


This report describes the programs of 38 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Pakistan with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 38 U.S. organizations included in the report, 27 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1980 totaling \$10,971,106. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Pakistan. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of the relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) has been operated by the Council since 1955 with support from the U.S. Government, currently a grant from the Agency for International Development. All agencies that are Council members are noted by a +.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. Provides grants to projects which are initiated locally by governmental or voluntary organizations; some of these programs, which were funded in fiscal year 1979, are described below.

COMMUNICATIONS: Provided \$9,455 to organize a system of portable "box libraries" of reading materials in Urdu for rural communities lacking bookshops or libraries. Through the Books for Asia Program provided \$23,763 to distribute English-language publications to libraries, educational institutions and government agencies.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Gave \$7,061 to provide the services of two specialists to assist women's organizations develop projects in health, nutrition and family planning. Provided \$23,646 to the All Pakistan Women's Association to instruct trainers, provide transportation and support the preparation of nutrition courses for mothers in community centers near Karachi, and to extend the program to rural women through community centers in other provinces.

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EDUCATION: Operates primary schools in Karachi and in the Sahiwal District. In Sahiwal dormitory arrangements are provided for approximately 350 girls who could not attend the school without such assistance. Also runs 30 adult literacy centers.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: Food, medicine and equipment are provided to needy individuals and for disaster and flood relief.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Provides managerial and technical assistance to small farmers to help increase the yield of their crops and utilize additional land through leveling, salinity control, demonstration and technical advice as well as fertilizer, seed, water and equipment loan schemes. The agricultural program is carried out through extension centers within Sahiwal District.

MEDICINE AND PUBLIC HEALTH: In Sahiwal, operates Nancy Fulwood Hospital, a 140-bed full service hospital emphasizing surgery with a fully accredited School of Nursing and Midwifery. The hospital program includes preventive medicine, immunization, tuberculosis control, well-baby and ante-natal services, and counseling. These services are carried out within the institutions as well as in local public health centers and village clinics.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Maintains a family planning center at Nancy Fulwood Hospital which provides supplies, counseling, family planning devices and surgical procedures.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Provided a grant of \$46,565 (for the year ending 1/31/81) to continue a female voluntary sterilization service and training program, and to conduct an information and education campaign at Lady Willingdon Hospital in Lahore. Provided a grant of \$21,739 (CY 1980) to establish a vasectomy and vasovasectomy service at Mayo Hospital in Lahore, and to conduct an extensive information and education

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program in Punjab Province for the promotion of male voluntary sterilization. Provided a grant of \$65,183 (for the year ending 9/30/80) to provide continued support to the Voluntary Sterilization Center in Lady Dufferin Hospital, Karachi; female voluntary sterilizations will be continued and a pilot vasectomy program will be initiated. The program will also include a pilot preventive health care component for mothers and children aimed at decreasing infant mortality and increasing the acceptance of voluntary sterilization among women attending the Center.

The program is concerned primarily with assisting Caritas Pakistan to develop more on the local and national level as an efficient charitable agency of the local church.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: Provided donated materials valued at \$641,830, to dispensaries, hospitals, leprosaria and development projects; 45 designated consignments were sent in all.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Provided supervisory assistance and \$13,673 in seed money for five projects: land leveling, tractor subsidies, watercourse improvements, a link road and a survey.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Distributed 39 tons of medicines and supplies, valued at \$144,108, to approximately 40 charitable medical facilities. Distributed 160 metric tons of vitamin enriched milk powder, donated by the European Economic Commission, valued at \$208,384, to over 11,000 malnourished women and children.

SOCIAL WELFARE: The CRS Program Director is an advisor to both Inter-Aid Committee (Karachi) and Caritas Pakistan in their relief and rehabilitation programs for Afghan refugees; from September through December, 1980, these organizations purchased and distributed \$500,000 worth of supplies to approximately 500,000 refugees. Provided \$17,000 for the purchase of local food-stuffs, a subsidy to construct a home for the handicapped and meals for the aged.

FUTURE PLANS: To provide additional assistance to Afghan refugees; to institute vocational training for deaf students, sponsorship of groups of children in educational institutes and a medical outreach program; to construct a nine-mile rural road and conduct a survey of the effects of this road on the local inhabitants.

The purpose of the program in Pakistan is to support the relief and development activities of a variety of Christian and Muslim voluntary agencies. The major partner in this work is the Development Commission of the National Council of Churches in Pakistan.

COMMUNICATIONS: Provides funds for the preparation of materials for the newly literate.

Four fully-equipped mobile teams, each with one or two doctors, a health visitor and a compounder (pharmacist/paramedic), visit the camps.
