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Highlights of U. S. Voluntary Agencies' Activities

As of June 30, 1979 there were 138 private and voluntary agencies registered with the Agency for International Development's Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid. Through registration these agencies are eligible to apply to participate in the overseas freight subsidy, Food for Peace, and the U. S. Government-owned excess property programs.

Total income received during this reporting period was \$1,156 million. Private contributions (cash, supplies, and equipment) totaled \$554 million. U. S. Government support in the form of grants, contracts, excess property, P. L. 480 donated food, transportation costs for this food, and overseas reimbursement for the agencies' own donated supplies totaled \$448 million.

In addition to participation in the overseas freight subsidy, Food for Peace, and the U. S. Government-owned excess property programs, a number of registered agencies received program support grants from the Agency for International Development. These grants are designed to assist these agencies in their overseas development work that furthers the goals of the Foreign Assistance legislation. The agencies' self-help programs include activities such as rural and agricultural development, housing, preventive health care, family planning, and non-formal and vocational education in the developing countries. They are also deeply involved in refugee and migration activities. The work of these organizations is a valuable contribution and A.I.D. is seeking to expand its cooperation and support.

The private and voluntary agencies also provided emergency support in the form of food, clothing and medicine to victims of disasters in Ethiopia, Sudan, Belize, Honduras, Nicaragua, Bangladesh, India, Lebanon, Sri Lanka, Indonesia and Korea.

Six registered voluntary agencies also helped feed 41 million people in 44 countries under the Food for Peace program. These programs were administered by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, CARE, Catholic Relief Services, Church World Service, Lutheran World Relief, Seventh-Day Adventist World Service.

Register of Voluntary Agencies

Who they are and what they do

The rules governing the registration of non-governmental nonprofit agencies engaged in voluntary foreign aid are promulgated in Part 203, Chapter II, Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations. Such aid includes projects and services of development, relief, and rehabilitation to needy nationals and refugees in health, education, welfare, agriculture, industry, emigration, and resettlement. The Regulations also authorize the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid to establish and maintain a register of qualified agencies voluntarily accepting registration. Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid

The present charter of the Advisory Committee provides that its objective is: "To serve as a focal point for relations between the U.S. Government and U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation, and development overseas." Its duties, as outlined in the charter, are:

1. To register qualified U.S. private, nonprofit organizations engaging in overseas voluntary aid programs and seeking to be registered. Such registered organizations are then eligible to apply for participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace, and Government-owned excess property programs.
2. To provide information and advice to the Agency for International Development (A.I.D.) and other U.S. Government agencies relating to areas of foreign assistance in which the government and private and voluntary organizations interact.
3. To provide assistance to the community of private and voluntary organizations working abroad, relative to problems and issues in their relations with A.I.D. and other Federal agencies.
4. To foster public interest in voluntary foreign aid and the activities of the private and voluntary organizations.

The Advisory Committee is attached to the Agency for International Development. The advisory functions of the Committee are subject to the standards set by the Federal Advisory Committee Act of 1972.
