HOW TO USE THIS DIRECTORY

1. Sources

The information contained in this directory has been derived from a questionnaire completed by each of the organizations listed about activities pertinent to the organization's international health activities. The organizations and countries in which they operate are shown in the tables on pages 1-1 to 1-12.

2. Table of Activities and Countries

Organizations are indentified by primary activity and countries in which they are active, based on information provided by the organization. The organization is identified by its numerical order in the directory, rather than by an acronym.

3. Health Activities Classification System

This system was developed as a guide to assist organizations in identifying their various program activities. It forms the basis of the primary and secondary activities sections listed for each organization, when that information was provided on the questionnaire. The classification system is by no means exhaustive, and organizations have in some cases added other areas in which they are involved.

HEALTH ACTIVITIES CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

A. Disaster Relief:

Disaster and emergency relief, aid to refugees, and health services for migrant populations.

B. Environmental Services:

Water and sanitation projects, potable water systems and latrine construction.

C. Health Education:

School health classes, community participation in basic hygiene and health care.

D. Health Planning/management:

Infrastructure support, health systems financing, data collection and analysis, project administration, information systems.

E. Hospital/health centers:

Clincs, dispensaries, leprosia, sanitaria, hospices, mobile health units.

F. Maternal and Child Health/well child:

Pre- and post-natal services, breastfeeding promotion, growth monitoring, immunization, oral rehydration therapy.

G. Medical Equipment/supplies:

Vaccines, hospital equipment, pharmaceuticals, diagnostic tests.

H. Nutrition Services:

Nutrition education, food supplements, targeted feeding programs, school lunches.

I. Population and Family Services:

Birth spacing counseling, contraceptive distribution, demographic research.

J. Primary Health Care:

Integrated basic health services.

K. Research:

Laboratory, clinical, and operations research.

L. Special Disease Initiatives:

Communicable diseases, STDs, tropical disease programs, infectious and parasitic diseases.

M. Training of Health Care Workers:

Doctors, nurses, midwives, dentists, health auxiliaries, laboratory technicians, primary health care workers.
