

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

Respected Members of the Bangladesh Association for Community Education (BACE), Ladies & Gentlemen.

1. On behalf of the BACE Governing Body & myself, I welcome you all at the Annual General Meeting, 1987.

2. I have the pleasure of presenting the Annual Report for the financial year 1986-87. This is the 11th year of this organisation. During this period, BACE has made significant contribution in furthering the cause of community education, rural development, family planning and promoting income generating work for women. BACE has been cooperating with other important NGOS like Shawnirvar Bangladesh, Village Education Resource Centre (VERC), Ahsania Mission & Nari Maitry and working with institutions like IBA/CPMR, Dhaka University.

3. The BACE projects are still financed by the foreign and local donors. To make BACE self financing, a printing and packaging unit was set up in 1982 with NORAD assistance at 140, Motijheel Commercial Area, Dhaka on a piece of land leased out by the Ministry of Works. This is a modern offset press with camera & packaging unit. The press was handicapped so long for want of working capital and capable business management. So as per decision of the G.B, an agreement for collaboration with the Gonosasthya Kendra was signed and actions were completed on the side of BACE to convert the press into a limited company with shareholding of BACE and Gonosastha Kendra. BACE had requested Gonosasthya Kendra to contribute their share capital in the form of working capital, but their response is still awaited. Meanwhile BACE has taken some steps to revamp the management of the Press which is showing encouraging results. Some understanding has been reached with the National Bank Ltd. to provide an overdraft accomodation while the request of BACE to NORAD to provide a working capital fund of Tk. 10 lacs is being pursued.

4. The BACE pioneer project, Universal Primary Education, initiated since 1976, provides an alternative approach to accelerate Universal Primary Education through community participation. The project is in operation in 3 areas namely Meher Panchgaram, Bahadurabad & Farazikandi. The project was evaluated in 1987 with favourable findings.

5. BACE Scholarship Programme financed by the USAID/TAF ; SCF(UK) ; CIDA and local donors including National Bank Ltd. supported 7101 students during 1986-87. The Programme has furthered the causes of education, family planning and income generating work in project areas. Both internal & external studies have confirmed that the Scholarship support has enabled the children of poor families to prosecute studies, kindle the desire amongst them and inspire others to continue the studies, defer marriage and limit the size of family.

6. The BACE monthly news letter Gonoshikkha continues to disseminate information on community education, appropriate technology, science education, womens activities, health and nutrition, rural development and family planning. It is distributed free of cost and supported by earnings of the BACE Press and advertisement.

7. Under women's programme, ICOMP financed training programme, is under execution through Shawnirvar Bangladesh, Ahsania Mission and Nari Mairtry. 200 Shawnirvar credit workers were trained through 4 day's workshops at Bagerhat, thereafter 20 leading trainer's were trained in Dhaka University to take up trainers training at grass root level. This was delayed due to flood and thereafter for various disturbances. The Ahsania Mission has taken up training of women in Secretarial course for a year and also Sales Girl's training.

The Nari Mairtry has imparted Aya training to 8 females who are now attached with different families with enhanced pay . The next course will be taken up on the evaluation of the 1st course .

8. The BACE Gonobiddalaya Project financed by DANIDA commenced in 1982 was due to close on 15th Oct'1987. The programme has trained 860 males and 877 females in income generating works. The Donors agreed to finance the project upto June, 1988, while the 2nd phase of the project for another 5 years is being developed in accordance with the recommendations of the evaluation conducted jointly by the Donors & the IER, Dhaka University. It has recommended continuation of the existing Gonobidyalayas and setting up upto 6 new G.B's, one of which will be a model G.B. Considerable headway has been made in resolving the issue of the title of the land for the Chasi G.B. Rangunia to satisfy the Donors.

9. The question of acquiring the title of the Head office land at Motijheel in favour of BACE is being pursued with the Ministry of the Public Works both at the Secretary's and Minister's level. The pending case in the court between the Government and a private party has been found to be a stumbling block in resolving the matter.

10. I am glad to inform the A.G.M. that the BACE activities as reflected in last Annual Report (1985-86) was appreciated by the USA Library Congress office and they obtained 18 copies of the report for distribution amongst library of the following Universities :—

University of Pennsylvania, University of California, University of Chicago, University of Minnesota, Cornell University, University of Texas, University of Hawai, University of Washington, University of Wisconsin, Duke University, Columbia University, University of **Verginia** University of **Michigan** University of Illianois, **Syracuse** University, Harvard College Library, University of Roches^{ter} and University of Iowa.

I, on behalf of BACE, would like to place on record the appreciation of the BACE General Meeting and Governing Body for the general and continued support and assistance extended by the various organisations like Ministry of Education, Population control and Family Planning Division, USAID, DANIDA, SCF(UK), SCF(BC), NORAD, UNESCO, UNICEF. 


(M O N O G R A M)

Bangladesh Association for Community Education (BACE) is a non-governmental organization established in 1977 by a group of distinguished individuals concerned about education and development in Bangladesh. BACE is involved with problems such as low primary school enrolment, high dropouts, educated unemployed, acute shortage of technicians and craftsman and low level of skills particularly for the rural areas.

The Association was registered as voluntary association with the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies on February 1, 1978. The Registration Number is S-606/22 of 1977-1978. The Association was formally recognised by the Ministry of Education, Government of People's Republic of Bangladesh. BACE received the Tax-Exempt status on 9.1.79 (National Board of Revenue No.S.R.O.9 (80)TIV/78/1011). BACE has also been permitted to accept foreign donations under the Foreign Donation (Voluntary Activities) Ordinance 1978 under the Social Welfare Department Registration No.DSWFDORO 87.

In recognition of its activities in community education, BACE was awarded "NOMA Literacy Award-1980" by UNESCO.



S U M M A R Y

A. CURRENT ACTIVITIES

(i) Universal primary Education (UPE) :

The project, introduced since 1976, provides an alternative approach to achieve improved primary education through Village-based Kindergarten Schools called "Feeder Schools" and community participation. The project is being supported by Save the Children Fund, (Br. Columbia) and Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA).

(ii) BACE Monthly Newsletter Gonoshikkha :

The publication aims at disseminating information on community education, appropriate technology, science education, women's activities, youth development, sports, health, nutrition, rural development and population. Gonoshikkha is published from the earnings from the BACE Printing Press donated by NORAD.

(iii) BACE Scholarship Programme :

BACE Scholarship Programme has 4 donors consisting of SCF (UK), USAID/TAF, CIDA and local sponsorships providing 7,171 scholarships during 1986-87.

- (a) SCF (UK) : SCF(UK) introduced a scholarship programme since 1979 providing scholarships @Tk. 140/- for boys and @Tk. 175/- for girls, per quarter. Criteria for eligibility is poverty. During 1986-87, SCF(UK) provided 1,679 scholarships to students of secondary schools and madrasahs.
- (b) USAID/TAF : Introduced since 1982, the project covers all female students of 28 secondary schools of Shahrasti Upazila of Chandpur district. Total coverage was 5,409 female students during 1986-87 @Tk. 75/- per student.
- (c) CIDA : CIDA provided 50 scholarships for female Shawnirvar workers. The scholarships are awarded in recognition of the community development activities and those who could not continue study due to poverty or lack of opportunities.
- (d) Local : BACE awarded Scholarships to 33 students of different level of sponsorships Institutions from donations by benevolent patrons.

(iv) Gonobiddalaya (Community School) :

Established with DANIDA assistance in 1982 at Meher (Chandpur), Rangunia (Chittagong), Uchai (Joypurhat) and Khanjahania (Bagerhat) to provide low cost non-formal training of skills and basic needs oriented education to the rural people

with special attention to target groups such as school dropouts, unemployed youth, women and local artisans. The Government of Bangladesh introduced Community schools nation-wide following the BACE pilot experiments.

1987 is the closing year of the first Phase of the Project. The project has been evaluated by DANIDA and the second Phase of the project to run the Gonobiddalaya (Community School) as a movement is under negotiation with DANIDA.

(v) Printing Press and Training Centre Project :

A modern offset printing press with Camera , Packaging and Letter Press Unit has been installed at 140, Motijheel Commercial Area, Dhaka with NORAD assistance. The press is now on commercial operation. Earnings of the press support various BACE activities including Gonoshikkha.

(vi) Publications :

Founding member of BACE Dr. Ellen Sattar's book on Universal Primary Education in Bangladesh, funded by UNICEF, was published in 1982. The book had made an effective contribution in the formulation of the policies on primary education. The book was donated to BACE and the income from the book is used for BACE activities and for augmenting Community Education Award Fund. Prof. A.S.Islam's book "Reading through Rhymes" has been partially financed by BACE for publication. The book "At-Dashaker Sangram", biography of Community leader Azizur Rahman Patwari. (struggle for eight decades) has been published by BACE. This publication was funded by the Panchagram Shamabay. The English version of the book is under preparation for publication.

(vii) Leadership and Management Development of Women :

Financed by ICOMP, the project was organised in collaboration with Shawnirvar, Village Education Resource Centre (VERC) and IBA, Dhaka University to train women through workshops. Three rural level and three urban level workshops and one national level workshop were organised during 1985-86 imparting training to 213 Women executives. The second phase of the project imparting training to women workers through Shawnirvar Bangladesh, Nari Maiyetre and Ahsania Mission is under implementation with technical assistance of the I.B.A, Dhaka University. The third Phase of the project is under preparation and will be submitted to ICOMP in due course.

(viii) Mass Literacy :

BACE effort through Universal Primary Education project, Scholarship to Secondary Female Students, formal and nonformal education through 4 Gonobiddalayas, Gonoshikkha and leadership programme are positive steps to supplement government efforts towards mass-literacy programme, educational improvement and rural development.

- (ix) BACE-BCC Foundation Scholarship Programme.

BACE ANNUAL REPORT 1986-87

Introduction :

In its anxiety to deal with problems of low level of literacy, particularly among women, educated unemployment, acute shortage of technicians and craftsmen and low level skills particularly in the rural areas, Bangladesh Association for Community Education (BACE) has been executing the following projects :—

PROGRAMME/PROJECT ACTIVITIES :

1. UNIVERSAL PRIMARY EDUCATION (UPE)

BACE non-formal Universal primary Education project to provide Universal primary Education with community-based Feeder School (Village Kindergarten) was undertaken at Meher (N) Union of Shahrasti Upazila, Dist. Chandpur in 1976, financed by Ministry of Education upto Dec'81 and then by the Save the Children Fund (British Columbia and CIDA). The aim of the project is to increase enrolment and to decrease the drop-out, in other words, to bring all toddlers to the school and to retain them upto higher classes of the primary school. Twenty three Feeder schools, attached to 8 Primary Schools, have been established with Community support under a non-formal education system. The total enrolment and the retention rate of the students under this project is 50% higher than the rate of national average. Enrolment in 3 project areas during 1987 are as below :—

Special features of the project are :

- (i) The Community is involved on a continuing basis in primary education.
- (ii) Small Schools close to Children's homes, small average class size in the Feeder Schools giving each child a better chance of growth/learning.
- (iii) Women teachers are given preference for appointment and they act as model to the girl students as well as creating a caring atmosphere in the school; child care and family development through parent guidance is a new element;
- (iv) No corporal punishment is allowed and positive child development approach is encouraged;




Feeder school students under UPE Programme

- (v) An Aya in each school is particularly important where there is no women teacher as the aya provides "Shelter" needed for girls;
- (vi) All books are provided free to the students.
- (vii) Educational materials, a Cupboard and simple furniture are provided to each feeder school.
- (viii) Feeder school teachers are volunteers who accept lower salaries than Primary school teachers, thus keeping their recruitment cost per child to a minimum.
- (ix) Feeder school teachers are given once a month refresher training on child care.
- (x) Parents are involved in child care and teaching at home.

The project was evaluated at the instance of the Ministry of Education in 1980 by the Institute of Education and Research (IER), Dhaka University, and the BARD, Comilla which revealed enormous impact of the project on girls enrolment, attendance and retention with the following findings :-

Independent Evaluation :

- (a) "The project has had an enormous impact on girls enrolment, 49% of all the students being girls. Moreover, girls retention in the higher grades continues to be much higher than the national average.
- (b) The standard of instruction in grade 1 was considered higher than those in the primary schools of the adjoining union, Meher (south).
- (c) Attendance rates in the union were higher than those for the country as a whole.
- (d) Nienty percent of all the households with primary schools age children are attending schools".

Financial Evaluation :

"The recurring cost per enrolled student in the Meher Panchagram UPE compared quite favourable with those of ordinary primary schools in Bangladesh. This is true despite the fact that feeder schools supply their students with reading materials and some stationery. Nearly two-thirds of the total fixed cost of the project was financed by local resources. They have also contributed a part of recurring cost. If local resources could be mobilized elsewhere in Bangladesh, the treasury could be relieved of a substantial financial burden".

Mr. Nurul Huq, Retd. Director, R.D.A. Bogra evaluated the project in 1987 with favorable findings recommending further extension.

Administration :

- (i) Meher Panchagram : Project Manager with the assistance of local Education Committee and Block Committees administer the project.
- (ii) Bahadurabad : The local sub-committee assisted by Block Committees for each Feeder School under supervision of SCF(UK) project Manager through a supervisor is looking after the project.
- (iii) Farazikandi : The Neda-e-Islam supervises through local Education Committee and Block Committees.

BACE has planned to organise 6 Feeder schools attached to two primary schools around each of the 3 Gonobiddalayas following the Meher UPE model and 50 Mosque based Feeder schools.

2. COMMUNITY EDUCATION NEWSLETTER GONOSHIKHA :

BACE has been publishing the Monthly Gonoshikkha since 1978 and has published 76 issues of Gonoshikkha until 1987 for supply free of cost to Secondary schools, Madrashas, Union Parishads and voluntary organisations. The response from the recipients is positive and the newsletter has proved its utility. Efforts are being made to improve the contents and presentation and to make it more varied and attractive. On the recommendation of the Ministry of Education, UNESCO financed publication of this monthly upto October, 1984. The publication is continuing with funds generated by the BACE Printing press and local donors.

3. BACE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME :


In 1986-87, BACE awarded 7,171 scholarships to both secondary school girls and boys in various areas of rural Bangladesh. The programme has four donors:-

(i) SCF (UK) Scholarship programme:

Introduced in 1979, the scheme operates in Meher and Bahadurabad with varying economic and social environments. Apart from these two areas with 26 secondary schools, there are 3 other schools in relatively poor areas. Total coverage during 1987 is 1,220 boys and 459 girls. The main objective of the scheme was to encourage girls' education who come mostly from disadvantaged families. As the children of the poor families do not go to primary school, it was clear that the scheme had to operate in areas where at least some of the poor were reaching the secondary school. Meher (N) in Chandpur district is the pilot project area on Universal primary Education (UPE). During the last 11 years' operation of the pilot project, it has been proved that children of landless families do attend schools and aspire to become educated if adequate incentives and educational opportunities are easily available.

In view of monitoring and supervision difficulties, the donor has decided to concentrate at Bahadurabad area of Jamalpur district and to withdraw from other areas by 1989 when the present asardees will appear at the S.S.C Examination.

Prizes for best attendance, proficiency in examination have been introduced in 18 Secondary Schools of Bahadurabad area. Incentives in the shape of sports, cultural activities and book grant are under consideration.

Project officers stationed at Meher Panchagram and Bahadurabad supervise 26 secondary schools. The 3 individual schools are supervised by BACE headquarter staff.

The school scholarship committee consisting of the members of the school Managing Committee is responsible for initial selection and the BACE Education Committee screen the list for final and confirmation by the BACE Governing Body.

The SCF (UK) places fund on quarterly basis in Scholarship account on submission of expenditure statement. The students open their individual bank account. The scholarship money is transferred to individual accounts of the awardees. On receipt of stamped receipts, fund for the subsequent quarter is disbursed by SCF (UK). This procedure provides a built in quarterly review by the donor agency.

USAID/TAF SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME :

With the approval of the Government, an agreement was signed between BACE and USAID to provide scholarships to secondary school girls in rural areas from January, 1982, with a view to increasing continuation rates from primary to secondary schools and to reduce drop-out rates.

It is well known that with higher level of women's education from primary to secondary, couples tend to have smaller families. Educated women also practice late marriage. Twenty-eight secondary schools of the following 9 unions of Shahrasti Upazila and Meher Collolege covering 5,409 female awardees are Currently given Scholarship @ Tk. 75/- per month.

Under arrangement with the USAID, the fund is now channelled through the Asia Foundation. This procedure has the approval of the External Resources Division.

One Project Officer assisted by one Accounts/Assistant, one Statistician and 4 Inspectors supervise the project locally.

The following committees are responsible for selection and overall supervision:—

- (a) School Scholarship Committee at each school.
- (b) Regional Scholarship Committee at Meher Panchagram consisting of the selected Headmasters and the Bank Managers, Advisor, Panchagram Samabay as Chairman and Project Officer as Member- Secretary.

At the close of the first, second and thiru year, the project was evaluated 3 times by donors through external evaluators and the findings of each evaluation were encouraging and supportive of the project.

The synopsis of major findings and recommendations are as follows:—

- (i) The analysis of almost all the tables used in the Evaluation Report indicates that the ultimate goal of USAID Scholarship programme, as an experimental project in Shahrasti Upazila under Chandpur District is greatly in the process of being achieved. Although the duration of project was quite short, yet the impact of the project in achieving the ultimate goal of reducing the fertility of the Scholarship recipients seems to be highly Prospective.

- (ii) The Scholarship recipients were found to have lower percentage of marriage figures compared to the nonscholarship recipients.
- (iii) The mean ages of marriage indicates that the scholarship recipients had much higher mean marriage age than that of the non-scholarship recipients.
- (iv) Similar trend was observed in regard to the ideal age of marriage. The majority of un-married scholarship recipients were in favour of marriage at ages between 20-22 years.
- (v) Most of the scholarship recipients particularly the secondary school graduates were not in favour of early marriage as against a negligible number among the non-scholarship recipients holding the similar view.
- (vi) The non-scholarship recipients were married at much earlier ages than the scholarship recipients.
- (vii) The non-scholarship recipients had greater number of children than the scholarship recipients.
- (viii) Majority of the married women, among the scholarship recipients, desired to have not more than 2 children As against this, the majority of the non-scholarship recipients desired to have more than 3 children.
- (ix) So far as the knowledge on population problem of the country and on family planning method is concerned, 100% of the married scholarship recipients were aware of both population problem of the country and family planning methods. As against this a less number of non-scholarship recipients had the same level of awareness on these two aspects.
- (x) A very high percentage of the scholarship recipients both married and un-married believed in family planning method.

(iii) CIDA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME :


Shawnirvar Bangladesh has a large number of dedicated women workers. Some of these women workers dropped out from school for economic reasons, but they were anxious and interested to return to school if they got financial support.

To support 50 such rural female Shawnirvar workers who discontinued study for economic reasons in 10 intensive Shawnirvar thanas, a scholarship scheme @ Tk. 40/- per month per awardee for a period of 5 years (from January 1982 to December, 1986) was introduced with CIDA assistance.

The Programme will continue during 1987 and 1988 from savings.

The Shawnirvar Bangladesh, Dhaka in consultation with School Scholarship Committee (consisting of school Managing Committee) finalises the list of awardees and submit the same to BACE for approval. The BACE Education Committee after due serutiny accords approval

(iv) LOCAL SPONSORSHIP :

BACE made a general appeal for help to support educational expenses of poor boys and girls @ Tk. 380/- and 500/- per year respectively. Response is favourable and 33 scholarships were awarded in 1986. A copy of rules for administration of scholarship fund (local contribution) is at Appendix 'A'

Local financial institutions (Banks and Insurance Companies) have been approached and in response, National Bank Ltd. has donated Tk. one lac for one year which is under distributions as below: --

4. WORKSHOP :

BACE organises workshops on quarterly basis at Meher Panchagram to review the progress and problems of scholarship programme. It is attended by BACE representatives, project staff, Heads of Institutions, Bank Managers. At times, Representatives of donors also attend. The workshops have created greater awareness. Similar workshops were also organised at Bahadurabad.

5. GONOBIDDALAYA (BACE-DANIDA PROJECT):

With the approval of the Government, an agreement was signed with DANIDA in Oct. 1981, tenable for 5 years for developing Gonobiddalayas (community schools). The objectives of the Gonobiddalayas are to build up the character and to provide non-formal training on skills and basic needs oriented education for rural people, paying special attention to target groups involving the distressed and disadvantaged such as school dropouts, unemployed youths, women, local farmers, artisans and craftsmen on the basis of regional consideration, local initiative and support.

The Gonobiddalayas are located at Meher Panchagram (Chandpur), Rangunia (Chittagong), Uchai (Joypurhat), and Khanjahania (Bagerhat).

Sanctioned staff consisting of one Principal, 3 Instructors, one Accountant-cum-Assistant, one peon and one Night Guard are in position in all Gonobiddalayas. In addition to sanctioned staff, guest instructors and local officers are engaged for training purpose. A full-time Danish advisor on Community education assisted by a local counterpart has been placed at the BACE Office.

The project provides for construction. Progress is as below:—

a) Meher Panchagram	Male & Female hostels
b) Uchai	2 class rooms, training —cum—production centre & toilet, Hostel.

TRAINING :

So far 860 males and 877 females have been trained in different income generating works. The scheme has been revised in consultation with DANIDA Mission to induct talented people for giving a fair trial of the Danish folk high school ideas under the guidance of a full-time Danish advisor. The newly recruited Principals and Instructors were given ground training for 2 weeks and undertook a study tour to Indian Gonobiddalayas for 2 weeks.



The main features of the revised Gonobiddalaya Project are as follows :—

- (i) G.B. cell was constituted for quick disposal of Gonobiddalaya business.
- (ii) Recasting of budget to suit real needs and aspirations of Gonobiddalayas.
- (iii) Induction of experienced and qualified Principals and Instructors at a higher salary.
- (iv) Fifteen days inservice training given to the Principals and Instructors by the renowned educationists and experts.
- (v) To acquire practical experiences, a 15 day study tour for the Principals was arranged to see the Vidyapithas (People's College) and Rural Development Institutions in India.
- (vi) Introduce stipends and mid-day meals for the students.
- (vii) Introduction of six months course for 50 students (25 Boys and 25 Girls), age 16 to 25 years.
- (viii) Revision of course content to suit the need of the students with the following :—
Bengali, Arithmetic, History, Social Science, Primary Health care, Religion, Sports and Culture, Music, Family planning, Sewing, Carpentry, House wiring, Dairy, Welding, Cooking and Sramadan for community activities etc.
- (ix) Introduction of self reliant activities to make Gonobiddalayas self—reliant in future.
- (x) Introduction of compulsory Sramadan (two hours per day) for Gonobiddalaya Community activities included in the daily routine.
- (xi) Selection of students from underprivileged target groups.
- (xii) Ensuring legal perpetuity of Gonobiddalaya land and premises.
- (xiii) Communication and co-operation strengthened with the local community and local administration.

Project funding period expired on 15th Oct. 1987. Bridging fund has been agreed upto 30th June, 1988. Meantime, the second phase of the project will be developed and processed.

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The Project has been finally evaluated by joint team of BACE and DANIDA under technical guidance of the IER, Dhaka University. It has been recommended to extend by 6 Gonobiddalayas or more to run as a movement.

6. PRINTING PRESS, TRAINING CENTER AND SCHOOL PROJECT :

With the Government approval, BACE entered into an agreement with NORAD in 1981 to initiate following development activities in the field of education :

- (i) Construction of feeder schools and teacher's training centre ;
- (ii) Improvement of feeder schools , and
- (iii) Printing press.

Progress is as below :

- (i) Construction of the Teachers Training Centre is complete.
- (ii) Repair of 7 feeder schools and construction of model feeder school have been completed.
- (iii) Press Machines worth Tk. 30,48,298/- were imported and installed at 140, Motijheel C.A. Dhaka on a plot of land with part construction measuring 7,622 sft, allotted by the Ministry of Works. The press is in commercial operation since 1st July, 1984. The Press has been converted into a limited concern for better management. An agreement has been signed with the Savar Gonoshst haya Kendra providing management of the Press to a six Member Board of Directors on 50:50 basis. Gonoshasthy Kendra will nominate Mnanging Director while BACE Chairman will be Chairman of Board of Directors.

7. PUBLICATION :

Dr. Ellen Sattar's book Universal primary Education in Bangladesh funded by UNICEF/NORAD was published in 1982. The book has made an effective contribution in creating awareness on policies on Universal primary Education. The book has been donated to BACE. Its proceedings are used for BACE activities and for the A.R. Patwari Community Education Award

Prof. A.S. Islam's Book "Reading through Rhymes" has been partially financed by BACE for publication.

The book 'At Dashaker Sangram (Struggle for Eight decades), a biography of community leader, Mr. Azizur Rahman Patwari has been published by BACE with financial support from Mehar Panchagram Samabaya. The book will serve as a guideline for implementation of community—based development projects at the grassroot level. Sale of 3,000 copies of 1st edition is over. The 2nd edition was printed and are on sale. The English edition is also ready for publication.

Partial support on printing of life history of *Enam* Mahfuzul Haq, Chairman National Committee for Shawmirvar has been assured. The book is at the final stage of editing.

8. MASS LITERACY :

BACE effort through universal primary education project, scholarship to secondary school students in the project area, formal and non-formal education through 4 Gonobiddalayas and BACE monthly Newsletter Gonoshikkha and Leadership and Management development programme for women are positive steps to supplement government efforts towards mass literacy, family planning, educational development, women in education and development.

9. WOMEN'S PROJECT :

Upto December, 1981, BACE had been running two women's projects supported by UNICEF. One project was in Panchagram, Chandpur and the other in Kalabagan slum area of Dhaka city- Fifty two women in Mehar and thirty two in Kalabagan slum area were given income generation training with motivational effect on their neighbours. The result was encouraging. Programme activities are now carried on with local fund.

10. LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT OF WOMEN :

The project was undertaken by BACE with assistance of the International Council on Management of Population Programme (ICOMP) to provide training of

women through 7 workshops organised in 3 rural settings, 3 urban settings and one at National level with collaboration of Shawnirvar Bangladesh, Village Educational Resource Centre (VERC) and IBA of Dhaka University. In total 213 women Managers received training from the workshops.

The second phase of the project is under implementation in collaboration with VERC, & IBA Dhaka University, through Shawnirvar Bangladesh. Nari Maitree and Ahsania Mission.

Progress is as below

i) Shawnirvar Bangladesh :—

In field level, 200 workers under credit Programme have been trained and out of them, 20 leading female workers were given Trainers Training in Dhaka for 4 days to take up training at village level through 8 workshops which have been delayed due to devastating flood. Training will be resumed after flood condition improves.

ii) Nari Maritee :—

Training of 8 females (Aya) is over. They are now attached to different families and working with full satisfaction with increased wages. The next course will be developed on the light of evaluation of 1st course.

iii) Ahsania Mission :—

- a) Secretarial course training to 19 females for a year is continuing.
- b) Sale's Girls training is under process

11. BACE BUILDING PROJECT :

To accommodate its office, the offset/Printing press, with computer training centre, library, women's training centre and packaging unit and other related activities, BACE has developed a building construction project and submitted to donors.

12. EXTENSION OF UPE PROJECT AROUND 3 GONOBIDDALAYAS :

BACE proposes to run Feeder Schools within the command area of each of the 3 Gonobiddalayas (ward in which the Gonobiddalayas is located) on Mehar Panchagram Model.

13. MOSQUE BASED UPE PROJECT :

The project envisages universalisation of primary education along with religious education through Mosques.

14. COMMUNITY HORTICULTURAL NURSERY DEVELOPMENT :

BACE proposes to develop village Horticultural Nursery Development programme attached to the Gonobiddalayas.

15. WOMEN'S RESIDENTIAL HIGH SCHOOL :

The scheme envisages to develop 4 residential high schools on the model of Bharetshury Homes, Mirzapur. One such pilot school is being established in Panchagram with the help from the Women's Education trust.

16. RURAL CHILD CARE AND FAMILY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME :

The Project envisages development of rural childcare and family development programme including MCH and Family planning.

17. WOMEN'S VOCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT :

Development of Vocational training for Women.

18. Secondary School Girls Scholarship Programme under Kaharuj upazila, Dist. Dinajpur— To introduce Scholarship Programme in a backward area of Dinajpur district.

19. BACE—BCC Foundation Scholarship Programme — To introduce Scholarship Programme in Shyamgram and Rasullabad High Schools of Nabinagar Upazila.


Group Insurance and Staff Welfare Fund have been introduced. Introduction of Service Rules and Contributory Provident Fund is under contemplation.



RULES FOR ADMINISTRATION OF BACE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

(Local Sponsorship)

1. Short Title --- These rules may be called the Bangladesh Association for Community Education Scholarship Programme (Local Sponsorships) Rules, 1983.

2. Contribution --- Any person in Bangladesh, a national or a resident may subscribe to this fund supporting education of students male and female, at secondary, higher secondary, degree or masters level of a minimum rate of Tk. 500/- for a female and Tk. 380/- for a male student per year, provided that the above scholarship rates can be varied with mutual agreement between the donor and the BACE.

2(a) The donor may send his contribution by cash against a receipt signed by an authorised officer or by account payee cheques, or Bank draft in favour of Bangladesh Association for Community Education.

3. Administration --- The fund will be administered at the School level by a School Scholarship Committee Consisting of School Managing Committee members and at national level by the BACE Governing Committee. In case of College/University/Professional Institute, BACE in consultation with the authority concerned will administer the fund.

4. Maintenance of Accounts --- All funds donated under these rules will be kept in a Schedule Bank in Savings Account under BACE Scholarship Fund (Local sponsorship) to be operated under joint signature of any two of three authorised persons, viz, Chairman, Treasurer and Director.

4 (a) Disbursement of Scholarship money under these Rules will be made on a quarterly basis through account payee cheques.

4 (b) Every awardee will open a Savings Bank Account and the Scholarship money will be deposited/transferred to that account by BACE.

4 (c) The awardee will send receipt countersigned by the Head of the Institute of his authorised official to BACE within one month of receipt of account payee cheque. Subsequent release of fund will depend on receipt of the countersigned receipt for previous period.

4 (d) BACE will maintain a Fund Register, institution/awardee wise showing disbursement of scholarship money. The Register will remain open to the donor for inspection on request.

5. Selection --- The donor will have option in nominating awardee and institutions which will not be altered except by consent in writing of the donor provided that for unsatisfactory performance by any awardee, BACE may withdraw the scholarship under intimation to the donor.

5 (a) In case of no option exercised by the donor in selection of awardee/institution, BACE will follow the normal rules for distribution of such scholarship operated by BACE.

5 (b) Minimum donation will be Tk. 500/- for a girl and Tk. 380/- for a boy to support one year's study according to academic year/session. There is no maximum limit. The donor has to deposit the whole year's scholarship fund in advance to BACE.

5 (c) At the close of each academic year/session, the BACE will furnish a statement of accounts to the donor.

6. Amendment -- The BACE Governing Body reserved the right to further amend the Rules from time to time according to necessity
