


This report describes the programs of 82 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Brazil with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 82 U.S. organizations included in the report, 36 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1978 totaling \$17,947,000. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Brazil. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of the relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) has been operated by the Council since 1955 with support from the U.S. Government, currently a grant from the Agency for International Development. All agencies that are Council members are noted by a +.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON VOLUNTARY FOREIGN AID was established in 1946 to serve as a focal point for relations between the U.S. Government and U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. It is composed of private citizens who serve without compensation. The Committee's advisory responsibilities are to provide information and advice to A.I.D. and other U.S. Government agencies relating to areas of foreign assistance in which the Government and private and voluntary organizations interact, to provide assistance to the community of private and voluntary organizations working abroad relative to problems and issues in their relations with A.I.D. and other Federal agencies and to foster public interest in voluntary foreign aid and the activities of the private and voluntary organizations.

AITEC is involved in a small business development program in the cities of Recife and Salvador. The main goal of the program below is to increase employment opportunities in slum areas.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: In cooperation with Uniao Nordestina de Assistencia a Pequenas Organizacoes (UNO), provides credit from local banks and technical assistance (in bookkeeping, management, finance, marketing, etc.) to small businesses with less than 10 employees and less than \$100,000 in annual sales. Also, is testing a program which will focus on equity investment rather than credit, using money from Brazilian and international sources, and will provide technical assistance to businesses selected for participation in the program.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Works through local Baptist College to assist agricultural and food production programs. Provided funds for U.S. volunteer team to conduct feasibility study, survey and design for reconstruction of dam to provide water for vegetable farming activity. Anticipated date of construction is July 1979. Provided funds for two U.S. veterinarians to travel to inspect and work with animals at the college, in a livestock improvement program which involved special drugs used in artificial insemination of cows.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Assists the Evangelical Committee for Rehabilitation of Leprosy Patients (CERPHA) with leprosy control programs and public health education. Provides consultation, special services, physical therapy, special footwear and prosthetics, and funding for hospitals, clinics and leprosaria. Trains doctors

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(especially in reconstructive surgery), nurses, auxiliaries, physical therapists, and makers of special footwear and prosthetics. Much of the training is done at Lauro de Souza Lima Hospital, Bauru.

SOCIAL WELFARE: Supports social workers who are serving leprosy patients. ECONOMIC & DEVELOPMENT PLANNING: In FY 1976 made a \$22,000 grant to the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul for strengthening of graduate training and research in the rural social sciences, a \$210,000 grant to the Federal University of Vicosa for strengthening of graduate programs in agricultural economics, and a \$120,000 grant to the University of Sao Paulo for development of graduate training and research in the rural social sciences.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: In the Amazon region and northern Mato Grosso, conducts a pasture and livestock production project with support from SUDAM (Superintendencia do Desenvolvimento da Amazonia) and from private ranching groups. This program involves extensive field testing of grasses and legumes with and without fertilizer variables, particularly in areas which were originally cleared from forest and seeded to pastures. These areas have declined substantially in productivity, and methods are being developed to recuperate the areas on an economically viable basis. Good response has been obtained from phosphorus applications to pastures seeded to grasses and legumes. New grasses and legumes have been introduced and field tested with very promising results. Grazing trials for animal grains are also conducted in this program.

Environmental improvement of roadside areas through revegetation studies has been conducted with support from DNER (Departamento Nacional de Estradas de Rodagem) and from DERSA (Desenvolvimento Rodoviario S.A.). The objective of the DNER project is to revegetate the cuts and fills along the road from Manaus to Porto Velho in the Amazon. The DERSA roadside revegetation project is in the State of Sao Paulo. Soil samples have been analyzed, greenhouse studies made, and field plots established to determine the nutrient factors limiting the growth of grasses, legumes, and other vegetation. A large number of grasses and legumes have been field tested under the local environmental conditions to determine the rapidity of establishment and ground cover, their ability to control erosion, and their growth habits in terms of height, dry season resistance, persistence, and other factors. Revegetation projects have also been carried out in Manaus in cooperation with the Water and Sanitation Department.

A rice development project in the Amazon area has been underway for more than ten years. This project involved initial surveys of the area to determine the adaptability for growing rice, small plot studies of varieties, fertility requirements, pest control methods, and other cultural requirements as well as field testing of large-scale machinery and processing methods. Two crops per year are in production with good yield levels. A technical bulletin has been published on this project describing the sulphur deficiency which occurred after 2 to 4 crops. This deficiency can be corrected through the use of fertilizers which are sulphur carriers such as simple superphosphate which provides sufficient sulphur for the production of a rice crop.

A training and research farm has been operated at Matao in the State of Sao Paulo for more than 25 years. Short courses have been conducted for various government and private agencies on pastures, soils, crop production, and other subjects. At the IRI farm, a large collection of tropical grasses and legumes is maintained in the field and in a seed germplasm bank. Maintains collections of indigenous and introduced tropical grasses and legumes and evaluates this material to deter-

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mine its forage or roadside revegetation potential. Grass and legume seeds from this collection are provided on a commercial basis. In addition, feasibility studies have been conducted on crop, pasture and livestock production projects.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: In 1978, made a three-year grant of \$23,000 to provide program support costs for a clinic on the grounds of Instituto S.S. Trindade (Holy Trinity Institute), in rural Moreira. The Institute, an agency related to the Brazil District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, provides residential care for some 120 displaced children and 30 elderly persons. In addition, children from the local community attend the Institute's primary school. The clinic is designed to provide needed medical services to the Institute's residents and staff, and to families in the surrounding community. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Cooperates with the Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL) in the Amazon Region in a program with 13 primitive tribes, providing funds for transportation, educational expenses and materials, plus a revolving loan fund which enables SIL personnel to assist tribes with activities in food production, small commercial enterprises, provision of transportation facilities and health education and services.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Provides major support for personnel and operating expenses for an autonomous family planning clinic and family orientation center in Maua which is sponsored by Centro de Orientacao da Familia (COF). The clinic provides the only existing services in this industrial suburb of Sao Paulo. Nearly

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half the budget is raised by patients' fees. Plans are under way to relocate the clinic in improved facilities to allow for expansion of clientele and growth toward self-support.

Assists a program in Salvador, based in a maternity hospital serving low-income areas. The hospital is operated by the Red Cross Chapter of the State of Bahia. Supports sex education, maternal child health activities, and motivation for family planning. Nurse's assistants and volunteer first-aid workers are also trained for service in the city and social workers receive apprenticeship training.

In cooperation with Servico de Orientacao da Familia (SOF), supports a program in the low-income areas of Sao Paulo which provides complete family orientation services, including sex education for adults and children, family guidance, marital counseling, and contraceptive services and information. Seventy per cent of the operating expenses are now raised from patients' fees and local contributions. A new clinic building is under construction (funded by a foundation from the Netherlands).

Assists a new family planning clinic in Curitiba, patterned after the COF program in Maua, which provides family planning orientation and services. Emphasis is being placed on building into the plans the basis for total local support after the first two years of operation.

Assists a family planning program in the low-income areas of Victoria in cooperation with BEMFAM (Sociedade Civil de Bem Estar Familiar), the International Planned Parenthood Federation affiliate in Brazil. The program is attempting to solve two basic problems: the need for vocational training so that young people can find employment, and the need for channels through which family planning can become known and appreciated as a normal part of family life. Activities involve vocational training classes, youth clubs and mothers' clubs, in all of which family planning and motivation are provided as an integral part of this effort to exert a positive influence on public opinion regarding family planning.

FUTURE PLANS: Support of the program began in 1975 and will be phased out as of June 30, 1979.
