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This report describes the programs of 42 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of the Dominican Republic with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 42 U.S. organizations included in the report, 29 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1981 totaling \$10,419,965. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and materiel shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in the Dominican Republic. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, governments, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), maintains in its Bureau for Food for Peace and Voluntary Assistance a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. Operates the following programs in conjunction with the Dominican Development Foundation.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: In 1978 designed and assisted in the implementation of a program to improve basic administrative and planning skills of small farmers. Over 850 rural farmers have participated in group training sessions studying topics ranging from the preparation of budgets and financial statements to basic accounting and marketing.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: In 1981, started PISCES (Program for Investment in the Small Capital Economic Sector/Micro-Business Development Project) which assists very small, established businesses by providing loans up to \$3,000 and rudimentary management assistance. Also provides loans of up to \$300 to members of "solidarity groups", hawkers and vendors organized into credit groups of from five to eight members. The funds used by the programs are grants, and the program will cover its administrative and operational costs through loan repayment and interest by the fourth year of operation, assuming a very low default rate.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Provided a grant of \$184,450 for the year ending 11/30/81 to the Asociacion Dominicana Pro-- Bienestar de la Familia to initiate a service program in permanent female contraception in public and private health centers. Also gave a grant of \$36,769 for the year ending 2/28/82 to the same organization to support the performance of male procedures, to train physicians in the male voluntary surgical procedure and to conduct an information and education campaign. Provided a grant of \$39,985 for the year ending 7/31/81 to the Consejo Nacional de Poblacion y Familia (CONAPOFA) to renovate a repair and maintenance center which is funded by Johns Hopkins. Provided a grant of \$20,730 for the year ending 2/28/82 to support CONAPOFA's north coast female permanent contraception program and to perform contraceptive procedures. In addition, providing 30 minilaparotomy kits for use in rural programs.

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Provides low-cost housing for approximately 200 low-income families who live in sub-standard units in Palenque and nearby where housing was damaged by hurricanes. In FY 1982 potential beneficiaries will be surveyed, selected and organized into cooperative groups and work brigades for the manufacture of building blocks to initiate construction of the units. It is anticipated that approximately 1,000 persons will benefit from this project. Local housing cooperatives (FEDOCOOP) cooperate in this project.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Operates a project to strengthen and increase the efficiency of 25 existing and two new agricultural groups by introducing new income-generating approaches for increasing rural economic opportunities. Activities planned during CY 1982 include: inspection and technical visits, and completion of management, administration, cost control and marketing courses for young farmers and technicians from the Secretariat of Agriculture. Agricultural husbandry or agro-industrial projects in food production will be implemented by groups of young farmers, women's groups and young farmer associations. Loans will be made to participating groups in the form of materiel and equipment, with repayments utilized in a rotating fund which will be reinvested in new projects.

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MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Distributes PL 480 food commodities to approximately 100,000 pregnant women, nursing women and their under-five aged children at rural health centers and feeding posts and to 3,000 beneficiaries in hospitals, orphanages and special schools. Beneficiaries also receive basic health services, including vaccinations and dewormings, through the Secretariat for Public Health. CARE works with the Division of Nutrition of the Secretariat of Public Health and Social Assistance (SEPAS) on this project. Operates a university training course for X-ray technicians and provides training to residents and nurses in orthopedics and operating room nursing procedures. The program is based in Santiago in the X-ray department of the Hospital Jose Maria Cabral and Baez. In CY 1982, 24 students will be involved in the radiology training program. It is anticipated that orthopedic residents will also be trained under a newly-initiated scoliosis program. The Secretariat of Public Health and the University of Madre and Maestra work with CARE on this project. Distributes PL 480 food commodities in 550 preschool education centers in the southwest region of the country, in cooperation with the Secretariat of Education.

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EDUCATION: Fostering educational activities, including a network of groups working in popular education, information sharing with other organizations and support for projects which emphasize consciousness raising.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: In 1981 distributed approximately 214,500 pounds of donated clothing; freight shipments were paid for by the U.S. Government. In collaboration with the Catholic Medical Mission Board, made available 50,000 pounds of medicines in 1981. Through 12/80 provided \$2,860,000 in material aid in response to the damage inflicted by the hurricane. Worked with local groups in reconstruction and rehabilitation projects emphasizing agriculture and housing.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Emphasizes increased agricultural production of food and increased local control of the marketing system, with capital inputs for credit and/or technical training; encourages cooperative utilization and management of resources. Supports food-for-work projects such as feeder road construction, enabling farmers to have access to large towns; in 1980 48,000 workers participated in road building. Improving irrigation systems for Jimani and Beni, and conducting agricultural training courses throughout the country.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: In 1980 provided assistance for radio programs on health for Haitian migrants, for parasite projects in Bonao and for a leprosy control project. Cooperating with Caritas Dominicana on an applied nutrition program which began in 1972 in the Southwest Region and emphasizes the use of locally available foods and improved nutritional habits. In 1981 provided 14,867,000 pounds of Title II food for 240,343 workers and dependents enrolled in 1,051 projects through the food-for-work program.

PADF was instrumental in the formation of the Fundacion Dominicana Desarrollo (FUNDADOM), an indigenous, non-profit organization dedicated to the social and economic development of low-income Dominicans. Since that time, PADF has emphasized community self-help as an important component to the development process. FUNDADOM provides loans and technical assistance to farmers, small scale business people as well as producers of handicrafts. FUNDADOM is able to tap the funds and advisory services available from Solidarios (the Council of National Development Foundations) of which it is a member.
