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Highlights of U. S. Voluntary Agencies' Activities

As of December 31, 1981 there were 156 private and voluntary agencies registered with the Agency for International Development. Through registration, these agencies are eligible to apply to participate in the overseas freight subsidy, Food for Peace, and the U. S. Government-owned excess property programs.

Total income received during this reporting period was \$1.8 billion. Private contributions (cash, supplies and equipment) totaled \$981 million. U. S. Government support in the form of grants, contracts, excess property, P.L. 480 donated food and overseas reimbursement for shipment of the agencies' own donated supplies totaled \$742 million.

In addition to participation in the overseas freight subsidy, Food for Peace, and the U. S. Government-owned excess property programs, a number of registered agencies received program support grants from A.I.D. These grants are designed to assist these agencies in their overseas development work that furthers the goals of the Foreign Assistance legislation. The agencies' self-help programs in developing countries include activities such as rural and agricultural development, housing, preventive health care, family planning, and non-formal and vocational education. They are also involved in refugee and migration activities. The work of these organizations is a valuable contribution and A.I.D. is seeking to expand its cooperation and support.

The private and voluntary agencies also provided emergency support in the form of food, clothing and medicine to victims of disasters in El Salvador, Algeria, Lebanon, Costa Rica, Djibouti, Gambia, Haiti, Indonesia, Mali, Upper Volta, Zambia and Greece.

Six registered voluntary agencies also helped feed 41 million people in 44 countries under the Food for Peace program. These programs were administered by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, CARE, Catholic Relief Services, Church World Service, Lutheran World Relief, and Seventh-Day Adventist World Service.

Who they are and what they do

The rules governing the registration of nongovernmental nonprofit agencies engaged in voluntary foreign aid are promulgated in Part 203, Chapter II, Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations. Such aid includes projects and services of development, relief, and rehabilitation to needy nationals and refugees in health, education, welfare, agriculture, industry, emigration, and resettlement. A Matching Grant is awarded to a PVO for that organization to carry out a clearly conceived, evaluable field-oriented program that takes place in a number of countries; is consistent with our legislative mandate, and supports a clearly-defined, delineated program. The multi-year grant is matching to the extent that A.I.D. will pay no more than 50% of the cost of the program.

Institutional Development Grants (IDGs). IDGs are awarded to a very limited number of organizations which received Development Program Grants (DPGs), to complete the work started by the DPGs where the previous performance justifies. These grants are being phased out by A.I.D.

Consortium Grants. A grant made to a group of PVOs with similar interests to allow them to exchange information, collaborate in programs, and distribute funds for grassroots projects. Limited category.

Operational Program Grants. A two or three year grant at least 25% of which is funded through non-A.I.D. sources, which supports projects that are initiated by the PVO, fully compatible with A.I.D.'s legislative mandate, congruent with A.I.D.'s overall program for the country in which it is to operate, and prepared in accordance with the relevant Bureaus' or USAID Missions' guidelines.

Institutional Support Grants (ISGs). ISGs are long term grants awarded to a few PVOs and cooperative development organizations with well-established programs to sustain their programs at an optimal level. In most cases these organizations provide a unique development program overseas, but for one reason or another, are unable to raise enough money from the private sector to enable A.I.D. to discontinue our broad support to their programs. A.I.D. is now converting most of these grants to Matching Grants.

Management Service Grants. A grant to an organization with particular competence in technical, program or management assistance (clearing-house, accounting assistance, and evaluation) that its colleague PVOs need. The grant allows it to provide that expertise at a very low cost to other PVOs. Limited category.

Other Grants. Particularly from the Science and Technology Bureau, but from some Policy and Planning Coordination offices as well, there are a number of grants to private and voluntary organizations to carry out particular technical programs in fields like family planning, health, energy, and the like. Typically, these grants are considerably more tightly controlled and managed by A.I.D. than some of the other categories noted above. Like many of A.I.D.'s grants to PVOs, they tend to last for a three-year period, and they vary significantly in size. In addition, through the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance, grants are provided to PVOs to carry out disaster relief and rehabilitation activities; and PVOs are among the grantees under the American Schools and Hospitals Abroad Program.

Cooperative Agreement. A funding arrangement first used by FVA in FY 1981, the Cooperative Agreement calls for A.I.D. to play a substantive role

in project design, and in decision making during the project's life, in partnership with the implementing PVO. Most often there is a degree of cost-sharing by the PVO under this arrangement, although it is usually less than in an OPG or Matching Grant.
