This report describes the programs of 26 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Botswana with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 26 U.S. organizations included in the report, 12 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1981 totaling \$981,417. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Botswana. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

It makes available to organizations, governments, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), maintains in its Bureau for Food for Peace and Voluntary Assistance a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Supports the "brigade" movement through a local group, the Kweneng Rural Development Association (KRDA) which combines vocational training with productive activities, helping to meet community needs for jobs, goods and services. Four volunteers with KRDA provide training for their national counterparts and management assistance with projects. A fifth volunteer coordinates a branch of the KRDA, the Kgalagadi Settlements Project, which is an attempt to respond to the needs of isolated communities in the western part of Kweneng District, on the fringe of the Kalahari Desert. Since the initiation of the project in the fall of 1979, a number of activities have been started, including brickmaking, gameskin collection and marketing, horticultural programs and adult literacy.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: With funding from the Ministry of Agriculture and the J.S. Agency for International Development, participates in a four-year horticultural project for subsistence farmers and the commercial sector which aims to make the country nearly self-sufficient in vegetable and fruit production. Since 1979, the Ministry of Agriculture's Horticulture Officer,

an IVS volunteer, has directed the project's three components, research-training and extension; two other volunteers work with KRDA in an extension program. At the Ministry's agricultural facility, conducted trials on tomatoes, cabbages, onions, carrots, potatoes and maize, using various irrigation and shading techniques. Training agricultural demonstrators; 114 had taken special courses by September 1980, and there are plans to train a total of 150 by the end of the project. These trainers will introduce farmers to the growing of vegetables. Currently five people are taking formal training in research, marketing and extension services in Kenya, Tanzania and the United States, and will take over from the IVS volunteers in the Ministry and fill other key positions in the fledgling horticulture industry. Under the guidance of two IVS volunteers and their KRDA co-workers, about 100 individuals are growing vegetables, either on their own land or on allotments provided by KRDA; this project is at Melepolole where KRDA is based. This experience is being monitored in an effort to develop a model for support of small-scale producers which can be adopted by other community development associations. The KRDA horticulture extension team, in conjunction with the Ministry's horticulture unit, has also assisted schools, hospitals, clinics, youth clubs, farmer training centers, commercial growers and other community groups, both in surrounding areas and in other parts of the country. Provides the services of a voluntary business management advisor for an agricultural services and supply center run by KRDA for the benefit of local farmers, and a financial controller for KRDA itself.
