INTRODUCTION

This directory is intended to facilitate communication among librarians and information professionals interested in the international aspects of the profession. Many of the people who worked on this directory have been involved with Washington State University's development projects through overseas assignment or campus support activities. Realizing the need for the exchange of experience among library consultants to development projects, a proposal for the directory was submitted to the University's Memorandum of Understanding Committee. The work on this publication was funded, in part, by monies from the Memorandum of Understanding/Program Support Grant to Washington State University from the U. S. Agency for International Development.

This second edition is an update of a preliminary edition that was published in 1987. Information for entries were compiled from responses to a questionnaire that was circulated to all land-grant institutions, universities in each of the fifty states, and library schools in the United States. In addition, announcements of the survey were published in library journals. Individuals who responded to the survey include information specialists in private industry, government, international organizations, and some foreign countries. Only librarians and information specialists who have served overseas as library consultants to a development project or to a developing country in Asia, Africa, Latin America or the Middle East have been included.

The main section of the directory is arranged alphabetically by last name. Each personal entry lists the individual's title, address, telephone number, education, area of specialization, language proficiency, project experience, and additional relevant experience. The name of the project appears on the first line of the narrative description of the project. The name of the host country, dates in country, and the project's sponsoring agency(ies) are listed to the left of the narrative for each project.
