F O R E W O R D

This summary of non-military Free World Assistance to Vietnam presents a compendium of bilateral assistance granted by individual countries since the Government of Vietnam on July 15, 1964, launched a formal appeal to the Free World for material and technical assistance. (For reporting purposes, however, July 1 is used as the control date.)

Forty-three countries, in addition to the United States, have responded in various ways in contributing manpower, materiel, and training at an estimated total value of \$80,727,857. This total is comprised of thirty-four Free World countries contributing an estimated \$63,076,336 and nine other countries, whose assistance, strictly speaking, does not fall within the Free World Assistance classification, contributing an estimated \$17,651,521.

While official government sources account for the major share of assistance provided to Vietnam, numerous foreign voluntary agencies and professional societies have also contributed and, where such assistance has been sponsored by Free World governments, it has been included in this report.

In addition to the detailed country listing of contributions, there is included a summary of the estimated value of assistance by countries, a tabulation giving the number of foreign technicians in Vietnam and the number of trainees in donor countries, charts depicting the percentage of aid by type of assistance and field of activity, and maps showing the location of material aid when such assistance is geographically identifiable. (U.S. programs are excluded in these tabulations.)






