Roster of Women in Development Consultants:
An Introduction

At the request of the Office of Women in Development, AID, ICRW conducted an inquiry among the AID Regional Bureaus and selected consulting firms in Washington, D.C., regarding the availability of women technical consultants who combine knowledge in their technical/professional specialization with women-in-development issues.

It was evident from these interviews that women consultants with backgrounds in sociology, anthropology, education, nutrition, home economics and health services could be identified. However, there were obvious gaps in knowing and identifying women consultants in areas such as economics, public health medicine, civil engineering, demography and rural development. Also, among most of the persons interviewed there was an implicit assumption that a woman consultant would automatically be knowledgeable in the area of women-in-development issues.

In this roster ICRW has identified and selected a number of women and men highly qualified in their areas of expertise, who have in actuality through research activities, program planning and/or project implementation demonstrated both commitment to and awareness of the range of women in development dimensions.
