended on 3 April 1975, by order of H. L. Sultan, Contracting Officer. An inventory of materials on hand and work completed to date of suspension were finalized by agreement between Mr. Beery, SPA Resident Engineer; Mr. Tibor Nagy, Acting COR and Deputy Chief ETA/HB, and the contractor. The contractor was instructed to process an invoice for final payment. Data supporting these actions were on file at USAID/ADCS/VN. SPA copies could not be evacuated from Vietnam.

(2) Bong Son Bridge. A contract for construction was awarded to the contractor Le Thi Mai. Notice to Proceed was issued on 26 March 1975.

The project site became inaccessible, subsequent to that date, and the contractor was not able to accomplish any significant mobilization. An equitable settlement was being negotiated with the contractor, but could not be concluded prior to evacuation.

- (3) Ben Ganh and Dap Da Bridges. Contracts for construction were awarded to the Contractor Mai Ha. Notice to Proceed had not been issued due to lack of security at the project sites.

V. PERSONNEL

- a. Local. The following summary of local personnel disposition indicates the phasing out of SPA employees, prior to and following receipt of evacuation orders and notice of partial termination. All local personnel were terminated in accordance with the provisions of Vietnamese Labor Law. For security reasons employee names have been omitted.

VII. FINAL VOUCHER

Separate U.S. Dollar and Piaster vouchers have been submitted for payment thru the period ending 11 April 1975. Concurrently, with this Final Report, there are being separately submitted U.S. Dollar and Piaster vouchers in the total combined amount of US\$72,036.29 which covers all outstanding costs incurred in effecting evacuation, demobilization of U.S. and Local Employees, and final close out of services under Contract USAID-730-3619. Reimbursable costs covered by the Final Vouchers are also included in the summary of total expenditures, as outlined in Article VI hereof. Also included with this Final Voucher is a reconciliation of Piaster Bank Accounts and an account covering return of a

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37,000,000 piaster advance payment made by USAID during the early mobilization stages of Contract USAID-730-3619.

VIII. DISPOSITION OF RECORDS

The requirement to effect a hasty evacuation, combined with imposed weight limitations on hand carried luggage, precluded the evacuation of all essential personnel and accounting records. Accordingly, a selected portion of the accounting and personnel records were hand carried to Saigon and the balance manifested at Air America; Nha Trang, for later shipment by air freight. Reports indicate that Air America freight warehouses, Nha Trang, were subsequently destroyed. It must be assumed that the manifested records have been lost. The hand carried records were subsequently evacuated to Bangkok, via Clark Field and Guam. The cost of transporting these records, by employee courier, is included in the Final Voucher. Other records, drawings and related engineering data filed at 70 Duy Tan and Ru Ri Laboratory were jointly screened, on 31 March and 1 April 1975, by the SPA Project Manager and Mr. Tibor Nagy, Deputy Chief ETA/HB. Sensitive files were destroyed, by direction of Mr. Nagy. Non-sensitive files were left on the premises at 70 Duy Tan. Similarly, non-sensitive files were left in the VHA Laboratory at Ru Ri. A limited file of correspondence, reports, personnel and accounting records have been maintained in the SPA Regional Office, Bangkok and at the Home Offices in

St. Louis, Missouri. These records will be maintained for a period of time, in accordance with applicable provisions of Contract USAID-730-3619.

IX. PROPERTY LOSSES

All property and equipment in the custody of SPA and being used in the performance of work was, with the exception of a leased Xerox machine, transferred to VHA, as described in Article II of this report prior to evacuation. The Xerox machine, leased with approval of the COR/Nha Trang for use under the contract, could not be evacuated and returned to the Lessor. Terms of the Lease Agreement provides for Lessee purchase of the machine, in the event it could not be returned due to circumstances beyond the control of the Lessee. This purchase was regularized by a confirming USAID approval of the Lease Agreement, per copy attached as EXHIBIT V.

X. PERSONAL EFFECTS AND HOUSEHOLD GOODS

The hasty evacuation and weight limitations imposed on hand carried luggage precluded the evacuation of essentially all personal effects and household goods belonging to the SPA expatriate employees. This property was physically located, in the homes of the respective employees, or in the employee's place of work, at the time of evacuation. Detailed inventories of personal effects and household goods had been prepared by each

employee and maintained in a secure place, in accordance with evacuation instructions issued by COGEN II. Complete inventories and an itemized tabulation of replacement costs are being submitted under separate covering letter, copy attached as EXHIBIT VI, for examination and appropriate settlement with the individuals concerned.

XI. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Throughout the period of time we've been privileged to work on Contract USAID-730-3619, a thoroughly professional, but cordial, association has prevailed with the USAID Mission in Vietnam, CONGEN II, the Vietnam Highway Authority and, in particular, the component Departments, Sections and Branches of USAID and VHA, with whom we maintained direct and frequent contractual relations. We regret the circumstances which have caused a premature termination of work in the Nha Trang Highway District and take this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation for the objective guidance, understanding cooperation and timely assistance which were accorded SPA, and its employees, throughout the contract term by USAID, VHA, CONGEN II and, by each of their representatives with whom we maintained a direct contract association.

On Friday, 28 March, the office received a telephone call from the office of the Contracting Officer Representative (COR) at the Consulate General (Congen) that all US. personnel were to evacuate to Saigon immediately. E. Polasky and the writer left immediately for Congen to obtain particulars on this garbled telephone call.

At Congen, we could not find Mr. Allan Strom, COR, or receive any other information as it was nearing the noon lunch break. At the Pacific Club dining room, we met Norm and Elaine Hibbert with minimal baggage in hand, ready for departure for Saigon. After some moments, it was ascertained that Allan Strom had verbally instructed all highway personnel to evacuate immediately for Saigon.

Al Beery and I went back to Congen to attempt to see someone in authority. We met no one and returned to the Pacific Club to await further developments.

During lunch, Mr. Spears, the Consul General for Nha Trang, appeared in the dining room to make a brief statement that there was, in fact, no general evacuation order, that a plane which could not land at Da Nang had been diverted to Nha Trang, and that there was space

available for non-essential personnel to embark for Saigon. He emphatically stated that this was not a general evacuation order. He urged all non-essential personnel to leave for Saigon on this plane, or on any planes with space available which might be leaving for Saigon. His definition of non-essentials did not include SPA, according to Al Beery's and my interpretations.

Directly after lunch, we met Mike Van Zyl, DMJM, who had a note from Strom, hastily written during lunch by hand at Norm and Elaine's table, that DMJM, M&M and Dae Lim's U.S. and TCN personnel were to evacuate to Saigon. We asked Mike for a copy whenever he would get it copied. As the note made no mention of SPA, I returned to the office to continue work.

Perhaps one hour later, we received a radio call from Tibor Nagy, Deputy Chief HB/ETA in Saigon, requesting that Strom be located and called to the radio. While awaiting for Strom, Tibor asked for information of what was transpiring since Van Zyl had called Leroy Purifoy, Chief HB/ETA, by telephone to inform him that Strom had instructed DMJM and Dae Lim to evacuate to Saigon. I confirmed that Strom had scrawled such a note and that SPA was ignoring it and his verbal instructions until we had a more substantial, firm directive as we considered SPA's operation essential.

After learning that Strom had boarded the plane directly after lunch, Mr. Tibor Nagy was advised by radio that Strom was enroute to Saigon. Mr. Nagy order me to go to the Consul General to get confirmation,

in writing, that an evacuation order was in effect.

At Congen it was impossible to see Mr. Spears. Norman Hibbert, who accompanied me, suggested seeing Mr. Peter Brownback, Acting Director RRO. Mike Van Zyl also appeared. Peter took Mike and I in to see Mr. Philip Cook, Deputy Consul General for Administration. Mr. Cook confirmed the evacuation order and gave us a handwritten note addressed to Mr. Purifoy that Congen had ordered all US and TCN Highway Branch personnel out at once. A copy of this note is attached. Since I did not know who Mr. Cook was at that time, I was still skeptical. The information was passed on to Mr. Nagy in Saigon.

After some thought and talk with Al Beery, I tentatively decided that Norm and Elaine probably should leave (because of Elaine) and that Mr. Gil Rivero's check-writing capability had to remain, preferably in Saigon. Al and I decided that we would stay unless the Consul General directed otherwise. In that case, I would leave and he would remain. (Since that time I learned that Al was part of the Congen Evacuation Team). Al said he would make an appointment to see the "man" on Saturday morning to get exactly what was requested by Mr. T. Nagy in Saigon.

On Saturday morning, Al Beery returned to the office with a letter from Mr. Spears, the Consul General, authorizing the termination of highway activities in order to effect the evacuation orders he had given our staff. A copy is attached. On that day, Mr. Gil Rivero and I departed for Saigon, each with the specified baggage of 44 pounds in

hand as directed by Mr. Martin, an Air America official working in Congen under the direction of Mr. Ira Carr.

On Sunday, 30 March, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hibbert and Mr. E. A. Polasky, outgoing Project Manager, were evacuated to Saigon. Mr. Al Beery later followed on the last plane out on Tuesday, 1 April. The Consul General and his immediate staff were evacuated, amidst riots around the compound, late Tuesday afternoon.

On 3 April, I visited the office of Mr. Glenwood Roane, Contracting Officer, with a letter on procedures for effecting demobilization and termination of U.S. employees, copy attached. I had already read TAMS and M&M's letters on Partial Termination and had been advised by Mr. Tibor Nagy and Mr. Ralph Barnett, COR in charge of Contract Terminations, that we would also receive the same letter shortly.

Mr. Herbert Sultan, who acts as Contracting Officer in Mr. Roane's absence, Mr. Ray Potocki and Mr. Kelly were in agreement with the substance of our letter request, and it appeared that Mr. Sultan was ready to sign, indicating concurrence. While the final points were being clarified, Mr. Roane returned, relieved Mr. Sultan of his acting capacity, and indicated in no uncertain terms that he would not sign concurrence as this was contrary to instructions given to him ordering immediate termination of all U.S. employees, excepting one, and their hasty evacuation thereafter. He directed me to Room 601 where I was to receive the letter for Notice of Partial Termination. There I received the letter, a copy of which is attached.

April 7, 1975

On meeting with Ed Polasky later in the day, we agreed that it would be difficult and time consuming to terminate in Saigon. Ed booked reservations for all U.S. personnel on the first space available for Bangkok (Sunday), purchasing R/T tickets for all personnel and dependents. Mr. & Mrs. Al Beery would remain behind, Al as our representative and Mrs. Beery because of passport difficulties. They were supplied with open R/T tickets to Bangkok. (R/T tickets were thought to be necessary because most personnel were not properly visaed for entry into Thailand.) As this is the first leg on the trip back to the States, increased costs, if any, are thought to be negligible.

On Sunday, 6 April, on two separate airlines, Polasky, Rivero, Nagy and Mr. & Mrs. Hibbert left Saigon and arrived in Bangkok to begin demobilization.

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 23 "Title to and Care of Property" paragraph (c), notice is herewith given of a happening in Nha Trang which necessitated a rapid transfer of property from our control to the VHA, Nha Trang.

This happening was an evacuation order issued by the Consul General Nha Trang, copies attached.

The transfer of property was effected on 31 March 1975, with the very able assistance of Mr. Tibor Nagy, Deputy Chief; Highway Branch/ETA.

All furnishings, equipment and vehicles under our control and shown on the attached inventories were physically transferred, except as follows:

- a. Hewlett Packard Programmable Computer, Model 9810A Serial AR# 1128A 05361. Currently in Bangkok for repair.
- b. Ford Sedan VO-4345/mobile radio. Left in parking lot CONGEN II. VHA informed and requested to remove vehicle.

- c. Four Pickups (2 Dodge and 2 Chevrolet) delivered to VHA Phan Rang by Mr. Lac, SPA General Engineer.
- d. Three radios (2 mobile and 1 base station). Shipped to USAID Saigon by order of Mr. Leroy Purifoy, Chief; Highway Branch/ETA.
- e. Monroe Calculator, Model 1310 - In SPA custody Saigon.
- f. Two laboratory Hot Plates (Local Purchase). Missing from Soils Laboratory.
- g. Two used level rods (VHA) and two new 30 meter Lufkin chains (dollar purchase) Model 05100 M. Left with Morrison - Maierle. See letter attached to Survey Equipment Inventory.
- h. Miscellaneous small items as noted on Survey Equipment Inventory.

As last seen, all property transferred to the VHA was in good serviceable condition, as a result of an effective maintenance and repair program which was strictly enforced during the period of our vested custody and control of this property.

All laboratory equipment was physically present in the VHA laboratory, Ru Ree at the time of property transfer. The inventory of laboratory equipment is also located in the laboratory files, but could not be recovered prior to evacuation.

Inasmuch as we have complied with the provisions of Article 23 of the subject contract, with respect to disposition of property under our control, it is herewith stated that, except as otherwise noted, we no longer have in our custody any property, either furnished or purchased, for our use in providing services required by the subject contract.

Property still in our custody, either for repair or use in closing out the contract services will be disposed of in accordance with USAID/ETA instructions when the requirement for use no longer exists.





EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT made and entered into at Saigon, Vietnam, this 20 day of SEPTEMBER, 19 73, by and between SVERDRUP & PARCEL AND ASSOCIATES, INC., hereinafter called the "Company" and [REDACTED] hereinafter called the "Employee", WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Company has been engaged to perform engineering work in Vietnam, and desires to retain the services of the Employee for said work:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and the mutual covenants, agreements and conditions hereinafter contained, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

1. Employment Subject to Engineering Contract

The Company employs the Employee to perform services within the Company's classification reflected in APPENDIX I, which is attached to and made a part hereof, in connection with engineering work to be performed by the Company under its engineering contract or contracts for work in Vietnam, and said employment is in all respects subject to the provisions of said engineering contract or contracts and the reasonable requirements and interpretations thereof. Said employment shall commence on 29 September, 1973 as stated in Company letter dated September 24 1973 subject: Confirmation of Employment, copy attached.

2. Term of Employment

(a) The term of this Employment Agreement shall be the period during which the Company desires to retain the services of the Employee in connection with its work in Vietnam. The Employee may terminate his employment hereunder by giving the Company written notice specifying the date on which he desires to terminate his employment, provided said date of termination shall not be less than one hundred and twenty (120) days following date of delivery of such notice to the Company's Project Manager in Vietnam.

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- (b) If the Company's work in which the Employee is engaged is reduced or suspended, or if such work or any part thereof is completed or terminated, in consequence of which, in the judgement of the Company, the services of the Employee no longer are required, this Agreement may be terminated on 30 days notice by the Company and in that event, all rights and obligations under this Agreement automatically shall terminate and cease, except that the Company shall pay the Employee such benefits as have accrued to him prior to such termination and shall provide the Employee with return transportation and travel expense as provided in Section 4 to his point of origin and pay his salary while so returning.

3. Salary Payments and Other Compensation

- (a) The Employee is employed at the annual salary rate stated on APPENDIX I payable by United States Dollar check or United States currency, or by mutual agreement its monetary equivalent.
- (b) The Employee shall work such hours and shifts as may be required by the Company and any days off shall be designated by the Company from time to time. The work week shall consist of a minimum of 48 hours, and no compensation will be paid for hours worked in excess of 48 hours per week. Holidays designated by the Company will be observed by personnel in Vietnam. Payment to and acceptance of the herein stated gross salary by the Employee shall constitute a full release to the Company.
- (c) Employee will be entitled to vacation, sick leave and total temporary disability in accordance with established Company policy, a copy of which is attached to and made a part of this Agreement as APPENDIX II.
- (d) If the Employee is permanently stationed in one location by the Company and is not provided quarters by the Company, he will be reimbursed by the Company in lieu of housing at the rates prescribed from time to time by USAID/VN.

If the Employee is in travel status in Vietnam, he will be reimbursed for reasonable actual expenses incurred, in accordance with the travel regulations prescribed by USAID/VN.

4. Transportation and Travel Expense

(a) Transportation

Except as provided in Section 8 hereof, the Company shall provide transportation for actual travel from the point of origin to

the job site, and, upon compliance with the provisions of Section 2 (b) hereof, or upon medical release, as provided in Section 5 (a) hereof, actual return to the point of origin. Transportation shall be by such method, class, schedule, and routes as the Company shall designate or approve. Should the Company authorize the Employee to furnish any part of his transportation, reimbursement therefore will be made to the extent authorized upon presentation by the Employee of such evidence of expenditure as the Company may require, and evidence that U.S. Air Lines were used for expenditures to be reimbursed by the Company.

(b) Moving Allowance

The Company shall pay to the Employee a lump sum of Seven hundred and fifty (\$750.00) U.S. Dollars for storage and/or shipment of household effect after the Employee has been gainfully employed under this Agreement for a period of more than one year but less than two years. A similar lump sum payment of like amount will be made to the Employee after two years of gainful employment under this Agreement. The Employee will be responsible for all shipping arrangements and there will be no further liability on the Company should actual shipping costs exceed the above allowances. All shipping to be reimbursed by the Company shall be on U.S. flag vessels or Air Lines.

(c) Per Diem

While in actual transit by air to Vietnam and from Vietnam, if entitled thereto, the Company will pay travel subsistence expenses actually incurred but not to exceed at the rates of twenty dollars (\$20) for each day during which the Employee is in travel status, twelve dollars (\$12) per diem for members of Employee's family who are eleven (11) years of age and over. No expenses will be paid during stopovers or deviations resulting from the Employee's voluntary act or disregard of the Company's instructions.

- (d) If the Company consents in writing, the Employee may have his wife accompany or join him. Transportation shall be paid by the Company for such dependent travel together with approved per diem applicable to families. Return transportation for the Employee's family to his point of origin together with per diem applicable to families shall be paid by the Company provided further the Employee has not forfeited his right under this Agreement to his own return transportation. It is agreed that the Company is not and shall not in any way be responsible for any member of said family except as herein specifically provided.

5. Disability or Death Due to Bodily Injury or Occupational Disease

(a) If the Employee shall become incapacitated by disease or accident, not due to his willful misconduct, to a degree which, in the judgment of a doctor of medicine selected by the Company, will prejudice his work under this Agreement, the Employee will be returned to his point of origin. In that event, salary during travel and per diem provisions hereof shall remain applicable until the Employee's return by the most expeditious air route to the point of origin, or, if the Employee does not proceed to the point of origin, until he is returned to a point in the continental United States not more distant than the point of origin; provided, however, the Employee shall not be paid any salary or allowances for any time which he may spend for medical treatment or hospitalization in Vietnam or the United States or in any other country while returning to the point of origin. Upon cessation of salary, employment shall automatically terminate.

(b) The Company will undertake to provide insurance, subject to certain limitations and exclusions, to cover the death of the Employee from injury caused by accident occurring outside the continental limits of the United States during the term of his employment, in the principal sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00).

6. Rights and Remedies for Bodily Injury or Illness

It is agreed that Employee's rights and remedies under the Company's established sick leave and temporary total disability policy, the accidental death insurance and applicable workmen's compensation laws are in lieu of all other rights and remedies of the Employee for recovery of damages for bodily injury or illness and Employee waives all other rights and remedies to recover from the Company for bodily injury or illness under the laws of any jurisdiction.

7. Payments During Internment

(a) The Employee, in entering into this Agreement with the Company, recognizes that Vietnam and the countries and waters in or over which he must travel are subject to possible invasion or otherwise to be involved in war, rebellion or civil strife, and the Employee and his family shall have no claim against the Company because of the existence or happening of any of these hazards or the consequences thereof.

(b) The Employee shall not receive any salary or other payments for any period or periods during which he shall be prevented from performing or be unable to perform his duties because of:

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- (1) incarceration for any offense;
 - (2) his capture or internment by any country or government or by any hostile forces, except as provided below.
- (e) If during the term of this Agreement, the Employee shall be prevented from or unable to perform his duties hereunder because of internment as mentioned in paragraph 7 (b) (2) above, the Company shall pay to the Employee's Allottee each 4 weeks an amount equal to the gross salary rate hereinabove stated during the period of such internment, not, however, to exceed thirty-nine (39) pay periods from the date of the beginning of said internment, which payments shall be in lieu and/or discharge of any and all other obligations of the Company under this Agreement. Internment, as that term is used herein, shall be deemed to mean an Employee who:
- (1) is found to be missing from his place of employment, whether or not such person then actually was engaged in the course of his employment, under circumstances supporting an inference that his absence is due to the action of a government other than that of the United States;
 - (2) is known to have been taken by an enemy as a prisoner or hostage;
 - (3) is unable to leave country in which he is employed due to action of a government other than that of the United States of America.

8. Termination of Employment

If, prior to the completion of twenty (20) months employment under this Agreement, the Employee quits or is discharged for cause, all salary, travel allowance and other payments and compensation shall cease as of the time of quitting or discharge, and the Employee shall thereafter be liable for and shall pay his own costs of living and his own return transportation costs and expense, and similar expenses of his family, if any, and no further obligation shall exist on the part of the Company to the Employee, provided that Company may deduct from the final amount due from it to Employee the cost of return transportation for Employee and his family and apply such amount for that purpose.

9. Claims

The Employee agrees that he will, within thirty (30) days after any claim exists (other than a claim for Workmen's Compensation or Defense Base Act benefits) arising out of or in connection with this Agreement and the employment provided for herein, give written notice to

the Company of such claim, setting forth in detail the facts in relation thereto and the basis for such claim; and that he will not institute any suite or action against the Company in any court or tribunal in any jurisdiction based on any such claim prior to six (6) months after the filing of the written notice of claim hereinabove provided for, nor later than two (2) years after such filing. Any action or suit on any such claim shall not include any item or matter not specifically mentioned in the proof of claim above provided. It is agreed that in any such action or suit, proof by the Employee of his compliance with the provisions of this Section shall be a condition precedent to any recovery under this Employment Agreement.

10. Disposition of Employee's Remains and Personal Effects

In the event of the death of the Employee while outside the continental limits of the United States during the term of this Agreement, the Employee hereby authorizes the Company to have his remains transported with his personal effects to the point of origin, if feasible and if so desired by the Person To Be Notified in Case of Emergency as specified in APPENDIX I; otherwise, the Employee hereby authorizes the Company to make appropriate disposition, as shall be deemed best by it under the prevailing circumstances.

11. Final Settlement

On termination of this Employment Agreement and payment to the Employee of all amounts due him hereunder, the Employee shall execute and deliver to the Company upon a form prepared by it, a receipt for said sums and a release of all claims, except such unsettled claims as may have been submitted pursuant to the provisions of Section 9 hereof. It is understood that in preparing the final record of employment on termination, the Employee shall submit to such physical examinations, both at the job site and after his return to his point of origin, as the Company may deem necessary for the preparation of such record.

12. Law Applicable

It is understood and agreed between Company and Employee that the terms of this Agreement shall be constructed according to the laws of Missouri.

1. On 23 September 1974, a Xerox machine was acquired from the Fuji Xerox Corp. Ltd., in accordance with terms and provisions of a standard form of Lease Agreement, after prior approval of James B. Cole, then COR Nha Trang. A copy of a memorandum confirming James B. Cole's approval of this transaction is attached.

2. The Lease Agreement, copy attached, provided for rental of the machine at the rate of \$0.47 per day plus a minimum monthly use charge of \$100.00.

3. The Lease Agreement also required the Lessee (SPA) to purchase the machine at a cost of \$2,800.00, in the event that, for reasons beyond control of the Lessee, the machine could not be returned to the Lessor.







2. The Renter agrees to pay a basic monthly rental of US\$14 per machine.



The evacuation became official on the morning of 29 March and was concluded on 1 April with the airlifting out of the Consul General and the last of his party by helicopter amidst severe civil disorder. No packed baggage was lifted out as evacuation of personnel took first priority. Shortly after final evacuation, the city of Nha Trang was occupied by hostile forces. There appears reason to believe that belongings left behind as hereinlisted are now irrecoverable.

MEMORANDUM

On Friday, 28 March, the office received a telephone call from the office of the Contracting Officer Representative (COR) at the Consulate General (Congen) that all US. personnel were to evacuate to Saigon immediately. E. Polasky and the writer left immediately for Congen to obtain particulars on this garbled telephone call.

At Congen, we could not find Mr. Allan Strom, COR, or receive any other information as it was nearing the noon lunch break. At the Pacific Club dining room, we met Norm and Elaine Hibbert with minimal baggage in hand, ready for departure for Saigon. After some moments, it was ascertained that Allan Strom had verbally instructed all highway personnel to evacuate immediately for Saigon.

Al Beery and I went back to Congen to attempt to see someone in authority. We met no one and returned to the Pacific Club to await further developments.

During lunch, Mr. Spears, the Consul General for Nha Trang, appeared in the dining room to make a brief statement that there was, in fact, no general evacuation order, that a plane which could not land at Da Nang had been diverted to Nha Trang, and that there was space

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available for non-essential personnel to embark for Saigon. He emphatically stated that this was not a general evacuation order. He urged all non-essential personnel to leave for Saigon on this plane, or on any planes with space available which might be leaving for Saigon. His definition of non-essentials did not include SPA, according to Al Beery's and my interpretations.

Directly after lunch, we met Mike Van Zyl, DMJM, who had a note from Strom, hastily written during lunch by hand at Norm and Elaine's table, that DMJM, M&M and Dae Lim's U.S. and TCN personnel were to evacuate to Saigon. We asked Mike for a copy whenever he would get it copied. As the note made no mention of SPA, I returned to the office to continue work.

Perhaps one hour later, we received a radio call from Tibor Nagy, Deputy Chief HB/ETA in Saigon, requesting that Strom be located and called to the radio. While awaiting for Strom, Tibor asked for information of what was transpiring since Van Zyl had called Leroy Purifoy, Chief HB/ETA, by telephone to inform him that Strom had instructed DMJM and Dae Lim to evacuate to Saigon. I confirmed that Strom had scrawled such a note and that SPA was ignoring it and his verbal instructions until we had a more substantial, firm directive as we considered SPA's operation essential.

After learning that Strom had boarded the plane directly after lunch, Mr. Tibor Nagy was advised by radio that Strom was enroute to Saigon. Mr. Nagy order me to go to the Consul General to get confirmation.

in writing, that an evacuation order was in effect.

At Congen it was impossible to see Mr. Spears. Norman Hibbert, who accompanied me, suggested seeing Mr. Peter Brownback, Acting Director RRO. Mike Van Zyl also appeared. Peter took Mike and I in to see Mr. Philip Cook, Deputy Consul General for Administration. Mr. Cook confirmed the evacuation order and gave us a handwritten note addressed to Mr. Purifoy that Congen had ordered all US and TCN Highway Branch personnel out at once. A copy of this note is attached. Since I did not know who Mr. Cook was at that time, I was still skeptical. The information was passed on to Mr. Nagy in Saigon.

After some thought and talk with Al Beery, I tentatively decided that Norm and Elaine probably should leave (because of Elaine) and that Mr. Gil Rivero's check-writing capability had to remain, preferably in Saigon. Al and I decided that we would stay unless the Consul General directed otherwise. In that case, I would leave and he would remain. (Since that time I learned that Al was part of the Congen Evacuation Team). Al said he would make an appointment to see the "man" on Saturday morning to get exactly what was requested by Mr. T. Nagy in Saigon.

On Saturday morning, Al Beery returned to the office with a letter from Mr. Spears, the Consul General, authorizing the termination of highway activities in order to effect the evacuation orders he had given our staff. A copy is attached. On that day, Mr. Gil Rivero and I departed for Saigon, each with the specified baggage of 44 pounds in

hand as directed by Mr. Martin, an Air America official working in Congen under the direction of Mr. Ira Carr.

On Sunday, 30 March, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hibbert and Mr. E. A. Polasky, outgoing Project Manager, were evacuated to Saigon. Mr. Al Beery later followed on the last plane out on Tuesday, 1 April. The Consul General and his immediate staff were evacuated, amidst riots around the compound, late Tuesday afternoon.

On 3 April, I visited the office of Mr. Glenwood Roane, Contracting Officer, with a letter on procedures for effecting demobilization and termination of U.S. employees, copy attached. I had already read TAMS and M&M's letters on Partial Termination and had been advised by Mr. Tibor Nagy and Mr. Ralph Barnett, COR in charge of Contract Terminations, that we would also receive the same letter shortly.

Mr. Herbert Sultan, who acts as Contracting Officer in Mr. Roane's absence, Mr. Ray Potocki and Mr. Kelly were in agreement with the substance of our letter request, and it appeared that Mr. Sultan was ready to sign, indicating concurrence. While the final points were being clarified, Mr. Roane returned, relieved Mr. Sultan of his acting capacity, and indicated in no uncertain terms that he would not sign concurrence as this was contrary to instructions given to him ordering immediate termination of all U.S. employees, excepting one, and their hasty evacuation thereafter. He directed me to Room 601 where I was to receive the letter for Notice of Partial Termination. There I received the letter, a copy of which is attached.

Memorandum

April 7, 1975

On meeting with Ed Polasky later in the day, we agreed that it would be difficult and time consuming to terminate in Saigon. Ed booked reservations for all U.S. personnel on the first space available for Bangkok (Sunday), purchasing R/T tickets for all personnel and dependents. Mr. & Mrs. Al Beery would remain behind, Al as our representative and Mrs. Beery because of passport difficulties. They were supplied with open R/T tickets to Bangkok. (R/T tickets were thought to be necessary because most personnel were not properly visaed for entry into Thailand.) As this is the first leg on the trip back to the States, increased costs, if any, are thought to be negligible.

On Sunday, 6 April, on two separate airlines, Polasky, Rivero, Nagy and Mr. & Mrs. Hibbert left Saigon and arrived in Bangkok to begin demobilization.

At the time of this loss I was employed by Sverdrup & Parcel and Associates, Inc. of St. Louis, Mo., working under USAID Contract AID 730-3619 in Nha Trang, S. Vietnam. On Friday, March 28, 1975, because of the worsening military situation in S. Vietnam and the very great possibility of civil disorder, the Consul General at Nha Trang ordered that all non-essential personnel move immediately to Saigon. All personnel connected with the highway program were considered to be non-essential at this time, since was impossible to do any highway work. I made an effort to pack many of my personal effects and books and household goods and ship them out, but with no success. On March 29, I left Nha Trang for Saigon by air with only the baggage I was able to carry. By this time a general evacuation of Americans was underway, with all personnel leaving as soon as possible. By April 1, all American personnel, including the Consul General, had been evacuated. All of my effects, as listed in this claim, were left behind. There appears to be no possibility that I could return to Nha Trang, or that any of my effects will be recovered.

On 6 April I was evacuated from Saigon to Bangkok in the first stage of my return to the United States.

Copies of the orders directing my evacuation are attached.

All personnel connected with the highway program were considered to be non-essential at this time, since was impossible to do any highway work. I made an effort to pack many of my personal effects and books and household goods and ship them out, but with no success. On March 29, I left Nha Trang for Saigon by air with only the baggage I was able to carry. By this time a general evacuation of Americans was underway, with all personnel leaving as soon as possible. By April 1, all American personnel, including the Consul General, had been evacuated. All of my effects, as listed in this claim, were left behind. There appears to be no possibility that I could return to Nha Trang, or that any of my effects will be recovered. On 6 April I was evacuated from Saigon to Bangkok in the first stage of my return to the United States.


