

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INTRODUCTION
The Objective of this
Directory and How to Use It

Men and women in rural development work instinctively feel the need for dialogue, for linkages and for partnerships. The nature of their work: its complexity and immensity, its isolation and frustrations - impel those engaged in fostering integral rural development to seek others who can share experiences and information on what-to-do and what-to-avoid, who can offer alternatives and resources absent in their efforts.

Back in 1974, a group of 130 men and women from 10 countries in Asia and the Pacific met in Thailand to explore ways of cooperation through the sharing of expertise and experiences. This group and its secretariat, CENDHRRRA: Centre for the Development of Human Resources in Rural Asia, by organizing country and Asian-level meetings have grown into a network which interacts with 500 persons and agencies.

This network represents a rich treasury of human resources placed at the service of the rural poor. There are community development workers who share the life of villagers; there are experts in irrigation, cooperatives, marketing, group farming. There are trainers of village leaders and practitioners of herbal medicine. Some are with government, many are with non-governmental organizations, others are church-related agencies.

The life blood of this network is communication - constant communication of experiences - critical communication of methods - frank communication of problems - practical communication of transferable results. . .

This directory: The CENDHRRRA Network of Development Partners is an attempt to facilitate this communication.

Who are listed in it? Mainly participants of the Development of Human Resources in Rural Asia Workshop (DHRRAW) 1974 and of the CENDHRRRA Integrated Rural Development (CIRD) workshops 1976 - 1978. Some new contacts have also been listed.

This first edition is not meant to be a comprehensive list of all participants and contacts of CENDHRRRA activities. The practicality of such a directory format is being tested and if proved to be useful, an updated and more comprehensive directory will be published.

How to use this directory. In the first section, persons are listed under their specialties. You can contact those whose expertise you are interested in by sending your letter either through the CENDHRRRA secretariat in Manila or through the National Committee of our partner in the country (see addresses in Section 4). Your letter will then be forwarded to the person concerned.

The reasons why we are requesting you to send your first letters either to the local national committee or to the CENDHRRRA secretariat are because (1) we can find out initially how useful this directory is and (2) to avoid lost mail since the addresses of individuals need frequent updating. Once the first letters are exchanged, then, you can continue communicating directly with the assurance of correct addresses.

In the second section are listed some of the development needs of our partners. If you feel you can be of some help to them, please write them and share your experiences or information which can be of benefit to them.

The third section gives a brief description of the background and work experiences of the persons named in this directory.

The fourth section lists the addresses of the CENDHRRRA secretariat and of the various national committees.

Dear partners and friends, we hope this directory will open doors of communication, cooperation and service for you in your country and among our neighbors.

We thank Carina Leviste for helping us prepare this directory.
