VIETNAM TRANSPORTATION STUDY. Prepared for the Government of Vietnam and for USAID by Transportation Consultants, Inc., Wash., D.C., June 1966, vii + 358 pp. + attachments.

Based on field studies conducted April 1965 through May 1966, the study was undertaken to assess the present state of the economy, to inventory to the extent possible the transport capabilities in South Vietnam, and to project an economic growth pattern as a guide to peacetime transportation planning. Recommends action that can be taken now to develop a more efficient factual base for postwar planning; recommends programs to strengthen national capabilities in the administration, design, construction and operation of transport facilities and services; and indicates areas where expenditures are not needed in the immediate future as well as those urgently requiring attention.

tends to end with its first breakdown." The Subcommittee also concludes that A.I.D.'s emergency measures to alleviate port congestion were ill-conceived, since the military was ultimately called in to clear the port. (pp. 20-25, photographs)

The Port Situation in Vietnam (Followup Investigation), (House Report 611).
Committee on Government Operations, Subcommittee on Foreign Operations and Government Information Subcommittee (Dawson-Moss); August 25, 1967.

After noting that the Committee's original recommendations had not been satisfactorily implemented, it held that the U.S. should take a tougher stand with the GVN. The following specific suggestions were offered: (1) Suspension of importers who fail to remove cargo within 19 days of discharge; (2) personnel should use the transient labor pass system; (3) increase U.S. truck security riders; (4) require an indemnification clause for goods lost by private traders; and (5) establish a central purchasing and distributing center for non-appropriated fund activities. (p. 7)

Here again the Committee notes that its original recommendations have not been satisfactorily implemented and alleges that A.I.D. has inadequately checked importers backgrounds, imposed unfair restrictions on importers, and caused unnecessary delays. Specific recommendations include: (1) Broader checks on importers; (2) require established importers to conform to the same conditions as new applicants; (3) speed the process for security clearances for consultants; (4) insist the GVN increase foreign exchange spending in the U.S.; (5) identify US-produced CIP commodities, and urge GVN to buy from US through its foreign exchange; and (6) curtail importation of textiles and paper items to encourage in-country industrial development. (pp. 14-16)

Illicit Practices Affecting the U.S. Economic Program in Vietnam (Followup Investigation), (House Report No. 609). Committee on Government Operations, Foreign Operations and Government Information Subcommittee (Dawson-Moss), August 25, 1967.

The Committee notes that several of its original recommendations were not implemented (i.e., pre-shipment inspection of CIP commodities; adequate suspension procedures; establishment of an escrow account; restitution of confiscated dollars, MPC, etc.). New recommendations include: (1) Prevention of kickbacks by requiring importers to be their own sales agents; (2) improve speed and effectiveness of penalties; (3) insistence that the GVN establish a \$10 million escrow account; and (4) insistence that the GVN return all seized U.S. moneys.
