VOLUNTARY FOREIGN AID PROGRAMS

Reports of American Voluntary Agencies Engaged in Overseas Relief and Development
Registered with the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid

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HIGHLIGHTS OF U.S. VOLUNTARY AGENCIES' ACTIVITIES

As of December 31, 1973, there were 91 organizations voluntarily registered with the Agency for International Development's Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid. Four new agencies were registered with the Advisory Committee and one agency's registration terminated in calendar year 1973.

During this reporting period the registered voluntary agencies received some \$680 million in income, an increase of \$28 million over 1972. Private contributions (cash, supplies and equipment) amounted to \$473 million. U.S. Government support in the form of grants, contracts, excess property, P.L. 480 donated food, transportation costs for this food and overseas freight paid on the agencies' own donated supplies totaled \$208 million.

Activities of the agencies in foreign countries include agricultural and rural development, community development, family planning, health and nutrition, housing construction, refugee assistance, relief and rehabilitation, vocational education and related projects. People in need in more than 100 countries benefited from these programs through the distribution of food products, medical and agricultural supplies and equipment, clothing and textiles, and other items.

In fiscal year 1973, P.L. 480 food donations, valued at \$133 million, to the registered voluntary agencies under the Food for Peace Program were administered by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, CARE, Catholic Relief Services, Church World Service, Hadassah, Lutheran World Relief, Seventh-day Adventist World Service, World Relief Commission, N.A.E., and World Vision Relief Organization.

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U.S. VOLUNTARY AGENCIES—WHO THEY ARE AND WHAT THEY DO

ACCION INTERNATIONAL/AITEC

Establishes national, locally supported urban community action institutions in Latin America. Through its division, AITEC, conducts research, develops experimental programs and offers consulting services in the following areas: human resource development, community credit and finance, community development, and urban planning and development.

AGRICULTURAL MISSIONS FOUNDATION, LTD.

Provides technical and material (seed, equipment, livestock, supplies, etc.) support to agricultural development work in underdeveloped countries around the world. Works primarily, but not exclusively, with agricultural missionaries assigned by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

AID FOR INTERNATIONAL MEDICINE

Furnishes financial assistance, professional counsel, medical supplies and drugs to medical institutions, chiefly in Vietnam. Projects being funded include, among others, library help to the Hue Medical School and Hue Nursing school; assistance to the An Lac orphanage in Saigon, a refugee feeding program outside of Saigon, and to a hospital in Kontum. Nursing scholarships have been provided at the Medical Training Health Center in Da Nang. A.I.M. in cooperation with the Johns Hopkins Medical School of Gynecology instituted the first radium treatment center in Kathmandu, Nepal for pelvic cancer.

AMERICAN BUREAU FOR MEDICAL AID TO CHINA

Contributes to a broad program of medical training and health service for the Chinese people in Taiwan. Assistance is provided for training doctors and nurses, research, the funding of fellowships, physical medicine and rehabilitation, community health services, and the procurement of medical equipment and supplies.

AMERICAN COMMITTEE FOR SHAARE ZEDEK HOSPITAL IN JERUSALEM

Supports and maintains a program of preventive, diagnostic and curative medical services in United Jerusalem. Operates Hospital, Out-Patient Clinics and Nurses Training School and assists programs in

Home Care for the rehabilitation of its patients and the elderly. Supports the building of a 500 bed Medical Center presently under construction.

AMERICAN DENTISTS FOR FOREIGN SERVICE

Provides free dental equipment, such as dental units, chairs, instruments and supplies. ADFS offers dentists, hygienists, assistants, teachers, both graduate and undergraduate, for brief, intermediate and long term service to indigent people, foreign agencies and newly developing countries. A large scale Topical Fluoride program is to be started in the Caribbean area, in the West Indies and Central America. Several dental colleges have obtained dental equipment. A whole new dental school is being equipped in Korea. About 400 complete dental operators have been serviced and shipped overseas. Foreign students have obtained admission to our dental schools and have obtained instruments and supplies from ADFS.

AMERICAN FOUNDATION FOR OVERSEAS BLIND

Serves as consultants to governments and voluntary agencies in creation of services and programs directed towards education, rehabilitation and vocational training of blind people throughout the world. Implements services with blindness prevention program. Major projects in Europe, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East include teacher training programs and services to determine education and other needs of blind people. Blindness prevention programs assist governments in the developing countries.

AMERICAN FREEDOM FROM HUNGER FOUNDATION

Seeks to arouse public awareness of the causes and extent of hunger and malnutrition throughout the world and to mobilize private sector support for programs to combat hunger and promote development. Cooperates with other governmental, international and private groups having similar goals.

AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE

Provides emergency and war relief in addition to development assistance for countries in Africa, Asia, Latin America and

the Middle East. Assists local agencies in the fields of demographic and family planning education and sponsors international conferences on world affairs. Service and development programs include a prosthetics and rehabilitation center in South Vietnam; activity centers for pre-school age children of Arab refugees in the Gaza Strip; self-help housing in Zambia; community development programs in rural Mexico; a pilot project in rural health in Guatemala.

AMERICAN FUND FOR CZECHOSLOVAK REFUGEES

Provides relief supplies and services, counseling, and resettlement opportunities in western countries for refugees from Czechoslovakia and elsewhere. Operates overseas offices in Munich and Zirndorf in Germany; Vienna and Traiskirchen in Austria; Rome in Italy and Paris in France. Has resettled more than 70,000 refugees. Also resettling Asian refugees from Uganda in the U.S.A.

AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR FREE LABOR DEVELOPMENT

Assists labor movements in Latin America and the Caribbean through the provision of basic leadership and technical seminars, regional and resident courses, and advanced study courses in the United States. More than 140,000 trade unionists have taken part. Social aid programs include housing, community development, and agricultural projects.

AMERICAN JEWISH JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

Operates broad range of health, welfare, rehabilitation, education, and cultural assistance programs in the Middle East, Europe and North Africa. Services of AJDC, the major American agency aiding needy Jews overseas, include care of the aged, support of voluntary programs for handicapped children and financial assistance to religious schools.

AMERICAN-KOREAN FOUNDATION

Provides agricultural training and technical instruction in rural areas, including support of Korean 4-H Clubs. Major projects include a hospital and children's center at Kaejong, hospital medical teams operating in doctorless areas, school construction and general educational and orphanage support.

AMERICAN MISSION TO GREEKS

Operates and assists orphanages in Greece, India and the Philippines. Programs include vocational training, distribution of food, clothing, and monthly allowances to the orphanages and to needy families, and provisions of medical supplies. Presently building a hospital in Thessalonica and leper units in India.

AMERICAN NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO AID HOMELESS ARMENIANS

Sponsors and processes refugees of Armenian ethnic origin mainly from the Eastern European and Middle Eastern areas. Has assisted over 21,000 such refugees since 1949. Maintains volunteer representatives throughout Europe with a major office in Beirut. Maintains a working liaison with the Council of Churches and Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration.

AMERICAN NEAR EAST REFUGEE AID

Seeks to increase the overall level of assistance from private American sources to Palestine refugees and other needy individuals in the Middle East; and to inform the American people about the Palestine refugee problem. Assistance is given in the form of cash grants and shipments of pharmaceuticals and other medical supplies direct to operating institutions in the area. Areas of activity include Jordan, Lebanon, the United Arab Republic, and the Occupied Territories (Gaza, West Bank, and East Jerusalem). ANERA now includes American Middle East Rehabilitation (AMER) as an operating division in New York.

AMERICAN NATIONAL RED CROSS¹

Works closely with the International Committee of the Red Cross and the League of Red Cross Societies in meeting emergency needs of disaster victims and refugees in other countries. Cash, medical supplies, food, clothing, and sometimes personnel are sent to assist in these relief projects. Technical assistance is given to other national Red Cross societies in disaster relief, nursing, health education, and other traditional Red Cross programs. Red Cross Youth sponsors the shipment of friendship boxes, school chests, and correspondence albums donated by elementary and secondary school students to other Red Cross societies for distribution to children.

¹NOTE: Although not a registered voluntary agency, the American National Red Cross has a Congressional charter and by statutory authority participates in the benefits or registration.

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AMERICAN ORT FEDERATION

Operates a network of technical and vocational education institutions including vocational high schools, teacher training institutes, and technical colleges in 20 countries, with largest programs in Israel, France, Iran, Morocco and Argentina. While primary emphasis is on providing a comprehensive technical education to Jewish youth, ORT's AID-funded operation in African nations aims at establishing many institutions for developing middle-level manpower and teachers for vocational schools.

AMERICAN RELIEF FOR POLAND

Provides medical equipment and supplies for hospitals, health centers and university clinics and distributes food to schools, orphanages, and other institutions. Sponsors welfare and relief programs.

AMERICANS FOR CHILDREN'S RELIEF

Provides emergency relief and welfare services for children threatened by crisis or catastrophe. Founded initially to aid children caught in the Nigerian conflict, the primary project was an extensive medical and psychiatric program for evacuated refugee children. Financial assistance was provided for victims of the 1970 cyclone and flood in East Pakistan. Funds were provided for emergency care for orphans in postwar Bangladesh. A continuing commitment to these orphans has resulted in a special Bangladesh Orphans' Program. ACR is now involved in blueprinting a program to help the orphans and "street children" of Vietnam. The balance of ACR programs is domestic.

ANDEAN FOUNDATION

Seeks to encourage and advance educational, social and community development in the Andean area of South America. Establishes pilot agrarian reform projects, and provides administrative and logistical support for model projects in conjunction with an autonomous agency of the Peruvian Government.

ASIAN-AMERICAN FREE LABOR INSTITUTE

Carries out extensive programs in trade union education, skills training, social projects development, and trade union leadership exchange. AFLU is also engaged in impact and disaster relief projects.

ASSEMBLIES OF GOD-FOREIGN SERVICE COMMITTEE

Directs and provides technical assistance for social welfare and emergency relief programs located in all major geographical areas. Projects include schools, orphanages, and medical clinics as well as disaster relief programs.

BOY'S TOWNS OF ITALY

Provides institutional care for homeless and disturbed children in Italy. Emphasis is on an educational system teaching responsibility under a self-government structure. Other projects include a rehabilitation center for young men released from penal institutions, a delinquency prevention program, and day care centers.

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES-USCC

Operates relief, welfare, and self-help programs in 77 countries to assist refugees, war victims and other needy persons. While emphasis is placed on the distribution of supplies of food, clothing and medicines, CRS activities in technical assistance and community development have steadily increased in recent years. CRS is the official overseas aid and development agency of the Catholic Church in the United States.

CHILDREN'S MEDICAL RELIEF INTERNATIONAL

Has operated a program for the treatment of children and the teaching and training of Vietnamese doctors, nurses and ancillary personnel since July 1968. The completed "Center for Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery" in Saigon was opened in July 1969. It comprises a fully equipped 54 bed intensive care surgical unit, and a 120 bed reception/convalescent facility, the latter currently administered by the International Rescue Committee. The Center has the capacity for at least 1200 operations per year and is open, free of charge, to any Vietnamese child or youth who can benefit from plastic and reconstructive surgery; first preference is given to war casualties. Local staff is being trained in plastic and reconstructive surgery, anesthesia, pediatrics, specialty nursing, speech therapy, and administration. Expansion plans include: the construction and renovation of a new reception and convalescent facility, which will be administered by CMRI, adjacent to the hospital thereby increasing over-all efficiency and significantly decreasing operating costs to the Center; and the con-

struction of Vietnam's first modern burn unit to deal exclusively with acute, fresh burns which require isolation and intensive care.

CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S FUND

Provides supplementary aid to children and families through programs assisting orphanages, schools, and Family Helper Projects. Child care specialists counsel with each child, and administer a child care program that provides a variety of services to each child, depending on the particular problems of the child, and the needs of the community. In each country an advisory committee or juridical body, composed of national child care authorities, evaluates the program and determines the type of child care program most beneficial to the country.

CHRISTIAN REFORMED WORLD RELIEF COMMITTEE

Operates relief and rehabilitation programs in Korea, Jordan, Mexico, Nigeria, the Philippines, Bangladesh, Nicaragua and Honduras. Projects include child care, medical aid and self-help agriculture and community development programs. CRWRC maintains the first licensed in-country adoption program in Korea.

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE

Provides emergency relief, technical assistance, refugee resettlement, and inter-church aid. Emphasis is on the process of development as it involves local people and institutions through indigenous counterpart agencies and community committees, some of which raise as much as 80% of the cost of their own programs. CWS is the disaster relief and service agency of 30 US Protestant and Orthodox churches working in cooperation with the World Council of Churches; CROP, the Community Hunger Appeal of CWS, provides food, seeds, tools and other resources to support the self-help programs of CWS. CWS sponsors programs of disaster relief and rehabilitation, agriculture, nutrition and public health, education, functional literacy, planned parenthood, low cost housing, social welfare, leadership development, medical aid and community development in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Europe, Latin America and the Middle East.

CODEL (Coordination in Development)

Serves as a clearinghouse to share techniques and coordinate plans of its member agencies; sets up project guidelines to aid members in setting goals and methods; and provides fund raising assistance to selected projects of member and associate member agencies. CODEL emphasizes self-help and self-determination through training of local personnel to administer, staff and initiate development projects and public service programs.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Provides technical services to governments in structuring and organizing national community development programs and in training, information, reporting and evaluation. Assists self-help projects, operates computerized information systems, and supplies packaged instruction materials and video tapes for open and closed circuit television. Field offices and staff are maintained in all countries.

CARE (Cooperative for American Relief Everywhere)

Conducts programs in 34 countries of Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. Major emphasis is on feeding programs to improve the nutritional intake of school and pre-school age children and on self-help assistance in which CARE, local communities and host governments work together on school construction, roads, water supply systems, mother-child nutrition centers, housing and community development. Active in immediate and long-range disaster relief. MEDICO, a service of CARE, maintains medical treatment and training teams in eight countries, augmented by volunteer specialists on one-month tours of duty.

COOPERATIVE LEAGUE FUND

Is a fund raising and fund granting organization involved in: (1) India - Providing technical assistance to cooperatives in India in planning, establishing and operating oil-seeds processing plants; providing advice on the technical and financial requirements for executive and technical training and regional dairy marketing systems for Operation Flood, a one quarter billion dollar dairy project which will supply milk to the four largest cities in India; assisting Indian cooperatives in management training. (2) Bangladesh - Disbursed and supervised

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\$125,000 Emergency Relief Fund Grant to help rehabilitate agricultural, fishery and weaving co-operatives. (3) Argentina - Programming U.S. visit of Argentinean cooperative leaders to learn U.S. cooperative operational techniques annually. (4) International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) - Annual contribution to the ICA development fund for assistance to developing countries. (5) Cooperative training for LDC personnel - Administration of A.J. Smaby International Scholarship fund to provide cooperative training in the U.S. for LDC cooperative personnel. CLF is collaborating with Cooperative Education and Training Inc. in Madison, Wisconsin which awards the scholarships.

DIRECT RELIEF FOUNDATION

Provides pharmaceuticals, medical and hospital supplies to needy areas in medically less developed countries in Latin America, South Asia, the Far East, and Africa. Under its Aesculapian International Program, DRF arranges assignments of volunteer physicians, dentists, senior medical and dental students, and paramedical personnel to the same areas.

THOMAS A. DOOLEY FOUNDATION

Provides technical and material assistance to the developing countries of Asia in medical care and health education. Emphasis is on self-help through public health training, village health education, training of medical and paramedical personnel, and medical care. Health surveys have been conducted in Nepal and Laos where mobile health units are presently used to bring programs to rural areas.

FOSTER PARENTS PLAN

Provides programs of counseling and guidance, community development, education, health, financial assistance to children, their families and their communities. Sponsorships of children by foster parents is cherished but programs more and more center on the entire family and the community. Offers programs in the Republic of Korea, Philippines, Vietnam, Indonesia, (Yoghakarta and Bali), Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, and Brazil.

FOUNDATION FOR THE PEOPLES OF THE SOUTH PACIFIC

Provides training and technical assistance for self-help community development groups

and cooperatives and financial assistance for self-help projects, mainly in small business development, fisheries & agriculture in Micronesia, Papua New Guinea, Fiji and other nations of Pacific Basin.

FRANKLIN BOOK PROGRAMS

Provides technical assistance to help countries increase their capability to create, produce, distribute, and efficiently utilize educational materials, both formal and informal. Operating offices in Egypt, Iran, Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Bangladesh. Cooperates with local ministries of education, fundamental education organizations, and publishers and printers.

FRIENDS OF THE UNITED STATES OF LATIN AMERICA

Assists community development and health and nutrition projects as well as vocational training schools, hospitals and other institutions in Costa Rica.

HADASSAH

Supports and maintains a program of preventive, diagnostic and curative medical services in Israel. Operates hospitals, health centers and medical schools and assists programs in education, social welfare, land reclamation and reforestation.

HEIFER PROJECT

Assists farmers in 85 countries to produce more protein food and income for themselves by providing them with quality livestock and training in its care. Emphasis is on training in good management practices and the development of livestock breeding programs. Livestock shipments are provided to programs in all areas of the world.

HOLT ADOPTION PROGRAM AND HOLT INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S FUND

Seeks to prevent unnecessary institutionalization of children and find homes for those already institutionalized. Provides relinquishment counseling, social and medical services, physical therapy, special education, and custodial services for the severely handicapped. Places children with families in the United States, in the Far East, and in Europe. Works in Korea and Vietnam.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Assists Latin American public and private agencies in projects which seek to increase the participation of low income groups in development. Provides expert advisors in agricultural marketing, municipal government, and training for community organization. Current programs include agricultural marketing organization projects in Bolivia, Paraguay, and Panama; urban development in Peru; and a grant program enabling Latin American leaders to visit the United States for consultations.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Assists Jesuits and other groups involved in development work. Projects include an agricultural research center in the Ivory Coast, the India Social Institute in New Delhi, the Sanggar Prathivi Television and Radio Program Production Studio in Indonesia, Sogang University in Korea, and the Ponape Agricultural and Trade School in the Caroline Islands.

INTERNATIONAL EYE FOUNDATION

Aids in the prevention and treatment of worldwide blindness through self-help orientation with surgical teaching and fellowship programs, shipment of eye tissue, organization of eye banks and the inauguration of first paramedical assistance training program in ophthalmology. Geared in the developing country abroad and the developing community at home for the prevention and treatment of blindness.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE OF RURAL RECONSTRUCTION

Based in the Philippines, IIRR conducts leadership training, field operation, applied research and international extension. It has trained rural development directors, administrators, supervisors and specialists from Asia, Africa and Latin America. It has also organized and assisted national rural reconstruction movements in the Philippines, Thailand, Guatemala, Colombia, and Ghana, all led and run by their own nationals. Its action research projects, conducted in IIRR's social laboratory of some 80 villages in Cavite province of the Philippines, where IIRR is located, deal with major areas of rural reconstruction.

INTERNATIONAL RESCUE COMMITTEE

Assists refugees from totalitarian countries, and from war, through many services ranging from emergency relief to overseas resettlement. IRC activities include medical aid, child care, community development, educational assistance, job placement, and a variety of self-help, training and rehabilitation programs. Major refugee groups presently helped by IRC are East Europeans, Russians, Cubans, Haitians, Ugandans, Chinese, Greeks, the internal war refugees of South Vietnam and the uprooted people of Bangladesh.

INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTARY SERVICES

Provides U.S. and multi-national middle level technical assistance teams (or individuals) to foreign public and private agencies. Programs include agriculture, secondary education and teacher training, English language instruction health services, assistance to national youth or volunteer services, community or rural development, and assistance/advice to cooperatives. Volunteer technicians are currently serving in countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America (Algeria, Bangladesh, Colombia, Ecuador, Honduras, Indonesia, Laos, Madagascar, Libya, Sudan, Yemen and Zaire).

IRAN FOUNDATION

Seeks to advance health and education in Iran and other culturally related areas. Projects include further financial assistance to the earthquake area in Ferdows, Iran; assistance to a village education and medical project of the SIRIP Oil Company; financial assistance for research in public health, in conjunction with the Department of Community Medicine of the Pahlavi University and supplying audiovisual equipment; fellowships for teachers at the Nemazee School of Nursing; financial assistance for transportation of academic personnel to and from Iran and Afghanistan.

LAUBACH LITERACY

Publishes literacy primers and easy-to-read post-literacy materials; trains volunteers and professional literacy writers, tutors, and teacher trainers; and offers in-service consulting services for literacy program organization. Emphasizes the development of demonstration programs staffed by local workers. Laubach programs are presently

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operating in Afghanistan, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, India, Jordan/Israel (West Bank), Mexico, Panama, Rhodesia and U.S.A.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

Operates programs for disaster relief, refugee assistance and social and economic development in Asia, Africa and Latin America. Projects include small industry, well digging, land reclamation, construction of irrigation wells, reservoirs, roads, schools, community centers, and demonstration projects in nutrition and social work. Also active in medical assistance and family planning.

MEALS FOR MILLIONS FOUNDATION

Seeks the relief and prevention of starvation in developing countries through the introduction of multipurpose foods, high protein foods made up of nutritionally fortified available raw materials not generally used for human food. Emphasis is on the utilization of indigenous resources. Extends financial, technical and personnel assistance to countries in Latin America, Asia and Africa.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Assists physicians and medical institutions in developing countries by providing supplies, short-term personnel, development and disaster aid, educational assistance, and purchasing and student placement services. More than \$150 million in medicines and supplies donated by pharmaceutical and surgical supply firms have gone to 80 developing countries.

MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE

Responds to disaster needs and sponsors volunteers, including teachers, who live and work with people in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East. In conjunction with food and clothing distribution, programs encompass housing, education, agriculture, mental and public health and community development.

MISSIONS HEALTH FOUNDATION

Provides material assistance to the developing countries of Asia, Africa, Central America and the Caribbean in medical care and health education. Cooperates with other governmental, public and private groups which have similar goals.

MIZRACHI WOMEN'S ORGANIZATION OF AMERICA

Operates an extensive network of children's villages, vocational and academic high schools, settlement houses, community centers and nurseries in Israel. Emphasis is placed on providing child care, social welfare, and educational programs. Current expansion programs include the completion of two new comprehensive high schools in Tel Aviv and Raanana.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF THE PARTNERS OF THE ALLIANCE

Services, promotes, and raises funds for volunteer Partners of the Americas' committees located in 41 states, linking thousands of private citizens in direct "partnership" with 43 areas in 18 Latin American nations. These partnerships conduct people-to-people and technical assistance exchanges in agriculture, education, health, rehabilitation, cultural arts, community recreation, investment, and tourism. Coordinates multi-national programs in rehabilitation and sports. Develops new partnerships.

NEAR EAST FOUNDATION

Assists governments of developing nations in Asia and Africa to launch programs of rural improvement that later become the full responsibility of the host governments in matters of operation, financing and personnel. Provides experienced technicians who serve in operational as well as advisory positions. Current programs in thirteen countries include agricultural schools, range management, rural water development, agricultural research, irrigation, livestock and crop improvement, disease control and conservation.

OPERATION BOOTSTRAP, TANZANIA

Cooperates with the Ministry of National Education in erecting primary school units and teachers' houses in Northern Tanzania. Building materials consistent with government standards are provided with all labor supplied by people of the village in which the unit is being built. Other related projects are undertaken as the need of the villages or the national government may require.

OPERATION CROSSROADS AFRICA

Operates programs in several countries in Africa. Has cooperative, summer work-study

projects in Africa, mainly for students, and provides assistance to certain African countries with medical, physical education, and teacher training programs.

OXFAM-AMERICA

Provides financial assistance for operational field projects in Africa, Latin America and Asia in both emergency and long term development schemes. The emergency sector includes grants to refugee operations and post-disaster rehabilitation and reconstruction. The long term field includes agricultural and community development projects in rural areas, technical and agricultural training, literacy, public health, nutrition, preventive medicine and family planning.

PAN AMERICAN DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Encourages the establishment of autonomous, national development foundations (NDFs) in Latin America. Provides technical assistance in administrative and financial management and makes grants and loans available to aid NDFs in financing community-level self-help social and economic projects in all Latin American countries. Under a Tools for Freedom program, sends tools and machinery donated by U.S. industry to vocational schools and provides surplus hospital, dental and medical equipment to supplement government public health efforts.

PATHFINDER FUND

Sponsors and funds family planning/population projects by local organizations and individuals in the developing countries. Emphasis is on countries to which family planning is new, and on rapid response to requests that are consonant with Pathfinder's overall objectives. Priority is also given to a) introduction and promotion of more effective contraceptive methods; b) introduction and promotion of more effective systems for delivery of family planning services; c) demonstration of ways to obtain local endorsement of family planning; d) research (usually conducted by local nationals); and e) information, education, and manpower-development activities.

PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE HEALTH FOUNDATION (PROJECT HOPE)

Sponsors the hospital ship S.S. HOPE, land-based programs in countries visited by ship,

and two domestic programs. All are medical teaching-treating programs designed to improve health care by expanding medical knowledge of area physicians, dentists, nurses and allied health personnel. Ship has had missions to Indonesia, South Vietnam, Peru, Ecuador, Guinea, Nicaragua, Colombia, Ceylon, Tunisia, the West Indies, and Brazil. Land-based programs are in operation in Peru, Tunisia, Brazil, Colombia, Jamaica, Barbados, Guyana and Ethiopia.

POLISH AMERICAN IMMIGRATION AND RELIEF COMMITTEE

Assists Polish refugees seeking asylum and resettlement in Western countries, including the United States, Canada, Australia and New Zealand. Maintains offices in Munich, Zindorf, Brussels, Paris, Vienna, Trieste and Rome. Has resettled more than 54,000 refugees.

PROJECT CONCERN

An independent medical/dental training and assistance organization founded in 1961 to develop the physical well-being of people who lack the basic elements of health, education, food, and shelter with self-sufficiency as the ultimate goal. Project Concern operates programs in Vietnam, Hong Kong, Ethiopia, Mexico, Guatemala, Bali, and two rural areas of the United States.

REFUGE DES PETITS

Provides financial support for a children's home in France through a non-profit organization.

DR. JOSE P. RIZAL-GEN. DOUGLAS MACARTHUR MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

Provides medical services, supplies and equipment to needy individuals in the Philippines, offers funds to encourage doctors and dentists to practice in areas of the Philippines that lack doctors, and assists in establishing and supporting medical centers, clinics and hospitals where needed.

SALVATION ARMY - NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS

Provides financial and personnel assistance to projects in education, disaster relief, public health and social welfare. Distributes food and clothing and operates nursery, primary and secondary schools as well as vocational and technical schools, hospitals,

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mobile clinics, children's homes and homes for the aged. Current programs are in Latin America, Africa, India, Bangladesh, the Philippines, Korea, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, New Guinea, Singapore, Malaysia, Taiwan.

SAVE THE CHILDREN FEDERATION

Save the Children Federation historically has sought to advance the wellbeing of children, families and communities by providing grants or interest-free loans for self-help projects and scholarship aid. New multi-purpose impact program combines community development with aid to entire child population of impact area. Active in immediate and long-range disaster rehabilitation, family planning, housing, water systems, agricultural production improvement, community centers, schools, technical assistance and training. Staff and field offices maintained in 11 countries with small programs in six additional countries.

ALBERT SCHWEITZER FELLOWSHIP

Supports the Albert Schweitzer Hospital in Lambarene, Gabon and is presently engaged in helping to raise funds for additional hospital facilities there.

SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST WORLD SERVICE

Assists in rehabilitation for the needy through self-help projects. Operates and provides equipment and material aid for programs in education, agriculture, public health and social welfare. Supports medical facilities in 60 countries, mainly in the developing world.

SHOESHINE BOYS FOUNDATION

Seeks to raise and maintain funds exclusively for charitable purposes, including the relief of homeless children in the Republic of Vietnam. Currently maintains seven hostels in Saigon and Da Nang (staffed by Vietnamese), for approximately two hundred children. Support includes food, shelter, medical and dental care, clothing, educational and vocational training and support of self-help farm projects (2), photography lab, medical clinic and forthcoming Honda repair shop.

STELIOS M. STELSON FOUNDATION

Ships English language educational and other books to institutions overseas and enables U.S. citizens to open corre-

spondence with citizens of other nations. Encourages exchanges of artistic efforts between pupils in U.S. schools and students in other countries.

SUMMER INSTITUTE OF LINGUISTICS

Engages in language research, bilingual educational projects and literacy programs for ethnic minority groups throughout the world and is presently involved in such research for 600 language groups in 24 countries. In Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Guatemala, Panama and Peru the SIL has assisted the National Departments of Education in establishing bilingual educational programs for many of the language groups represented in these countries. In the Philippines, Papua New Guinea and Vietnam the SIL has begun broad literacy programs. SIL undertakes community development projects with other groups in many of these countries.

TOLSTOY FOUNDATION

Seeks to assist victims of war and persecution through rehabilitation in countries of asylum and immigration. While primary concern is for Russian refugees, help is also given to other refugees without distinction of race, nationality or religion. Emphasis is given to refugee immigration and resettlement, counseling and integration into local economies. Homes for the aged have been established in France, Germany, Latin America and U.S.A.

TRAVELERS AID - INTERNATIONAL SOCIAL SERVICE OF AMERICA

Assists people with personal, psychological and situational problems related to movement, migration and family separation within the U.S. and across national boundaries. Through its Intercountry Casework Division, TAISSA is part of a network of branches and cooperating agencies in over 100 countries. WAIF, the Children's Division, assists in arranging for inter-country adoptions and improvement of child care services in U.S. and abroad.

UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST SERVICE COMMITTEE

International programs address institutional oppression and seek to make existing institutions more responsive to the people they exist to serve. Present international projects stress adult education as the necessary first step to social change, specifically training of

community leaders in Guatemala and publication of a newspaper in El Salvador. In addition, UUSC maintains pilot projects in community development - family planning in Haiti and irrigation in Peru.

UNITED HIAS SERVICE

Assists Jewish refugees and migrants to resettle in Western countries for family reunion and freedom from persecution. Services include pre-migration counselling, visa procurement, transportation aid, guidance to relatives, resettlement assistance, adjustment of status assistance, and intervention with governments as necessary. HIAS is a worldwide agency with offices, cooperating committees and agencies in the United States, Canada, Western Europe, Africa, Latin America, Australia, New Zealand and Asia.

UNITED ISRAELI APPEAL

Assists in financing the immigration and absorption of refugees in Israel. Working through the Jewish Agency for Israel, Jerusalem, as its agent, the UIA extends assistance in housing, health, social welfare, youth care and training, agricultural settlement, educational and vocational training, and higher education.

UNITED LITHUANIAN RELIEF FUND OF AMERICA

Provides overseas aid and relief to Lithuanian refugees and displaced persons through food and clothing parcels. Assists the sick, homeless and needy of Lithuanian descent.

UNITED STATES FOUNDATION FOR INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

Disburses financial aid to national Scout associations and sponsors studies of youth movements, Scout financing, leadership training of volunteers and support of the Boy Scouts World Bureau. Ongoing projects include continuing study of philosophy, action and progress of various youth movements around the globe, a financial advisory service for Latin America, support of community development seminars, sustaining continuing training for Scouting professionals around the world.

UNITED UKRAINIAN AMERICAN RELIEF COMMITTEE

Offers relief and rehabilitation services for Ukrainian and other refugees in Austria,

Belgium, France, Germany, Poland, Brazil, Argentina and Yugoslavia. Provides immigration and counseling services, financial assistance for cultural and educational projects, and material and medical aid.

VITA (Volunteers in Technical Assistance)

Responds to individuals and development organizations requesting technical support in project planning, implementation, and problem solving. Through VITA's Technical Information Service and Special Projects Program, volunteer professionals in 30 countries provide information, and devise and adapt designs. Resulting plans are collected, tested, and made available through the Publications' Program, and through various indigenous development programs with whom VITA cooperates. Affiliate Programs in seven developing countries utilize local volunteers to provide on-site assistance to social and economic development projects.

VOLUNTEER BORDER RELIEF

Provides emergency and welfare relief for communities on the border between Mexico and Texas. Services include public health and immigration assistance. A regular food and clothing distribution program is operated across the border for communities in Mexico. Helps crippled and badly burned children, blind persons, those with facial defects by locating benefactors who pay for examinations, treatment, operations and plastic surgery.

WORLD EDUCATION

Provides technical assistance to programs for the functional education of adults in nearly twenty countries on four continents. Working in partnership with private and government agencies, World Education helps to plan, implement, support, and evaluate innovative nonformal education programs, especially those related to literacy, food production, and family planning. In Asia, Africa, and Latin America, World Education is demonstrating that effective learning takes place when educational opportunity intersects with vital daily concerns. This international experience is now being transferred to educational programs for adult learners in the United States. Two decades of association with Literacy House in Lucknow, India, laid the groundwork for this expanding program, which since 1969 has fostered projects crucial to individual

and national development throughout the world.

WORLD NEIGHBORS

Assists self-help programs in cooperation with indigenous programs and people to promote food production, family planning, health education, small industries and leadership training in 28 developing nations of Africa, Asia and Latin America. Two major thrusts are helping people to produce more food and planning their families. Programs assisted are in Burundi, Ethiopia, Kenya, Nigeria, Republic of South Africa, Rhodesia, Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru and Venezuela.

WORLD RELIEF COMMISSION, N.A.E.

WRC, the overseas arm of the National Association of Evangelicals, promotes and conducts programs in agriculture and rural development, child care (including rural medical clinics for children under five), community development, health, nutrition and training. Provides emergency relief to victims of war and disasters. WRC is presently supporting programs in Bangladesh, Chad, Ethiopia, India, Korea, Mali, Niger, Peru, Senegal, Sudan, Thailand, Upper Volta, Vietnam and Yemen. Major projects include a children's hospital, extensive programs in agriculture and rural development and vocational training in Vietnam; and programs in agriculture and rural development, family planning, vocational training, and rural medical clinics for children under five in Bangladesh.

WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE

Operates a broad program of assistance to students and to institutions of higher education in Africa, Asia, Latin America and Europe. Sponsors international cooperation programs for students and professors and provides material and technical assistance for educational facilities and in support of student health, housing and emergency relief projects.

WORLD VISION RELIEF ORGANIZATION

Delivers commodities to meet emergency needs in crisis and disaster situations and supplies ongoing programs in Cambodia,

Vietnam, Laos, India, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Korea and the Philippines. In addition to providing specific items as requested, WVRO regularly ships food, medicines and medical equipment, educational material and clothing. Various types of emergency assistance went to Cambodia, Bangladesh, Nicaragua, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, the Philippines and Upper Volta during 1973.

YMCA - INTERNATIONAL DIVISION

Manages an overseas assistance program for the YMCAs of the United States aimed at establishing and strengthening YMCAs in other countries. Financial and technical help are provided for YMCA Movements in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Europe and Latin America. There is heavy concentration on helping the Nationals of the YMCA Movement to improve their own capacity for giving direction to their own work. Additional assistance is given to YMCAs to assist them when crises arise in their country due to flood, famine or war.

WORLD RELATIONS UNIT, NATIONAL BOARD OF THE YWCA OF THE U.S.A.

Emphasizes cooperation in leadership development, assistance in building projects, grants for program and administration, elimination of racial discrimination, and the strengthening of women's role in development. Assistance is provided YWCAs in Africa, South America, Asia, the South Pacific, and the Middle East. In some countries provides the help of staff or volunteers.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON VOLUNTARY FOREIGN AID

The present charter of the Advisory Committee provides that its objective is: "To serve as a focal point for relations between the U.S. Government and U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation, and development overseas." Its duties, as outlined in the charter, may be condensed as follows:

1. "To register qualified U.S. private, nonprofit organizations voluntarily seeking and accepting registration. . .to assure their bona fides to the public and to maintain and publish a register of such organizations. The register constitutes the authoritative listing of those organizations which may apply to the United States Government for (a) reimbursement for transportation charges of donated supplies and receipt of Government-owned excess property under sections 216 and 607. . .of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, and (b) receipt of agricultural commodities under Title II of the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954, as amended. . . ."
2. To provide information and advice to A.I.D. (and other U.S. Government agencies) relating to foreign assistance "in which U.S. Government and the private voluntary organizations interact."
3. To provide assistance to the community of private and voluntary organizations working abroad relative to problems and issues in their relations with A.I.D. and other Federal agencies.
4. To foster public interest in voluntary foreign aid.

By Presidential direction the Advisory Committee is now attached to the Agency for International Development, Bureau for Population and Humanitarian Assistance, and its staff operations are supported through that Bureau's Office of Private & Voluntary Cooperation. The Committee is subject to the standards set by the Federal Advisory Committee Act of 1972 and Executive Order No. 11686.

The Regulations also authorize the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid to establish and maintain a register of qualified agencies voluntarily accepting registration.
