# Preface

This report is the result of technical assistance provided by the Economic Modernization through Efficient Reforms and Governance Enhancement (EMERGE) Activity, under contract with the CARANA Corporation, Nathan Associates Inc. and The Peoples Group (TRG) to the United States Agency for International Development, Manila, Philippines (USAID/Philippines) (Contract No. AFP-I-00-03-00020-00, Delivery Order 800). The EMERGE Activity is intended to contribute towards the Government of the Republic of the Philippines (GRP) Medium Term Philippine Development Plan (MTPDP) and USAID/Philippines' Strategic Objective 2, "Investment Climate Less Constrained by Corruption and Poor Governance." The purpose of the activity is to provide technical assistance to support economic policy reforms that will cause sustainable economic growth and enhance the competitiveness of the Philippine economy by augmenting the efforts of Philippine pro-reform partners and stakeholders.

This report covers the proceedings of the two-day Orientation/Workshop for the Philippine National Single Window, which was held on August 7 and 8, 2007. Commissioner of Customs Napoleon Morales requested EMERGE to provide assistance in conducting the workshop and designated MISTG Deputy Commissioner Alexander Arevalo, who is also the Chairman of the ASEAN Single Window Steering Committee, to convene the various relevant agencies that will become part of the NSW network. The workshop participants produced a work plan that will be presented to the NSW Steering Committee when it meets to implement Executive Order (EO) 482, which created the NSW Task Force for Cargo Clearance on December 27, 2005, to ensure a coherent and effective formulation, coordination, implementation and monitoring of the international trade NSW. The NSW will allow (a) a single submission of data and information; (b) a single and synchronous processing of data and information; and (c) a single decision-making for customs inspection, clearance, and release of cargoes. Dr. Ramon L. Clarete, EMERGE Technical Director and Deputy Chief of Party, provided the requested assistance to organize the workshop, and Arlan Z. I. Brucal served as research associate/documenter.

**Proceedings**

This technical assistance aims to help the Philippine Government develop a Plan to Establish its National Single Window and meet its obligations under Article 5 of the ASEAN Single Window Agreement. Specifically, the requested assistance will be applied to help the Bureau of Customs convene and hold the orientation, team building and workshop of the relevant Philippine government agencies which have the mandate of regulating internationally traded goods in the public interest, as well as present the NSW Work Plan to the Philippine NSW Steering Committee.

President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo through EO 482 created the National Single Window (NSW) Task Force for Cargo Clearance on December 27, 2005 to ensure a coherent and effective formulation, coordination, implementation and monitoring of the international trade NSW. The members of the Task Force are the relevant national government agencies, which have the direct mandate to regulate internationally traded goods. President Arroyo created the Task Force with the Steering Committee (SC) directing and ensuring the effective implementation of the Plan to Establish the NSW, and the Technical Working Group (TWG) which attends to the day to day implementation of the Plan.

The Bureau of Customs chairs both levels of the Task Force. As the designated Chair Agency of the NSW Task Force, Commissioner of Customs Napoleon Morales requested the USAID-supported EMERGE project to provide assistance in conducting an orientation, team building and workshop for the Philippine National Single Window. Commissioner Morales designated MISTG Deputy Commissioner Alexander Arevalo, who is also the Chairman of the ASEAN Single Window Steering Committee, to convene the various relevant agencies which will become part of the NSW network and hold the orientation and workshop. The Work Plan which the participants of the workshop will produce will be presented to the NSW Steering Committee when they meet as soon as possible to implement EO 482.

The requested technical assistance for the NSW is both a trade capacity building and governance enhancement reform, which is driven by information technology. The NSW allows (a) a single submission of data and information; (b) a single and synchronous processing of data and information; and (c) a single decision-making for customs inspection, clearance, and release of cargoes. Not only does the NSW aim to establish an effective and efficient system in expediting customs cargo clearance and release to promote trade facilitation, it is likewise considered as a catalyst for reforms in business procedures, organizational structure, and human resource systems in the agencies forming the nodes of the NSW network.

**Orientation/Workshop:**  
**Planning for the National Single Window**

This two-day event aims to provide its participants an orientation about the ASEAN single window agreement, mechanics of the national single window, and dimensions of institutional capacity needed for establishing the national single window. Annex 1 shows the tentative program of the proposed orientation/workshop. The timing of the presentations and discussions may be adjusted in order to give time to team building exercises. Deputy Commissioner Arevalo has expressed the importance of attaining a limited level of bonding among at least the representatives of the agencies forming the Technical Working Group of the National Single Window Task Force. In Annex 2, we show the list of proposed invitees to the Orientation/Workshop. At most two from each of these agencies will be invited.

An important product of the Orientation/Workshop is the National Single Window Work Plan. Following Article 5 of the ASEAN Single Window Agreement, the Philippines and the rest of the non-transition country members of the ASEAN have the obligation to be ready with their respective NSWs on January 1, 2008.

**Proceedings**

Co-sponsored by the Bureau of Customs (BOC) and with technical assistance from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) mission in the Philippines, the orientation cum workshop planning for the Philippine National Single Window (NSW) focused mainly on discussing and formulating of the National Work Plan. The activity was undertaken, pursuant to Executive Order 482 creating the NSW Task Force for Cargo Clearance<sup>1</sup> and to the Agreement on creating the Association for Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Single Window (ASW). Under the ASW agreement, the Philippines is obliged to implement the NSW by 01 January 2008. The program included Working Group discussions to develop the national work plan, aiming to identify a modality for a consensus-based national strategy which would state the immediate steps that need to be taken by individual agencies as well as collectively to move toward the long term objective of establishing the NSW.

The orientation cum workshop brought together participants from forty seven different concerned government agencies and private sector stakeholders, which are considered to be part of the NSW network. The Work Plan which the participants of the workshop produced will be presented to the NSW Steering Committee when they meet to implement EO 482.

BOC Commissioner Napoleon Morales delivered the welcome address. In his address, he underscored the importance of establishing the NSW, including, among others, the provision of the most efficient services for traders, thereby enabling the trading community to be more competitive. Meanwhile, improved governance and better use of

resources on the part of the government can also be brought about by the establishment of the NSW. There are nevertheless cost and administrative implications inherent in the initiative, thus consensus and coordinated efforts of all trade-related and regulatory bodies of the government and private sector stakeholders as well are among the critical success factors.

### **Orientation and Workshop Outcomes**

BOC Management Information Systems and Technology Group Deputy Commissioner Alexander Arevalo acquainted the participants on the ASEAN Single Window and (ASW) the NSW while highlighting the strategies for developing the two facilities.<sup>2</sup> Also the Chairman of the ASEAN Single Window Committee, Dep. Comm. Arevalo defined the ASEAN Single Window as the environment where National Single Windows of Member Countries operate and integrate, thereby making the latter the building block of the regional facility. The agreement to establish and implement the ASW stipulates that the ASEAN6, which includes the Philippines, need to operationalize their NSWs by 2008, while 2012 for the ASEAN4. Meanwhile, the NSW is a system which enables (i) single submission of data and information; (ii) single and synchronous processing of data and information; and (iii) single decision-making for Customs release and clearance, all targeted to achieve the maximum release time of 30 minutes. In order to implement the systems, concerned agencies should focus on tangible deliverables and resource mobilization and consider centralized planning but decentralized implementation.

The orientation noted with great interest the enabling factor of the NSW as Atty. Reynaldo Umali, Deputy Commissioner, Revenue Collection Monitoring Group, discussed the legal framework for the NSW program.<sup>3</sup> Aside from the ASW Agreement, the program can be traced from the E-Commerce Law of 2000 (Republic Act 8792) enacted principally to promote the universal use of electronic transactions in the government and by the general public. It was then reinforced by DTI-DOST-DBM-BSP joint Administrative Order (AO) No.2 (series of 2002) which laid down the implementing rules and regulations (IRR) on electronic authentication and electronic signatures; and later on by the accession of the Philippines in 2002 to the WIPO Copyright Treaty and WIPO Performance and Phonograms Treaty which protects IP rights of those who use the internet for commerce. Notwithstanding these enabling factors, crafting and execution of inter-agency agreements in support to the NSW remains a challenge. Therefore, Atty. Umali urged the concerned agencies to look at their specific mandates and (IRR) to pursue NSW without having the legislators amend a law or enact a new one as these normally require longer time to materialize.

Key to the presentation of Atty. Reynaldo Nicolas is to give the participants the perspective of where the NSW is needed to facilitate trade by walking them through the high level cargo clearance processes, from the lodgment of import entries up to the “second border” control.<sup>4</sup> Essentially, the NSW could play a vital role in the lodgment of entries by harmonizing and standardizing the collection of data. NSW is also needed to

facilitate decisions on valuation and clarification issues as it connects BOC with the regulators and other relevant government agencies. At the payment processes, NSW connectivity with authorized banks, the Insurance Commission and relevant agencies facilitates reconciliation of payments and assessment and bond-supported payments. NSW can also enhance security check for high-risk cargoes, i.e. the disclosure of product description in the ASEAN Customs Declaration Document (ACDD).

The orientation also disclosed the components of the Philippine NSW Work Plan including the technical aspects and tools for implementing the facility. To have a clearer picture on how the facility works, Director Josephine Nagallo of the BOC-MISTG rendered a comprehensive overview of the pilot implementation of the ASEAN Single Window which centered on the Philippines-Thailand Pilot Single Window.<sup>5</sup> The said pilot test enabled exchange of e-documents, such as Export Declaration and CEPT-Form D, between BOC and the Royal Thai Customs. Existing local automated processes have also been illustrated with the discussion on Electronic Manifest System currently operational at the Manila International Airport Authority (MIAA) and the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA). Dir. Nagallo also gave an overview of the e-customs Project of the BOC, which includes the Inter-Agency Information Exchange Gateway or the NSW, the Client Profile Registration System (CPRS), Licensing and Clearance System and the Project E2M which aims to revolutionize the business process of the BOC by making it mobile and wireless. To surmise, the technology that relates to the implementation of the NSW is not limited to the existing ones that concerned agencies are currently utilizing. Rather, there are those that are yet to be discovered and could probably transfigure existing business processes and procedures to make them more effective and efficient.

In order to complement the inputs from the perspective of the technical aspects of the NSW, Dr. Ramon Clarete, Technical Director of the USAID-EMERGE Project, presented a framework for preparing the NSW Work Plan comprising of the elements of institutional capacity for the NSW.<sup>6</sup> In particular, he laid down the strategy map for the formulation and implementation of the NSW, which underscored the need for the selection and sequencing of activities; identification of goals, objectives, outputs, and activities; description of the cause and effect relationships of one to the other, and how all these relate to the “environment”; and most importantly the hierarchy of results, with lower level results acting as inputs into higher level results. Also related to institutional capacity of the NSW is the resource requirement for the work plan wherein the government, private sector stakeholders and development partners can contribute, for instance, to the development of diagnostic studies or in the identification of appropriate business models.

The program also included two pilot implementations of NSW primarily to identify from their experiences practical issues as well as the advantages of undertaking initiatives towards the realization of the NSW. One such experience is that of the Department of Agriculture (DA) regulators on Sanitary and Phyto-sanitary (SPS) administration

reforms, as presented by Dr. Simeon S. Amurao, Jr., OIC-Chief, Veterinary Quarantine Service, DA-RFU IV.<sup>7</sup> Key constraints to implementing the pilot test includes ICT infrastructure, legal impediments, technical assistance, financial constraints, and resistance to change amongst concerned line agencies within the department. Notwithstanding, the said pilot test enabled harmonization of SPS processes, including, among others, import licensing, product registration, and facility accreditation. Although there are still issues that need to be resolved within the system, Dr. Amurao stressed that the department is ready to connect with the BOC and initiate bilateral data exchange.

Mr. Frederick Santillana from the Bureau of Import Services (BIS) presented their experience with the pilot implementation of a standardized process flow in the importation of vehicles, parts and equipment.<sup>8</sup> Before, the process flow requires manual processing of application forms and authority to import (CAI). With technical assistance from BOC, the agency has now formulated a more efficient processed flow which entails online submission and processing of application forms and import clearances.

### ***Conclusions***

Participants have prepared and agreed on the common NSW Work Plan, which will be presented to the NSW Steering Committee when they meet in September 2007 to implement EO 482.

Participants also recognized that the initiative generally requires continuous inter-agency collaboration among them in order to achieve the overall goal of establishing the NSW by January 2008.

Overall, the orientation and workshop effectively put forward the knowledge and ideas of concerned government agencies and private sector organizations in developing an effective NSW work plan while underscoring the need for deepened cooperation and inter-agency coordination. The delegates expressed their deep appreciation to BOC and USAID for conducting this very worthwhile and fruitful event.

### ***First Meeting of the Technical Committee of the National Single Window Task Force***

At the end of the Orientation/Workshop, Deputy Commissioner Alexander Arevalo in his capacity as the representative of the Chairman of the Technical Working Group of the National Single Window Task Force, Commissioner of Customs Napoleon Morales, convened the first meeting of the NSW Technical Committee.

The agenda of the meeting was the adoption of the Work Plan for the National Single Window and the minutes of the meeting.<sup>9</sup>

The members of the Technical Working Group along with the representatives of the other regulators, who together make up the National Single Window network, adopted the

Work Plan and the minutes of the First Meeting of the NSW TC. The Work Plan will be presented to the National Single Window Steering Committee for its consideration and approval in its first meeting as soon as this can be scheduled.

With the approval by the TWG and all of the workshop participants of the Work Plan and the minutes of the meeting, the TWG adjourned its meeting.

Deputy Commissioner Arevalo then gave his closing remarks on the Orientation/ Workshop on the Philippine National Single Window.

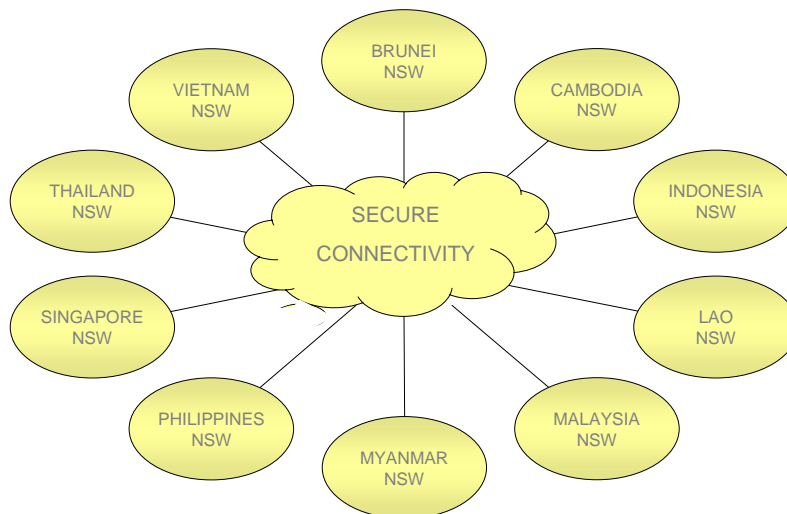


## ASEAN & NATIONAL SINGLE WINDOWS CONCEPT

One-to-Many and Bottom-to-Top Strategy

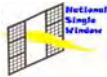


## ASEAN SINGLE WINDOW CONCEPTUAL MODEL

## Multilateral Agreements for NSW

- ASEAN member countries have obligations under the GATT 1994, which stipulates for the adoption of international best practices in trade facilitation, such as the use of single windows.
- Member countries had acceded or in the process of acceding to the Revised Kyoto Convention on the Simplification and Harmonization of Customs Procedures, including single windows.

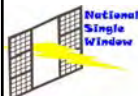


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## ASEAN NSW Agreement

- July 2003. ASEAN DGs of Customs adopted trade facilitation measures under the single window mechanism in support of the implementation of freer trade and economic community.
- ASEAN leaders in pursuit of the Bali Concord II endorsed the core customs cooperation to reduce transaction cost through the ASEAN trade single window.
- ASEAN leaders agreed to adopt the Single Window approach at national and regional levels on December 9, 2006.

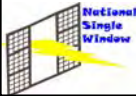

## Basis for the Philippine NSW

- Sec. 5 of the ASW Agreement obliges member countries to “develop and implement their National Single Windows (NSWs) for the establishment of the ASEAN Single Window”.
- The NSWs of Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines, Thailand and Singapore shall be ready by 2008.
- Transition countries of ASEAN are given until 2012 to have their NSWs up and running.

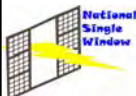

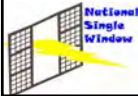


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## e-Commerce Law

- The Electronic Commerce Act (R.A. 8792) was enabled in 2000 to "...to promote the universal use of electronic transactions in the government and by the general public."
- The DTI, the DBM and the BSP in 2002 jointly laid down the Implementing Rules and Regulations for the Electronic Commerce Act.
- Administrative Order No. 2 (series of 2002), jointly issued by DTI, DOST, DBM and the BSP in 2002, laid down the Implementing Rules and Regulations on Electronic Authentication and Electronic Signatures.



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## Protection of Personal Data in ICT Systems

- DTI Administrative Order No. 8 (series of 2006) prescribes for the Guidelines for the Protection of Personal Data in Information and Communications System in the Private Sector. The guidelines:
  - ◆ encourage and provide support to private entities to adopt privacy policies for the protection of personal data in information and communications system in the private sector.
  - ◆ prescribe the rules governing data protection certifiers.
  - ◆ apply to the processing of all types of personal data whether such data refers to any natural or legal person, and without regard to whether or not that personal data is of local origin or from foreign countries.

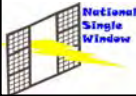


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## Consumer Protection in e-Banking

- The Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) in 2006 issued Circular No. 542, providing for consumer protection for electronic banking.
  - ◆ Banks are obliged to implement minimum security measures in its automated teller machine (ATM) facilities and internet or mobile banking activities to protect depositors and consumers from fraud, robbery and other e-banking crimes.
  - ◆ Guidelines are set:
    - to safeguard customer information
    - prevents money laundering and terrorist financing;
    - Reduces fraud and theft of sensitive information;
    - Promotes legally enforceable e-banking supported agreements and economic transactions

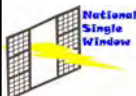


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## Intellectual Property Protection in the Internet

- The Philippine Senate in 2002 ratified the two internet treaties, namely
  - ◆ WIPO Copyright Treaty (WCT)
  - ◆ WIPO Performances and Phonograms Treaty (WPPT).
- The accession of the Philippines to these treaties is an important step towards the recognition and protection of IP rights of those who use the internet for their commerce.

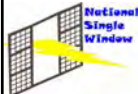


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## Important Provision in EO 482

- “Government Departments and Agencies involved in the cargo clearance release must cooperate with each other in order to provide the Bureau of Customs with automated electronic system required for the establishment, implementation, and operation of the NSW, and eventually the ASW.”

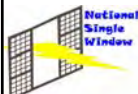


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## Examples of Inter-agency Agreements

- A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Bureau of Customs (BOC) and the Department of Agriculture (DA) was signed in December 2006
  - ◆ for the pilot implementation of the NSW between the DA and the BOC
- A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) was signed last October 2006 among BOC, Philippine National Police (PNP), Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA), and the Semiconductor and Electronics Industries of the Philippines in line with the objective of the National Single Window.



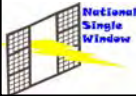

# Challenges

- Passage of laws
  - ◆ Anti-Cyber Crime Act. It aims to curb illegal activities committed in cyberspace, including computer fraud, forgery and sabotage and unauthorized access.
  - ◆ Enabling by domestic law the internet IP treaties, which the Senate ratified in 2002.
  - ◆ Customs code modernization to recognize and enable the internationally best practices in trade facilitation and customs administration such as the single window.
- Crafting and execution of inter-agency agreements in support of the NSW.
  - ◆ Prescription of monitoring and dispute settlement procedures in such agreements.
  - ◆ Prescription of enabling improvements into existing agreements.

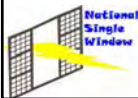
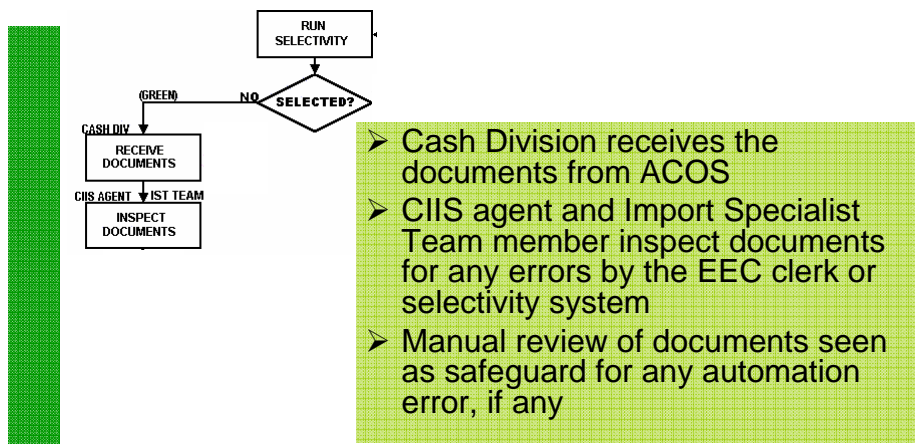
- BOC's Automated Computer Operating System (ACOS) assesses if the import entry will be selected to follow the red or yellow lanes
- Selectivity system comprises a set of queries or screens depending upon the revenue and compliance risks

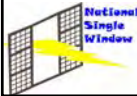

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## Potential NSW Role!

- In their review of the documents, the IST, CIIS, or the Cash Division staff may raise a compliance issue or note an error in the document.
- Information is required from any of the possible nodes:
  - ◆ AA Banks (**EXISTING NODE!**) on information on payment made by importer
  - ◆ Sources of price information (IST tends to focus on valuation issues)
  - ◆ Value added service provider for possible mistakes in digitizing information

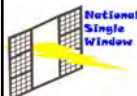


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## Selected Entries

- Entries are selected
  - ◆ if they the imported merchandise is regulated which may require document and physical inspection
  - ◆ a serious compliance risk is identified which requires both document review and physical inspection
  - ◆ A valuation issue was identified by the selectivity system
- These processes (red and yellow lane) are done by the Formal Entry Division of the Collection Districts or Ports
- At least 80 per cent of entries are selected.

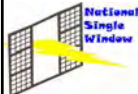


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## Yellow Lane: *"Follow the yellow brick road!"*

- Document review undertaken:
  - ◆ List of required documents
  - ◆ Integrity/authenticity of the documents
- Consignment integrity check
  - ◆ Consistency of the information of the import entry document with the conditions stipulated by the regulator in the import permit in the case of regulated imports
- Cargo clearance cannot proceed without completing the yellow lane.
- Failure to complete the yellow lane requires deliberation of the matter by a special Committee, higher level officials under or above the district in consultation with the border inspector of the regulator, in the case of regulated imports.



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## Red Lane



- Besides a thorough check of the customs declaration documents, the merchandise covered are inspected.
- A customs examiner (COO3) conducts the inspection with the respective border inspectors of the regulators (in the case of regulated imports).
- Inspector is advised by supervisor of the reason for inspecting the cargoes.
- Cargo clearance cannot proceed back to green lane without completing the red lane.
- Failure to complete the red lane requires the deliberation of the matter by a special Committee, higher level officials under or above the collection district in consultation with the border inspector of the regulator, in the case of regulated imports.



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## VCRC Process

- If yellow or red lane entries have passed the document review and/or inspection **and** they don't have valuation or classification issues, they are transferred to the green lane.
- Import entries have a valuation issue if their declared values fall out of the value ranges (a selectivity screen).
- Those with classification issues are merchandise with unclear HSN classification.
- Valuation and classification issues are elevated to the VCRC (above the districts), with authority to decide on the matter.



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## VCRC Process

- Decisions on valuation issues may be resolved with providing information supporting the authenticity of the declared values.
- BOC requires intervention by the Tariff Commission to help resolve a classification issue.
- If needed, goods may be released conditionally with a customs bond.
- Completion of the VCRC process entitles the customs declaration to be routed to the cash division for final processing.



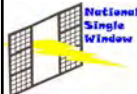
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## Potential NSW Role!

- In their review of the documents, the examiner may raise possible compliance issues such as:
  - ◆ Incompleteness of the documents
  - ◆ Integrity of the documents
  - ◆ Consignment integrity or internal consistency of the documents
  - ◆ After inspection, merchandise brought in are inconsistent with those declared.
- They may also raise valuation and classification issues.
- NSW connectivity with the regulators, Insurance Commission, Tariff Commission, and other relevant government agencies are needed to facilitate decisions on the above issues which has slowed down the cargo clearance process.



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## Cash Division Processing

- Cash Division of the District runs the Automated Matching of Payment and Payables (AMPP).
- If payments made and assessment match, the Cash Division sends the cargo release instruction to arrastre via the On Line Release System (OLRS).
- If they don't, importer may pay the additional assessments.
- This formally ends the BOC assessment and cargo clearance process.



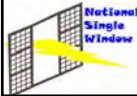
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## Potential NSW Role!

- At the cash division, a payments issue may arise.
- NSW connectivity with the AA banks, Insurance Commission and other relevant government agencies is needed to facilitate reconciliation of payments and assessment and bond-supported payments.

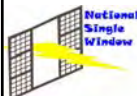


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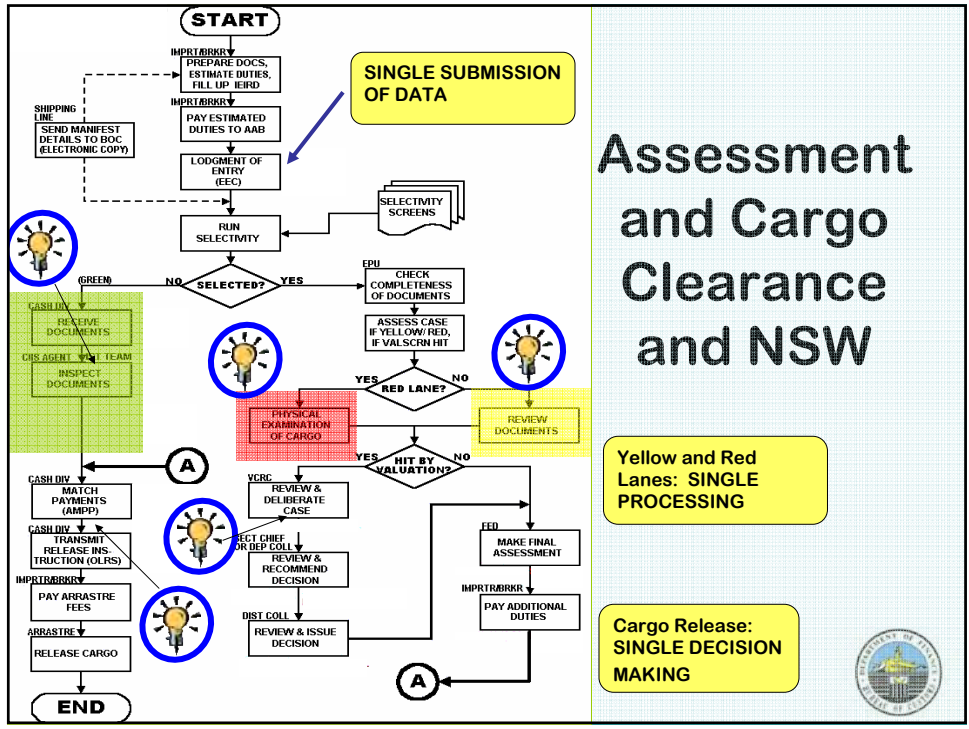
## Outside the Customs Zone

- Arrastre receives the release instruction through OLRS.
- Importer/broker pays the arrastre fees.
- Arrastre releases the cargoes to the importer.
- Some regulators may require further processing (so-called "second border") but this is not within the BOC jurisdiction.

  - ◆ Systems
  - ◆ organization Structure
  - ◆ human resource Skills

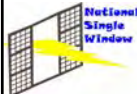


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# What is Strategy

- The selection and sequencing of activities by a set of actors and how these will produce the outputs needed to attain the stated objectives and goals of the actors.
- Identify goals, objectives, outputs, and activities.
- Describe the cause and effect relationships of one to the other, and how all these relate to the “environment”.
- Hierarchy of results
  - ◆ Goals, objectives, key result areas, project activities can be referred to as “results”.
  - ◆ A lower level result is an input into a higher level result.



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# Crafting the Strategy

- Identification, selection and sequencing of component activities/results of a strategy depends upon:
  - ◆ Diagnosis of the capacity of the institution to perform, state of its environment and its stated high level goals and objectives (or its vision and mission)
  - ◆ The cause and effect relationships of “input” and “output” results
  - ◆ Relative ease of attaining lower level results
  - ◆ Timing
- At any one time, performance capacity of an institution is determined by the state of its most limiting capacity dimension.
- Generally, environmental factors are given in the definition of the strategy
  - ◆ However, more creative strategists undertake institutionally doable changes in the environment as part of their strategy



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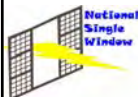


# High Level Results (“outputs”)

- Greater transparency and accountability in cargo release
- Reduced transaction cost to engage in trade
- Efficient cargo clearance through improved coordination among government agencies improved
- Higher tax revenues

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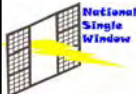


# Strategy Map for the NSW

  - ◆ Reformers in government consider the consultants to genuinely share their reform objectives and acknowledge their unique technical contribution.
- **Political economy principle**
  - ◆ Reform process is managed. Risks of political isolation on the part of reformers are mitigated. Chances of winning stakeholders to the reform are enhanced.

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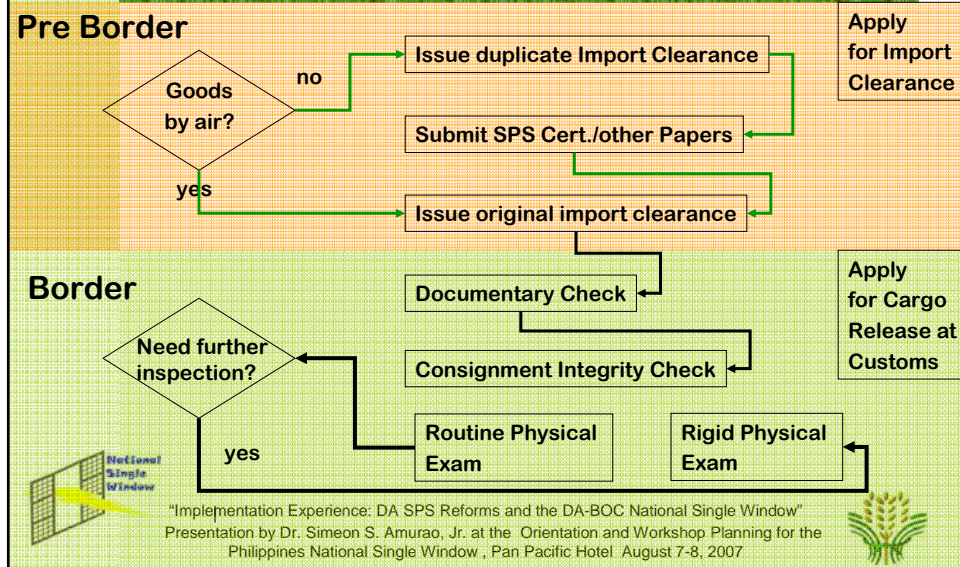
# High Level SPS Process Flow



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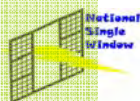

# Clearance and Border Inspection Objectives

- Efficiently and effectively enforce measures to (a) protect plant and animal health and (b) ensure food safety
- Promote better monitoring of imports vis-à-vis clearances issued
- Harmonize the process across DA agencies to the extent practicable

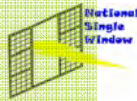


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# Import Clearance Validity

- As long as commodity is shipped out (a) on or before “must ship out” date indicated on clearance but (b) not before issuance of SPS clearance. Must ship out by:
  - ❖ 20 days for fresh and chilled fruits and vegetables;
  - ❖ 30 days for eggs, milk and dairy products, animal feeds and feed ingredients and other products of animal origin i.e. embryos and semen, frozen fruits and vegetables
  - ❖ 90 days for veterinary biological and drug products
  - ❖ 60 days for live animals, fish and fishery/aquatic products, meat and meat products, fertilizers, pesticides and other agricultural chemicals. and all other products
- As long as fish, fishery/aquatic products arrive 30 days from issuance if consigned by air and 60 days if by sea.

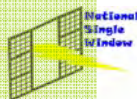


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# Clearance Revocation

- Any time by issuing agency
- May be appealed with DA Secretary
- Without prejudice to holder being further subject to penalties

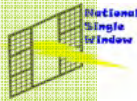


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## Grounds for Clearance Revocation

- Providing false information in the application form or in any of the accompanying documents
- Mis-declaration of consignment
- Violation of relevant SPS and biosafety rules and regulations or conditions imposed in the Clearance
- Refusal to allow inspection of physical containment facility or intermediate destination
- Legal authority to commercially distribute the product in country of origin has been suspended or revoked; or
- New information indicating that the use of product will result to risks to human, animal or plant health or life and the environment

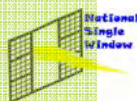


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## Reasons for Refusing Entries

- Product/commodity manufactured, processed or packed under unsanitary conditions
- Product/commodity forbidden or restricted from sale in the country where it was produced or exported
- Product/commodity adulterated, contaminated, dangerous, noxious, misbranded, mis-declared, unregistered or in violation of the terms and conditions embodied in the Clearance and sanitary and/or phytosanitary measures;
- Product arriving without the required SPS Clearance and International SPS Certificate or using a fake SPS Clearance

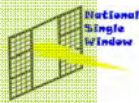


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## Disposition Options for Products Refused An Entry

- Confiscated and destroyed
- Returned to the country of origin
- Shipped to a third country

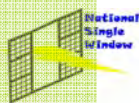


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## Confiscation

- At port and in transit: by BOC on information from DA inspector
- At 2<sup>nd</sup> point of border control: by DA agency
- DA Secretary or authorized representative may formally investigate and conduct summary hearing on the proper disposition of the product/ commodity
- Disposition shall be at the expense of the importer

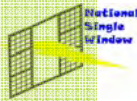

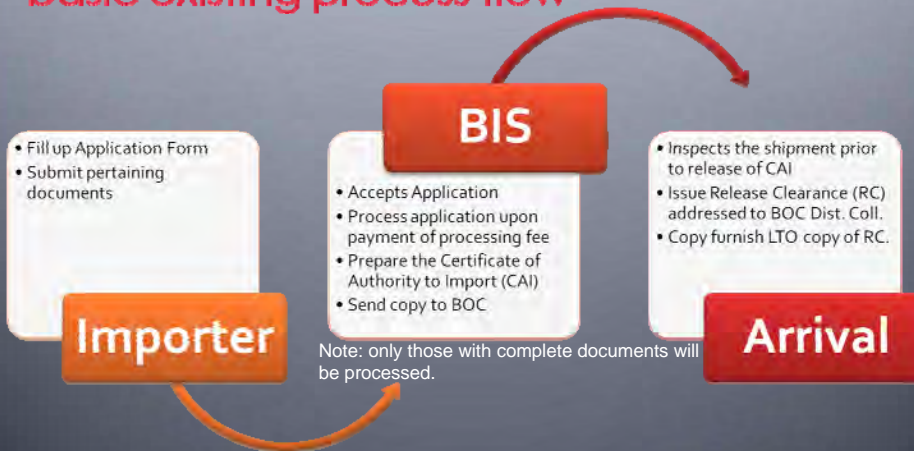

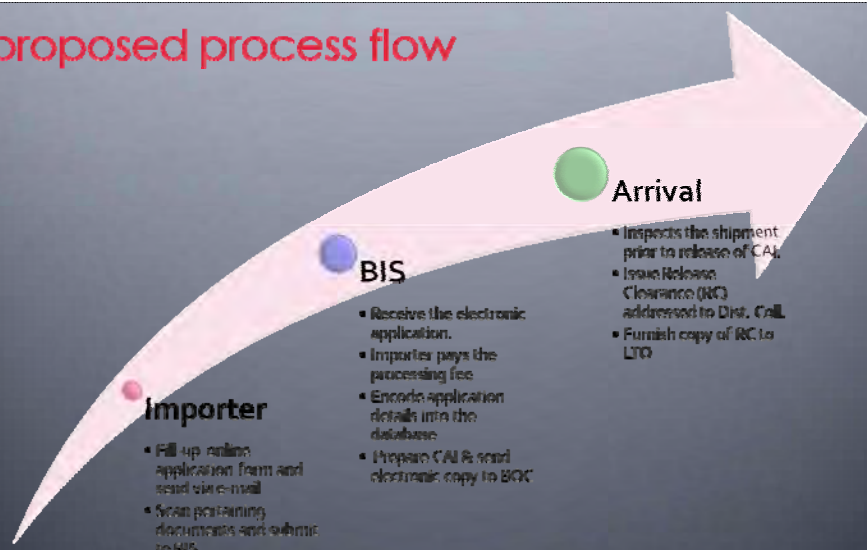
