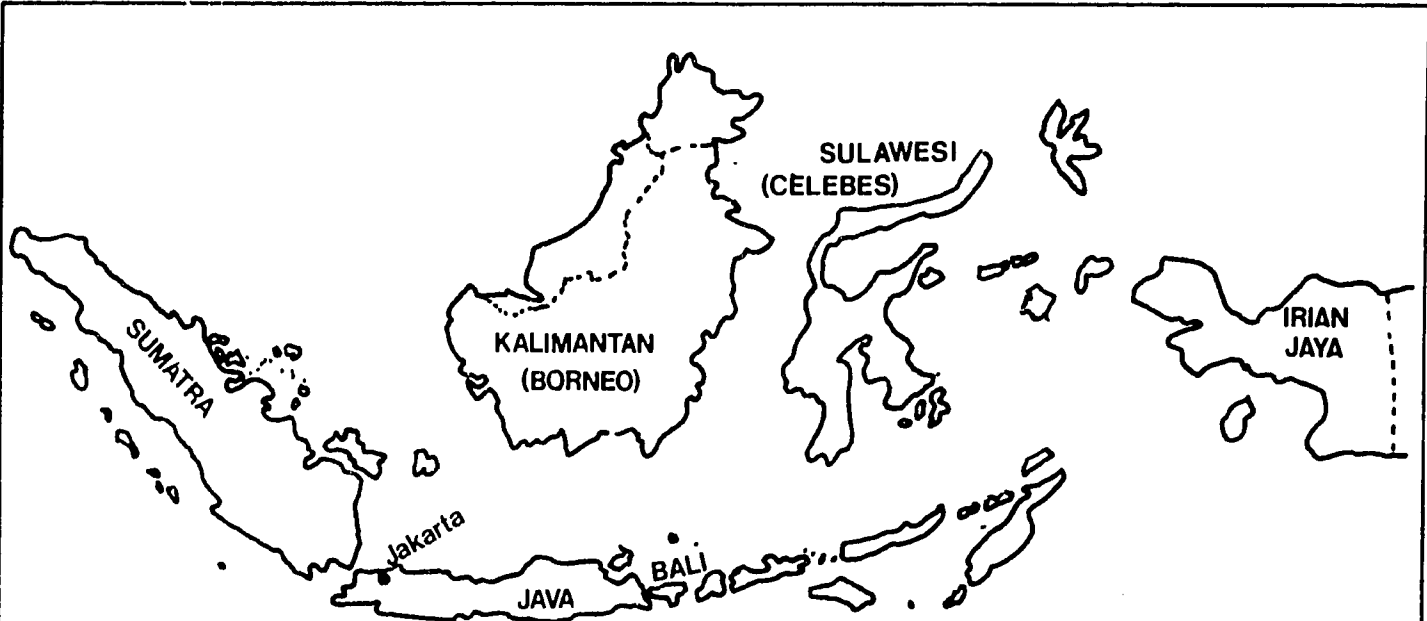

This report describes the programs of 67 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Indonesia with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 67 U.S. organizations included in the report, 44 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1981 totaling \$49,765,350. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and materiel shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Indonesia. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

It makes available to organizations, governments, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), maintains in its Bureau for Food for Peace and Voluntary Assistance a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. The resident associate is the Council's link to the social science community in the country with which the Council works in seminars, workshops, training grants, research projects and publications.

SOCIAL WELFARE: Helps support several day care centers on Java; the main center of activity is Jakarta. Over 2,000 children receive clothing, a meal and education on a daily basis. Assists approximately 50 leprosy patients at Surabaya.

Provides grants to projects which are initiated locally by governmental or voluntary organizations; during the fiscal year ending 9/30/80, provided funding for the programs described below.

COMMUNICATIONS: Through the Books for Asia program gave \$30,248 to provide American books and journals to scholars, libraries and other institutions; gave \$5,889 to provide key institutions, professionals and decision makers with special collections of Indonesian and English language books and journals.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Gave \$30,068 to Syiah Kuala University, Home Economics Department, to meet community needs in such areas as nutrition, home management, sanitation and child care, and to enhance women's role in development. Syiah Kuala University received \$32,075 to assist in the advanced training of staff, particularly pertaining to community development. Gave \$8,884 to the Irian Jaya Community Development Center to provide support

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services to agencies and institutions concerned with human resources development among tribal groups in Irian Jaya; aid included provision of consultants in nutrition and community development, and books for health centers. The Dioceses of Jayapura in Irian Jaya, and Aqats-Asmat received \$2,258 and \$10,559 respectively to support community development training and social action programs conducted by missionary groups working among Irian tribes. Gave \$101,913 to Yayasan Indonesia Sejahtera to cover administrative costs in support of a diverse range of community development activities. The Peasant's Socio-Economic Development Foundation received \$5,866 to provide partial scholarships for staff development training for seven participants at the Education and Training Center for Village Self-Reliance Group Facilities in Jakarta, and \$26,837 to conduct 20 courses to train members of the Center for Mutual Self-Help, Promotion and Development in agriculture, processing and marketing, home economics, savings, credit and management. Gave \$6,813 to the Indonesian Secretariat for the Development of Human Resources to allow the "Haur Geulis" Training Center to purchase practical tools and equipment for training high school dropouts and unemployed youth in the rural areas near Bogor, and \$3,198 to provide a full-time field motivator to work with the village level cadre in cooperation with the Center for Mutual Self-Help Promotion and the Association of Women of the Republic of Indonesia. Gave \$9,715 to the Indonesian Consumers Organization to promote the concept of consumer protection and rights in rural villages through the community development activities of six islamic women's groups. The University of Indonesia, Legal Documentation Center received \$59,439 to establish a legal information and documentation system serving the many legal aid groups country-wide.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: Gave \$7,474 to Muhammadiyah University, Medan, to conduct a two-week workshop on management training for managers of cooperatives in the province of North Sumatra.

EDUCATION: Gave \$31,527 to Syiah Kuala University to develop a secretarial training program for young Acehnese men and women to enhance their employment opportunities. Gave \$2,340 to the Institute for Economic and Social Research, Education and Information to enable development workers from selected Islamic private schools to undertake training programs, conduct surveys of rural technology, and upgrade their information centers and libraries. Gave \$3,572 to AISYIAH (Islamic Women's Organization) to conduct a course nationwide entitled "Improving the Quality of Leadership to Develop AISYIAH Entrepreneurship", and \$9,255 to the Association of Women of the Republic of Indonesia to establish a vocational training and service center to increase the income of rural women in South Kalimantan.

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FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Provided \$45,799 to Syiah Kuala University, Rural Development Center to coordinate and implement university-based rural development activities through pilot projects, publications and workshops. The Cenderawasih University, Faculty of Agriculture, received \$6,802 to strengthen the faculty at Manokwari in the Bird's Head region of Irian Jaya through training, research and outreach services, and to help solve their agricultural and forestry development problems. Gave \$10,467 to Yayasan Indonesia Sejahtera to develop prototypes and field test locally-appropriate solar food driers.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Provided \$14,211 to the Academy of Finance and Accounting, Semarang, to organize training and consultancy programs for small entrepreneurs throughout Central Java.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Gave \$41,472 to Yayasan Indonesia Sejahtera to conduct two water supply projects to implement the concept of integrated community development in Sumberbroto, East Java and Tarus, Nusa Tenggara Timur. Provided \$12,757 to the Department of Health, Bali, to translate ancient Balinese medical texts for adaptation and integration into modern medical practice. Provided \$9,127 to the Horticultural Research Institute to conduct research on the protein-rich saga bean on the islands of East Nusa Tenggara Province to promote its greater utilization. Gave \$3,153 to Yayasan Essentia Medica to publish 12 low-cost medical textbooks in the Indonesian Language.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Provided a grant of \$164,066 for the year ending 12/31/81 to the Indonesia Society for Secure

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Contraception (PKMI) to enable it to maintain a national headquarters; PKMI coordinates with professionals, research institutions, universities and hospitals in training, equipment, research and the exchange of technical information. Gave a grant of \$101,027 for the year ending 4/30/82 to PKMI to continue operations and improve a center for the repair and maintenance of publicly donated endoscopic equipment. Provided a grant of \$112,849 for the year ending 2/28/82 to the Jakarta branch of PKMI to ensure space for voluntary surgical contraception services in 12 Jakarta maternity clinics. This grant also covers refresher training of the maternity clinics' physicians. Gave a grant of \$43,823 for the year ending 5/31/82 to The Dharma Dutta Foundation to continue its coordination and financial assistance to the island-wide tubectomy and vasectomy services in government hospitals on Bali. Gave a grant of \$112,100 for the year ending 6/30/82 to Dr. Cipto Mangunkusumo General Hospital in Jakarta to provide support to Klinik Raden Saleh, and to continue to train physicians and nurses in tubectomy and vasectomy techniques. This grant will insure that sufficient trained manpower is available to provide services in the provinces of Kalimantan, Lampung and Jakarta. Provided a grant of \$67,900 for the year ending 8/31/81 to Airlangga University Medical School At Surabaya to provide training in male sterilization techniques to physicians and paramedical personnel. The long-range goal is to create sufficient trained manpower to make sterilization services readily available in the provinces of East Java, Bali, West Nusa Tenggara, East Nusa Tenggara and Timor Timur. Provided a grant of \$69,405 for the year ending 1/31/82 to Mangkuyudan Hospital, Gadjah Mada University, Jogyakarta, to support a training center where female and male surgical contraception techniques are taught to physicians and other medical personnel. The long-range goal is to create sufficient trained manpower to service the provinces of Central Java and Jogyakarta. Gave a grant of \$53,580 for the year ending 2/28/82 to Hasan Sadikin Hospital, University of Padjadjaran, to continue training programs for medical personnel at a center in Bandung. The long-range goal is to train sufficient personnel to service the province at West Java. Gave a grant of \$61,148 for the year ending 12/31/81 to Dr. Pirngadi's Hospital in Medan to provide training in female sterilization to medical auxiliaries and to general practitioners operating in military and government hospitals. Funds will cover the renovation of facilities in the Provincial Referral Hospital in Medan to provide recovery room space for voluntary sterilization requestors.

FUTURE PLANS: To initiate an information and education pilot project for the recruitment of tubectomy and vasectomy clients in Bali which is covered by the funding supplied to The Dharma Dutta Foundation.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Assisting selected communities and the various provincial and local governments on the island of Sulawesi in community improvement efforts, especially water systems development. Approximately 20 liters of safe water will be made available to each person per day upon completion of the project. Other activities include the initiation of health/sanitation education for the communities. CARE is cooperating with the Provincial Governments of South, Central, North, and South East Sulawesi to implement this project. Working in cooperation with the Provincial Government of Nusa Tenggara Barat, supports the following activities: construction of nine water systems; seven kilometers of village-to-market roads; establishment of home gardening and animal husbandry projects to benefit approximately 500 families; assistance in preparation of one-half hectare of rainland ricefield for 50 families; introduction of a public education program relating to clean water use, facilities, and maintenance, home gardening, animal husbandry and nutrition; and initiation of four beekeeping experimentation and training programs.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operating a project to improve the health status and living conditions of rural Balinese concentrating on provision of water systems at 10 sites and public education programs relating to clean water and sanitation. CARE and the Provincial Government of Bali cooperate to implement this project. In West Java providing safe water and sanitation education for selected rural communities. Constructing three water systems and 100 water tanks and will dig a well. Will install hand pumps at 210 locations, and prepare leaflets, flip charts and courses on clean drinking water, hand pumps and sanitation to educate beneficiaries in 27 communities. CARE implements this project with the Provincial Government of West Java.

COMMUNICATIONS: Sends tapes or scripts which are translated and taped by volunteers into the local language. These tapes are used by local radio stations to broadcast as a public service short, practical health messages on dental hygiene, disease prevention, drug abuse, ecology, family planning, mental hygiene, nutrition and sanitation. The messages, broadcast daily throughout the prime listening time emphasize preventive medicine. Each major category is given 10-30 second spots.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: In 1980 operated food-for-work programs which employed more than 100,000 people in such projects as road construction/rehabilitation, irrigation canal construction, dike construction, protecting rice fields and land clearing. In cooperation with the Government of Indonesia, supports a transmigration program designed to ease population pressure on overcrowded Java, Madura and Bali, and to promote regional development on sparsely populated outer islands such as Sumatra and Kalimantan (Borneo). The Government gives each family (often landless farmers) transportation to the new resettlement site, a house, provisions for one year and two hectares of land. The first hectare is roughly cleared prior to the arrival of the settler, who is then responsible for clearing the second hectare.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: In 1980 distributed donated materials to a number of hospitals, clinics and other institutions serving the needy, including medicines valued at \$664,452, clothing valued at \$183,257 and miscellaneous equipment valued at \$341,670.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operates a nutrition program in more than 200 villages on Java and other islands, serving more than 100,000 mothers and children; in 1980 distributed 7,409 tons of food to these people. The short-term goal of the program is to improve the health and nutritional status of malnourished children under five years of age and their pregnant and nursing mothers by providing a nutritious food supplement to their normal

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diet. The long-range goal is to educate the mothers on the importance of nutrition through monthly lectures by trained cadres at the time of distribution of food supplements. Conducts monthly weighing of children; their growth is plotted on a growth chart to graphically illustrate the importance of nutrition on growth.

SOCIAL WELFARE: In 1979 began relief operations in East Timor and in 1980 provided assistance to the 240,000 people of East Timor by distributing more than 20 million pounds of food, as well as 400,000 pieces of clothing; mobile teams of medical personnel provided basic medical care. Distributed corn and rice seed, and water buffalo which enabled the affected population to plant their fields.

Primarily funds community centers which provide basic services to children, and educational and income-generating programs for adults; projects are on Java, Sumatra, Flores, Ambon and Nusa Tenggara.

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EDUCATION: Helps support 40 centers which provide funds to families to help them meet the cost of their children's school expenses. Helps support 30 centers which provide vocational training in some form to parents and older children. Provides complete care for girls in two schools who cannot live in their local communities.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Established 10 crafts production cooperatives for low-income women.

The purpose of the program in Indonesia is to increase the availability of family planning services, particularly in rural areas, with a special emphasis on assistance with the provision of voluntary sterilization services.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Funded a project which integrates family planning services and information with income generating activities related to fisheries for 60 women from five villages from the Jorong sub-district in the district of Tanah Laut in South Kalimantan. Trains women to participate in the ongoing village-based family planning program and, simultaneously, to learn and practice fishery skills which will increase their family income, and to teach these skills to other women. The program is designed to bolster the acceptance of family planning by adding a development component to the village-based family planning program. The program is designed to break through the current plateau of family planning acceptance in these four areas.

Provides funds to the Department of Surgery of the Bayangkara Hospital at Ujung Pandang to provide vasectomy services to 600 acceptors at the Palopo District Hospital and to train six interns, five health center doctors and six last-year medical students in the vasectomy procedure. Since 1979, provides funds to the Ob/Gyn Department of the Navy Hospital in Ujung Pandang to continue offering voluntary surgical contraception on an outpatient basis; the local norm has been for women to be hospitalized for one or two days after sterilization.
