

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
INTRODUCTION

The A.I.D. Participant Training Program is a vital element of U.S. foreign assistance. Its primary goal is the development of the human resources potential of citizens of developing countries. High-level training is important to meet more effectively the changing needs for managers, scientists, technicians, teaching faculties, and institutional leaders in all sectors.

More than 18,000 A.I.D.-sponsored participants received academic or technical training in the United States in the past Fiscal Year. Slightly less than half of these were enrolled in academic programs in U.S. colleges and universities, while more than half received technical, non-degree training. Most A.I.D. participants are professionals already engaged in an occupation or career.

The Office of Housing and Urban Programs sees U.S. participant training as an opportunity to support shelter and urban development institutions in developing countries. Given the seriousness of shelter and urban problems in developing countries and A.I.D.'s strong relationships with key housing and urban development institutions in those countries, we know that there are many individuals who need and would be appropriate candidates for relevant training and education in the U.S. Several subjects are important for this purpose: national housing policy, national urban development policy, land policy, public/private collaboration in urban service delivery, housing finance, housing needs assessment methods, urban and regional planning, real estate development, urban land management, municipal management, municipal finance, feasibility assessment methods, project planning, and project implementation.

The Office of Housing and Urban Programs has prepared this catalogue to assist A.I.D. field personnel identify U.S.-based training programs that are appropriate to the training needs of the countries in which they are working. The catalogue should be a handy reference not only for Regional Housing and Urban Development Officers and Mission Housing Advisors, but Mission Training Officers and other Mission officers working in related sectors.

THE CATALOGUE

The first edition of this catalogue was published in March 1988. This second edition reflects changes and additions we have collected since then.

The training programs included here are of two types. The first section provides an information sheet for degree programs of one or two year duration at the graduate level. The second section provides an information sheet for short term courses, seminars, and workshops; these programs do not grant degrees, but may grant certificates.


The Office of Housing and Urban Programs has gathered course information from a number of different sources. The Office contacted institutions with whom it has relationships, institutions which were suggested or recommended to the Office, and institutions which were known by name, reputation or affiliation. Altogether, inquiries were made to over 100 institutions about their courses, seminars, and workshops.

In the first edition, subject areas were limited to traditional urban development disciplines. Field personnel using the catalogue requested that topic categories be expanded to include courses in community development and participation, and administration and management. The reader will find a few courses listed here which address these topics, and as we discover more such courses, they will be included in the next edition. Likewise, there is a growing interest in courses offered in foreign languages in the United States. No such courses are listed in this edition of the catalogue, but if you know of any please let us know.

In our search for participant training courses, we find that there are in fact very few courses which are specifically geared towards students from developing countries. However, as the catalogue develops and more information is acquired, we will be able to include specialized courses that are more applicable for such students.

The information provided should be sufficient for the A.I.D. field officer, the U.S. based placement officer, or the participant, to make an initial determination of the suitability of a course or program. For further information, the reader is invited to contact the institution directly. The Office of Housing and Urban Programs may also be able to provide assistance.

With your assistance, we are better equipped to identify relevant training opportunities and to collect timely information on degree and non-degree programs.
