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WORLD CONFERENCE OF THE UN DECADE FOR WOMEN

R E P O R T

PLANNING AND ADMINISTRATION

Following a decision of the Board of the Conference of NGOs in Consultative Status with the Economic and Social Council early in 1979, a Planning Committee for NGO Activities at the World Conference of the UN Decade for Women was established with Elizabeth Palmer, former General Secretary of the World YWCA, as its convenor.

Participation on the Planning Committee was opened to all members of the Conference of NGOs and 34 organizations (see attached list) participated in its work. The Planning Committee met at regular intervals from May 1979 through September 1980. The majority of the meetings were held in New York, but two meetings were convened in Geneva (July 1979 and February 1980) and three meetings during the Forum in Copenhagen in July 1980. At one of its earliest meetings, the Planning Committee decided it would undertake two main activities: A Forum to be held at the same time as the Conference in Copenhagen and a newspaper. Working groups to deal with Finance, Program and the Media were set up and a Publications Committee (see list in Appendices) to be responsible for the NGO newspaper, FORUM 80. In December 1979, an office was rented at 600 Lexington Avenue, New York City, the headquarters of the National Board of the YWCA, USA which handled the accounts for the Committee, and two co-coordinators, Marianne Huggard and Hilda Paqui, were appointed to carry out the work of organizing the Forum in close cooperation with Elizabeth Palmer. A press officer, Fortuna Roth, was appointed as a member of the team later in 1980. In addition to secretarial help, they were supported on a regular basis by a few volunteers. Without such volunteer assistance, it would not have been possible to have organized the Forum in the short time available.

The Planning Committee worked closely with Dr. Lucille Mair, Secretary General for the World Conference and the Conference Secretariat and also with the Foreign Ministry of Denmark and its UN Mission in New York. A coordinating Committee made up of the National Council of Women of Denmark and KULU was established in Copenhagen which eventually took over the job of making the local arrangements in consultation with the Planning Committee. This committee set up an office in Copenhagen with Liss Hansen as coordinator. There were four visits by Planning Committee members and/or staff to Copenhagen, July 1979, January, March and May 1980 in preparation for the Forum. The success of the Forum relied to a great extent on the cooperation of not only the UN Secretariat and the Government of Denmark, but in particular to the work done in Copenhagen by the Coordinating Committee there. The Committee in Denmark was responsible for locating sites in addition to the Amager University Centre, making arrangements with banking facilities, the post office, Red Cross, bus company, etc., and finding and training a large number of volunteers who were responsible for registration and information at the three Forum locations.

In order to involve the thinking of as representative a group of women as possible in the planning of the Forum, two Consultations were held in January 1980. The first was a one-day consultation in New York attended by

42 people living mostly in the New York area but coming from a wide range of geographical backgrounds. The second, made possible by a grant from The Ford Foundation, was a three-day meeting held in Geneva, Switzerland, attended by 32 women from 21 countries. Both Consultations included a few members of the Planning Committee and the Coordinators. As a result of these consultations, it was decided that the Forum would be held from July 14-24, 1980, and the following areas were identified as being the major subjects for introductory panel sessions: Equality, Development and Peace; Health, Education and Employment; Racism and Sexism; Migrants and Refugees, and The Family in a Changing Society.

Emphasis was given to the importance of Workshops for the exchange of information and "how-to," on a wide variety of practical issues. It was also agreed that a further important function of the Forum was to facilitate opportunities for informal meetings. In this connection, the suggestion was made for a human resource centre, "Vivencia," in addition to an information-sharing resource centre. It was suggested that it could provide focal points such as a Caribbean, South Pacific or African corner. These would not only be identifiable places where women could meet but could also serve as a means of identifying and strengthening the links among women within the various regions. In order to implement this recommendation, the International Women's Tribune Centre was asked to be responsible for this area of the Forum programme.

The Planning Committee agreed that the Forum, as such, would not have a point of view on substantive issues and, therefore, there would be no Forum resolutions. Guidelines for the conduct of Forum panel sessions were published in the newspaper, FORUM 80, at the beginning of the Forum and circulated widely among Forum participants (see Appendices).

Finance

One of the first tasks of the Planning Committee was to establish a budget and to make plans for raising the necessary funds to carry out its work.. A draft budget was prepared in September 1979 and, in the light of what services could and could not be provided by the Government of Denmark, revised early in 1980. Both of those budgets appear in the Appendices along with a list of donors and a financial report. Some of the donors restricted all or part of the use of their grants to assistance to women from developing countries, and this was the largest item in the budget.

Grants

As a result of donations received, the Planning Committee was able to assist over 100 women from countries (list in Appendices), all of whom were chosen as being able to contribute to the Forum as a panel speaker, workshop leader or resource person, and as being in a position to use the Copenhagen experience in a practical way on her return to her own country. Many organizations and governments also gave grants, outside of the Planning Committee, to women from Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Pacific and Caribbean areas, which was reflected in the fact that there were over 1600 women from these regions of the world at the Forum.

THE NGO MID-DECADE FORUM held at the University of Copenhagen, Amager Centre, the Royal School of Librarianship and the Police College attracted over 8000 people: organization representatives, delegates, panelists, development workers and other concerned persons representing 128 countries.

The Introductory Panel Sessions were held at the Royal School of Librarianship with a seating capacity of 600 people and facilities for simultaneous interpretation. Most panels were held twice in order to enable as many participants as possible to attend. These panel sessions were instrumental in stimulating lively discussions from the floor and a great many spontaneous small working groups. On the day before the closing of the Forum, three extra and "open" panel sessions were organized around the themes of Equality, Development and Peace.

Workshops, Seminars and Roundtable Discussions ranging in size from 16-250 persons were held in the University of Copenhagen, and the Police School. These facilities provided by the Government of Denmark were excellent for these smaller groups and provided the contacts leading to future networking, as well as prompting intimate and often intensive and extensive work on the spot. Workshops were organized at the initiative and responsibility of various NGOs, both international and national, groups and individuals. The Planning Committee, responsible for organizing 18 panel presentations, three open session and twice daily briefings on the UN Conference, was mainly a facilitator in relation to the workshops, except for the four workshops in which selected UN Specialized Agencies, including UNICEF, UNDP, WHO, FAO, UNESCO, the Voluntary Fund and the UN Regional Economic Commissions, discussed their various programmes as they relate to women and the ways in which they cooperate with NGOs.

About 200 workshop proposals, many of them involving several sessions, were received by the Forum office before July 14 and more than that number during the Forum itself, as a result of contacts made there among people with similar interests and concerns or as a spin-off from the introductory panel sessions. A number of workshops were repeated or had followup sessions so that an average of 100-150 work groups met daily, so that there were well over 1000 workshop sessions during the period of the Forum. These groups dealt with diverse subjects related to the issues of the Forum and the World Conference although toward the end additional topics and issues were discussed by some groups. Criteria had been agreed on in advance by the Planning Committee. According to these, all those applying to hold workshops were requested to deal with topics of international interest, related to the issues of the Forum and the World Conference, and to have international leadership to assure a truly international programme. The

Planning Committee endeavored to put group organizers, who had no access to people from other parts of the world, in touch with participants from other areas so that they might share in the leadership. Prior to the Forum, applications that did not meet these criteria were returned to the initiators with explanations and provisions to reconsider their requests at the time of the Forum. After the Forum began, facilities were provided for all who requested space. The Planning Committee did not set any deadline regarding applications to hold workshops in order to assure maximum outreach and participation.

Briefings on the World Conference of the UN Decade for Women, made possible through the cooperation of the United Nations and International NGOs, were given twice daily throughout the period of the Forum, at 9 a.m. in the Library School and at 1:30 p.m. in the auditorium at the Amager Centre, University of Copenhagen. Both these sessions had simultaneous translation (see Appendices).

During the second week of the Conference, at the invitation of Ms. Ostergaard, President of the World Conference, the Planning Committee made a presentation about the Forum to an information session at the Bella Centre open to all Conference delegates.

VIVENCIA provided a wide range of activities and services: over 130 films and slide shows, daily cultural events staged at noontime by groups from various regions of the world, documents and information on the major themes of the Forum, an Information Network booth which assisted people in finding the workshop to meet their needs or finding people of similar interests from a different region of the world, space for regional and special interest groups such as journalists, artists, etc. Vivencia also maintained close cooperation with the Women in the Arts Festival held in Copenhagen the second half of July. As a result of all these activities, ongoing groups were strengthened and many new "networks" were established.

Interpretation and Translation

Interpretation was available in English, French and Spanish at the Library School auditorium (600) where the panel presentations were made and in the largest auditorium (250) at the Amager University Centre. Unlike some of the previous NGO forums related to world conferences, this was an expense which was borne by the Planning Committee and not by the host government. In some of the workshop sessions, there was whispered interpretation by volunteers and some provided their own interpretation and equipment. The majority of workshops were held in English. The written information prior to the Forum was provided to the largest extent possible in French and Spanish as well as in English. Certain notices at the Forum were also available in three languages. Information for the press and press briefings had translation.

Press Information

The activities of the Press Information Office between the middle of April and the end of July were primarily the distribution of press releases, setting up interview and giving additional background information from the New York office and, in Copenhagen, besides the above, conducting daily press conference. By the end of June, the Voice of America had taped

"curtain-raisers" on the Forum in Spanish and in French; WBAI and the United Nations Radio Services tapes interviews with the Executive Committee and Forum Coordinators, and there were a number of local radio and T.V. broadcasts. In addition, 10,000 copies of a number of press releases written in English, Spanish and French were distributed through the United Nations.

In Copenhagen, the Press Office maintained a Press Documents room and another room for the use of radio and television. Starting July 14, there were daily press conferences between 12:45 and 1:15 p.m. (Monday through Friday) in the large auditorium at the University and brief daily releases (e.g., on numbers of registrants, changes in the program, etc.). There was no simultaneous interpretation during the press conferences, but consecutive interpretation in Spanish and French was available as needed. Through the assistance of three volunteers, one Danish, one Swiss, one Egyptian, the Press Office was able to provide assistance throughout the day in Danish and Arabic besides the three official languages and to set up interviews with panelists and other participants, both at the Forum and the UN Conference.

THE NEWSPAPER - FORUM 80

The Publications Committee met three times, in Geneva, (February 1, March 3 and April 21) and three times in Copenhagen during the Conference. It also corresponded by mail and telephone as it assembled a team of professional journalists to function within the agreed upon guidelines:

The paper will report on significant events occurring in Copenhagen from July 14-24, 1980, with emphasis on linking deliberations of the Conference and Forum.

It will carry schedules of planned events and other useful information. It will also include material such as reports and comment on related activities, background on issues being discussed, signed expressions of opinion, letters to the editor, interviews, film and art reviews, photographs and cartoons.

The paper will focus on issues and will provide for the free exchange of views in a spirit of mutual respect.

The paper will use English as the primary language. Some interviews, opinion articles or letters should be published in French or Spanish in each issue.

The UN staff involved with Conference preparations assured facilities for FORUM 80: accreditation, room and telephones in the Press section, distribution at the Bella Centre and permission to solicit contributions for the paper. In addition, it offered a Journalists Encounter fellowship to a FORUM 80 staff member.

Danish colleagues assisted in finding printing facilities at INFORMATION, a Danish daily newspaper, which also provided a room for the editor and staff.

FORUM 80, an eight-page daily, staffed by an international team of independent journalists, was issued 13 times, each day that the World Conference was in session.

The first issue, devoted to the Forum schedule, was printed twice for a total of 10,000 copies. Until the Forum closed, a daily run of 6000 copies was printed for distribution at the Bella Centre, University, Royal School of Librarianship, Police Academy and six hotels. When the Forum closed, the print order was reduced to 2800 and the Della Centre became the main distribution point. All copies, except some 150 reserved for the Planning Committee, were picked up by participants. Copies were free although contributions were encouraged.

OPENING AND CLOSING SESSIONS

A formal opening session was held in the Library School at which the Secretary General of the World Conference, the Danish Minister of Culture, the President of the Conference of NGOs, the two Presidents of the Danish Coordinating Committee and Elizabeth Palmer, Planning Committee Convenor, participated. In order to include the views of women from other parts of the world, the four women's organizations in Category I Consultative Status were invited to provide a speaker each from a different region of the world. Vinie Burrows closed the meeting with a dramatic selection and song (details in Appendices).

Due to the problems of space faced at the Opening Session, it was decided not to use the Library School auditorium for the Closing but to have music and dancing at several focal points in the University where large groups could gather. At one of these focal points, there were brief speeches from officials of the Forum and from women from different parts of the world who had participated in the Forum, and a song by Vinie Burrows.

GUIDELINES FOR CHAIRPERSONS
OF
BRIEFINGS AND PANEL PRESENTATION SESSIONS

Chairpersons will begin Sessions promptly. Panel Presentations on the major Forum themes will be held at the Royal School of Librarianship, from 10 AM till 12 noon, 1:30 PM to 3:30 PM and 3:30 PM to 5:30 PM (Daily M-F).

Briefings on the World Conference of the United Nations Decade for Women will be held daily (M-F) from 9 AM to 9:50 AM in the Royal School of Librarianship, and from 1:30 PM to 2:20 PM at the University of Copenhagen, Amager.

Each session has been designed to allow time for questions and discussion. Panelists have been asked to make short presentations. If after the allocated time has been completed there is interest in further discussion, not already provided for in Workshops, a request may be made to the Forum office for time and space for those interested in continuing the discussion.

In order to provide for the greatest possible exchange of ideas, the Chairperson will indicate, at the beginning of each session, that interventions (questions or statements) must be limited to 3 minutes and that no one person will be recognized a second time until all those who want to speak have done so.

Panelists will also be asked to limit their responses to questions to 3 minutes. A signal will be given after 2 minutes to remind each speaker of this limitation.

Those wishing to make an intervention will be asked to send their names to the Chairperson, in writing. The Chairperson will call speakers in order and will permit only 3 people at a time at a microphone.

Interventions from the audience that do not relate to the topic of discussion will be ruled out of order.

It is hoped that these few simple rules will provide an opportunity for the widest possible participation.

ORGANIZATIONS SPONSORING WORKSHOPS
