





Overview of A.I.D. Population Assistance

Policy

Support for voluntary population and family planning programs is an essential part of U.S. development assistance. Family planning programs enhance individual freedom to choose the number and spacing of children, provide critical health benefits for mothers of young children, and contribute to more rapid social and sustainable economic development.¹

Program Strategy

Over the past twenty-five years, the number of countries seeking population assistance has increased tremendously -- from roughly a dozen countries in the 1960s to more than 80 countries today. This growth has been due to an increase in the number of countries favoring lower levels of fertility and in those eligible for A.I.D. assistance. Newly adopted policies, particularly in Africa, and newly emerging democracies, particularly in Eastern Europe, promise further increases in the number of countries seeking assistance. At the same time, populations are still growing throughout the developing world, further stretching donor resources. In response, A.I.D. has initiated an effort to better concentrate resources in countries where the need for family planning is greatest.

Table 1 presents a listing of the major recipients of A.I.D. population support. These include 20 countries that have been identified as global priority countries. There are an additional 29 countries which have bilateral population programs, including two where there is a population component within a larger health program. Four priority countries have no bilateral program, but receive support through centrally-funded programs.

Technical assistance and program resources are provided to developing countries through a wide range of A.I.D. activities including family planning assistance; information, education and training programs; and policy analysis. A.I.D. is also involved in four broad areas of research: demography, social science, operations, and biomedicine. Service delivery and supporting research have the highest priority for the Agency.

Within the guidelines of A.I.D.'s population sector strategy, factors considered in the design of country-specific assistance include an assessment of each country's need to: 1) strengthen government commitment to voluntary family planning; 2) develop effective public and private family planning programs; 3) increase the utilization of these programs; and 4) decrease dependence on external donors for program support.²

Funding

Over the past 27 years, A.I.D. funding for population assistance has totaled \$4.8 billion. Ninety-four percent, or \$4.5 billion, has been provided under the Population Planning account and the Development Fund for Africa. The remaining six percent, or \$0.3 billion has come from the Economic Support Fund and the Sahel Development Fund. A summary of A.I.D. funding for the period 1965-1992 are provided on page 9, Table 2.

In 1992, obligations for population assistance totalled \$327 million. The sources of these funds were: \$250 million under the Population Planning account; \$66 million under the Development Fund for Africa; and approximately \$11 million under the Economic Support Fund. A.I.D. funds account for more than forty percent of donor population assistance available to developing countries.

Organization of Assistance

Population assistance is provided by the Bureau for Research and Development's Office of Population (R&D/POP) through centrally-funded projects, and by A.I.D.'s Regional Bureaus -- Africa, Asia, Europe, Near East, and Latin America/Caribbean -- either through bilateral (country-to-country) projects monitored by A.I.D.'s overseas Missions (USAIDs) or through regional projects monitored by the Regional Bureau officer in Washington, DC (see organizational charts).

The Population Sector Council reviews policy and program issues related to population assistance. The Council is chaired by the Director of R&D/POP and is comprised of representatives from the five Regional Bureaus and the Office of Health.

The current allocations of resources from all sources among the different bureaus are as follows:

- The Office of Population, whose work is described in this guide, accounts for about 60 percent of A.I.D.'s population assistance. In 1992, R&D/POP's final budget included \$11.4 million in transfers from other bureaus for contraceptives, which slightly inflates R&D/POP's actual share. R&D/POP carries out its activities through over 40 grant agreements and contracts with U.S. government and private agencies.
- Bilateral and country programs, accounting for about 40 percent of population assistance, are carried out by A.I.D. Missions in 44 countries. (See Table 1 for a list of bilateral programs.)
- Regional population assistance programs are managed by A.I.D. Regional Bureaus and account for less than one percent of assistance.

The Office of Population (R&D/POP)

Role

R&D/POP projects are designed to strengthen USAID assistance to country family planning programs worldwide. The projects fall into two broad categories: support for family planning service delivery and research to enhance future efforts in the population field.

Just over 75 percent of R&D/POP activities support service delivery and include:

- Programs to enhance policy development that can legitimize and encourage family planning programs;
- Program support for voluntary family planning programs, particularly for innovative activities;
- Training of program personnel;
- Provision of contraceptive supplies; and
- Assistance to population information and education programs.

Research, which accounts for the remaining roughly 25 percent of R&D/POP funding, builds the scientific and technological base for future program efforts. Research support includes:

- Biomedical research on safer, more acceptable, more effective, and more affordable methods of contraception;
- Operations research to improve the management and operation of service delivery programs; and
- Social science and demographic research to increase knowledge of population dynamics and to improve the collection and analysis of demographic data.

Relationship to A.I.D Overseas Missions

R&D/POP projects provide a wide range of services to countries that do not have bilateral programs. Missions with bilaterals often draw upon R&D/POP resources to address needs not covered by mission programs. USAID missions often “buy-in” to Office of Population projects with their own funds. In 1992, the Office of Population processed \$39 million in “buy-ins,” demonstrating high demand for central projects from Missions (See Table 3). R&D/POP also supports activities designed to benefit all missions, such as biomedical research and centralized contraceptive procurement.

Organization of the Office of Population

R&D/POP has six divisions plus an Operations Coordination Staff (OCS). The OCS assists the Director in coordinating the funding and implementation of R&D/POP programs with the activities of Missions and Regional Bureaus. The six divisions and their functions are described below:

Commodities and Program Support Division (CPSD)

Provides a centralized system for contraceptive procurement, maintains a database on commodity assistance, and supports a program for contraceptive logistics management.

Family Planning Services Division (FPSD)

Increases availability and quality of family planning services through government programs, local private voluntary organizations, for-profit organizations, and commercial channels.

Information and Training Division (IT)

Increases the awareness, acceptability, availability and use of family planning methods and expands and strengthens the managerial and technical skills of family planning and health personnel.

Policy and Evaluation Division (P&E)

Improves demographic research and data collection, assists policymakers and researchers in understanding the impact of rapid population growth on economic development, supports the development of appropriate policies and programs, and guides efforts to evaluate population program impact.

Regional Coordination Division (RCD)

Guides efforts to improve field support and better link population activities with priority country program needs; monitors implementation and coordinates evaluation of priority country strategies.

Research Division (R)

Supports research on contraceptive methods and the development of new fertility regulation technologies and, through operations research, improves family planning service delivery.

Project Activities

Each division carries out its responsibilities through a number of R&D/POP projects. The funding for projects supported in 1992 is summarized in Table 3.

Purpose:

To provide an efficient mechanism for consolidated A.I.D. purchases of contraceptives based on the transfer of all funds from all A.I.D. accounts that support contraceptive procurement to a single central procurement account at the beginning of each operational year for implementation of the procurement process.

Description:

This project was established in FY 90 to provide an efficient central contraceptive procurement mechanism for all A.I.D. offices whose programs require contraceptive supplies. Funds are transferred annually to this project through OYB transfers from each of the A.I.D. accounts that support contraceptive procurement (e.g. DA, DFA, AIDS, ESF), and R&D/POP directs the use of these funds through a series of procurement contracts to provide the contraceptive supplies required by A.I.D. programs worldwide. This project consolidates the procurement actions but leaves responsibility for the estimation of contraceptive needs in the A.I.D. offices that support FP delivery systems.

The central procurement system undertakes the purchase of several differently-packaged condoms: oral contraceptives; vaginal foaming tablets; NORPLANT®; the Copper T-380-IUD; and Depo-provera. For details on formulation, brands, prices, contract terms, and ordering procedures, please refer to the guidance issued by R&D/POP as part of its guidance for estimating contraceptive procurement needs. All shipping and warehousing of A.I.D.-supplied contraceptives is provided by Panalpina, Inc.

Description:

R&D/POP aggregates the contraceptive needs of family planning subprojects supported under various centrally-funded Cooperating Agency grants. During FY 1993, R&D/POP is funding the contraceptive needs of governmental programs in countries funded by A.I.D.'s Development Assistance account. R&D/POP, as the manager of contraceptive supply for worldwide A.I.D. programs, also budgets funds for the maintenance of warehouse stocks to meet unplanned program needs of all programs. The funds budgeted in 936-3018 are transferred each fiscal year to the Central Contraceptive Procurement project (936-3057) which pools all A.I.D. funds - central, Mission, regional - designated for contraceptive procurement and serves as the common fund for all contraceptive procurement contracts.
