

This report describes the programs of 66 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Haiti with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 66 U.S. organizations included in the report, 55 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1980 totaling \$23,987,894. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Haiti. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) has been operated by the Council since 1955 with support from the U.S. Government, currently a grant from the Agency for International Development. All agencies that are Council members are noted by a +.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. EDUCATION: Provides the major support for College Pratique, a primary and secondary school at Cap-Haitien, with an enrollment of about 1,350. Also provides financial assistance to approximately 100 local schools throughout Haiti.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Provides personnel support to an agricultural school and an experimental farm, a reforestation project, and a seed and plant distribution project. Special attention is being given to raising fast growing trees for fuel.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Provides personnel support to a self-help program of cottage industry and crafts with an outlet shop.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Staffs and operates Good Samaritan Hospital at Limbe, which has a 20-bed maternity ward, a 45-bed pediatric ward and a dispensary treating approximately 6,750 outpatients a month. Also staffs and operates St. Michel Clinic, St. Michel, with emphasis on public health and clinic care. Conducts a food distribution and feeding program through the hospital and schools.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Operates family planning clinics at Good Samaritan Hospital and St. Michel Hospital.

PERSONNEL: 17 U.S. including 2 doctors, 3 nurses, 1 laboratory technician, 3 teachers, 3 agriculturists; approximately 500 local including 380 teachers, 20 hospital workers.

EDUCATION: Operates elementary schools with additional courses for older girls in home economics in the following locations: La Porte with 165 students and five teachers, Ravine Alliance with 60 students and two teachers, Anneau with 50 students and two teachers, Cavaillon, with 80 students and three teachers. Also operates an adult literacy program in Les Cayes with eight students and one teacher with plans for additional literacy programs in the out-lying areas.

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MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Installed pump and cleaned out old well in La Porte which provides water for the area which previously did not have water available locally. Drilled well and installed pump on the north side of Les Cayes which will provide water for people in that area as well. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: In cooperation with Harmonisation de l'Action des Communautés Haitiennes (HACHO) operates a rural development program which includes beekeeping, seed distribution, establishment of nurseries, seedling outplantings, and family planning and nutrition education for 3,000 couples. Also constructing four adjacent irrigation projects in the Northwest Peninsula.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: In cooperation with HACHO operates a program to raise income and provide employment for 1,200 rural inhabitants, mainly women, through production and sale of local crafts including pottery, woven cotton, bamboo, sisal and palm leaf products. Provides training in small business and cooperative management, as well as design of new products, and the establishment of new production centers and raw material sites; emphasizes improved marketing and sales promotion techniques.

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MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: In cooperation with the Ministries of Education, Finance and Health, distributes PL 480 food commodities to 274,200 pre-school and school-aged children, pregnant and lactating women, institutionalized adults, and workers and their dependents engaged in food-for-work activities relating to food production and community improvement. Three supportive projects provide transportation, supplies, tools for food-for-work projects, and other training and evaluation needs to maintain and improve efficiency and effectiveness of feeding program operations. In cooperation with the Ministries of Health, Education and Agriculture, operates an integrated program which provides supplementary feeding, health services, training in nutrition and health education, gardening and home economics, as well as the construction and furnishing of CINEC (Community Integrated Nutrition and Education) centers. In cooperation with HACHO, is constructing three potable water systems.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Supports food-for-work programs which involve construction and repair of roads, construction of wells and irrigation canals, construction of community health centers, leadership training and other courses, and agricultural projects. Provided \$35,680 to IDEA (institut Diocesain d'Education des Adultes)

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for a project jointly financed by Oxfam and CRS which set up a leadership training school to foster community action in the northern section of the country. Provided \$189,874 to continue assistance to the Gros-Morne project encouraging the formation of farmer cooperatives, the introduction of technology, the formation of local service councils, and technical support for sanitation and preventive health practices in and near Gonaives. Provided \$287,500 to the Groupement Pilot Project involving a small number of rural families 20 kilometers from Gonaives. The project will include cooperatives, non-formal education, appropriate agricultural technology and sanitation. The project will attempt to develop a methodology that prepares individual farmers to participate in local development and to become self-sufficient. Provided \$2,000 for an economic planning center in the Pilate commune aimed at the social improvement of women. Provided \$39,000 to a comprehensive rural development project which will organize farmers in pilot communities, train animateurs in the area of sanitation, develop health centers and offer some credit.

EDUCATION: Provided \$5,500 for a school in the slums of Port-au-Prince.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: Distributed food obtained from the European Economic Community (EEC) valued at \$45,289. Provided the following assistance to hurricane victims: \$450,000 for feeding programs and crop production; \$20,183 for fishery equipment; \$4,758 for livestock; an EEC grant of \$426,387 for special purchases of blankets, building materials, clothing, tents, seed, fertilizer, rice and beans; and \$25,000 for housing.

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FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Supports two agricultural workers who are training local agricultural leaders, who in turn will demonstrate new methods to farmers in their villages. The focus of the program is on seed selection, grain storage, use of natural fertilizer and the improved preparation of the ground for planting.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Supports a team of three nurses who train local rural health workers to set up village clinics which feature preventive medicine and nutrition; currently there are five clinics. Workers are encouraged to capture natural springs to improve the purity of the water supply.

FUTURE PLANS: To set up another nine clinics.

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Constructed a clinic, primary school and feeding center in Port-au-Prince.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Provides financial assistance to the Aide aux Enfants program for preschool children in Port-au-Prince. The program includes clinical care and supplemental feeding for approximately 4,500 children per month.

EDUCATION: Operates 73 elementary schools with 114 school lunch programs.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: Provides funds in times of disaster such as hurricanes, and long-term aid for drought.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Assists in improving animal husbandry, providing improved poultry; drills wells on La Gonave Island to provide water for agriculture.

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INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Teaching skills in wood-working, sewing, tailoring, women's handicrafts, fiberglass production and training in marketing; assists in providing markets. In cooperation with Olivet Nazarene College (Kankakee, Illinois) researches new sources of fuel to replace scarce wood for charcoal.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operates two clinics; provides nutrition centers for training of mothers. A trained nutritionist brings a small number of mothers with malnourished children to a central location for four to six weeks where the ailing children are fed and given vitamins. The mothers are trained to get proper nutrition from common foods and an inexpensive protein supplement so that when they return home they can care for all of their children and teach their neighbors. The nutrition training centers then move to a new area. Provides a team of opticians for a two week period to provide glasses and some medical treatment on La Gonave.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Operates a soil and water resource project with six motivation agents ensuring active community participation in water projects. The communities prepare the sites and contribute local materials. The project provides potable water to island communities to improve irrigable farm land.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Supports a water development project which provides a population of 12,000 with its first piped water. In a year 14 wells were drilled for schools, churches, clinics and communities in rural areas; also funds a nutrition program with 65 centers on the mainland and 20 on La Gonave reaching 12,500 children.

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SOCIAL WELFARE: Under a \$268,970 grant from the U.S. Agency for International Development, in 1980 rations in both CWS maternal/child health and school feeding programs were increased and an adequate logistics system was established to serve as a link in the Haitian disaster preparedness network.

FUTURE PLANS: Hopes to further expand the nutrition program by building a new and larger warehouse/office complex.

EDUCATION: Provides support for a national school with 1,200 students from first through tenth grades; assistance includes vocational training in sewing, welding and shop work. Supports schools in Borel, Pierre Payen, Gilbert and Savion Tapion. Provided grants for 10 students to continue their education beyond high school and for one student to study in the United States.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Supports gardening and animal husbandry including rabbit and poultry projects. Provides training in the production of improved crops through use of better seed, crop rotation, use of fertilizer and irrigation. Supports agricultural youth clubs.
