



This report describes the programs of 21 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Sierra Leone with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. This is one of a series of periodically revised country reports which expand and update Part II of the TAICH 1971 directory, U.S. Non-Profit Organizations in Development Assistance Abroad.

Of the 21 U.S. organizations included in the report, 11 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1976 of \$4,299,457. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Sierra Leone. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by that organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of the relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but also with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. Since 1955, the Council has operated the Technical Assistance Information Clearing House under contract with the U.S. Agency for International Development.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON VOLUNTARY FOREIGN AID was established in 1946 to serve as a focal point for relations between the U.S. Government and U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. It is composed of private citizens who serve without compensation. The Committee's advisory responsibilities are to provide information and advice to A.I.D. and other U.S. Government agencies relating to areas of foreign assistance in which the Government and private and voluntary organizations interact, to provide assistance to the community of private and voluntary organizations working abroad relative to problems and issues in their relations with A.I.D. and other Federal agencies and to foster public interest in voluntary foreign aid and the activities of the private and voluntary organizations. Through the Foreign Assistance Act, the Committee has the operational function of registering qualified U.S. private, non-profit organizations that have overseas voluntary aid programs and seek to be registered. Such registered organizations are then eligible to apply for participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. In response to Congressional mandate, A.I.D. has expanded the Registry, and as of October 1, 1977, registration with the Advisory Committee is now a prerequisite for all U.S. private and voluntary organizations seeking A.I.D. grants. Currently the Advisory Committee is in the process of registering and re-registering agencies under the new guidelines. The purpose of the program in Sierra Leone is to assist Sierra Leone Labour Congress (SLCC) and its affiliated trade unions to develop viable programs and effective, free, democratic, and responsible organizations capable of representing the legitimate interests of workers, and of contributing to the social and economic development of Sierra Leone.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Provides basic support and assistance to a vigorous trade union movement, helping both technically and financially in the processes of leadership and organizational development.

During FY ending 6/30/78 CARE is supporting the following projects in Sierra Leone:

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Sponsoring road construction in three rural districts where villagers are participating in agricultural development activities. The project involves a road maintenance component to teach government crews and local inhabitants road maintenance techniques. Funding assistance is being provided by the World Bank and USAID. Peace Corps volunteers assist in project implementation.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: With the Government of Sierra Leone supports a program which combines supplementary feeding, nutrition education, and the development of local food sources. The project is to benefit primary school children and pregnant/lactating mothers. Implemented with the Government of Sierra Leone, the project provides for the distribution of PL 480 foods to pre-school and primary school aged children and pregnant/lactating mothers in schools and centers in all but the northern sector of the country. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Provides U.S. Government-donated commodities for food-for-work projects such as bridge, school and community center construction; swampland rice production; and feeder road maintenance and repair. Assisted in the rehabilitation of five schools in the Lungi area.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Sent U.S. Government-donated foods which were used for a school lunch program for students in primary schools in the Northern Province. The Ministry of Finance, Development and Economic Planning and the Ministry of Education, Social Welfare and Rural Development provided grants to assist in the warehousing, distribution, port clearance and reporting of the foods. Provides additional support to health facilities in the Northern Province which initiate full-scale preventive health programs for mothers and pre-school aged children. Provides primary education as well as improved health care to the Kurando and Yalunka tribes in eastern Northern Province and to the Temne tribe near Magburaka through the following projects:

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Constructs elementary schools and assists in the construction and maintenance of roads and bridges in remote areas of Northern Province.

EDUCATION: Manages and maintains elementary schools in rural areas of Northern Province. Schools include English language training to prepare children for secondary school. Runs a hostel in Magburaka, and plans another for Kabala, as supervised housing for secondary school students who come from rural areas where there are no secondary schools. Also operates literacy programs to teach English language as well as local language reading to youth and adults. Translates and prints reading materials for the program.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Introduced and assists a plot farming program designed to improve agricultural yield (mostly rice, some sweet potatoes) by terracing swamp areas.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operates dispensaries among the Kuranko and the Yalunka in the eastern section of Northern Province and one near Magburaka for the Temne tribe. Facilities provide treatment for disease and accident victims, immunization and maternal/child health services.

The purpose of the OIC Sierra Leone project is to assist in establishing a community based institution devoted to vocational skill training, entrepreneurial management development and non-formal remedial education for a target population of rural based school leavers and unemployed young adults.

EDUCATION: Operates a coeducational vocational training school for 200 trainees in Bo. The OIC training center focuses upon: prevocational skills, including courses in attitudinal and motivational development; communication and computation skills; consumer education; personal hygiene and job-finding techniques. Vocational offerings include: auto mechanics, secretarial science, and building trades (electricity, carpentry, and masonry).
