INTRODUCTION

SADEX is designed as an information and documentation guide to serve as a primary component in the establishment of a Southern Africa Development Information/Documentation Exchange (SADEX) network in cooperation with Southern African and African institutions and others involved in the development process in Southern Africa. Its purpose is to provide the Southern Africa development community with pertinent and timely information on publications, projects and international cooperation efforts related to development within Southern African countries and in the region as a whole.

The SADEX project is intended to complement and interact with escalating efforts in Southern Africa to establish an economic development information and documentation network. SADEX, at the request of the member states of the Southern African Development Coordination Conference, is currently serving as a regional development information network mechanism in Southern Africa, while the states concerned develop their own national information and documentation centers, and their own regional development information system, the Southern Africa Documentation and Information System (SADIS) in Harare, Zimbabwe.

The information and bibliographic sections of SADEX focus on the nine majority-ruled states of Southern Africa which participate in the Southern African Development Coordination Conference (SADCC) -- Angola, Botswana, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Swaziland, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe -- and the pre-independent state of Namibia. Although South Africa is not included within the scope of the SADEX project, materials on South Africa, when relevant to the unfolding dynamics of the region, are included under the "Regional" heading in the bibliographic section.

The African Bibliographic Center is solely responsible for the production and contents of SADEX and for conducting the Southern Africa Development Information/Documentation Exchange project.



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THE SOUTHERN AFRICAN DEVELOPMENT COORDINATION CONFERENCE: SELECTED RESOURCES - JULY 1981 TO JULY 1982

The following selected listing commemorates the July 1982 establishment in Gaborone, Botswana, of the Secretariat of the Southern African Development Coordination Conference (SADCC) - a decision of the July 1981 SADCC summit in Harare, Zimbabwe. Part I of the listing surveys the SADCC and its activities within the past year. Part II focuses on related developments involving regional cooperation among SADCC member states. The listing is drawn from the SADEX data base.

PART I. THE SADCC

"Africa Co-operation: By Their Bootstraps." In: Economist, London, November 21, 1981. Reports "modest success" of SADCC, against backdrop of Malawi's hosting of SADCC-3 in Blantyre.

"Aid Pledge to SADCC." In: Chronicle, Bulawayo, August 28, 1981. Brief: "The German Democratic Republic is interested in participating in projects of the nine-nation Southern African Development Coordination Conference to reduce their dependence on South Africa. This was said at a news conference in Maputo by Johannes Remus, trade counsellor at the German Democratic Republic Embassy in Maputo."

"Angola: Réunion des experts de la Commission énergétique de la S.A.D.C.C." In: Afrique-Asie, Paris, n.247, 31 août 1981, p.24. Provides details on the SADCC energy meeting in Angola, July 30-31, 1981.

ATKINSON, KEITH. "SADCC Bid to Improve Regional Cooperation." In: Herald, Salisbury, November 26, 1981. Presents highlights of the report on regional cooperation in the mining industry, prepared by the Zimbabwe government for presentation at SADCC-3 meeting in Malawi.

BARRELL, JENNY. "Escaping SA's Economic Clutches." In: South, London, November 1981, pp.18-19. Overview of SADCC objectives and progress.

Brief: \$56m EEC Aid Plan. In: Herald, Salisbury, February 4, 1982. EEC Development Commissioner Pisani announced in Gaborone that the EEC plans to give \$56m in aid to

member states of the SADCC. Botswana would get \$20m "in addition to what it received as part of the \$56m."

Brief: Meeting of the SADCC Industrial Co-operation Committee. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, v.3 n.17, April 23, 1982, p.22. The Industrial Co-operation Committee of the Southern African Development Co-ordination Conference met in Arusha, Tanzania, from 28 April to discuss such topics as a plan for regional industrial development drawn up by Tanzania. Recommendations are to be brought forward at the SADCC ministerial meeting in Luanda scheduled for the end of May.

"Brief: SADCC." In: African Economic Digest, London, August 21, 1981, p.24. "A meeting of finance representatives from member countries of the Southern African Development Co-ordination Conference (SADCC) was held in Lusaka on 17/18 August to discuss setting up a Southern Africa Fund. Opening the meeting, Zambian Finance Minister Kebby Musokotwane said he hoped plans for a regional financial institution could be finalised before the SADCC secretariat started work in Gaborone in July 1982."

"Zimbabwe has put forward Ambassador to the EEC and Belgium Arthur Blumeris for the key post of Executive Secretary of the Southern African Development Co-ordination Conference (SADCC). No official announcement has been made, as the appointment has to be ratified by Zimbabwe's eight SADCC partners. A career diplomat, Blumeris worked for the U.N. from 1963-74, mainly for UNESCO."

Southern Africa Forum, Johannesburg, 1981. 21pp. A perspective on economic development and cooperation in Southern Africa from the Executive Director of the Anglo-American Corporation. Calls for compromise between South Africa and the SADCC, to include South Africa in a loose association for regional development purposes while the pace of internal racial reform is accelerated in the Republic.

"Experts to Meet on SADCC Food Plan." In: Herald, Harare, April 27, 1982. "Officials from the Canadian International Development Research Centre (IDRC) and the (Zimbabwe) Ministry of Agriculture meet this week to discuss draft reports on the SADCC's food losses through waste, pests and poor processing and distribution....Zimbabwe is the headquarters of the SADCC's food co-ordinating secretariat...."

FAUVET, PAUL & STAN WINER. "Mozambique: Threat to SADCC Strategy." In: Africa Now, London, n.9, December 1981, pp.19-20. Suggests that recent sabotage attacks in Mozambique may signal a shift in Pretoria's military focus from control over territory to sabotage of selected economic installations, designed to cripple efforts by SADCC member states to lessen transport dependence on South Africa.

GOMES, ALVES. "África do Sul teme SADCC." In: Tempo, Maputo, n. 565, 9 de Agosto de 1981, pp.34-35.

HARRISON, CHARLES. "Black Africa Presses Arabs for More Aid." In: Times, London, May 5, 1982. Notes that at the annual meeting of the Arab Bank for Economic Development in Africa, Botswana's Finance Minister requested special consideration for the SADCC. "BADEA is expected to give more of its aid towards this group...in view of...the political urgency of their case. Regional projects for railways, roads, telecommunications and ports are likely to get priority." Malawi is barred from direct aid because of its diplomatic links with Israel.

HATUGARI, LEOPOLD. "Europe Keen to Boost SADCC." In: Moto, Gwelo, October 24, 1981. Reports signs of increased EEC interest in supporting the SADCC, while noting that "members of the EEC are also keen that Angola and Mozambique should join their SADCC colleagues as members of the Lome Convention."

HOLMAN, MICHAEL. "Regret of an Unexpected Guest." In: Financial Times, London, November 21, 1981. Brief report on a South African observer at the SADCC meeting in Malawi. Most delegates were unaware of the South African's presence.

"Investment Code for SADCC Proposed." In: Africa Economic Digest, London, v.3 n.23, June 4, 1982, pp.22-23. Opening a 10-day workshop in Harare for members of the SADCC on ways of ensuring maximum benefits from multinational investments, Zimbabwe's Minister of Justice proposed that the SADCC draw up a common investment code "to present a 'united front' to multinational corporations."

ISLAM, SHADA. "Europe to Boost Frontline States." In: Times of Swaziland, Mbabane, March 16, 1982. Reports on EEC interest in stronger political and economic backing for SADCC member countries following recent trip by an 18-member mission to the region and a visit by Europe's development commissioner, Edgard Pisani.

KORNEGAY, FRANCIS A., JR. "Dependency in Southern Africa and the SADCC: Selected Resources." In: SADEX, Washington, D.C., v.4 n.3, May/June 1982, pp.1-15. Entries preceded by introduction covering various aspects of economic relations in Southern Africa and the politics of economic conflict and accommodation between the SADCC member states and South Africa.

LAISHLEY, ROY. "Early Crop and Drought Warning for SADCC." In: Herald, Salisbury, December 17, 1981. A new chain of agricultural early warning systems is to be set up with the aid of the U.N. Food and Agricultural Organization.

Argues that "predictions concerning the future development of regional cooperation in southern Africa are apt to be misleading because the actual course of events will depend on a host of unforeseeable factors." LESLIE-SMITH, IAN. "Aviation -- SADCC's Poor Cousin." In: Africa Economic Digest, London, v.3 n.3, January 15, 1982, pp.4-5. Explores prospects for greater cooperation in civil aviation among member states of the SADCC.

MURRAY, ROGER. "SADCC Plans Are Hit: Cash Snarl Is Blamed." In: New African, London, n.172, January 1982, pp.29-30. Reports that SADCC plans are hindered by failure of donors to commit pledged funds to specific projects.

NGARA, TODD. "SADCC Must Win the War for Water." In: Herald, Harare, May 10, 1982. Zimbabwe's Chief Meteorologist surveys the drought situation in Southern Africa and calls for a regional centre that would conduct research on drought-resistant crops, assist in water resource management projects and house a regional climatological data bank.

"Recommendations: U.S.-Africa: Economic." In: TransAfrica News, Washington, D.C., v.2 n.3, June 1982, p.7. Among policy recommendations for U.S.-Africa economic relations: "The U.S. administration should make a serious effort to assist regional integration,

"Money firmly committed to the Southern African Development Coordination Conference (SADCC) has doubled since the Blantyre meeting in November 1981....This, however, is only 27 percent of the estimated \$2,200 million needed."

"SADCC: Conferência para a Coordenação do Desenvolvimento na África Austral." In: Cadernos, Lisbon, n.2, Marco de 1982, 33pp., map. Questões Internacionais, Série Estudos. Published by the Centro de Informação e Documentação Amílcar Cabral. Details objectives and activities of the SADCC; includes excerpts of an address by Mozambican President Samora Machel at the SADCC2 meeting in Maputo, November 1980, and an interview with Angolan Secretary of State for Cooperation Paulino Pinto João, which appeared in the July 24, 1981 edition of Jornal de Angola.

(It) is hoped the...centres will be set up by the second half of this year."

"Southern African Energy Experts Meet in Luanda." In: Foreign Broadcast Information Service, Springfield, Virginia, February 11, 1982, p.U1. Reports opening of major SADCC energy conference in Luanda, aimed at defining an energy policy for the SADCC and setting up an committee to prepare possible regional projects based on that policy.

"The Soviets Shifting Gears in Southern Africa." In: African Intelligence Digest, Denver, September 1, 1981, pp. 1-3. Monthly publication of Denver-based Americans Concerned About South Africa (ACSA) alleges that the Lusaka "economic liberation" declaration of the SADCC was "drawn up in Moscow" and is part of a shifting Soviet strategy "designed to bring economic disintegration to South Africa."

STEVENSON, MERRIL. "Southern Africa's Bid to Shun Pretoria May Hinge on Ailing Mozambique Port." In: Wall Street Journal, New York, December 30, 1981, p.10. SADCC hopes for transport independence from South Africa depend on Mozambique's ports, especially Beira.

"Third World Must Link Up on Research." In: Herald, Salisbury, December 1, 1981. Addressing the technical cooperation conference of SADCC member states, UNDP African Regional Director Michel Doo Kingue called on developing countries to establish ministries for technical cooperation among themselves, noting that, "The absence of adequate information has prevented the countries of our continent from benefitting from the lessons they have learnt in technical cooperation."

"Thirty Nations Invited to SADCC Talks." In: Herald, Salisbury, November 3, 1981. Outlines objectives and participant list of Southern African Development Coordination Conference meeting in Blantyre, Malawi, November 19 and 20, indicating that conference will be a consultative and not a pledging meeting, and will review progress made in

implementation of Lusaka programme of action.

"We Must Beat the Technology Trap." In: Herald, Salisbury, December 1, 1981. Reports on five-day technical cooperation conference in Salisbury, sponsored by UNDP and attended by SADCC representatives. In opening the conference, Dr. Bernard Chidzero stressed dialogue and information exchange among developing countries to avoid excessive dependence on technology from industrialized countries.

"West Germany Stops EEC Aid to Angola and Mozambique." In: African Business, London, n.42, February 1982, pp.5-6. Reviews issues involved in West Germany's continuing refusal to allow EEC aid funds to be allocated to Angola and Mozambique. Notes problems this poses for EEC financing of SADCC projects. Also notes that the new EEC Development Commissioner is scheduled to visit Angola and Mozambique in February 1982 "and then report back to the EEC Council."

"Zimbabwe Is the Pivotal SADCC Country." In: Financial Gazette, Salisbury, September 4, 1981. Reports on an address by the general manager of Zimbabwe's Dairy Marketing Board, at a conference of the Institute of International Affairs in Johannesburg, concerning Zimbabwe's position within the SADCC.

"Zimbabwe não vai parar por falta de combustível." In: Tempo, Maputo, n. 573, 4 de Outubro de 1981, p. 41. Briefly argues that Zimbabwe's fuel crisis has been overstated and that Mozambican railways has not been deficient in providing fuel to its neighbor; suggests that reports to the contrary may be part of a disinformation campaign designed to complicate relations between the two countries and discredit the SADCC Transport and Communication Commission.

"Zimbabwe to Have SADCC 'Nature School.'" In: Herald, Salisbury, March 30, 1982. "A natural resources training college for SADCC is being built in Zimbabwe by the Conservation Trust of Zimbabwe with Government help....The college should be finished in 1984 or 1985."

"Zimbabwe: Nine in Need." In: Financial Mail, Johannesburg, v.82 n.10, December 4, 1981, pp.1186-87. Discusses foreign aid requirements of SADCC members to lessen dependence on South Africa, especially in transport sector. Focuses on increasing the railway capacity of Zimbabwe and the railway and port capacity of Mozambique.

"Zimbabwean to Head SADCC Secretariat." In: Business Herald, Salisbury, March 25, 1982. Reports nomination of Arthur Blumeris, Zimbabwe's ambassador to Belgium and the EEC, to be Executive Secretary of the SADCC. "It is expected that the heads of state of SADCC will ratify Mr. Blumeris' appointment before the next council of ministers meeting in Luanda in May."

PART II. REGIONAL COOPERATION

"African Common Market?" In: Financial Gazette, Salisbury, November 6, 1981. Discusses final negotiations to establish a Preferential Trade Area involving 18 countries from Eastern and Southern Africa and the Indian Ocean, noting that heads of state are scheduled to meet in Lusaka on December 21st for the treaty-signing ceremonies.

"Africans Sign Trade Pact." In: Times, London, December 22, 1981. A preferential trade area treaty covering East and Southern Africa has been signed by the Comoros, Djibouti, Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, Mauritius, Somalia, Uganda and Zambia. "Five others -- Angola, Botswana, Lesotho, Swaziland and Zimbabwe -- had delegations at the ceremony, but did not sign. Potential treaty adherents not attending the ceremony were Madagascar, Mozambique, Seychelles and Tanzania."

"At Last! Zambia Mail Route Goes 'Express.'" In: Sunday Mail, Salisbury, April 4, 1982. Negotiations have been completed between the National Railways of Zimbabwe and Zambian postal authorities to establish two-way direct postal service, by-passing the previous route through South Africa.

"Bridge Attack Not Critical." In: Financial Gazette, Salisbury, November 6, 1981. Assesses seriousness of Mozambique Resistance Movement attack on Pungwe River rail and road bridges for Zimbabwe's economy.

Brief: Communications in Southern Africa. In: BBC Summary of World Broadcasts, Reading, England, n.ME/W1168, January 19, 1982, p.B/1. Origin: Johannesburg, December 31, 1981. "Negotiations on the installation of a microwave communications link joining Zambia, Zimbabwe and Botswana have been completed in Salisbury. An agreement is expected to be approved within the next three days. The system will be set up in two phases and will link the three countries to the pan-African telecommunications system. The project, which will cost \$12.5m, is being financed by Norway and Sweden."

Brief: Kangai Off to Lesotho Talks. In: Herald, Salisbury, November 28, 1981. "The Minister of Labour and Social Services (in Zimbabwe), Mr. Kumbirai Kangai, leaves Salisbury tomorrow for Lesotho to attend the third meeting of the Southern Africa Labour Commission. Mr. Kangai is the current chairman of the commission."

Brief: Lesotho and Swaziland Sign PTA Treaty. In: Daily Telegraph, London, March 24, 1982. "Lesotho and Swaziland signed the Eastern and Southern African Countries Preferential Trade Area treaty...in Lusaka, Zambia, bringing the number of countries which are signatories to 11."

Brief: Mozambique & Malawi. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, August 21, 1981, p.24. "Mozambique's Port & Surface Transport Minister Alcantara Santos, on a five-day

visit to Malawi, said on 15 August that his trip was to prepare a joint contribution towards a multilateral transport and communication agreement next summit of the Southern African Development Coordination Conference."

Brief: Mozambique/Tanzania Trade Barriers. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, October 9, 1981. "Trade barriers between Mozambique and Tanzania are expected to be reduced following a 5-8 October meeting in Maputo between the two countries' Trade Ministers. They discussed the setting up of the Ruvuma Free Trade Area (RFTA). Trade between Mozambique and Tanzania was valued at \$18.75 million in 1980 and is expected to rise in 1981."

Brief: Talks to Continue on Blocked Funds. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, v.3 n.19, May 7, 1982, p.20. "Talks will continue between the central banks of Zambia and Zimbabwe about the future of funds blocked in their respective countries at the time of UDI in November 1965. Zambia has provided the Reserve Bank of Zimbabwe with details of funds held in Zambia, but Zimbabwe has asked for more time to study the problem...."

Brief: Tanzania/Malawi Border. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, October 9, 1981. "Ministers from Tanzania and Malawi met at Kyela, Tanzania, on 2 October to define the border. The uncertainty was caused by the frequent shifting of the River Swonwe, which formerly marked the border."

Brief: Tazara. In: Africa Economic Digest, London, October 9, 1981. "The Tanzania-Zambia Railway Authority is owed more than ZK11 million (\$12.3 million) by defaulting customers, the Lusaka-based Sunday Times of Zambia reported on 4 October. Since 31 July, importers, except for customers with credit facilities, have been required to pre-pay for goods. But the report added that even credit facilities had been abused."

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This is basically an author index to works cited in the bibliographical sections. Authorless journal and newspaper articles are listed under the periodical title. The numbers refer to entries, not to pages; numbering of items is continuous from issue to issue.

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
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
