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Overview of U.S. Voluntary Agencies' Activities

The Agency for International Development (A.I.D.) recognizes the significant role that Private and Voluntary Organizations (PVOs) play in Third World relief and development. Although the PVOs registered with A.I.D. vary tremendously in size, scope, and capability, they share a strong commitment to improving the quality of life of people in less developed countries.

In recent years the hallmark of PVO efforts has been the shifting in emphasis from conducting short-range relief projects to planning and implementing long-term programs geared toward eliminating the underlying causes of world hunger and poverty. This expansion of emphasis marked the emergence of the second generation of the A.I.D./PVO relationship in which the PVO has assumed the role of implementor, directly undertaking field projects in a variety of sectors. Most recently A.I.D./PVO collaborations have focused on the task of strengthening the capacities of indigenous organizations. While continuing to be responsive to immediate human needs, particularly in emergency situations, many PVOs are now contributing their valuable resources to activities which A.I.D. considers crucial to improving conditions in the Third World: building institutions, transferring appropriate technology, and encouraging investment in private enterprise. These comprise the major principles upon which A.I.D.'s development assistance program is based and upon which A.I.D.'s partnership with PVOs is focused.

This partnership can take several forms. First, PVOs act as independent agents, conducting their own programs with A.I.D.'s support. They can also act as intermediaries for A.I.D., specifically where A.I.D. strategies and PVO project objectives coincide in developing countries. While each type of partnership is different, all joint A.I.D./PVO projects recognize the independent, voluntary nature of PVOs. In line with Congressional legislation, PVOs must obtain at least 20% of their annual financial resources for their international programs from non-U.S. Government sources in order to be eligible for A.I.D. funding.

Whatever the terms of the relationship, PVOs make an important contribution to the foreign assistance programs conducted by A.I.D. By joining forces and complementing each other's capabilities and scope, A.I.D. and PVOs can accomplish more than either could alone; A.I.D. is committed to strengthening that partnership. The economic impact of the PVO programs supported by A.I.D. has been enhanced by: placing increased emphasis on program integration; focusing resources on field programs; taking into account the diverse nature and capabilities of PVOs as policy development and grantmaking decisions are made; simplifying and standardizing the PVO administrative relationship with A.I.D. whenever possible; establishing a central point of contact in A.I.D. for PVO information, coordination, and dissemination in the Bureau for Food for Peace and Voluntary Assist-

ance; and providing PVOs ample scope for independence in the actual design of project activities, bearing in mind that A.I.D. links the concepts of cost-sharing and program independence in its grant relationships with PVOs.

The following pages describe the general nature of the work being carried out by the PVOs which are registered with A.I.D. Included is such information as a PVO's geographic focus and sectoral concentration, as well as summaries of support, revenue, and expenditures. As of July 31, 1988 there were 205 PVOs registered with A.I.D. PVOs required to submit support and revenue data received \$571,508 (million) in private contributions, and the U.S. Government provided them with a total of \$1,010,172 (million) in the form of grants, contracts, U.S. Government-owned excess property, ocean freight subsidies, and P.L. 480 donated food.

Register of Voluntary Agencies

Who they are and what they do

The rules governing the registration of nongovernmental, nonprofit agencies engaged in voluntary foreign aid are promulgated in Part 203, Chapter II, Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations. Such aid includes projects and services of development, relief, and rehabilitation to needy nationals and refugees in health, education, welfare, agriculture, industry, emigration, and resettlement. Summary of Grants Set-Aside for PVOs

The types of A.I.D. assistance relationships available to U.S. PVOs from FVA/PVC and other A.I.D. bureaus, offices, and missions are described in the following. Registration with A.I.D. is a prerequisite for application for each.

Grants and cooperative agreements are both types of assistance provided to PVOs by A.I.D. These terms are used interchangeably in the following discussions.

Field Support for PVOs

With funding provided both through U.S.A.I.D. Missions and A.I.D./W regional bureaus, A.I.D. deals primarily with private and voluntary organizations at the country level through field support grants, a term which encompasses both Operational Program Grants (OPGs) and co-financing program grants. The program may support direct service delivery, provision of technical assistance and training, or may involve institutional strengthening of a U.S. or local based private voluntary organization.

Matching Grant Program

Matching Grants are awarded to PVOs for a clearly conceived, evaluable, field-oriented program to be carried out in a number of countries, which is consistent with A.I.D.'s legislative mandate and supports a clearly defined, delineated program. Such a program may be as broad as the overall scope of the PVO's work

or as specific as community-based health services or small enterprise development. The matching grant will normally allow a PVO to expand its program to new places and initiate new projects. Grants are awarded to PVOs with well-established development programs and with demonstrated private fundraising ability. The grant may have a term of three to five years and is matching in the sense that A.I.D. will pay no more than 50% of the cost of the program. Through the Matching Grant, A.I.D. supports small enterprise development, local institution-building, and technology adaptation and transfer, directly and as they result from programs in agriculture and rural development, health, education and energy.

Partnership Grant Program

Partnership grants are an extension of the Matching Grant concept. To qualify, the PVO must have a successful record of implementing multiple, ongoing relationships with the Agency. The concept is to merge several independent relationships that a PVO may have developed with several A.I.D. offices or Missions, into a single agreement with a mutually agreed upon strategic plan for program implementation. Centrally managed, the agreement encourages individual A.I.D. offices and field Missions to "buy-in" to support country specific activity which is consistent with the scope of the agreement. These grants are authorized for a five-year period, and are expected to enhance the PVO's role in addressing development

priorities shared by A.I.D. Partnership Grants are also matched in the sense that A.I.D. pays up to 50% of the cost of the activity.

Child Survival Program

Beginning in FY 1985, competitive grants are awarded to PVOs engaged in primary health programming as part of their international development efforts. Project activities are designed to demonstrably enhance the health status of children and mothers living in target areas through the delivery of a select number of simple, cost-effective technologies. Oral rehydration therapy and immunizations are the primary interventions delivered through the Child Survival grants. At least 25% of the project costs must be borne by the grantee.

Development Education Program

The Development Education Program is competitive, cost-shared small grants program, initiated in FY 1982 to increase the awareness of the American public of the social, political, technical, and economic factors pertaining to world hunger and related development issues by supporting private and voluntary organizations in their efforts. The program is targeted to program initiatives which facilitate broad public participation and imaginative educational approaches and to create outreach efforts directed to the media, educational associations, and other important influence groups.

Cooperative Development Program

Cognizant of the advantages which cooperatives have in accelerating development, A.I.D. provides support to U.S. Cooperative Development Organizations (CDOs) to enable them to play an important role in the development of overseas cooperatives through organizing local cooperatives and credit unions, strengthening cooperative federations, training cooperative managers and technicians, and encouraging the use of cooperative structures in development projects. This is accomplished through three distinct components: (1) Cooperative Program Support Grants which strengthen and expand the CDOs' international operations; funding from field Missions, other donors, and host governments provides the bulk of the resources for their specific international programs/projects; (2) Cooperative Business and Trade Initiatives which provide funding for innovative programs, especially those which mobilize additional outside resources and bring new cooperative actors into the development process; and (3) Management of the P.L. 480-related Farmer-to-Farmer Program and the Dairy Links program which provide short-term specialized technical assistance in agricultural production and marketing, develop nascent dairy industries and expand dairy product consumption in developing countries, and help to dispose of excess U.S. dairy products. In addition, the Cooperative Development Program continues to encourage and support the involvement and investment of U.S. cooperatives in overseas development activities, espe-

cially through U.S.A.I.D. mission buy-ins and accessing other outside funds.

Commodity Transport Program

A.I.D. supports the shipment of donated goods overseas by a variety of organizations/citizens. PVOs collect donated equipment from U.S. firms and ship them to recipients in the LDCs. PVO activities often require the input of commodities as an integral part of project implementation.

Ocean Freight Reimbursement: Under this program, PVOs registered with A.I.D. compete for development assistance funds to support the shipment of goods overseas. This program ships equipment, supplies, and other donated resources, such as tools and other equipment, to support village development project and income-generating activities; medical equipment and supplies, which support primary health clinics' efforts to reach the rural poor; and books and educational supplies for primary school programs.

Denton Amendment: This program, implemented in coordination with the Department of Defense, allows any U.S. donor to ship goods overseas for humanitarian purposes on space available military flights. In the past, regular requests for shipment under Denton have included medical equipment and supplies, books, clothing, tools, building materials, and ambulances. This authority has also been used to provide assistance to victims of hurricanes.

Title II Development Grant Program

Starting in FY 1989 the Title II Development Grant Program will provide support to Co-operating Sponsors to enhance the utilization of PL-480 food as an effective development resource. Three types of support are available: (1) Strengthening Grants for broad support of key headquarters and field activities; (2) Innovation Grants to explore, test, and demonstrate new ideas and approaches to maximize the developmental impacts of Title II food resources; and (3) Planning Assistance Grants for PVOs to explore program feasibility and develop plans for implementation of new Food Aid programs.

Other A.I.D. Relationships

Private and Voluntary Organizations carry out particular technical programs in fields of interest of A.I.D., such as family planning, health, energy and the like. While not set-aside for PVOs, given the technical sophistication and in-country networks of many PVOs, these organizations are frequently selected as implementors of programs. For example, through the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance, grants are provided to PVOs in support of disaster relief and rehabilitation activities. PVOs are also among the grantees under the American Schools and Hospitals Abroad Program. Consortia have proven to be effective vehicles for assistance to local projects in LDCs and A.I.D. supports PVO consortia in their efforts to promote coordinated planning for overseas development programs through

the design, implementation, and evaluation of small projects undertaken by member agencies on a cost-sharing basis.

A.I.D. supports cooperative development organizations to enable them to play an important role in the development of LDC cooperatives by organizing local cooperatives and credit unions, strengthening cooperative federations, training cooperative managers and technicians, and encouraging the use of cooperative structures in development projects. These support grants also strengthen the ability of U.S. cooperatives to attract and channel additional bilateral, multilateral and cooperative development funding.

The Ocean Freight Reimbursement program reimburses PVOs for shipment of purchased or donated commodities used in their relief and development programs overseas.

Percentage of Funds Received from Non-U.S. Government Sources in Support of International Programs

The International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1981 amended Section 123(g) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 to establish a minimum non-U.S. Government (U.S.G.) funding requirement for the programs of U.S. Private and Voluntary Organizations (PVOs) funded from certain specified appropriation accounts. This basic provision has been incorporated into subsequent Foreign Assistance Appropriations and Authorization legislation. Stated simply, beginning January 1, 1985, PVOs must obtain at least 20 percent of their total funding for their international program from non-U.S.G. sources in order to qualify for grants set aside for PVOs (e.g., matching, operational program, and co-financing grants. See previous page). These grants are used to support PVOs as independent entities in their own right. A.I.D. also deals with PVOs as intermediaries in conducting A.I.D.'s program. These forms of support, such as institutional support grants to the labor institutes, family planning agencies, and cooperative development organizations, are excluded from the 20% non-U.S.G. funding requirements.

A calculation of each registered PVO's status vis-a-vis this 20 % requirement will be made annually based on documentation submitted as part of the annual recertification process for registration with A.I.D. The per-

centage calculations for each PVO, computed on the basis of the 1986 and 1987 audited financial documentation submitted to A.I.D. for purposes of determining PVO grant eligibility are listed in this section. A.I.D. maintains a separate listing which is updated as new financial information is submitted by the PVOs. Next year, percentages shown in this section will be based on the private resource test as enacted in the Foreign Assistance Legislation.
