I. Overview of A.I.D. Population Assistance

Policy. Support for voluntary population and family planning programs is an essential part of U.S. development assistance. Family planning programs enhance individual freedom to choose freely the number and spacing of children, provide critical health benefits for mothers and young children, and contribute to more rapid social and sustainable economic development.<sup>1</sup>

Program Strategy. Technical assistance and program resources are provided to developing countries through a wide range of A.I.D. activities that include family planning assistance, information, education and training programs, policy analysis, and four broad areas of research: demographic, social science, operations, and biomedical. Service delivery and supporting research have the highest priority for the Agency.

Within the guidelines of A.I.D.'s population sector strategy, factors considered in the design of country-specific assistance include an assessment of each country's need to: (a) strengthen government commitment to voluntary family planning, (b) develop effective public and private family planning programs, (c) increase the utilization of these programs, and (d) decrease dependence on external donors for program support.<sup>2</sup>

Funding. Over the past twenty-six years, A.I.D. funding for population assistance has totaled approximately \$4.2 billion. Ninety-three percent, or \$3.9 billion, has been provided under the Population Planning account and the Development Fund for Africa. Approximately \$2.7 billion of this amount has been obligated since 1981. The remaining eight percent, or \$0.3 billion, has come from the Economic Support Fund and the Sahel Development Fund. Summaries of A.I.D. funding for the period 1965-1990 are provided on page 5, Table 2.

In 1990, obligations totalled \$280 million. The sources of these funds were: \$225.6 million under the Population Planning account (including carryovers and transfers); \$35.8 million under the Development Fund for Africa; and \$18.6 million under the Economic Support Fund. A.I.D. funds accounted for roughly 45 percent of donor population assistance available to developing countries in 1990.

Organization of Assistance. Population assistance is provided by the Bureau for Science and Technology's Office of Population (S&T/POP) through centrally-funded projects, and by A.I.D.'s four Regional Bureaus - Africa, Asia/Private Enterprise, Europe/Near East, and Latin America/Caribbean - either through

bilateral (country-to-country) projects monitored by A.I.D.'s overseas Missions (USAIDs) or through regional projects monitored by the Regional Bureau offices in Washington, D.C. It should be noted that toward the end of FY 1990, the former Asia/Near East (ANE) bureau was reorganized into the Europe/Near East (ENE) and the Asia/Private Enterprise (APRE) bureaus. (See organizational chart on page iii.)

The Bureau for Program and Policy Coordination (PPC) allocates the population budget among A.I.D. bureaus and exercises policy and program oversight. The Population Sector Council reviews policy and program issues related to population assistance. The Council is chaired by the Agency Director for Population (who is also the Director of S&T/POP) and the Regional Bureaus are members of the Sector Council.

The current allocation of resources from all sources among the different bureaus is as follows:

- o The Office of Population, whose work is described in this Guide, accounts for about half percent of A.I.D.'s population assistance. In 1990, S&T/POP's final budget included \$21.7 million in transfers from other bureaus for contraceptives, which slightly inflates S&T/POP's actual share. S&T/POP carries out its activities through 45 grant agreements and contracts with U.S. government and private agencies.
- o Bilateral and country programs, accounting for about 45 percent of population assistance, are carried out by A.I.D. Missions in 37 countries. (See Table 1 on page 4 for list of bilateral programs.)
- o Regional population assistance programs are managed by A.I.D. Regional Bureaus and account for about 3-4 percent of assistance.
- o The remaining 1 percent goes to support special Agency initiatives in the population field.

## II. The Office of Population (S&T/POP)

Role. S&T/POP projects are designed to strengthen USAID assistance to country family planning programs worldwide. The projects fall into two broad categories: support for family planning service delivery, and research to enhance future efforts in the population field.

A little more than 75 percent of S&T/POP activities support service delivery and include:

- o Programs to enhance policy developments that can legitimize and encourage family planning programs;
- o Program support for voluntary family planning programs, particularly for innovative activities;
- o Training of program personnel;
- o Provision of contraceptive supplies; and
- o Assistance to population information and education programs.

Research, which accounts for the remaining roughly 25 percent of S&T/POP funding, builds the scientific and technological base for future program efforts. Research support includes:

- o Biomedical research on safer, more acceptable, more effective, and more affordable methods of contraception;
- o Operations research to improve the management and operation of service delivery programs; and
- o Social science and demographic research to increase knowledge of population dynamics and to improve the collection and analysis of demographic data.

Relationship to A.I.D. Overseas Missions. S&T/POP activities are designed to complement USAID programs. For this purpose, the Office of Population has developed 45 contracts or grant agreements with U.S. institutions - mainly private sector organizations - to work with LDC public and private institutions. S&T/POP projects provide support to activities that are not readily included in the 37 existing and planned bilateral population programs. In those countries that do not receive bilateral assistance, S&T/POP projects provide support that complements the USAID development assistance strategy. S&T/POP projects support population assistance for over 90 countries each year, including more than 1,100 in-country subprojects as well as extensive technical assistance and other support.

Annually, the Office of Population develops a resource allocation plan that reflects the judgements of the Regional Bureaus and country Missions on the priority needs for Office of Population assistance resources. This plan allocates S&T/POP funds by functional area, region, and contractor or grantee. The Office of Population tracks the implementation of the allocation plan and provides reports on the amount and type of population assistance provided.

USAID Missions may often "buy in" to Office of Population projects with their own funds to augment their share of S&T/POP activities. In 1990, the Office of Population received \$22,907 in "buy-ins." (See Table 3 on page 6.) This demonstrates high demand for our projects from the missions.

Organization of the Office of Population. S&T/POP has five divisions. In addition, an Operations Coordination Staff assists the Director in coordinating the funding and implementation of the S&T/POP program with the activities of Missions and Regional Bureaus. The division functions include:

- o Policy and Evaluation Division (P&E): Improves demographic research and data collection, assists LDC policymakers and researchers in understanding the impact of rapid population growth on economic development, supports the development of appropriate LDC policies and programs, and guides efforts to evaluate population program impact.
- o Research Division (R): Supports development of new fertility regulation technologies and, through operations research, improves family planning delivery systems.

- o Information and Training Division (IT): Improves awareness of the availability and use of family planning methods, and expands and strengthens the managerial and technical skills of LDC family planning and health personnel.
- o Family Planning Services Division (FPSD): Encourages and supports private sector involvement in family planning service delivery, and supports evaluation of family planning activities.
- o Commodities and Program Support Division (CPSD): Provides a centralized system for contraceptive procurement and maintains a database on all population projects and commodity assistance.

Project Activities. Each division carries out its responsibilities through a number of S&T/POP projects. The funding for projects supported in 1990 is summarized in Table 3 on page 6.

PURPOSE: To conduct sample surveys of contraceptive knowledge, availability, and use, recent demographic levels and trends, and maternal/child health.

BENEFICIARIES: Data generated by this project will be used by developing country governments to evaluate recent family planning and MCH services to the poor.

DESCRIPTION: For nearly two decades A.I.D., through its support of the World Fertility Survey, Contraceptive Prevalence Surveys, and Birth and Death Data Collection projects, has been a leader in supporting sample surveys to monitor trends in fertility and family planning behavior. The Demographic and Health Surveys project carries on the most important functions of these projects. The primary objectives of DHS-I have been to: a) provide financial and technical support to developing countries in conducting a total of 35 demographic and health surveys; b) disseminate survey results quickly to policymakers and family planning program administrators; and c) strengthen institutional capabilities in host countries for undertaking future surveys of this type.

Under DHS-II, IRD will: a) undertake a careful assessment of DHS data quality and future data needs; b) conduct approximately 25 additional DHS surveys; c) disseminate DHS data via reports, conferences, special presentations, and distribution of data files; d) promote further analysis of DHS data by host country researchers, program managers, and the international population and health communities; and e) further improve the Integrated System for Survey Analysis (ISSA) software and organize up to 10 ISSA workshops.

PURPOSE: To strengthen the capacity of developing countries to process, evaluate and analyze demographic and family planning data as well as other social and economic data.

BENEFICIARIES: Developing country statistical institutions: specifically, personnel responsible for the analysis, evaluation and use of demographic data; policymakers and planners who will use the improved data for more effective development planning (includes A.I.D. staff).

DESCRIPTION: PASA with the U.S. Bureau of the Census (BuCen) has two main components in the provision of assistance. One, technical support for the implementation of censuses in developing countries, provided by the International Statistical Programs Center, includes: (a) preparation and dissemination of instructional materials for taking censuses and surveys; (b) conducting census taking and data processing workshops; and (c) provision of technical consultations. Two, compilation and analysis of demographic data, carried out by the Center for International Research, comprises: (a) developing and maintaining a comprehensive worldwide demographic data base (b) responding to ad hoc requests from AID/W, USAID Missions and contractors and; (c) providing technical assistance on an ad hoc basis for the compilation and analysis of developing country demographic data.

BENEFICIARIES: Host-country policymakers and donor agency officials who learn about important population issues in relation to social and economic development.

DESCRIPTION: The Committee on Population conducts the following types of activities: 1) workshops for researchers and policymakers on key topics involving commissioned background papers; 2) in-depth assessments of major population issues; 3) experts' meetings lasting 1-2 days to address important policy questions; and 4) large conferences for U.S. and foreign researchers, policymakers, development specialists, and population program managers to discuss the work of the Committee on Population.

The Committee recently published Contraception and Reproduction: Health Consequences for Women and Children in Developing Countries. The 118-page report summarizes the results of a comprehensive two-year review of research on the health consequences of contraceptive use and controlled fertility. This report has been translated into French and Spanish languages. The proceedings of a major international conference on the Demographic and Programmatic Consequences of Contraceptive Innovations were published by Plenum Press. Finally, a major study on Developing New Contraceptives: Obstacles and Opportunities (funded by the Mellon Foundation) was published.

The Committee is undertaking several new activities including a major study on the population dynamics in sub-Saharan Africa and will hold workshops on Measuring Access to Family Planning Services and on Population and Land Use.

PURPOSE: To increase the awareness among policymakers in developing countries and the donor community about the implications of population trends and family planning issues.

BENEFICIARIES: Policymakers and family planning program administrators from developing countries as well as the donor community.

DESCRIPTION: PRB plays an important role in bridging the gap between the population research community and policy audiences who need the research to make informed policy choices. The agreement supports PRB's effective dissemination of population information. Activities include media outreach, materials production (such as policy booklets and the annual World Population Data Sheet) and distribution, training workshops, a small internship program, and a visitors program for developing country officials passing through Washington, D.C. Media efforts center on press releases, interviews, direct contacts with domestic and international media and wire-service representatives.

Missions and regional bureaus may request bulk or single copies of PRB materials; the production of special booklets, policy relevant analyses, briefing packets, slides and graphics; the updating and/or reprinting of existing PRB materials; and assistance in arranging meetings for developing country officials visiting Washington, D.C. Except for a limited number of international materials, the cooperative agreement will cover the staff time for the development of materials through central funds, but will require buy-ins or purchase orders to cover direct costs.

DESCRIPTION: The RAPID III project supports collaborative analyses of the implications of population growth for national development, health, and environment. Analyses also estimate family planning program requirements to meet expected future demand for services. Analyses utilize microcomputer-based simulations which project population growth under alternative fertility and family planning program assumptions. Integral to the RAPID III approach is the strengthening of local institutional capabilities for conducting population analyses. This is accomplished through technical training in U.S.-based courses and country-based workshops, in addition to microcomputer transfer.

PURPOSE: OPTIONS II assists developing countries in formulating and implementing population policies that increase access to and use of voluntary family planning services. While continuing efforts to further policy dialogue and secure commitment to family planning, OPTIONS II places special emphasis on mobilizing national resources to support the expansion of family planning service delivery.

BENEFICIARIES: Public sector: population councils, line ministries, fiscal and regulatory offices; Private sector: secondary health and family planning service providers, employees and professional associations, trade and labor organizations, research and policy institutes, and public interest groups.

DESCRIPTION: Many developing countries face serious resource gaps in meeting the growing demand for family planning services. OPTIONS II responds to these needs by helping LDCs mobilize public and private resources for family planning services. OPTIONS II also addresses the policy formulation and dissemination needs of LDCs that are at a more nascent stage of family planning program development. OPTIONS II seeks to achieve five outcomes: (1) articulate comprehensive national population policies that endorse and encourage family planning; (2) develop national plans for expanding family planning services; (3) increase public sector resources allocated to family planning programs and improve the efficiency of resource use; (4) remove legal and regulatory barriers to family planning; (5) increase private sector resources for family planning. OPTIONS II employs a wide variety of policy tools and strategies to achieve these outcomes.

In the contraceptive introduction area, the Council conducts activities to establish local experience and a management organization for the worldwide introduction of NORPLANT<sup>®</sup> implants and the Copper T 380A IUD. In addition, family planning program research and technical assistance is supported in such areas as post-partum family planning, breastfeeding promotion, and the study of various issues related to the introduction of new contraceptive technology being developed by the Council.

PURPOSE: To improve, through operations research and technical assistance, the quality, accessibility, and cost-effectiveness of family planning and maternal child health delivery systems in the developing world and to strengthen developing country institutional capabilities to use operations research as a management tool to diagnose and solve service delivery problems.

BENEFICIARIES: Over 40 million persons served by delivery systems in which the project operates; most beneficiaries are rural.

In addition, the CSM project is especially committed to developing projects in the Africa region because of the overall low modern-method prevalence levels throughout the region. The project has established eighteen new sales programs worldwide of which more than half utilize commodities provided by the commercial sector.

In some cases commercial channels may provide new family planning markets that can be expected to reach self-sufficiency and result in the sale of contraceptives at market prices (e.g., health maintenance organizations, pharmacies). In other cases, the delivery of family planning services to hard-to-reach populations may require local businesses to cost-share with PVOs (e.g., family planning services for factory employees or plantation workers).

This project is identifying approximately 30 of these family planning projects by conducting 6 regional workshops for selected alumnae. During these workshops, alumnae will develop or update proposals to extend family planning services in their respective countries, including plans for local financing through fees for service or other income generating activities designed to develop self sufficiency. Most of the sub-projects are being managed by CEDPA alumnae and will receive financial support for up to three years. It is expected that after the start-up period they will either have become self-sufficient or will have secured other donor financing.

After completion of an IG Audit of contraceptive procurement in FY 89, a new central contraceptive procurement mechanism was established, project no. 936-3057, that consolidates procurement by means of OYB transfers from all projects requiring contraceptive procurement. This consolidated procurement of contraceptive commodities leaves the programming and budgeting decisions related to contraceptives as the responsibility of the initiating A.I.D. office i.e., Mission, Regional Bureau, or (Central) - that supports family planning delivery systems. The consolidated procurement project is administered by S&T/POP/CPSD.

The central procurement system undertakes the purchase of five brands of condoms (Ansell Incorporated and Aladan Incorporated), oral contraceptives for public sector programs (Wyeth-Ayerst International LTD), oral contraceptives for social marketing programs (Syntex Laboratories, Inc.), vaginal foaming tablets (Ortho Pharmaceutical Corp.), and the Copper T-380 IUD (Finishing Enterprises, Inc.). For details on formulations, brands, prices, contract terms, and ordering procedures, please refer to the guidance issued by S&T/POP as part of its guidance for estimating contraceptive procurement needs. In addition, beginning in FY 90 all shipping and warehousing of A.I.D.-supplied contraceptives is provided by Matrix International Logistics, Inc.
