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
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ORGANIZATIONAL CHART OF

I. Overview of A.I.D. Population Assistance

Policy. Support for voluntary population and family planning programs is an essential part of U.S. development assistance. Family planning programs enhance individual freedom to choose freely the number and spacing of children, provide critical health benefits for mothers and young children, and contribute to more rapid social and economic development.<sup>1</sup>

Program Strategy. Technical assistance and program resources are provided to developing countries through a wide range of A.I.D. activities that include family planning assistance, information, education and training programs, policy analysis, and four broad areas of research: demographic, social science, operations, and biomedical. Service delivery and supporting research have the highest priority for the Agency.

Within the guidelines of A.I.D.'s population sector strategy, factors considered in the design of country-specific assistance include an assessment of each country's need to: (a) strengthen government commitment to voluntary family planning, (b) develop effective public and private family planning programs, (c) increase the utilization of these programs, and (d) decrease dependence on external donors for program support.<sup>2</sup>

Funding. Congress appropriates funds for population assistance under the Population Planning Section of the Foreign Assistance Act. Funding has totalled nearly \$3.4 billion over the last twenty-three years, \$1.9 billion of which has been obligated since 1981. In 1988, the population budget amounted to \$232 million. A.I.D. funds accounted for almost half of the external population assistance available to developing countries from all bilateral and multilateral sources in 1988. A summary of A.I.D. funding for 1965-1988 is provided on page 6.

Organization of Assistance. Population assistance is provided by the Bureau of Science and Technology's Office of Population (S&T/POP) through centrally-funded projects, and by A.I.D.'s Regional Bureaus - Africa, Asia/Near East, and Latin America/Caribbean - either through bilateral

(country-to-country) projects monitored by A.I.D.'s overseas Missions (USAIDs) or through regional projects monitored by the Regional Bureau offices in Washington, D.C. The Bureau for Program and Policy Coordination (PPC) allocates the population budget among A.I.D. bureaus and exercises policy and program oversight. See organizational chart on page iii.

The Population Sector Council reviews policy and program issues related to population assistance. The Council is chaired by the Agency Director for Population (who is also the Director of S&T/POP); the Regional Bureaus and PPC are members of the Sector Council.

The current allocation of resources among the different bureaus is as follows:

- o The Office of Population, whose work is described in this Guide, accounts for about 47 percent of A.I.D.'s population assistance. S&T/POP carries out its activities through 47 grant agreements and contracts with U.S. government and private agencies.
- o Bilateral programs, accounting for about 40 percent of population assistance, are carried out by A.I.D. Missions in 32 countries.
- o Regional population assistance programs are managed by A.I.D. Regional Bureaus and account for about 11 percent of assistance.
- o The remaining 2 percent goes to support special Agency initiatives in the population field.

## II. The Office of Population (S&T/POP)

Role. S&T/POP projects are designed to strengthen USAID assistance to country family planning programs worldwide. The projects fall into two broad categories: those which support current family planning service delivery and research to enhance future efforts in the population field. About 80 percent of S&T/POP activities support service delivery and include:

- o Programs to enhance policy developments that can legitimize and encourage family planning programs;
- o Program support for voluntary family planning programs, particularly for innovative activities;
- o Training of program personnel;
- o Provision of contraceptive supplies; and
- o Assistance to population information and education programs.

Research, which accounts for the remaining 20 percent of S&T/POP funding, builds the scientific and technological base for future program efforts. Research support includes:

- o Biomedical research on safer, more acceptable, more effective, and more affordable methods of contraception;
- o Operations research to improve the management and operation of service delivery programs; and
- o Social science and demographic research to increase knowledge of population dynamics and to improve the collection and analysis of demographic data.

Relationship to A.I.D. Overseas Missions. S&T/POP activities are designed to complement USAID programs. For this purpose, the Office of Population has developed 47 contracts or grant agreements with U.S. institutions - mainly private sector organizations - to work with LDC public and private institutions. S&T/POP projects provide support to activities that are not readily included in the 32 existing bilateral population programs or, in those countries that do not receive bilateral assistance, provide population support which complements the USAID development assistance strategy. S&T/POP is currently funding more nearly 1,300 activities in about 90 countries.

Annually, the Office of Population develops a resource allocation plan that reflects the judgements of the Regional Bureaus and country Missions on the priority needs for Office of Population assistance resources. This plan allocates S&T/POP funds by functional area, region, and contractor or grantee. In addition, Missions sometimes "buy in" to Office of Population projects with their own funds to augment their share of S&T/POP activities. The Office of Population tracks the implementation of the allocation plan and provides reports on the amount and type of population assistance provided.

Organization of the Office of Population. S&T/POP has five divisions. In addition, an Operations Coordination Staff assists the Director in coordinating the funding and implementation of the S&T/POP program with the activities of Missions and Regional Bureaus. The division functions include:

- o Policy Development Division (PDD): Improves demographic research and data collection, assists LDC policymakers and researchers in understanding the impact of rapid population growth on economic development, and supports the development of appropriate LDC policies and programs.
- o Research Division (R): Supports development of new fertility regulation technologies and, through operations research, improves family planning delivery systems.

- o Information and Training Division (IT): Improves awareness of the availability and use of family planning methods, and expands and strengthens the technical skills of LDC family planning and health personnel.
- o Family Planning Services Division (FPSD): Encourages and supports private sector involvement in family planning service delivery, and supports evaluation of family planning activities.
- o Commodities and Program Support Division (CPSD): Provides a centralized system for contraceptive procurement and maintains a data base on all population projects and commodity assistance.

Project Activities. Each division carries out its responsibilities through a number of S&T/POP projects. The funding for projects supported in 1988 is summarized in Table 1 on page 5.

PURPOSE: To conduct sample surveys of contraceptive knowledge, availability, and use and/or recent demographic levels and trends.

BENEFICIARIES: Data generated by this project will be used by developing country governments to evaluate recent family planning and demographic levels and trends, and to improve programs for providing family planning and MCH services to the poor.

DESCRIPTION: During the past several years A.I.D., through its support of the World Fertility Survey, Contraceptive Prevalence Surveys, and Birth and Death Data Collection projects, has been a leader in supporting sample surveys to provide this needed information. The Demographic and Health Surveys project carries on the most important functions of these projects. The primary objectives of DHS-I have been to: a) provide financial and technical support to developing countries in conducting a total of 35 demographic and health surveys; b) disseminate survey results quickly to policymakers and family planning program administrators; and c) strengthen institutional capabilities in host countries for undertaking future surveys of this type.

Under DHS-II, IRD will: a) undertake a careful assessment of DHS data quality and future data needs; b) further improve the Integrated System for Survey Analysis software and organize up to 10 Integrated System for Survey Analysis workshops; c) conduct approximately 25 additional DHS surveys; d) disseminate DHS data via reports, conferences, special presentations, and distribution of data files; and e) promote further analysis of DHS data by host country researchers, program managers, and the international population and health communities.

PURPOSE: To strengthen the capacity of developing countries to process, evaluate and analyze demographic and family planning data as well as other social and economic data.

BENEFICIARIES: Developing country statistical institutions: specifically personnel responsible for the analysis, evaluation and use of demographic data; policy makers and planners who will use the improved data for more effective development planning.

DESCRIPTION: Under a Cooperative Agreement, The East-West Population Institute (EWPI) is working to enhance the capacity of developing countries in the Asian and Pacific region to collect, process, evaluate and analyze population and family planning data. Emphasis is on the analysis of demographic trends, their social and economic consequences and related policy implications. Major activities include conducting conferences, workshops and training programs and providing technical consultations. The East-West Population Institute will cooperate with population-related organizations in the region to contribute to the knowledge and solution of population problems affecting countries of this region. Audiences include government policymakers and planners as well as the research community.

DESCRIPTION: The Committee on Population will conduct the following four main activities: 1) workshops for researchers and policymakers on up to 5 topics involving commissioned background papers; 2) in-depth assessments of 3-4 major population issues; 3) experts meetings lasting 1-2 days to address up to 8 important policy questions; and 4) two large conferences for US and foreign researchers, policymakers, development specialists and population program managers to discuss the work of the Committee on Population.

During 1988-89, the Committee will complete work on an assessment of the health consequences of contraceptive use and controlled fertility. A major conference on the demographic and programmatic consequences of new contraceptive technology was held in October 1988.

BENEFICIARIES: Policymakers and program planners in developing countries who need accurate and timely information to make informed policy decisions.

DESCRIPTION: The Population Reference Bureau provides creative design, production and targeted distribution of publications and supporting materials in a variety of formats (booklets, chartbooks, posters, factsheets, slide presentations, press kits, etc.) on population and family planning. Two in a series of four thematic booklets have been published in six languages and sent to a select list of policymakers in 29 countries. The first two booklets are entitled, "Family Planning Saves Lives: A Strategy for Maternal and Child Survival" and "Contraceptive Safety: Rumours and Realities."

Subprojects are being carried out in up to seven countries to assist developing country institutions to enhance their ability to improve the use of research findings by country leaders. Subprojects are underway in Ghana, Madagascar, Mali, (Sahel region), Somalia, Turkey and Zimbabwe and another subproject is being developed in Nepal. IMPACT has collaborated with other organizations in preparing special materials for conferences and seminars. IMPACT and DHS are collaborating on a series of summary reports on the country Demographic and Health Surveys. The IMPACT project also responds to ad hoc requests for materials on population and family planning. Short turnaround in producing quality materials is characteristic of the project.

DESCRIPTION: The RAPID III project supports collaborative analyses of the implications of population growth for national development and health. Analyses also estimate family planning program requirements to meet expected future demand for services. Analyses utilize microcomputer-based simulations which project population growth under alternative fertility and family planning program assumptions. Integral to the RAPID III approach is the strengthening of local institutional capabilities for conducting population analyses. This is accomplished through technical training in US-based courses and country-based workshops, in addition to microcomputer transfer. RAPID III carries forward aspects of the RAPID II, INPLAN, and DDD/Westinghouse projects. The project supports activities in over 25 countries with major emphasis on sub-Saharan Africa.

DESCRIPTION: This is a five-year project designed to assist private businesses and health care systems to incorporate family planning services into their health care programs. The chief audiences for this project are business owners, private health system managers, administrators, as well as private business persons who manufacture or distribute family planning products. Activities consist of country assessments, seminars, workshops, business analyses, study tours, and management fellowships. A minimum of 20 subprojects are being carried out in 10 developing countries. These subprojects are business analyses which examine the cost and health benefits of family planning. Project activities assist in developing plans for implementing national population policies as is now being done in Nigeria, Sudan and Zaire. In addition, assistance is provided to eliminate legal and regulatory barriers to family planning. PURPOSE: To support the Population Council's contraceptive development program, contraceptive introduction, the provision of technical information to the international population and family planning community, and provide limited funds and technical assistance to institutions in developing countries for service delivery systems, research, evaluation, training and contraceptive marketing.

BENEFICIARIES: Population/family planning professionals throughout the world through publications of research data and other papers; local clientele in developing countries, generally urban and rural poor, through application of research and demonstration activities by host country professionals.

DESCRIPTION: Two important ongoing, activities in FY 1989 will be technical assistance for the introduction of Copper T 380A IUDs and Norplant<sup>R</sup> Implants. Other research areas include the development of second generation subdermal implants, contraceptive vaginal rings, a levonorgestrel-releasing IUD, gonadotropin releasing hormone analogs for male contraceptives, and new spermicides. In the contraceptive introduction area, the Council conducts activities to establish local experience and a management organization for the worldwide introduction of NORPLANT<sup>R</sup> implants and the Copper T 380A IUD. In addition, family planning program research and technical assistance is supported in such areas as post-partum family planning, breastfeeding promotion, and the study of various issues related to the introduction of new contraceptive technology being developed by the Council.

PURPOSE: To improve, through operations research, the quality, accessibility and cost-effectiveness of family planning and maternal-child health delivery systems in the developing world and to strengthen developing country institutional capabilities to use operations research as a management tool to diagnose and solve service delivery problems.

BENEFICIARIES: Over 40 million persons served by delivery systems in which the project operates; most beneficiaries are rural.

DESCRIPTION: This project provides short- and long-term technical assistance and funding for design, implementation and- with particular emphasis- evaluation of service delivery systems in developing countries. Health components focus on maternal and child health, e.g., oral rehydration, immunization and anti parasite drugs for young children. Several projects are designed to test the acceptability and cost-effectiveness of natural family planning services.

SCOPE: Worldwide - principally operating through five year contracts and cooperative agreements. During these workshops, alumnae will develop or update proposals to extend family planning services in their respective countries, including plans for local financing through fees for service or other income generating activities designed to develop self sufficiency. Most of the sub projects are being managed by CEDPA alumnae and will receive financial support for up to three years. It is expected that after the start-up period they will either have become self-sufficient or will have secured other donor financing.

BENEFICIARIES: Urban and rural couples in Latin America and the Caribbean. The project gives special attention to the major non-bilateral countries in the LAC region: Brazil, Colombia and Mexico.

DESCRIPTION: Organized in 1953, the IPPF/Western Hemisphere Region (WHR) was incorporated as a U.S. private voluntary organization in 1955 in the State of New York. It currently has 43 member associations of which 35 receive funds and technical assistance from WHR. WHR provides technical, advisory and commodity services to selected Family Planning Associations (FPAs) throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. The five year program expands community-based distribution programs; increases family planning services through a network of private doctors (700); establishes family planning services in collaboration with the public and private sector; establishes family planning associations with private voluntary organizations; activates management information systems in FPAs; increases resource allocation to FPAs; carries out client surveys; provides technical, advisory and evaluation assistance to member FPAs throughout the region.

As a result of this project, it is expected that an additional 2.8 million new clients will have received family planning information and services, 10 million clients will have been served, and participating FPAs will have strengthened management and family planning services in their respective communities. This project gives special assistance to FPAs not covered under USAID mission agreements, and the matching grant mechanism assures that A.I.D. does not become the sole sustaining donor to WHR.

PURPOSE: To provide a mechanism for consolidated purchases of centrally-procured contraceptives using central as well as bilateral/regional funds transferred by Regional Bureaus to S&T/POP's central account at the beginning of each operational year.

BENEFICIARIES: Recipients of family planning services in developing countries who are provided with safe and effective contraceptive products.

DESCRIPTION: Before the development of a central system for contraceptive procurement, purchases were made on an ad hoc basis and prices paid for products fluctuated considerably as the unpredictable timing of procurement actions, piecemeal purchases, and short lead times before expected production contributed to industry's inability to do adequate long-range forecasting. Consequently, since the mid-1970s, A.I.D. has been using a centralized funding and consolidated procurement system that aggregates worldwide requirements of selected contraceptive commodities for annual purchases. In September 1979, an Agency-wide Task Force on Contraceptive Procurement was convened to examine the Agency's procurement practices and procedures. The Task Force's findings included a variety of recommendations on requirement estimation, reporting procedures and commodity management, and one that required the Administrator's approval. In March 1980, the Administrator approved the establishment of a central contraceptive procurement project and a system of budgeting and funds control that maintained responsibility at the USAID level for budgets and inventory management.

The central procurement system currently provides for the purchase of a low-dose oral contraceptive and a progestin-only pill for public sector programs, three combined pills for subsidized commercial sales programs, a vaginal foaming tablet and twelve condom brands with differentiated packaging for public sector and sales programs, and the Copper T 380A IUD. For additional details on formulations, brands, prices, contract terms and ordering procedures, please refer to the guidance accompanying S&T/POP's annual contraceptive procurement table package.
