

This report describes the programs of 39 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Chile with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 39 U.S. organizations included in the report, 24 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1980 totaling \$13,521,320. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Chile. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. The purpose of the program in Chile is to assist the local Jewish community of 28,000 people in strengthening its leadership and in formulating a plan for community development.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Provides funds to a variety of communal institutions, homes for the aged, a children's home and a religious organization. An out-reach program enables local Jewish college students to meet with young scholars and professionals. A lay leadership development program helps incorporate new, younger leadership into the highest levels of the Jewish communal structure. 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COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Distributing PL 480 Title II food commodities to approximately 20,000 workers and 80,000 dependents in a food-for-work program. The main activity is the construction of farm to market roads in isolated regions to make them more accessible and encourage their development; the project is implemented in cooperation with the Social Division of the Ministry of Interior.

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Constructing six multi-purpose school buildings with 12 classrooms and six workshops near Coquimbo. These buildings will also serve as community centers for nutrition and vocational education. Community members, enrolled in the Government of Chile's Minimum Employment Plan, will be involved in the construction. Architectural plans and technical supervision will be provided by the Ministry of Education through the Society for the Construction of Educational Establishments.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Operates a school garden project which offers rural students an opportunity to acquire theoretical and practical agricultural and nutrition knowledge and skills; produce will be used for supplementary feeding. Cooperates with the Ministry of Education in the development of a school garden curriculum which consists of health education, nutrition and basic gardening. During fiscal year 1981, 200 new schools will use this curriculum and approximately 200 teachers will receive training in its use. It is anticipated that approximately 2,000 families will utilize the materials provided through this project.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Distributes PL 480 Title II commodities to approximately 50,000 pre-school children at approximately 400 day care centers in cooperation with the Ministry of the Interior.

COMMUNICATIONS: Sends tapes or scripts which are translated and taped by volunteers into the local language. These tapes are used by local radio stations to broadcast as a public service short, practical health messages on dental hygiene, disease prevention, drug abuse, ecology, family planning, mental hygiene, nutrition and sanitation. The messages, broadcast daily throughout the prime listening time, emphasize preventive medicine. Each major category is given 10-30 second spots.

CRS/Chile concentrates on assisting small farmers, in particular the Mapuche Indians who constitute a large percentage of Chile's southern rural population. The program emphasizes irrigation, the provision of potable water and sanitation.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Providing campesino leadership training courses in Temuco and Villerrica which include group discussions about the reality of the small farmers' situation, as well as instruction in agricultural subjects. Supports handicraft production as a base to prepare women as community promoters.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: Developed a five-year project to establish a livestock association and revolving loan funds for the purchase of seeds, fertilizers, cattle and equipment, to assist Mapuche Indians and other subsistence farmers.

EDUCATION: Funding training courses for members of farmers' associations to improve their capability in accounting and general administrative procedures.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Through PL 480 Title II provides food to pre-school children, primary school children, children in institutions, and workers and their dependents (food-for-work). Food provided through the European Economic Community is given to small farmers, unemployed persons, and university, secondary and technical school students. Also provides medicines.

SOCIAL WELFARE: Established halfway houses in Santiago to provide a transition period for people who have been undergoing long-term hospital treatment for emotional disorders.

The primary objectives of the program are to produce more nutritional foods and to increase the incomes of poor farmers by developing the capability of local groups to manage their own development.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Supports the development of 15 Indian communities (Mapuches) in areas near Nueva Imperial. Conducts training for women in nutrition, food preservation handicrafts and garden farming. Gives instruction in management training which includes basic accounting.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: Provides financial and technical assistance in the formation and operation of agricultural cooperatives. From 1980-1983, supporting Mapuche Mariluan Cooperative, Victoria, and from 1977-1980, El Sol Cooperative, Carahue, as well as the Regional Federation of Cooperatives, Nielol, located in the Ninth Region. Provides loans so that farmers can purchase animals, seed, and agricultural supplies and equipment.

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ECONOMIC & DEVELOPMENT PLANNING: Conducts three-week courses in all sectors which include agricultural planning, cost-benefit analysis, and feasibility studies and surveys among farmers; also conducts follow-up seminars. In conjunction with Government technicians carries out a large research program through experimental plots and stations. Conducts on-going weekly evaluations of all programs; outside organizations are brought in twice yearly for more objective evaluation studies.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Provides agricultural training in rural schools, with the emphasis on school gardens; trains farmers in improved agricultural storage, marketing techniques and in the care of domestic animals; and provides veterinary services. Teaches practical farming skills, such as irrigation, crop rotation, substitution and diversification, and improved utilization of grains, legumes and nuts. Initiates and develops experimental plots where the use of improved seed and the proper use of fertilizers are learned. Encourages the development of fruit orchards, vegetable gardens and apiculture; introduces new crops such as lentils and garbanzo beans; provides technical assistance in fruit and vegetable preservation; supports a large fence-building program; and conducts soil analysis on all plots.
