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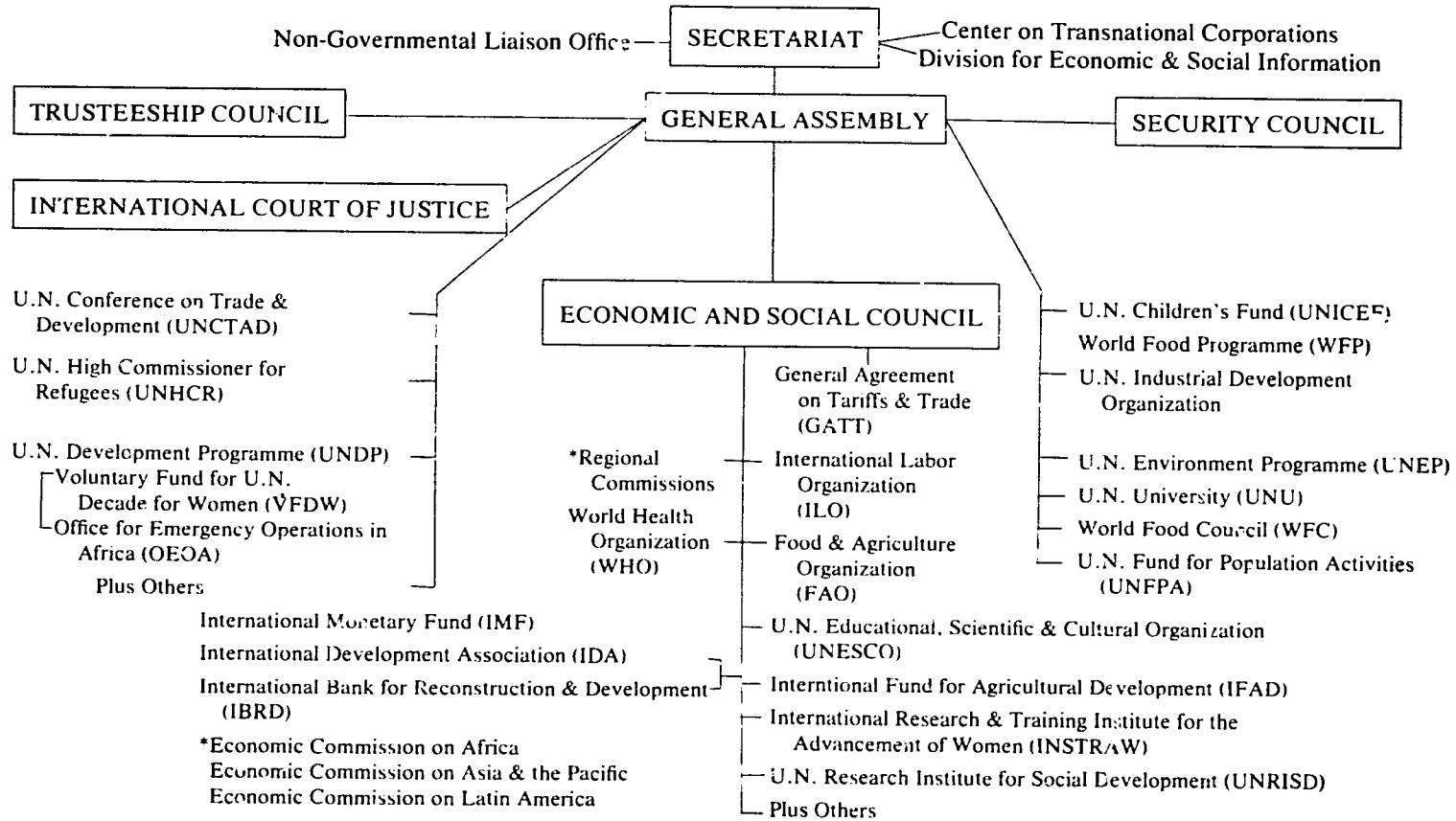

Selecting which PVOs to include in this volume has not been easy. Other than the three listed under "Appropriate Technology" for their special reputation in that field, we stress those PVOs which are particularly active in that specialty within the growing field of global education called "development education."

Development education attempts to help people in "high income" nations better understand "development" in low income countries—the nature of the development process, its challenges and obstacles, the many possible paths to progress, and how all of this relates to the high income nations. An increasing number of PVOs have come to consider such educational work among the U.S. public so important that they have added staff expressly for development education, in addition to and separate from staff who are engaged in teaching potential supporters about the PVO itself.

There is often a fine line between self-promotion and development education. For the user who wishes to support a particular PVO, that line may not matter. For someone who needs "generic" development information, however, material that includes "brand name" advertising can be unsuitable and even embarrassing in some contexts. Advertising by its very purpose must be held suspect of bias and exclusivity, no matter how educationally useful some of the information contained within the advertising might be.

In examining the materials and programs various PVOs are offering as development education, therefore, the editors of this guide applied two additional criteria in selecting which PVOs to include here. First, is the information focused narrowly on the PVO's own particular work and projects or does it provide a broader context for understanding development in which many people and organizations have roles to play? Second, if the PVO's name appears in the text of the information, does it appear as the sole illustration of an organization involved in development or as one among others? A positive answer to the latter alternative in each question in at least some of a PVO's educational work tilted the balance in favor of inclusion here.
